

When do magazines pay for work

on acceptance or publication? These are some of the most con non of the forty-leven questions that the rising crop of would-be authors ask me, and since there seems to be such a general interest in the subject I am going to answer them to the best of my ability in my space to-

The largest literary demand of the resent day, I am told, is for clever nort stories of from 1,000 to 5,000 vords, especially love stories. Ineresting articles on any topic o timely interest comes next in salability. Poetry, especially by unknown authors, is extremely difficult— almost impossible to sell. Some magazines actually have their poetry supplied gratis by people who conside the joy of seeing it actually printed sufficient remuneration.

The conventional methods anging manuscript is something who is trying to "break intypewritten if you possibly can. That makes it that much the clearer, and anything which is clear and doesn't ave to be puzzled over, is much nore apt to be appreciated and accepted. If you haven't your work the paper. 



Public Notice. **CENSUS, 1911.**

The following Regulations in coned for general information:-

1. The father of a family, if alive and present, is the proper authority to give information of his family; if the father is dead or absent, then the mother or person in charge shall speak for him:

(a) Provided that any child over sixteen years of age objecting to be classed in religion by the parent may be permitted to name his or her religion to the Magistrate;

(b) That the wife, hoarder or servant, or other person of full age present in a house, may speak for themselves, and can have alterations made by applying to the Court of Revision. 2. No person who has been con tinuously absent from Newfoundland for eighteen months immediately preceding the time of taking the Census shall be included in the Census, but this shall not be taken to exclude (1) Any child who is absent at school; and (2) Any head of a family who is employed out of the Colony, but whose family continues to reside in the Colony.

3. Every person resident in the ing taken shall be included without reference to the length of time during which such person has residen In other words, the name of every actual and bona fide resident




