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



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

VICTORY IN ASIA MINOR.

LONDON, July 29. General Sir John Nixon reports as the result of an action on the 24th July, near Nasiryeh (Asiatio Turkey), the disorganized Turkish forces retreated northward more than twenty-five miles. Enemy's casualties in killed, wounded and prisoners, amounted approximately to 2,500 men, the prisoners including 41 officers and 690 men, of whom 200 were wounded. LIBERALS FOR CONSCRIPTION. LONDON, July 29.
In the debate in the Commons yes erday, on the question of conscr ion, the immediate necessity of t Field Marshal French, and Josia to Field Marshal French, and Josiah Wedgwood, who returned wounded from the Dardanelles, were among the speakers. "When are those who have not come forward going to bear their fair share?" asked Captain Guest, which question was greeted with cheers from the Conservatives. He asserted that England ought to produce enormously greater numbers He asserted that England ought to produce enormously greater numbers of troops and supplies of ammunition. In reply, James H. Thomas, railway men's leader, maintained that the volunteer system had succeeded entirely, and that no industry was able to spare more workers. The Welsh coal strike showed the futility of trying to coerce the workers. Mr. Wedgwood said, "We can buy from America. Let the Englishmen fight. I do not see that compulsion is necessary.

But I do say that what we want is a declaration from the Prime Minister, that if circumstances require, he would not shy at that possibility. What we want in this country more than money and shells is a leader. For God's sake give us a man who will lead without fear of the consequences. Believe me the whole world frem Vladivstock to San Francisco is looking to see if we can develop a leader, who can lead and shape into line the new conditions. He praised highly the conditions in France, as a result of conscription. Germany now recognized the French as its chief opponent, and said that she would be prepared to offer France peace on terms which would be a great temptation. This declaration drew a bitter attack from William Llewellyn Williams, who said that the statement that the volunteer system was a failure was calumny on the country, and there could be no more dastardly suggestion than that France might be tempted to break her alliance. Mr. Wedgwood explained that Great Britain ought not to inflict the temptation on her ally. 

ENGLISHWOMEN TO HAVE RANK IN THE ARMY.

LONDON, July 24. Next week will see an innovation in British military methods, the re-cognition of women to the extent of giving them the rank of non-cosioned officers.

Some hundreds of London school teachers, whose specialty is instruc tion in the domestic arts, are going to spend their holidays in giving cookery lessons in the camps of Great Britain's new armies. These women will receive the temporary rank of corporal or sergeant.

Their initiative was taken as a re sult of reports of waste in the camps. The war office arranged for one hundred to begin work next week, and if the results are good the scheme wil e largely extended.

INDIAN PRINCES GENEROUS WITH GIFTS.

# Where Our Grave Peril Lies.

"We are held up, and as long a hese issues remain undecided it is no good concealing the fact that the situation is one of grave anxiety, and try as being in grave peril," said Lord Curzon in the House of Lords. "The country knows we are fight ill be long and arduous, and that it will only be by the concentration o every energy and every resource we possess that we shall win through to the end we all desire."

Not Invasion. "Some people may now be inclined to associate such a phrase as 'grave peril' with invasion," says the Glasgow Herald. "We do not suppose that Lord Curzon had that possibility in mind. It is contingent upon the defeat of our Navy, which has been equal to all the calls upon it and to the strain of prolonged inaction, which has increased its preponderance over the German fleet since war broke out, and which will continue to do so. The peril to which we are exposed, chiefly by the necessity of being obliged to improvise our military supply machinery in the course of eleven months of war, against an enemy who has been preparing war upon Europe for at least as many

years, lies elsewhere. "It is true that the German war scheme of conquest failed utterly more than nine months ago. It was shattered in the battle of the Marne. But the fighting of the Aisne, where the fortress war first exhibited itself to an astonished world, showed that Germany had prepared, with characteristic thoroughness, for the possibility of such failure to reach her immediate goal. We have had nine months of fortress warfare in France and Belgium. Broadly speaking, as Lord Curzon spoke of our national awakening, Germany holds now what she held fully seven months agonearly all Belgium and a large part of north-eastern France. Within recent months, while holding on to her prey in the West, she has been able to thrust the Russians back out o Galicia, and is apparently intent upon still another attempt to seize Warsaw "That she will fail once again we do not doubt, but the fact to keep i view is that in spite of its enorm osses in men and material, Germany s still in a position to attempt the

invasion of Russia, and evidently of a mind to make the attempt. "The 'grave peril' for this counry lies in the possibility that the struggle may develop into a war of exhaustion, military as well as financial; that Germany may be able to protract her resistance until the endurance of the Allies is weakened sufficiently to render a makeshift peace seductive. The peril is that per haps a year hence, or two years hence, Germany may be permitted to claim a draw, by surrendering the territory of Belgium and France now occupied, or whatever part of it she

may still hold. "That would be disastrous, not only to the Allies, but to civilization. We should have made all our sacrifices, the full extent of which we are only now beginning to surmise, for nothing. The only way to avoid such disaster as the return of an armed peace which might last for a generation of disquiet and anxiety is to regard ourselves now as at the beginning of a war, whose duration no one can predict, and into which we must be prepared to throw all our resources of men, of munitions, of money, of courage, of patience, endurance, and self-sacrifice

# No Half Measures.

"There can be no half measu:es for us. The very facts which establish our claim, amply recognised by neutral States, that we went into this this war with clean hands, increase the burden which we now have to bear, and intensify the demands upo our energy and determination. With a few exceptions, we were foolish enough and blind enough to believe in some kind of providential insurance against a European War during all the years that Germany was assiduously preparing to wage war at the moment of her own choice. We have now to turn our whole resources to

DENOUNCES ATTACK IN VEHE-MENT TERMS.

New York, July 19:- The World, in commenting on the submarine attack on the steamer Orduna, says:

"How can we account for this shocking occurrence? For a time there had been reason to suppose that the German Government had seen a great light upon the folly of thus offending a powerful neutral nation. The evidence of wiser counsels in the German naval control had been sufficient in recent weeks to justify the hope that this new outbreak of 'frightfulness' was an error of an over-zealous

commander. "If it proves to be a calculated act emanating from a naval control which submits to no restraint of statesmanship or policy, it must gravely increase the difficulties of reaching an agreement with Germany upon the question at issue between the two Govern-

ments."

The Tribune says: "It is not at all unlikely, as Captain Taylor suggests; that the Orduna owes her escape to a miscalculation of her speed on the part of the submarine commander. The conditions were extremely favorable for an attack of this kind: the weather was clear and there was wind enough to ripple the surface of the water.

"The submarine had doubtless been lying in wait and probably got within range while submerged. From all accounts a very strict lookout was kept. vet nothing was seen till the wake of the torpedo appeared passing ten feet clear of the rudder. The distance from which the torpedo was launched is, of course, not known exactly, but even supposing the submarine was pretty close, a miscalculation of two knots in the speed of the Orduna would be sufficient to account for her narrow escape."

### Question of Vital Moment.

The sun says: "The question of vital moment is whether the Orduna was hailed by her for visitation and search before the attack was made. If the challenge was given, and the merchantman, seeking to escape, disregarded it, the commander of the war vessel may cite those facts in explaining and defending his subsequent conduct.

"The testimony of the Orduna's cantain is that his ship was not challenged; that the first evidence given of the presence of an enemy warship was the appearance of a torpedo; and that thereafter nine shells were fired at his vessel. If this course was followed by the undersea boat, the at-

marine war. "It is unnecessary to discuss the situation of the Orduna, her cargo, her mission, her passenger list. No matter how laden or where destined. she was entitled under the law to warning, to be hailed; and if she was deprived of that right, the attack on

### her was lawless and unjustifiable." Unwarranted Attack.

The Times says:

"The unwarranted attack by a Gernan submarine on the passenger steamship Orduna, obviously carrying no munitions of war or other contraband, and having twenty-one Americans among her 227 passengers, increase the gravity of the situation arising from the destruction of the Lusitania. The news of this savage action, coming at a time when the President is preparing his note in reply to the evasive German message of July 9, must exert a sinister influ-

"It is impossible to account for the newest outrage, in view of the strained relations between Germany and the United States except on the hypothesis that no matter what complications may ensue, Germany intends to continue her submarine warfare on the plans announced last February.

"The international situation created. by the latest German note in relation to the massacre of more than one hundred Americans in the destruction of the Lusitania was sufficiently grave; it is aggravated by this wanon attempt to sink the Orduna."

# Potsdam State Board.

The original state sword of Potsdam is among Birmingham osssessions in England. It has been lying in a lumber heap at Aston Hall, now one of the show places of the Midland metropolis. The citizens were unaware of its existence till attention was called to it recently by a local antiquary. It is a mighty twohanded weapon with a four-foot blade, with allegorical devices dating back to remote days of Teutonic chivalry. It was probably part of the spoils of Napoleon's invasion of Prussia, and is stated to have passed about 40 years ago from a private collection to Aston Hall. Its identity is proclaimed by the word "Potsdam" on
