Rome, Oct. 20.

Mgr. Gauglbauer, Archbishop of Vienna, will leave that city to-day for Rome, where he will remain three weeks.

The Count and Countess Camillo Peeci returned to Rome on Monday evening; they will reside at the Palazzo Santa Marta, which is situated behind the Vatican Basilica. On Wednesday they were received in audience by his Holiness, and afterwards by Cardinal Jacobini, Secretary of State.
