The Engineer again expressed his doubt if the Hydro-Electric scheme would ever amount to anything. Engineer Leckie, who is in charge of the new works, said that he would like to see the question of power for the pumps settled at once.

The difficulty over the width of the devil strip on James street, between King and Main streets, where the Railway Board ordered the city and company to make improvements, has been amicably adjusted. Yesterday afternoon Colonel Gibson notified Mayor Stewart that the company would be willing to do the extra foot if the work was allowed to stand until next spring. Although the Mayor says it is up to the Board of Works to decide, he can see no objection to this, especially in view of the fact that the city has no more funds for road work this year. A letter from the company will be sent to the committee for consideration at its meeting this evening.

Dr. Roberts, Medical Health Officer, this morning raised the quarantine on 76 Merrick street, the house where Eva Hutchinson, a thirteen-year-old girl, was detained as a smallpox patient. She has entirely recovered. The Health Department thoroughly disinfected the place to-day and burned all the effects with which the patient came in contact. The other patient, on Birch avenue, the doctor says, is making satisfactory progress.

No adjustment of the insurance on the famous sander has been reached yet, although one of the company's officials was expected here to-day. The city engineer announced this morning that the middle road would be sufficiently scooped out by to-morrow to permit of the sucker being beached on it for repairs. He expects the insurance question will be settled up before the end of the week so that the work of repairing the dredge can be proceeded with at once.

Although some of the Tory war heels are making a howl over Mayor Stewart's action last night in nominating a Liberal for the position on the Parks Board, in municipal circles generally it is agreed that the Mayor could not have made a better choice.

Complaints have been made that gravel is still being taken from near the base of the High Level bridge, although the Board of Works ordered this was to be stopped. Officials of the department say that they staked off the limits from which gravel was not to be taken and they do not think this space is being encroached on.

Engineer Heddle has handed over to the city engineer his report of repairs made to the tracks by the Street Railway Company and Mr. Barrow says the report is very favorable to the company as also is the one prepared by Foreman Towers.

The city engineer said this morning that he was going to charge the Hamilton Street Railway Company for the amount of water it used in the concrete construction on King street east. It does not amount to very much, but then Mr. Barrow thinks the company should settle, as he says it promised to pay for the water used in this work.

The City Council last night decided to invite Lieut. Governor Mortimer Clark, who is going to Stony Creek battlefield on October 22, when the celebration of the burning of the mortgage debt will take place, to come to Hamilton to-day and through the manufacturing district. The Finance Committee was appointed to make arrangements.

Building permits were granted this morning to Donaldson & Patterson for a brick house and stable on Bay street, between Robinson and Charlott avenue, to cost \$2,400, and to C. W. Stephenson for a frame house on Homewood avenue, between Locks and Garth streets, to cost \$1,000.

A good deal of surprise has been expressed that the offer of W. D. Platt to give the city a park site in the south-west end has not been taken up before this. To-day was the time fixed for the offer to expire. The Parks Board some weeks ago appointed a special committee to wait on the Board of Works in connection with the matter, but it has not done so yet. Mayor Stewart, when the matter was brought to his attention last night, immediately called up Mr. Platt, and explained how things stood. The Parks Board will meet at 4 o'clock on Thursday afternoon to deal with the matter.

Dr. Bell, of the Provincial Board of Health, was in the city to-day. He was inspecting the canning factories at Burlington yesterday, and left this afternoon to inspect the factories of the Niagara district. He told Dr. Roberts, the Medical Health Officer, that it was pleased to see that the local board had taken some action in the Coal Oil Inlet matter.

The Fire and Water Sub-Committee appointed to take up the question of water supply for the township, will con-

fer with representatives from Barton at 10 o'clock to-morrow morning.

The population and assessment figures of Ottawa this year are disappointing compared with Hamilton. The assessment increase falls short nearly half a million, and the population increase is behind Hamilton's.

This is the last day for the entering of appeals. The officials say an unusually large number have been received this year.

—Acting for H. J. McIntosh, Biggar & McBrayne have issued a writ against Angus McDonald. The plaintiff claims unstated damages for personal injuries received while in the defendant's employ.

—Messrs. Hugh Robinson, representing the Journeymen Tailors, and S. L. Landers, representing the United Garment Workers, will attend the American Federation of Labor meeting in Norfolk, Va., next month.

—At 4 o'clock this morning the police were called to the Rolling Mills to convey Frank Miller to the City Hospital. He had been injured by a bar of iron falling on him. Miller, who lives at 225 Hess street north, is not badly injured.

RADZYK'S MONEY

Has Not Yet Been Claimed by Victim's Widow.

Although Mrs. Radzyk, the wife of Andrew Radzyk, who was murdered by Jake Sunfield, was discharged from custody last Friday night by the Judge at the Assize Court, she has not yet turned up at the Crown Attorney's office to get the purse and \$12 which Sunfield took at the time of the shooting, and which his Lordship ordered was to be given to the widow of the victim. She has probably been too busy getting her furniture and goods together. After she was taken into custody, as a material witness, the Radzyk home, which was spoken of at the trial as "The House of Joy," was rented to other parties, and the stuff in the house was stored. Yesterday morning Mrs. Radzyk was around the old home, complaining that some of her trinkets were missing.

To-day Mr. Protich, the interpreter, was sent down with the purse and money to try to find her. She has been staying with some friends in the vicinity.

MAYBE DROWNED.

Father of Hamilton Lady Missing From Buffalo.

John T. Boland, Buffalo, father of Mrs. H. Webb, 225 Robinson street, and who is an aged grain buyer, disappeared from his home a week ago Saturday and has not been heard of since. It is now believed he may have fallen or been thrown into the Erie Canal, and Mr. and Mrs. Webb left for Buffalo yesterday, with the intention of having the canal dragged.

LATE SPORTING NEWS

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 15.—Arthur Burn of Calgary, defeated Chandler in a fifteen-mile race here yesterday, thus laying claim to the championship of the Pacific coast.

He came within seven minutes of breaking the world's record, and it is considered by good judges that had the weather conditions been more favorable Burn would have beaten Howlett's world's record. The finish of the race was remarkable. Chandler had kept the lead almost from the start up to fourteen miles, when Burn finished 75 yards ahead. Burn's time was one hour twenty-eight minutes and fifty-four and one-fifth seconds. The cheers of the crowd of two thousand people were deafening when Burn finished, seemingly as fresh as when he started.

Toronto, Oct. 15.—At a banquet held after the Ward Marathon on Saturday night, James L. Hughes, one of the speakers, said that he had been requested by T. C. Flanagan, Tom Longboat's manager, to say that the Indian would prefer to have the \$500 city grant used toward the erection of a home for his aged mother rather than for the purpose of educating the great runner. It is the intention of Longboat to ask the city to devote the grant which the city promised him if he won the Boston Marathon devoted to the building of a modest little home, in which his mother may spend the remainder of her life.

It has been ascertained in England that Longboat is eligible to the Marathon to be run at the Olympic games next year. Inspector Hughes advocates the application of the clubs of the city to the Ontario and Dominion Governments for small grants to be used in sending a Canadian team to the games. The sum of \$600 was raised at the Marathon Saturday.

Toronto, Oct. 15.—Alfred Shrubbs wants to beat T. C. Flanagan or anybody else that Longboat did not run twenty miles Saturday in 1:41.40, and that he did not run nineteen miles in that time. The Englishman cannot believe that the Indian beat Crossland's record of 1:51.54, made on the best closed track in the world, and points out that his own record entitles him to consideration, even if he is a professional!

PROTICH LIKELY.

Will Probably be Made the Official Interpreter.

The Crown Attorney has forwarded to the Attorney-General a copy of the presentment of the Grand Jury, which recommended that an interpreter be appointed for the court and the police department for the many foreign-born citizens now in this city. Mr. Paul Protich, who is interpreter at the Sunfield trial, and who has acted at the Police Court and in the other courts for the past year, will, it is believed, get the appointment, if one is made. He speaks nine languages.

HIS LEG CRUSHED.

Harry Christmas, 82 Napier street, employed as a porter at Wood, Vallance & Co.'s warehouse, was badly injured this morning while at work. He was helping to move a heavy case of glass, when it fell on his leg, crushing it dreadfully. He was removed to his home, and medical attendance summoned. It was found that, while the leg was not broken, it was so badly crushed that it will keep him confined for some time.

BAPTIST CONVENTION.

The Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec will begin at Woodstock to-morrow. Among those who will attend from Hamilton are Rev. J. C. Sycamore, Rev. C. G. Triggerson, Rev. A. L. Hudson, Rev. H. KEEP THEM OUT.

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 15.—Hon. Joseph Martin, in an interview, to-day, stated that "There is only one solution to the present trouble, and that is to keep the yellow races out. They won't be satisfied with limiting the influx."

Stealing Elephants in Siam.

The stealing of elephants to be proceeding in Siam on a scale which the owners of elephants do not appear to find at all humorous. The industry in which the elephants that are stolen are so largely used is the teak timber trade, and it has been reported by the British Consul that the thefts are interfering with the profits of the work. The extent of the trouble may be gauged by the simple figures conveyed by the facts that in a space of a little more than a year one firm had twenty-six elephants stolen, of which fourteen were recovered, and another twenty-two stolen and thirteen recovered. The crowning insult appears to have been the stealing of one of the Consul's own transport elephants belonging to the British Government, which has now been missing for nearly a year.—Country Life.
