

As here illustrated, butchers' linen was used for the waist and checked suiting for the skirt. The waist is made with a pointed yoke, which extends over the front. The skirt has plaited side sections and jaunty pockets. Serge, taffeta, linen, gingham, mus' veiling and crepe are nice for both skirt and waist, if one desires a dress of one material. Crepe batiste, lawn and madras are good for a separate waist.

The waist pattern is cut in 6 sizes: 34, 36, 38, 40, 42 and 44 inches bust measure. It requires 2 1/2 yards of 44 inch material for a 36 inch size. The skirt is cut in 6 sizes: 22, 24, 26, 28, 30 and 32 inches waist measure, and requires 4 yards of 44 inch material for a 24 inch size. The skirt measures about 3 1/2 yards at the lower edge, with plaits drawn out.

Young French Hero Wins War Cross

BY DEED OF GALLANTRY—RESCUED UNCONSCIOUS IN BURNING WOOD.

Paris, March 20.—Marcel Marco, who lies in a Paris hospital wounded all over and horribly burned about the legs, was to-day awarded the French War Cross.

When the war broke out, Marcel was a stripling, slender as a girl, with beardless face, eyes large and black, and hands as white as any woman's.

At Verdun the other day he gladly faced almost certain death. He emerged with a body like a sieve, a leg broken above the knee and a hand that was a shapeless mass. His gallantry won him the coveted decoration.

A few hours before the French evacuated one of the hills defending Verdun, the commandant of a battalion picked the youngster for a daring mission. The French planned to steal away from the hill silently during the night.

Marcel was to stay behind, conceal himself and take special note of the emplacement of enemy artillery when the Germans arrived. Then, when night came, he was to fire off a colored light so the French could get the range of the German battery and destroy it.

Marcel hid in a hollow tree. Through a knot-hole he watched the arrival of the Germans and placing of the artillery. At midnight he crept out, set off a yellow light with his cigarette lighter and dodged back into his tree.

Now he heard loud oaths all about him as Germans searched the woods for the man who set off a colored light. Then he heard a crackling. They had set the wood on fire to burn him out as one does a rabbit. He gave himself up for lost.

Another sound crashed in his ear. The French were blazing away in response to his signal. The smoke was hurrying his eyes. He hoped a shell would end his existence before the flames reached his tree. Then there was an ear-splitting bang—the tree flew into a thousand pieces and his light went out.

When he came to he was in a farm house. His light had enabled the French to destroy the German battery and recapture the position. They told him how they found him unconscious in the burning wood, with the flames licking his leg.



The Municipal Bill

THE SECRETARY TREASURER.

We pointed out yesterday that the Bill proposes to make the Secretary Treasurer non removable for life, except for good cause. In other words he would be able to obtain an injunction, should this provision pass into law, restraining the Council from removing him, even by a two-third vote, unless the Council could prove he had been guilty of wrong-doing recognized by law.

It is proposed that he shall be a Justice of the Peace within the limits of the city; and that he shall have power to take part in all debates of the Council or its sub-committees, but shall not be allowed to vote, or move or second any resolution. This provision enables him with the knowledge at his disposal to hold a position at the meetings of the Council, where he can exercise great influence. His duties are set forth as follows:

- (a) to attend all meetings of the Council or sub-committees of the same, to keep the minutes of all such meetings, and to give effect to all orders or resolutions passed at such meetings, unless some other official of the City shall be directed so to do.
- (b) to countersign all cheques and to see that no payments are made unless authorized by appropriations.
- (c) to have under his supervision the officials of the Book-keeping and Collecting Departments, and the City Appraisers, and to see that all orders of the Council in regard to the same are faithfully carried out, and to report any dereliction of duty on the part of the officials of the said departments.
- (d) to see that all books of accounts directed by the Council to be kept are correctly kept, and are duly submitted to the Auditor on the dates appointed for the same to be audited.
- (e) to collect the City Taxes, Rates, Dues and License Fees or any other amounts payable to the City on the due dates and in the manner provided by this Act.
- (f) to submit to the Council at each weekly or regular meeting, a summary of all amounts received since the last period of accounting, showing the source from which such amounts have been received and a comparison with a similar period of the previous year.
- (g) to see that all funds received in the course of every day shall be deposited in the Bank designated by the Council before noon of the next succeeding day.
- (h) to lay before the Council at each weekly or regular meeting a summary of all amounts expended since the last period of accounting and a comparison with a similar period in the previous year.
- (i) to prepare and present to the

Council, not later than the fifteenth day of December of each year, an itemized estimate of the revenue of the City for the ensuing year, with such recommendations for alterations in the taxes, rates, assessments, dues or license fees as he may deem necessary.

- (j) to examine all complaints and claims which may be made against the City and to present a written report upon the same to the Council.
- (k) to examine, and if correct, initial all accounts payable, and report them to the Council for payment.
- (l) to perform such other duties as he may be called upon to perform by the Council.

His duties as to collection of taxes are further amplified in Sections 242, 243 and 244. He is bound on July 1st and January 1st of each year to take proceedings immediately to recover taxes, etc. for the previous six months. He is also empowered to issue warrants of distress and seize and sell any goods or chattels of the person or company in arrears for the six months' taxes. The bailiff or collector to whom the warrant is directed must execute the warrant forthwith.

These powers are extremely drastic and stringent. It is an extraordinary example of abolition and would make the Secretary-Treasurer the Tax Kaiser of the City.

About the S.S. Seal.

This morning the Postmaster General received the accompanying message from the Cape Ray Marconi Station:—

"Diana reports Seal about eight miles north at dusk, apparently O.K. Also that intermittent signals were heard from Seal about nine-twenty p.m. Wireless apparently out of commission. Diana reports calm, clear night there, so thinks there is nothing to fear. Other ships closed down at midnight, Montreal time."

The Agents have had no word from the Seal lately, though they believe it is unreasonable to assume that the ship is in trouble, excepting that her wireless has been out of working order.

PARIS, Official, Midnight.

In the Argonne we exploded a mine. In the district of Vouglons, west of the Meuse, the Germans kept up a persistent bombardment of Bethincourt salient and the villages of Esne and Montzville. East of the Meuse, Polvre Hill was shelled fiercely by the Germans all day to cover an attack but our cross fire checked any such attempt. Southwest of Donaucourt fort a series of small engagements reaching at times hand to hand struggles enabled us to advance through the enemy's trench works on a front of 500 metres and a depth of over 200. A German counter attack on this point failed completely. In Lorraine our artillery was active east of Lunville between Vizouse and the Vosges. Nothing to report on remainder of front apart from the usual cannonade.

Banker Wrecked.

The banking schooner Flirtation, C. B. Davey, of St. Mary's, master, while being out of Port aux Basques yesterday ran on a rock on the eastern side of Road Island. The weather was moderate and the crew abandoned the vessel last night. She is still on the rock and the forward part under water. The foregoing information was received to-day by Deputy Minister of Customs LeMessurier.



War News.

Messages Received
Previous to 9 A.M.

POSITION CAPTURED.
PARIS, April 6.
The War Office announced this af-
ternoon the capture by the French of
a large portion of the position north
of Avocourt, known as Bois Carre or
Square Woods. This ground was
captured in some of the fighting
which went on last yesterday after-
noon and last night, in Verdun re-
gion, west of the Meuse, on the Avocourt-Bethincourt line. An official
announcement stated to-day that at
one point along this line the Germans
succeeded in penetrating the French
positions. Two attacks were made
by the German troops against the
French positions north of Caillette
Woods, but they were without result.

**GERMAN TROOPS STORM HAU-
COURT.**
BERLIN, April 6.
German troops have stormed the
village of Haucourt, on the Avocourt-
Bethincourt front, to the northwest of
Verdun, the War Office announced to-
day.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.
PARIS, April 6.
In the Argonne we raided a German
trench near St. Hubert, inflicting im-
portant losses on the enemy, besides
capturing twenty prisoners. During
an attack in the adjoining sector our
batteries opened up heavy fire on that
part of Avocourt Wood held by the
Germans. After the lull of yesterday
noon, the Germans were very ac-
tive towards nightfall, and during the
night, in Verdun district, west of the
Meuse, an exceedingly fierce bom-
bardment of the Avocourt-Bethincourt
front was followed by a series of at-
tacks with large numbers against
two principal salients of this front.

Simultaneously the Germans
attacked desperately our centre, con-
sisting of Haucourt village. After
several failures, and in spite of
sanitary losses, they finally suc-
ceeded in gaining a footing during
the night, in Haucourt village, which
we cover by our fire from positions
on the heights. On our side, after a
short artillery preparation, we
launched a spirited attack debouch-
ing from Avocourt Wood, in view
of connecting this salient to
one of our works situated on the
northeastern outskirts of Avocourt
Woods. During this operation, which
was a complete success, we secured a
valuable piece of ground, known as
Bois Carre, and also captured fifty
prisoners. East of the Meuse two
German attacks against our positions
north of Caillette Wood only result-
ed in serious losses to the assailants.
Nothing to report elsewhere.

A MESOPOTAMIA TOWN CAPTURED BY BRITISH.
LONDON, April 6.
The town of Felahie, in Mesopota-
mia, has been captured by the British.
It is announced, officially to-day that
all positions gained have been con-
solidated, and counter-attacks by the
Turks repulsed. Felahie is below Kut
el Anara, where the British force
under General Townshend is be-
lieged. It has been the scene of
several engagements between Turk-
ish troops and the invading British
forces. This is the second victory of
the British to be reported officially
in the last two days.

DEMANDS RETURN OF SECURITIES
NEW YORK, April 6.
A News Agency despatch from the
Hague, published here to-day, says
that Holland has demanded from
England the return of valuable securi-
ties and documents seized in the
mails taken from Dutch ships by ves-
sels of the British Navy. An official
announcement to this effect was
made to-day.

DENIES REPORT.
LONDON, April 6.
A despatch from the Hague to Reu-
ters Telegram Co., states that the
Foreign Minister denies a report
published in a Dutch paper that Britain
had suggested to Holland that she
should allow passage to an army
through Dutch Flanders.

BRITISH STEAMER TORPEDOED.
QUEENSTOWN, April 6.
The British steamer Zent, 3,800 tons,
was torpedoed, without warning, west
of Fastnet. Forty-eight members of
the crew are missing and supposed to
be drowned. Two men were killed.

**FORTY-TWO GERMAN PLANES
BROUGHT DOWN DURING MARCH**
NEW YORK, April 6.
A News Agency despatch from Lon-
don to-day says that French and Brit-
ish aviators brought down 42 German
planes on the western front during
March. It was stated in reply to an
official German claim issued yester-
day, that only fourteen German aero-
planes were lost. A despatch from
Washington, published here to-day,
says that America is satisfied that the
British Channel steamer Sussex was
torpedoed without warning, endang-
ering the lives of American passengers.
The President has determined to put
the case before Congress and ask its
sanction for immediate action, unless
undeveloped evidence should prove
that it was not the work of a German
submarine. This is the statement by
one of the President's confidential,
who added that the President has de-
termined upon his course of action,
which he will ask Congress to ap-
prove. He declined to state whether
the President would suggest a break
in diplomatic relations or would out-
line some other plan.

What a terrible burden the fear of being imposed upon is to some people!

On a camping expedition in which I once joined, one member of the party was obsessed by this fear. He was an energetic young man who would work his head off in pursuit of pleasure or to do someone a favor if he felt in the mood, but he was as much afraid of doing more than his share of the work as a miser is of opening his purse strings.

He couldn't see around his own Share.

The work was divided up by lot, and his share was really no larger than that of anyone else, but it bulked so big in his eyes that he couldn't see around it to see what the others were doing and so became firmly convinced that he was doing the work of the whole camp.

If he hadn't been so amusing, he would have been extremely disagreeable, and if he doesn't look out he will pass over the line some day.

Rents and the Municipal Bill.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I would like to call the attention of "The House and Tenement Tenants" of this city, through your paper, to an important point that has been omitted from the "New City Charter." While power is given property owners to pass on two-thirds of the city tax to the tenant, there is no clause to prevent the owners from charging excessive rents and thus covering the whole tax and additional profit besides from the tenant.

What is wanted in my mind is a clause basing rentals on a fair percentage of the total first cost of houses, always to come within the means of the community, for after all the root of the whole evil, is the wide gap between the cost of existence and the average rate of wages paid—a gap that is growing wider day by day, causing suffering, degradation and misery to good, sober and industrious citizens and their families.

Workers who a few years ago could afford to rent a six or eight room house have to try to live, although their family have increased, in a four or five room tenement from which the former tenant has removed to a smaller tenement of three and in some cases two rooms. Thus we have congestion and slum conditions on the increase and the New Charter comes to increase the end and to place a premium on slummary.

In progressive communities in England and the United States the trend of municipal legislation is all the other way, the aim being to prevent any citizen from falling below the standard of decent citizenship.

When we are amending the charter I hope this aim will be kept in view and now I would like to ask the House and Tenement Tenants is it not time that we had an organization in existence to obtain and maintain rents and rates at terms within our means?

BILLIANT VICTORIES ON TIGRIS

LONDON, To-day. The official statement says: General Lake reports the Tigris corps, under command of Lieut.-General Sir George F. Gorring, who succeeded General Aylmer, attacked the enemy's entrenched position at Umm-el-Henna on April 5. Our trenches had been pushed forward by means of saps within 100 yards of the enemy's position. The leading battalions of the 13th Division then rushed the enemy's first and second lines in quick succession. The third line was captured by six a.m. Under support of concentrated artillery and machine gun fire, the 12th Division continued the victorious advance at 7 a.m., and had driven the enemy out of his fourth and fifth lines. Aeroplane reconnaissances then reported strong reinforcing entrenchments at Felahie and Sannayat yards respectively 6,000 and 12,000 yards from the front trenches at Umm-el-Henna. As these positions could only be approached over very open ground, General Gorring ordered a further attack deferred until the evening. In the meantime on the right bank the 3rd Division under General Keary, captured the enemy's trench opposite the Felahie position. During the afternoon the enemy on this bank made a strong counter attack with infantry and cavalry, supported by guns. This counter attack was successfully repulsed. The position was consolidated. About 3 p.m. General Gorring continued the forward movement on the left bank and carried the Felahie position. Reports indicate that the Umm-el-Henna position was strongly entrenched, the left flank resting in the Suwachi marsh, its right on the river front. The trenches are stated to be nine feet deep. The whole system extended in successive lines for a depth of 2,500 yards.

GERMAN CONCOCTION IN HOLLAND

THE HAGUE, To-day. The British Government has asked the Dutch Government to call the newspaper Avontop to account for spreading a false report of a British ultimatum to Holland, thus sowing distrust between two friendly nations. The newspaper Handelsblad claims to know that the Avontop report was inspired by the German consulate at Amsterdam. The German Consul excuses himself, saying he had heard it from the Hague.

BUDGET OF WAR NEWS.

NEW YORK, To-day. Not only have the Germans been engaged in heavy fighting with the French around Verdun, but they have launched a strong attack against the new British position near St. Eloi, which lies a few miles south of Ypres, in an endeavor to regain 600 yards of trenches which the British won from them ten days ago. The fighting at St. Eloi was proceeding throughout the day, and had not terminated when the latest official statement was issued. There have been gains both on the German and French sides. The Germans captured the village of Hautcourt, northwest of Verdun. This is considered by the Germans as an important strategic point, for while the French held it, the Germans could not cross the Forges Brook of this operation the French War Office says a series of attacks in which large numbers of men took part.

followed a bombardment of extreme violence. These attacks were checked by French fire, but one, more furious than the others, was launched at the centre against the Village of Hautcourt and resulted in the Germans gaining a foothold, in spite of repeated checks and bloody sacrifices. The French claim this village is dominated by French guns. On their side the French carried a large section of a position north of Avocourt, known as Bois Carre, and in several hand to hand encounters south of the fort of Douaumont drove the Germans back through their underground passages for a distance of 200 metres along a front of five hundred metres. They succeeded also by their curtain fire in preventing an assault on Cote du Poivre, east of Meuse, which the Germans had subjected to a long intense bombardment. A German submarine has been sunk by a squadron of French warships, the crew being captured. The British steamer Zent and the Vesuvio also have been sent to the bottom and forty-eight members of the crew of the Zent are missing. Three survivors of the Vesuvio were injured.

TRANSPORT SUNK.

LONDON, To-day. An Athens despatch to the Daily Mail says a telegram has been received from Preveza to the effect that a large transport, belonging to the Entente Allies, was sunk off the west coast of Greece, and the telegram added it is believed many were lost.

NOON.

HERRING CARGOES SEIZED.

LONDON, To-day. The Swedish steamers Hakan-Hera and Olaf, with herring for Germany, were seized by British warships and their cargoes are to be valued at 1,000,000 crowns.

TIRPITZ ADVISER REMOVED.

LONDON, To-day. An Amsterdam despatch says: Vice-Admiral Dick, Director of the Shipping Department of the German Navy, has been retired on a pension. He was regarded as one of the close advisers of Admiral Von Tirpitz.

P. & O. LINER SUNK.

LONDON, To-day. The Daily Mail published a report that the Peninsula and Oriental Line steamship, Simla, has been sunk in the Mediterranean. It is suggested that this may be the transport reported sunk in earlier despatches.

DUTCH FRIENDLY.

AMSTERDAM, To-day. M. Holberta, proprietor of the Amsterdam Telegraph, says nine-tenths of the Dutch favor the Allies. The Dutch people are essentially calm, but they were excited for a day or two after the sinking of the Tubantia. The Germans concentrated on the Belgian frontier have not worried the Dutch nation, but any movement of German troops on the eastern frontier would be taken seriously. Britain would be unable to land troops in Holland without saying "choose between us and Germany."

COMMITTED SUICIDE.

LONDON, To-day. Capt. McNeill, of the Canadian Pacific Railway steamship Manitoba, committed suicide at Plymouth to-day.

GERMAN ATTACK AT ST. ELOI.

LONDON, To-day. The British official statement on the campaign in the western zone last night states: Early this morning after a very heavy bombardment the enemy attacked our new trenches at St. Eloi. Strong fighting, proceeding all day, still continues. At Hooge a small hostile raiding party which entered our trenches was promptly ejected, suffering several casualties. The artillery on both sides has been active to-day about Lens and south of Boesinghe.

NO WITHDRAWAL FROM MEXICO.

WASHINGTON, To-day. Secretary of State Lansing to-day flatly denied that there was any ground whatever for the report that the withdrawal of American troops from Mexico was being contemplated.

STEAMER TORPEDOED.

LONDON, To-day. The British steamer Vesuvio, 1391 tons has been sunk and three injured. The survivors landed. The vessel was unarmed. The Vesuvio, built in 1879, was owned by the General Steam Navigation Company, London. The vessel is not listed on the latest shipping records.

BANBURY REBUKED.

LONDON, To-day. During the discussion in the Commons yesterday a motion presented by Chancellor of Exchequer, Reginald McKenna, that no member of the House should receive Parliamentary salary and also payment as a member of army or navy, but that he must elect which he would receive. A stiff breeze arose among Unionist members, owing to Sir Frederick Banbury raising the question and said if Sir Frederick's object was to get rid of the present Government, he should do it openly upon an issue big enough, of which Unionists should not be ashamed. Sir Edward Carson, Ulster Unionist leader, also characterized the amendment as mean and inopportune and finally the amendment was rejected by 247 to 32.

At the House.

THURSDAY, April 6th, 1916.
Mr. Clapp presented a petition from
the people of Bale Verte and Coach-
man's Cove asking that Mr. E. Butler,
J. P., be appointed Tideswater at Bale
Verte and that Mr. M. J. Henry
brought there from Conception Hr., C.
B., be removed. It appeared to him to
be very unfair to the people of St.
Barbe District, which he represented,
for the Minister of Finance and Custom-
s to go outside when he could get
a man within the district itself capable
of filling the position. Mr. Butler had
been a school teacher for 36 years,
was thoroughly competent and reliable
and the people were anxious that
he should get the position; further-
more the fact that he was a Justice
of the Peace was a strong recom-
mendation in his favour. Continuing, Mr.
Clapp emphasized that the practice
going on so long of filling offices from
other districts should cease and in
supporting the petition asked that the
Minister of Customs accede to the
wishes of the petitioners.

The Stone, Mr. Jennings and Mr.
Halfyard also presented petitions on
various public matters.
Mr. Lloyd asked the Minister of Finance
and Customs these questions:—
(1) To table a comparative statement
of Imports and Exports for the fol-
lowing periods: July 1st, 1913, to
March 31st, 1914; July 1st, 1914, to
March 31st, 1915; July 1st, 1915, to
March 31st, 1916; and (2) To table a
statement showing the Revenue re-
ceived from (1) Customs; (2) all other
sources between July 1st, 1915, and
March 31st, 1916; and also a state-
ment of local expenditure on current
account during the same period.

The answers given were that the in-
formation was being prepared.
The Bill "An Act to Amend and Con-
solidate the Law Relating to Educa-
tion" received its third reading and
the Bill "An Act to Revise and Con-
solidate the General Public Statute
Laws of the Colony" went through
Committee.

The House then went into Commit-
tee on Bill "An Act to Incorporate the
Union Electric Light and Power Com-
pany and for other purposes."
Mr. Lloyd, the introducer, explained
the Bill was to incorporate a com-
pany which would consist mainly of
fishermen investors to supply light
and power to Trinity, Catalina, Bona-
vista and adjacent towns. It pro-
posed the granting of certain waters
of Trinity, Champneys, Catalina and
Little Catalina for this purpose. The
capital was to be \$200,000. The fran-
chise was asked for 20 years, but on a
twelve months notice, the company
could be expropriated at any time by
the Government or local public bodies
not after thirty years as was pro-
vided in similar charters. There were
many millions of money in the Sav-
ings Banks and it would be wisdom
for the Legislature to encourage fish-
ermen to invest their savings in in-
dustrial enterprises.

The Bill passed the Committee stage.
The Bills respecting Passenger Ac-
commodation on Steamers and Sail-
ing Vessels; The Bank Fishery; Ad-
ministration of Local Affairs; the Re-
building of Carbonear and Trading
with the Enemy passed Committee
stage. Other items on the order paper
were deferred and the House adjourned
at 5.40 till this afternoon.

The New Municipal Bill

Discussed by Large Gathering of Cit-
izens at the Casino Theatre Last
Night—Diversity of Opinion
Among Taxpayers.
The new Municipal Bill was placed
before the taxpayers of St. John's
last night at a citizens meeting, when
the Casino Theatre was filled by an
audience representing all classes and
grades. The object of the meeting
was to discuss the Bill on its merits
from a taxpayers point of view. The
meeting was called by the city re-
presentatives in the Legislature, Sir
E. P. Morris, Hon. J. R. Bennett, J.
Dwyer, M. J. Kennedy and W. J. Hig-
gins who were seated on the plat-
form.

The Premier stated the object of the
meeting and asked that a Chairman
and Secretary be appointed. Mr.
Soper was appointed Chairman and
Mr. Warwick Smith elected Secretary.
The Chairman introduced Sir Edward
Morris who for upwards of an hour
dealt with several of the most impor-
tant sections of the Bill. He briefly
referred to Municipal Government as
far back as 1888 when it was first
inaugurated, the heavy debt that the
city owed the Government, and the
power of appointing two Government
representatives on that account. He
pointed out that the Bill contained 388
sections, and dealing with section No.
8, the Franchise, young men pay a
poll tax of \$2.00 and the right to vote
is granted women taxpayers.

21 to 23—The election of Mayor and
Councillors;
57—Taking from the Council the
control of labour and placing it in the
hands of heads of departments;
76—Town planning;
89—Housing of the poorer classes;
100 to 133—Streets and sidewalks;
225—Assessment of property and
several other sections of minor im-
portance.
In closing Sir Edward asked for an
expression of opinion, and for fully
two hours there was a general debate
the following gentlemen taking part:
Messrs. S. Joyce, S. Morris, Thos.
Peel, A. Mews, J. J. Spratt, W. Smith,
J. M. Devine, Chas. Way, L. Gardner,
P. Goff, M. Hesley, John Ryan, S.

The diversity of opinion evidenced
the feeling of citizens unfavourable
to certain sections of the Bill. Mr. Thos.
Peel asked for an explanation of Sec-
tion 225 dealing with the different per-
centages on the annual rental value
which varies from 10 per cent. on a
\$2,000 house to 7 per cent. on a house
costing \$10,000 or more, this he con-
sidered was very unfair and was sup-
ported by all present.

Mr. Alec Mews pointed out the un-
fairness of the arrangement.
It was proposed by Mr. Chas. Way
and seconded by Mr. Levi Gardner
that a committee be appointed with
power to add to their number, to fur-
ther discuss the bill before passing the
Legislature. Mr. A. Soper was ap-
pointed convenor and Mr. Warwick
Smith, secretary, and the following



War News.

PREMIER ON RECRUITING.

LONDON, April 6. The Premier, in a statement made in response to the agitation of married men that all single men should be called up before married men are enlisted, and the equally insistent demands of some political leaders that service be made compulsory for all men of military age, said that the Government was engaged in examining the figures of recruits obtained under the present system, and is estimating the additional number of recruits that will be required. Asquith, who arrived early this morning from Italy, was bombarded with questions from various members, but in most cases his replies were non-committal. His answer with respect to recruiting is hardly calculated to satisfy the Unionist advocates of conscription, who demanded from Andrew Bonar Law, the Unionist leader in the Commons, and Secretary of the Colonies, an immediate decision threatening to put a motion of want of confidence in case of an unsatisfactory reply.

A BUSY MAN.

LONDON, April 6. The Evening Standard says that Earl Denington has resigned the Chairmanship of the Joint Naval and Military Board of Control of the Aerial Service, on the ground that his position as Director of Recruiting occupies his whole time. The Standard says that the position has been offered to Earl Curzon. A committee has been appointed to consider questions of the construction and design of naval and military aircraft.

DESTROYED BY FIRE.

SYDNEY, April 6. Broughton Arms, the principal building in the mining town of Broughton, where the 13th battalion is quartered, was destroyed by fire this afternoon. The building, which was a large structure, containing over two hundred rooms, contained hospital, officers' quarters, mess rooms for two companies and recreation rooms. The cause of the fire is not known, but is attributed to a defective chimney.

'Belgium and Its People.'

There was a good attendance of the members of Wesley Bible Class and their friends last night to hear a lecture delivered by Alex. Rooney, Esq., Mr. B. Taylor occupied the chair, and at the opening a very fine duet was rendered by Misses Nichol and Adey, after which Mr. Rooney opened his manuscript and delivered a most interesting account of "Belgium and Its People," the buffer kingdom between France and Germany. He referred to its physical difficulties being below the sea level, its dikes and sand dunes along its short sea coast, to its religious status being largely Roman Catholic, with its many cathedrals and churches, to the history of many of its cities and towns such as Antwerp, Leige, Louvain, Brussels, Dixmude, Ypres and Aerschot. Speaking of these peace-loving, quiet people not one of whom dreamed of war, to find suddenly that their fields are trodden by horses of savage Hunn, who burn their dwellings, ruthlessly murdering and outraging their women and children, the aged, and any who made any stand against the invaders; of the splendid heroism of the young King, and his small army against the well prepared and trained troops of Germany; only after appalling losses, and their sacred shrines razed to the ground by shell or fire, and their harvests destroyed, could they leave their homes. Many English homes were opened to the refugees and we feel glad that from our whole Empire there has been so much done.

To Assist Those Brave People. Although devastation is now everywhere apparent, no doubt in time these struggling people in spite of the loss of possibly fifty thousand men by death, and many crippled for life by casualties, they will recoup themselves. Germany should pay a heavy indemnity to this suffering nation for there is no parallel in history of such awful cruelty as has befallen these unhappy people. It is the greatest crime which stains the Kaiser's skirts, since so well dyed with the blood of his submarine innocent victims. The Battle of Waterloo and Fontenoy brought glory to the English and Irish Guards, but the victories of the Marne and the Aisne and those of the French at Loos and Verdun will far eclipse them. Antwerp will again be a busy place, and the magnificent churches will be restored, and art will again embellish their galleries and villas; trade will flourish and its fields and vineyards yield a bountiful harvest. The lecturer did not fear decadence, though crushed in spirit, phoenix-like, they would rise from the ruins, a bright, happy and prosperous people. It was a splendid effort, for from a well stored mind the speaker brought an immense amount of information welded together in the most interesting manner. A duet followed by Messrs. Chaplin and Gaulton, which was well sung and most appropriate, and after a vote of thanks tendered to Mr. Rooney for his research and trouble, the meeting closed with the National Anthem.—Com.


