Dr. Coit, on behalf of the school exhibition committee, reported the work in progress and that the sum of \$250 had been collected from citizens towards carrying it on.

Mr. Tamplin, secretary of the recently formed athletic association, asked and was assured the aid of the Club in making the association a success.

Interesting Church Service

The service at the Baptist church on Sunday evening was under the auspices of the College Y. M. C. A. Dr. MacDonald presided and he was assisted by Mr. Longley, president of the Y. M. C. A. The speaker was Rev. W. A. White, of Halifax, and his address was on the work among the colored people of Nova Scotia. A vocal solo by Mr. Paul Cross, and a violin solo by Miss Helen DeWolfe, were both much enjoyed. The song service with which the evening service always opens was conducted by Dr. Spidle and led by the Wolfville orchestra. The choir consisted of twenty-five members of the Y. M. C. A.

At the close of the service the rite of baptism was administered to six candidates.

Death of Lieut. Palmeter

The death of Lieut. John Beverley Palmeter, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry M. Palmeter, of North Grand Pre, occurred early on Sunday morning, after an illness of some months. Lieut. Palmeter was 24 years of age, and was a splendid young fellow with many friends who heard with sincere sorrow of his death.

On May 1st, 1916, he enlisted at Halifax as a gunner with the 14th B. A. C. and reached the rank of Sergeant. He received his discharge in England and was granted a commission in the Royal Air Force, with which he saw service in the field.

Lieut. Palmeter returned home early in the spring of 1919 much to the delight of the members of his family and numerous friends. With bright prospects for a useful life, he was stricken down with illness early in the year and gradually failed until the end came. An enthusiastic and helpful member of the Wolfville branch of the G. W. V. A., and an active member of the executive since its inception, his loss keenly felt by returned men. The funeral was held on Monday afternoon and was largely attended, a large number of the members of the G. W. V. A. being present. The Service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Hockins, a former pastor of the Lower Horton Methodist church. He was buried in the uniform he had worn with credit to himself and to the interment being in the family cemetery at Grand Pre. The pall-bearers were Mr. Messrs. P. R. Tingley, Tuzo Watson, E. Lang, A. E. Woodman, R. W. Eaton and F. A. Allen.

Brotherhood Formed in Baptist Church

The banquet held at the Baptist church on Thursday evening of last week for the purpose of forming a brotherhood was most successful, one hundred men of the church being present. The repast furnished by the ladies of the church was most sumptuous.

Mr. L. E. Shaw presided. After the singing of "The Maple Leaf Forever," the chairman called upon Dr. J. H. MacDonald to explain the objects of the gathering. Dr. MacDonald stated that, for some time he had looked forward to an organization whose objects shall be:—(1) to create and promote a closer fellowship among the men of the church and congregation; (2) to meet together for Systematic bible study; (3) to engage in practical church work not covered by other organizations; (4) to provide a training school in which the members can be fitted for work now carried on by older men and for the greater tasks of the Kingdom of God, awaiting salvation; and (5) to link the church with the various phases of community life.

Dr. Elliott endorsed Pastor MacDonald's sentiments and moved that such an organization as had been outlined be formed. The motion was carried by a unanimous standing vote. The following officers were elected:

The speaker of the evening was the Rev. F. J. Armitage, of Windsor, a member of the Order, and a former pastor of the Wolfville Methodist church. He gave an eloquent and interesting address on the "The History and Principles of Odd Fellowship."

At the close of the service the members of the Lodge returned to the Lodge rooms where a vote of thanks was extended to Rev. Mr. Armitage, and speeches were given by several members of the Lodge.

The Town Improvement Committee of the Board of Trade has arranged for a general town clean-up during the week beginning May 10th. The undertaking has been arranged in connection with the Civic Club, and it is hoped will have the hearty co-operation of citizens generally. Wolfville is noted for its handsome residences and tastefully laid-out grounds. "What's this for?" they asked. "Sure," said Pat, "it's a custom of the country. We always help the orphans."

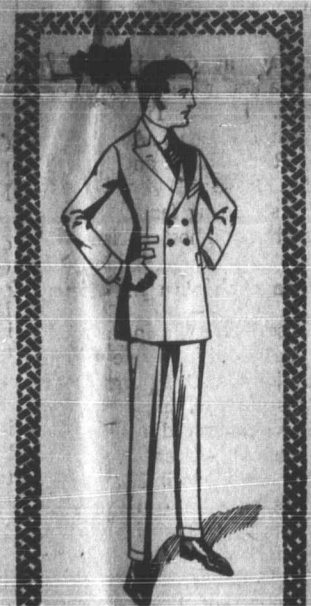

In speaking of Canada's White Ribbon Bulletin at the Nova Scotia Convention, Mrs. McOdrum said in part:

"In presenting the report of the Bulletin there are encouraging and discouraging facts to relate. Encouraging first in so far as there has been a goodly increase in the number of subscribers, and secondly that Nova Scotia leads the Dominion for promptness in forwarding subscriptions. One discouraging fact is that all our members do not take the Bulletin. The number of subscribers this year is 510, while our membership shows between 800 and 900.

Our Dominion organ, the Bulletin, is easily first in the list of papers published by women, its able editorials, the up-to-date Temperance information of the work done by the various provinces.

On Spring Housecleaning

A recent issue of Farmers' Magazine says editorially:

The custom of cleaning house in the spring is still generally observed in farm houses, though it has sustained some hard knocks since the vacuum cleaner began to make its way to the country districts. As the sun swings up from the south and the earth responds with warmth and freshness it seems impossible for the habitations of men not to respond in like manner. And so soap and water and fair arms make the attack and houses shine though bodies ache for it, and several days are cut right out of the heart of the sweetest of the spring-time.

Doubtless houses will be cleaned as much as ever this year; at the same time there are indications that women are not going to neglect the greater housecleaning issues which seem to be peculiarly the responsibility of women interested in the betterment of their community and of social conditions generally—problems which are more important than window-washing or rug-shaking. We would not suggest that these be dispensed with entirely; that would be nothing short of heresy. We would only hint that the world will survive if all house-keeping is not done at once, and with such an expenditure of feminine energy. But the other problems that progressive women are

working with—better schools, better health, better legislation for the safeguarding of children and maternity, and for the protection of our social order generally—a broader, friendlier spirit in their own neighborhoods—these cannot be safely neglected even for a season. So we say that while the individual homes must be cared for, let there be more power to the women's organizations working for those things that are going to make conditions better for every home.

Strawberry Growers, Exchange

Berwick, April 22—A large number of Strawberry Growers met in Foresters Hall, last evening, to complete the organization of The Berwick Strawberry Exchange.

This is the first move that has been made in the Valley in any way to organize a small fruit business and it was the feeling of those present that such an organization was very much needed.

The object of this Exchange is

to be the classification and marketing of Strawberries grown by its members, the enlargement of the market, proper distribution and to come in closer touch with the distributors in Cities and Towns and to be in a position to give them a uniform product. One important feature of the plan is the classification of the berries, the different grades to be sold on their merits. This is a new innovation in berry selling, and should meet with approval of the distributor. A strong Board of Directors was elected to have charge of the business of the Exchange.

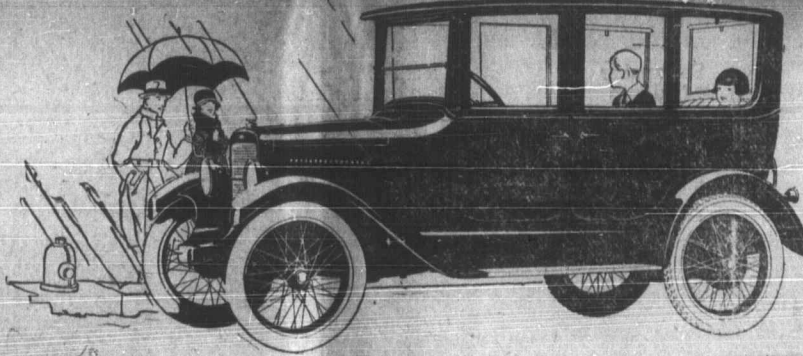

Editorial Jottings

The revival of athletics in Wolfville may mean much for the well being of the community life. This all depends upon the spirit that enters into the movement and the manner in which the enterprise is carried on.

At the meeting last week Scoutmaster Brown properly voiced the sentiment of the best element of our citizens when he stated that the undertaking if carried on in the line of "clean sport, clean speech and clean habits" would receive his hearty support. Otherwise he would feel compelled to withhold his help. This, we feel sure, will be the attitude of every patriotic citizen of Wolfville.

The need of a deeper interest in athletics undoubtedly exists in Wolfville and this can be best developed and directed by the existence of good, clean sport. 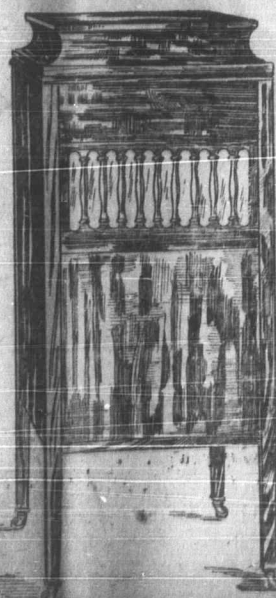

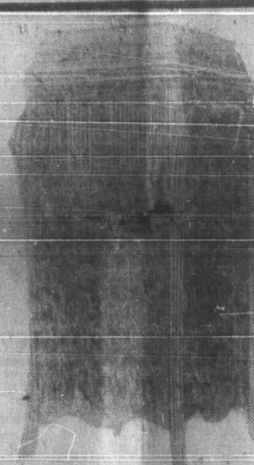

"Evangeline" for Acadia

Through the kind offices of Mr. J. Murray Gibbon General Publicity Agent of the C. P. R., the original burnt clay modle of "Evangeline," designed by the late Phillippe Hebert, and used by Henri Hebert as the basis for the statue being erected by the C. P. R. at Evangeline's well, has been presented to Acadia University, in recognition of its services in promoting Canadian literature. The modle depicts "Evangeline" at the moment when she turns back for a last look at the country from which she has been exiled, and bears the inscription "Pleurant Le Pays Perdu."

A board of tuberculosis sanatorium consultants has been appointed by the director of medical services of the department of soldiers re-establishment, to visit each of the twenty-three Sanatoria throughout Canada in which patients of the department are receiving treatment.

The personnel of this board includes Dr. A. F. Miller, of the Nova Scotia Sanatorium, Kentville, N. S.

The function of the board is in general to study the whole situation in Canada with respect to the treatment of the tuberculosis occurring among ex-members of the forces, and, so far as possible to bring about the adoption of uniform standards of treatment, equipment, records, etc., in such a way that the fullest benefit may be derived from treatment in each case.

Testing Advertising

In talking recently with a man who has made a large success as an advertising salesman in another place the question was asked him: "When a merchant says it does not pay to advertise, what do you tell him?"

"I just tell him this: What proportion of the population of this town has been inside your store during the past two months?"

"Very few merchants ever claim they have had more than 20 per cent. of the population. Most of the non-advertisers would be glad to get 5 per cent. A lot of them probably only get a small fraction of five per cent. with any regularity.

"Then, I say, how are all the rest of the people going to know about your goods? How can they tell whether it would be for their advantage to patronize you or not? If you have good values or special bargains how do they know about it? A great many of them rarely or never pass your store. The great majority that pass give you only a glance. You are not getting their business, having done nothing to interest them.

"Then I go on to say there are just three ways to get some of this trade now slipping past them. They can send round solicitors from door to door, distribute circulars or handbills or advertise in newspapers. The newspaper notice is read carefully where the solicitor is turned down, and besides the advertising is twenty times cheaper than canvassing. And handbills are chucked into the waste baskets while newspapers are read. If you don't care to

use any of these methods, I tell them, most of the people of this town will continue to pass you by without knowing anything about your goods."

These remarks fit in here as well as in the town where they were made. A merchant must tell the public about his goods in order to get trade.

An Industry That Would Pay


The rumor of the likelihood that a factory for canning and preserving all sorts of fruits and vegetables is soon to be established in Wolfville is most encouraging news. We trust that it may not prove to be "too good to be true". We believe that there is abundant reason for the belief that such an industry could be profitably carried on and of great value to the community. This "garden of Nova Scotia" ought to be capable of producing at least all the fruit and vegetables required for home use, and yet every year thousands of dollars' worth of canned goods of every description are imported from the other provinces and foreign countries for local use.

There is no better country in existence for fruit growing than this valley, and when attention has been given to the scientific growing of vegetables the undertaking has shown very substantial profit. With a good home market and the adoption of up-to-date methods of production there is an opportunity for our farmers and gardeners to do a thriving business. When, same years ago, a demand was made for cucumbers for a pickling concern, our people showed their willingness to co-operate and quite a profitable industry was developed and maintained for some years.

Not many years ago large quantities of plums of the choicest and best varieties were grown in these sections and only because of the absence of a profitable market were the plum orchards in many instances given up.

Immense quantities of all kinds of small fruits, including strawberries, might be easily produced within the radius of a few miles from Wolfville if a demand could be created for them. A very large quantity of fruit of different kinds is allowed to go to waste every year because there is no provision made for its conservation. Such an institution as is suggested would be of great economic value to the community and its establishment should be given every encouragement by our people generally. THE ACADIAN freely offers its columns for the discussion of the matter. The time is ripe for action.

The United Farmers' official organ in the Maritime Provinces, "The United Farmers' Guide," which is being published at Moncton, has made its initial appearance. The journal is in magazine form and the first issue consists of sixty-four pages. A subscription list of 14,793 is claimed.

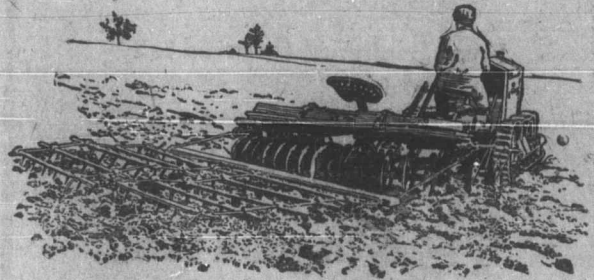
