

ZELAYA FLEES FOR MEXICO

Former President of Nicaragua a Fugitive on a Mexican War-Ship.

Washington, D.C., Dec. 26.—Zelaya is on a Mexican war vessel; it is expected he will soon be on Mexican soil and the United States has nothing further to do with him.

This statement was made today by Senator Colburn, chairman of the foreign relations committee of the senate. It seems to rest all doubts as to whether the United States would pursue Zelaya and bring him to the United States for punishment.

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San Juan del Sur, Nicaragua, via Galveston, Texas, Dec. 26.—The United States warship Princeton left here suddenly this afternoon on a mysterious errand to Mexico.

Zelaya Accused of Robbery. Managua, Dec. 27.—Though ex-President Zelaya has effected his escape to Mexico plans are now under way to bring him back on a criminal charge in connection with the looting of the Nicaraguan treasury.

Contino, Nicaragua, Dec. 26.—Mexico notified the United States that she was going to take the ex-president away from Nicaragua. No protest was made on this subject.

As the Mexican minister went on board the flag ship fired the prescribed salute of 13 guns and raised the Mexican flag for her forepeak according to naval etiquette.

As that action of Mexico simplified the position of the government at Washington Admiral Kimball interposed no objections.

At five o'clock in the afternoon the General Guerrero steamed out of the harbor bound for Salina Cruz, a Pacific port in far southern Mexico, from which runs the Tehuantepec National railway across the Isthmus of Panama to Mexico.

Caldwell before the meeting of the Manitoba Grain Growers' association yesterday reaffirmed in unmistakable language the position of the Manitoba Government in relation to the aims and objects of the association. This would hardly have been necessary had it not been for the virulent campaign of falsehoods by insinuation launched against the Government by those who desired to use the activities of the Grain Growers' association for political purposes.

As about the Christmas time there have gathered traditions peculiarly their own, traditions not associated with any other day in the calendar and with which no other day's traditions compare in character or number, so to the individual it is associated with a train of memories yearly lengthening and of the happiest nature. Poor indeed is the man—and fortunately rare—who the season does not bring recollections peculiarly delightful and of untold number.

The Canadian Manufacturers' Association are credited with spreading the report that a labor famine is imminent in Canada, affecting many lines of employment and all Provinces. Perhaps this report is in some measure true, but it is more probable that it is not true in any wide or general sense. It comes at the wrong season of the year to be very seriously taken. We do not of course hear anything, or much, of this year of unemployment and destitution, but the absence of such reports is no warrant whatever for exaggerating the case in the opposite direction and for inventing a deluge of unemployed—a large part perhaps employable from other lands in the dead of winter, when employment is scarcer than at any other time of the year and when it is more pressingly needed.

For the Government to prepare a measure for the public ownership of elevators and thrust it down the throats of the people of Manitoba is a measure which has been discussed in the past. There is a very great difference between the acquisition of a telephone system and the construction of a grain elevator system. The latter is a natural monopoly and applies equally to the whole body of the people whom the Government represents. An elevator service is not a natural monopoly and does not apply to the whole body of the people. It is out of the power of the Government to compel anyone to use the Government service. It must enter into competition with commercial companies which have invested money in elevators without which they could not transact their business.

JUDGMENT AGAINST C.P.R. IN ARBITRATION

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EUROPE STARTLED BY ASSASSINATIONS

Simultaneous Murders of Officials Seem to Suggest a World Wide Conspiracy of Anarchists.

London, Dec. 22.—Unhappily in by an unparallelled earthquake havoc, 1920 is departing under a black cloud of assassination.
