"Take off your coat," he said. "You might as well ask me to take off the roof of the house," retorted Cyril, grimly.

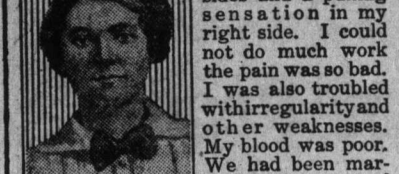

He put his hand to his forehead; it was wet with perspiration.

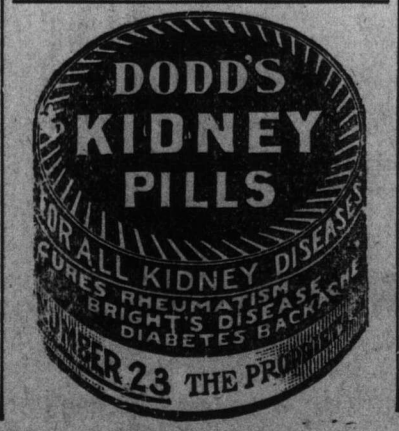
"Paint!" said Guildford Borton. "Wait, I'll give you something."

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.

BUCHAREST OFFICIAL.

BUCHAREST, Nov. 12. The following official announcement was made here to-day: "Roumanian forces captured two mountain positions in Tretus valley, on the Transylvanian front, and have assumed the offensive over a long section of the battle line, and several Austro-German attacks were repulsed. At the Dobruja the army of Field Marshal von Mackensen has been driven further southward."

PRISONERS TAKEN.

LONDON, Nov. 12. The official report from the Macedonian front says: On the Struma front our patrols encountered detachments of enemy troops and made them prisoners.

FRENCH GAIN GROUND.

PARIS, Nov. 12. The French gained ground last night in the vicinity of Sully Saillissel, on the Somme front, the war office says. South of the Somme the Germans penetrated the French trenches but were expelled. On the Macedonian front the Serbians have made further advance in the Cerna region.

SERBIAN SUCCESS.

LONDON, Nov. 12. Serbian troops succeeded in a series of attacks on Friday, north of the Cerna river, and entered the village of Polog, three miles north of Skochiver, capturing 600 prisoners, according to a Reuter despatch from Salonika.

SERBS INFLICT FURTHER DEFEAT.

PARIS, Nov. 12. Serbian forces in the Cerna river region, on the Macedonian front, S. E. of Monastir, inflicted a further defeat on the Bulgarians, it is announced officially. In the Cerna bend, the statement says, the Serbs, driving back the Bulgars, have continued their forward march. All of Culeva Hill is now in their possession as well as the village of Polog, which was captured as a result of a brilliant assault. All the Bulgarian counter-attacks failed.

ON THE SOMME.

BERLIN, Nov. 12. Another battle for the possession of Sully Saillissel, on the Somme front, began last night. The struggle is still in progress.

AEROPLANE ACTIVITY.

LONDON, Nov. 12. The Admiralty to-night made the following statement: A squadron of naval aeroplanes on Friday bombarded successfully the Bulgarian aerodromes and stores at Drama, Porna and Augusta, on the Macedonian front, with excellent results. On Friday at Volklingen an air raid was carried out by a squadron of naval air-planes.

THE RUSSIAN BOMBARDMENT.

LONDON, Nov. 12. The Russian bombardment of the Roumanian Black Sea port of Constantza is said to have inflicted great damage on the Bulgarian shore batteries, which were silenced. Heavy losses were inflicted on the garrison. A German aeroplane which attempted to bombard the Russian squadron was brought down and the pilot and observer captured.

SUCCESS AND REVERSE.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 12. The war office announces the capture by the Russian army in Transylvania of two commanding heights south of Almasmezo, 55 miles S. E. of Dorna-Watra. In Dobruja the Russian advance southward continues. Austro-German troops in large force

TRENCH STORMED AND CAPTURED.

LONDON, Nov. 12. The war office announces that last night the eastern portion of Regina trench on the northern end of the Somme front, being a continuation of the length of trench captured by us in our successful assault of Oct. 21, was stormed and captured on a front of 1,000 yards. In spite of a heavy enemy barrage, the new trench has been joined up with the old line, and the position secured. Prisoners of two regiments were taken. On the remainder of the front there was no change.

GERMANS DROP BOMBS.

PARIS, Nov. 12. North of the Somme the French have retaken the greater part of Saillissel village. The fighting continues, according to the bulletin issued by the war office to-day. South of the Somme there is chiefly artillery action. The Germans dropped bombs on Amiens several times during the night.

THE BALKAN EXPRESS.

BERLIN, Nov. 12. The Balkan express, which runs between Constantinople and Berlin, dashed to-day into a party of women and section hands in a suburb of Berlin, killing 19 women.

REPORT OF SUB-COMMANDER.

BERLIN, Nov. 12. The report of the commander of the German submarine which sank the British steamer Rowanmore, on which there were several Americans, received by the Admiralty, indicates that the captain of the steamer was responsible for her being sunk by the submarine. The report says the Rowanmore disregarded the submarine's signal to halt and endeavored to escape at full speed, making it necessary

Your Boys and Girls.

Some mothers unfortunately have to wean the baby from birth. For such a child, feeding from the bottle a mixture of oatmeal water and milk is very nourishing.

Use two thirds oatmeal water and one third of milk for a child three months old and weighing eleven or twelve pounds. Weight the baby each week, if she gains from four to six ounces a week her bowels move regularly and are of the right consistency, the mixture is perfect.

IN THE EAST.



The week opens with war news that is distinctly cheering. Everywhere the Allies are on the offensive and almost everywhere successfully. Though sterling work is being done in the West, it is now to the East that attention is first of all directed and there particularly to Roumania. By this time the purpose of Germany in these operations is sufficiently clear, and the possibilities of the situation have been sufficiently exhausted by commentators for us to read the inner meaning of events as they take their course. Mackensen must hold fast in the Dobruja and Falkenhayn cut his way through to him, or at least overrun Wallachia; anything short of this would be valueless to the enemy. The mere fact, therefore, that our Allies have been able to take the offensive on both fronts is encouraging, and their gains in Dobruja are proof enough that they have the position well in hand.

Simultaneously the Serbian army continues to push forward, the plucky vanguard of the forces that aim at Monastir. Few maps are on a scale large enough to show the exact disposition of this important front and the location of the names that appear in the messages, but all will show the Ichuna River and the loop inside which the present fighting is taking place. The Allied forces seem to be pivoted upon Kennal and to be swinging their right wing forward. The late successes are the more gratifying in the light of the heavy reinforcements the Bulgarians are known to have received.

It is of the utmost significance that the French Minister of War, General Roques, is now visiting Salonika. For such success as this campaign achieves—and many observers consider it second to none in importance—France will obtain the major credit; and if the delay in achieving it proves serious, the blame will be with the hesitation of the other Allies in sharing her views and following her firm lead. Had Greece been brought into line months ago and General Sarrail been enabled to give his great army fair play, the Balkan situation might now wear a very different aspect. On the other hand there is a good deal to be said for the more temperate policy advocated and contrived by England, for more drastic action might have antagonized even the favourable elements of the Greek people. There are now signs, though they come late in the day, that a much closer under-

On stepping to the platform the veterans of two campaigns were greeted by a large crowd of citizens, including Lady Davidson, the Premier and Lady Morris, the Ladies' Reception Committee, Major Montgomery and officers and men of the Volunteers now in training and parents and friends of the returning heroes. In extending the official welcome to the returned soldiers the Premier on behalf of the country at large, thanked them for valuable services they had rendered to the Empire and pointed out the great necessity of others filling up the gaps made vacant on Oct. 11th and 12th. At the conclusion of the Premier's address the men were placed in automobiles and driven to Government House, where they were received and entertained by His Excellency the Governor and Lady Davidson. Mr. M. Flynn, of Heart's Ease, T.B., at the request of Lady Davidson, called for three cheers for the returning heroes, in such a hearty manner that the crowd responded with vociferous cheering.

We understand the men, most of whom belonged to St. John's, received good inducement.

Laying of Foundation Stone

The laying of the foundation stone of the new St. Joseph's Church, Holytown, will take place next Sunday. His Grace Archbishop Roche will perform the ceremony. The work of building the new church is going ahead with marked progress. The basement has just been completed and operations commenced on the main floor. It is expected that the structure will be ready for occupancy about June next.

THE GREEK NAVY QUESTION.

ATHENS, To-day.—In connection with differences which have arisen between the Greek Government and the Entente Allies with regard to the Greek warships for patrolling operations, Vice-Admiral Du Fourmet says: "We have come to Greece not as conquerors but as friends." The State was ready to comply with the wishes of the Allied light squadron Greek ships bound for Salonika. He did not explain, however, whether the warships would be used for a purpose would include those taken from Greece. The Admiral also proposed the appointment of a mixed commission of engineers to work out plans for the improvement of the Port of Piraeus.

TIMES ADVANCES ITS PRICE.

LONDON, To-day.—The price of the Times will be increased to 1½ pence after November 20th. Others will probably follow suit owing to the cost of production. A number leading newspapers are being conducted at a very heavy loss.

GREEKS COMING ROUND.

LONDON, To-day.—A Reuter despatch from Athens of November 11th says it is understood the Greek Government has agreed to the Entente demands that officials and officers be allowed full liberty to join Provisional Government provided they first resign from the Royal Service. King Peter, of Serbia, has arrived at Athens inognito.

SUCCESSFUL GAS ATTACK AT YPRES.

LONDON, To-day.—Gas was successfully released by us last night against an enemy Salient south of Ypres, says an official issued here this afternoon. Beyond the usual artillery actions here nothing further to report from the whole front.

TWO MORE NORWEGIANS.

LONDON, To-day.—The Norwegian steamers Daphne, 1388 tons gross and Strömdal, 935 tons, have been sunk.

THE MINNESOTA RETURNS.

ST. PAUL, Minn., To-day.—To-day's corrections, additions and subtractions, left the Hughes plurality in Minnesota to 260. The total vote to date was Wilson 173,748, Hughes 173,896. Cass County revised returns gave Wilson 1290 and Hughes 982; the Faribault County returns favored Wilson at 14 to 12. There are a few precincts to hear from in addition to the soldier vote of two regiments.

GERMANS DENY REPORT.

BERLIN, To-day.—According to the Overseas News Agency an authoritative denial is made to statements from Belgian sources that Belgian workmen are being compelled to labor in a German factory where war materials are made.

FRENCH NOW HOLD SAILLISEL.

PARIS, To-day.—Official to-night reads: North of the Somme we completed the conquest of Saillisel and carried with grenades some groups of houses on the eastern part of the village where parties of Germans are still holding out. The whole village is now in our possession. The losses the Germans sustained in this fighting are indicated by the number of bodies which cover the captured ground. We captured seven officers and 229 unwounded prisoners, together with 8 machine guns.

THE SINKING OF THE ARABIA.

LONDON, To-day.—A despatch to Reuter's Telegraph Co., from Malta, dated last Thursday dealing with the sinking of the Ara-

bia says "The passengers who landed here say the submarine was not seen but that the wake of the torpedo was discerned. After the ship was struck a submarine periscope was seen at thirty yards distance. The torpedo struck the bunkers near the engine room. Coal blocked the rent and stemmed the inrush of water, which undoubtedly enabled the Arabia to stay so long afloat. The crash was terrific and the ship was swirled round under the force of the impact. Some of the passengers insist that the submarine approached to within 50 yards of the Arabia before she discharged the torpedo. Two engineers are missing and it is supposed they perished at their post of duty. The periscope was distinctly seen moving around the vessels after one was struck but the submarine never came to the surface. The passengers are convinced that the gravest disaster was only averted by the presence of mind of the Captain and the crew.

THE QUESTION OF CANADIAN NICKEL.

OTTAWA, To-day.—Sir Robert Borden has directed that inquiries be made into the allegations of the Province Journal that Canadian nickel is being taken back as part of the cargo of the German submarine Deutschland. The question will be taken up by the Cabinet tomorrow. An official statement was issued in the meantime that Government circles have discredited the story, asserting that sufficient safeguards have been provided. It states that some miners are supplying a limited supply of nickel.

WAR SUMMARY.

LONDON, To-day.—The Russo-Romanians on both the Dobruja and Transylvania fronts in the Roumanian theatre are vigorously on the offensive against the troops of the Teutonic Allies keeping up their operations north of Constanta-Tcher-navoda railway began last week, the Russo-Romanian forces have been enabled to push back Ploesti. Marshal Von Mackensen's men, from running through the towns of Tepel, Inances-mene and Tarasmut in the Transylvania zone. The Russians have gradually reinforced the Roumanian's northern sector line, until they are now fighting side by side with the French. A front about fifty miles south of the Bukovina border. Latest official statement from Bucharest and Petrograd, reports the capture of the Austro-German positions in Tretus and Alt Valleys and repulsed attacks at various points near Olutz. Pass. Austro-Germans have made advances according to Berlin, after days of sanguinary fighting in the village of Saillisel, lying to the east of Peronne. Bapaume road in the Somme region in France has fallen entirely to the French; they captured the town. The French inflicted heavy casualties on the Germans and in addition captured seven officers, 220 men, 8 machine guns. On the remainder of the front in France artillery duels are in progress. Little fighting is going on in the Russian Macedonian and Austro-Italian theatres along Narayuvka River, Galicia attacks by Russians have been put down by the Austro-Germans in the town of Polog; and Culza Hill has been captured by the Serbs from the Bulgars, according to Paris. Berlin admits advance by the Serbians in this region. No infantry engagements on the Austro-Italian front have been reported; unofficial advices from Berlin says the commander of the German submarine which recently sank the British steamer Resumore on which there were several Americans, reports the vessel was sunk because she would not halt when ordered.

ALL READY FOR DEPARTURE.

NEW LONDON, Conn., To-day.—Time of departure of the German submarine Deutschland uncertain to-night, although everything apparently has been ready since Saturday for a quick dash to sea; there were more rumours to-day that British cruisers outside three mile limit are waiting for the Deutschland and that two German subs were off the coast to con-

voy the boat back to Germany; there was no confirmation.

NINE PERSONS DROWNED.

VANCOUVER, To-day.—Nine persons were drowned at the Fraser Avenue Bridge across North Arm, Fraser River, five miles from the centre of Vancouver, they were aboard a large covered automobile; draw swung open to allow a tug to pass up the Fraser and the big auto plunged through the gates over into the tideway 20 feet below.

GALLANT AMERICANS.

PARIS, To-day.—The gallantry of section one of the American Ambulance Corps in France again has been cited in army orders.

HUMANITARIANISM!

AMSTERDAM, via London, To-day.—The Koelnische Volkszeitung published a long article on the subject of Germany's deportation of Belgian workmen in which it says in part: These measures are not connected with the war but are dictated solely by considerations of a sane policy of administration which could not allow thousands of able bodied workers to remain deliberately unemployed and spend their time unprofitably in cafes. Germany's action is the result of humanitarianism which would justify even the use of coercion in the circumstances.

WILSON AT WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, To-day.—Wilson returned to Washington last night and is ready to take up the waiting public business. He is framing plans for his second term in the White House.

THE POPE WILL PROTEST.

PARIS, To-day.—Despatches from Rome say that the Pope is about to send a note to Germany protesting strongly against the reported wholesale deportation of Belgians. Despatches say that this decision of the Pontiff has become known semi-officially in Vatican circles.

SERBIANS PURSUE BULGARS.

LONDON, To-day.—The Serbians are continuing their pursuit of the Bulgarians in the Cerna bend and have captured the village of Ivern, according to a despatch from Salonika. Ivern is about 10 miles within the Serbian border. Its capture, if confirmed, also means that the Serbians have effected a new crossing of the Cerna River.

SOFIA ADMITS SERBIAN SUCCESS.

SOFIA, To-day.—An advance of the Serbians in the Cerna bend is admitted in an official statement issued by the War Office to-day.

GERMANS' IDEA OF WILSON.

BERLIN, To-day.—President Wilson's attitude toward the warring nations of Europe is gradually changing, according to the Frankfurter Zeitung, which, in discussing Wilson's re-election, says: Germany's relations with America depend in the highest degree upon the future views and sentiments of this hard and self-willed personality, but certain signs indicate that President Wilson is gradually taking a more unbiased standpoint than hitherto. How does it happen that circles of American people, including women voters, prefer Wilson to Hughes for sentimental reasons? Because they assume his ambitions remain to keep the public out of the gigantic conflict of the other great powers. Whatever one says about the vitality of the Pacifist ideals we will commit the gravest error in underestimating their power over the American nation. Chancellor von Bethmann Holweg would probably shrink from being regarded as a sentimental dreamer, but he unequivocally proclaims the goal of humanity to be agreements and understandings. Clemenceau of France ridiculed Wilson as a more than fantastic orator. President Wilson will have first to ascertain how the Entente stands towards his plans, only then can he expect that Germany

which certainly has not been coddled by him, will occupy itself with his ideas.

GERMAN AIRMEN BOLDER.

LONDON, To-day.—The Times has received the following despatch from its special correspondent with the armies in France: The German airmen have grown bolder and are making a more serious attempt to dispute us. This winter probably will see more bitter fighting; air fighting now is much closer and savage than it ever has been before. Importance of air mastery has been more clearly demonstrated; the individual fighting and number killed have immensely increased with the greater speed of machines and greater cleverness in handling them. The old leisurely combats are no more now, it is a headlong plunge; a single shot, a dip, a swerve, another shot, a loop, a single shot again, a duel, swifter, more breathless, more reckless than any fighting that ever was before on earth or sea. One of the chief evidences of the new activity has been a great aerial battle mentioned in an official communique.

Conqueror of Himself

Here is a little story which has not been published before. The hour for which our men had been waiting was drawing near, and the combatants in a certain sector knew that in a few minutes they would launch into the reeking fire of death. The lieutenant who had to lead the men is a son of a peaceful parsonage, a man with quiet, kindly ways, but of lion-like courage, who knew that there was not a man in his company who would not die with him at the appointed time. There was a perfect understanding between this parson's son and the rough, tear-away heroes he commanded.

The long-expected summons came. The lieutenant gave the word to charge. One of his young men, a stalwart, cheery-hearted fellow, reeled as the fatal word was spoken. His face became ashy pale, and his powerful frame trembled visibly. Was one of this glorious little company falling at the final moment? The young soldier turned towards his officer, and the two men looked straight into each other's eyes. Neither spoke. After a moment the stalwart young private sprang to his officer and stretched forth his arms. Officer and man exchanged one tremendous hand-grip, still without a word. The company roared a hurrah, and they shot out of the trench and over the parapet like schoolboys playing a game. The first man to reach the open was the young man who had quailed. He was first into the storm of bullets and shrapnel, he was the first to come to grips with the enemy. The second was his officer.

Within five minutes of the order to charge, the officer and private were struck down together. They fell side by side, and the last glance of the youngster was fixed on the face of the officer whose courage had inspired him in the one tragic moment of his fear. The lieutenant is now in a London hospital, rapidly recovering from a bullet through the shoulder. The body of the younger hero lies to be lowered that soil of France for which he fought and died. "The bravest man I ever knew," says his officer, "was this lad who felt a great fear, mastered it, and charged home like a Crusader."

THE SILK STOCKING.

The silk stocking is a once proud emblem of aristocracy which has now become more common than flies at a Sunday-school picnic.

Who of our readers cannot remember the time when the owner of a pair of silk stockings was looked up to with more reverence than the possessor of a plug hat? In our childhood there were always one or two pairs of silk stockings in town, which were worn on stated occasions and exhaled the aromatic flavor of the moth ball. These were long, wiry, coal-black stockings, and whenever they appeared in public they caused more unrestrained envy than a sedan top dress nowadays. As they were made entirely of silk they were harder to wear out than a half cloth, and passed down to the third and fourth generation of bulging biceps intact.

They are thrust into the faces of modest men on the street, the veranda, and the stage. Most of these stockings are born to bloom for but one brief summer, when they ravel out at the heel and break down around the ankle, thus discouraging people from taking a second look. This is no doubt one reason why father enjoys so many of his vacations in close and studious proximity to the creditors' ledger.

As we do not manufacture any silk in this country that will defy the threads of the American bullion and the silk mills of France are turning out shrapnel, we are obliged to rely upon shiny substitutes composed largely of lacquered lisle thread and public confidence. It is extremely disappointing to invest 39 cents in a pair of alleged silk hose which after two hours of service allow the big toe to protrude in an aimless and disconcerting manner. This experience has driven many a man to wearing some durable form of stocking which will not fall apart before the end of the week.

The silk stocking is cool and enticing, and can be washed once with good results. It would be more universally respected, however, if a small part of it could be left to the imagination.

Civilisation Lost and Found.

160 Centuries of History in a Rubbish Heap—New Light on the World's Past from the Island of Venizelos—Lady's Dress 9,000 Years Ago.

The little Mediterranean Island of Crete, boasting but three towns in place of the hundred cities which flourished when Homer knew it, is chiefly notable to us, in the hurly-burly of war, as the birthplace of Venizelos, the man who once saved Crete from the tyranny of King Constantine's brother, and is even now, as we go to press, once more in Crete to save Greece herself from the tyranny of King Constantine. Should that happily come to pass, it will not be the first time that Europe has had reason to be thankful to this little island of Greece.

We have had a reminder of this fact in Sir Arthur Evans's address to the British Association.

Sir Arthur Evans is an explorer, not of new and barbaric lands, but of lands in whose silent, passionless heart is buried the secrets of a magical past, and Crete, where his discoveries have made him world-famous, has yielded from its rubbish heaps one of the richest harvests of knowledge ever garnered.

Until but a little while ago we looked upon ancient Greece as the wonder-child of the world's culture, science, poetry, rhetoric, logic, the source of the painter's and sculptor's art, the surgeon's skill, and the chemist's learning. We regarded intellectual Greece as having evolved from intellectual chaos into the richest flower of mental and moral elevation that the world had known, a sort of national Jonah's gourd come to perfection in a night. But these things do not happen.

Sir Arthur Evans has dug from the mound of Knossos a story of unrivalled romance, a story of laws and learning and high spiritual life wrought by the people of Crete thousands of years

before Greece rose to eminence. He shows that the wonderful power and exalted standing of ancient Egypt and Babylon were no more isolated than that of later Greece. It was part of a much larger whole than we had imagined. The records of one civilization after another are buried in that hill of wonders at Knossos, just as the wonders of Nineveh and Babylon are buried under the sands and debris of the Mesopotamian plains.

We can trace back the history of this wonderful island and its people, its kings and priests, its artistic women and beautiful children, for nine or ten thousand years.

Four thousand years before the dawn of Christianity, Crete had a culture equal to that of Egypt and Babylon, and it lasted for 2000 years, eventually spreading over the Aegean and Mediterranean countries. It is difficult in a few words to do justice to this earliest of European civilizations; its achievements are too manifold. "The many-storied palaces of the Minoan priest-kings in their great days, by their ingenious planning, their successful combination of the useful with the beautiful and the stately, and last, but not least, by their scientific sanitary arrangements, far outdid the similar works of Egyptian or Babylonian builders," says Dr. Evans. "Think of that high state of scientific perfection of physical life

6,000 years ago, and then remember that in the time of Elizabeth those sea-dogs of ours who scoured the seas of all the world used to die from disease like flies in their little ships, and found consolation only in the fact that their lives were less unhealthy than those of men at home, in the foul and filthy little land called England.

They had their high art, these old-time Cretons, and their wonderful frescoes remain upon the walls of their buried places, paintings which tell us the daily lives of the people. "The modernness of much of the life here revealed to us is astonishing. The elaboration of the domestic arrangements, the staircases, storey above storey, the front places given to the ladies at shows, their fashionable, founced robes and jackets, the gloves sometimes seen on hands or hanging from their folding chairs, their very mannerisms as seen on the frescoes, pointing their conversation with animated gestures—how out of place it would all appear in a classical design!" But we find it all at least 9000 years ago. There is this difference between the art of old Crete and that of classical Greece and Rome that not one single instance of indelicacy has been found in all the remains at Knossos, though nowhere, not even at Pompeii, have more pictures from the past been called to light. Probably this purity of their art was due to the religious control exercised by their priest-kings.

I hope some day to write a song that will astonish all the throng on this old planet groping; but I have to buy the children lids and shoes and pie, I'll take it out in hoping. I often think if I had time to put my best into a rhyme, John Milton would look faded; but writing doggerel that pays takes up the passing hours and days, and keeps me worn and jaded. I don't suppose I'll ever pen the ode that will astonish men, and bring me Shakespeare's laurels; and as of old my ink shall flow, expounding lessons all men know, and bargain counter morals. But when all day I've lyred and lyred, until I'm frazzled out and tired, it's pleasant to sit dreaming of that far day when I shall write an ode so full of force and light, the critics will be screaming. And thus your dream is soothing you, though you may know it won't come true, this side the river Jordan; it's good to have some kind of goal; and so, for duds and grub and coal, you struggle on according.

Another Big Open Air Recruiting Meeting.

Hicks, a Gallipoli and France veteran, who since returning has done excellent work in recruiting at Grand Falls and other northern settlements, graphically described the life of a soldier in the Newfoundland Regiment from the day he enlisted till he returned home. He spoke of the hardships the Regiment suffered at Gallipoli, the immortal charge of July 1st, the big engagement of October 11 and 12th and of those who when called upon had made the supreme sacrifice. From the horror and gloom of war he brought his listeners to the brighter side of a soldier's life, pointing out the many great favours and acts of kindness shown to a Newfoundland soldier in whatever part of the world he is to be found. He urged the young men to come forward and enlist, as their services were badly needed to fill the gaps made vacant by the killed, missing and wounded. At the conclusion of the address twenty-five young men offered for the army and a large number for the navy.






