Portugal in Throes of New Revolution.

Three Thousand Delegates Attend Sinn Fein Convention--Cleavage in Organization Expected--Irish American Free Staters Will Support Collins--Italian King Will Invite ex-Premier to Form Cabinet.

PORTUGAL HAS ANOTHER REVOLUTION.

LONDON, Feb. 20. A new revolution has broken out in Portugal, according to Reuters. No particulars are given. The earliest dispatch stated the new Portuguese Government would not present itself before Parliament until after the spring carnival.

A CRITICAL MEETING.

DUBLIN, Feb. 20. Delegates to the Sinn Fein Convention, which opens tomorrow, were already gathered in large numbers this morning. About three thousand are expected to attend. The ostensible purpose of the convention is to decide the future constitution of the Sinn Fein movement, but by the decisions and the final vote will be revealed the comparative strength of the supporters of Eamon De Valera and Arthur Griffith among Sinn Fein clubs throughout Ireland. It is widely believed that the convention will result in a complete reorganization of the movement, and the election of two bodies pledged respectively to the Anglo-Irish treaty, and to holding out for a Republic. Opinions differ as to the duration of the convention, some expecting it to last a week and other predicting only a few days session. If a split occurs the question of the disposition of the Sinn Fein funds will become acute. Forecasts as to division, if one occurs, are greatly, but most observers expect a small majority for Free State supporters.

WILL SUPPORT COLLINS.

DUBLIN, Feb. 20. Michael Collins, head of the Provisional Government of the Irish Free State, received two cable despatches from Philadelphia today. One from President Ryan of the National United Irish League of America said the majority of Americans wish success for the Free State and will support Collins.

INVESTIGATE PROHIBITION.

SYDNEY, Australia, Feb. 20. The New South Wales Government announced today that it was sending a Commissioner to America to investigate the workings of prohibition.

FRENCH DELEGATION DISSATISFIED.

PARIS, Feb. 20. The French delegation to the Washington Armament Conference reached Paris today on its return from the United States, its members giving the impression that they were dissatisfied with the result of their mission, apparently feeling that their visit to Washington had caused regrettable

GONE BACK TO IRELAND.

MANCHESTER, Feb. 20. A score of Sinn Feiners who were convicted here in 1921 on charges of shooting and intent to kill, arson, and other offences and sentenced to terms of imprisonment from fifteen years downwards, returned to Ireland tonight. The local branch of the Self-Determination League of Ireland gave the released men a public reception.

FORDNEY TARIFF HELD UP.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20. Predictions are that the Fordney Permanent Tariff Measure will not be passed for two months and possibly not until after the Congressional election next fall.

STOCK BROKING FIRM SUSPENDS.

NEW YORK, Feb. 20. The suspension of Kohler Bremner and Company, stock brokers, was announced from the floor of the Consolidated Stock Exchange today.

THE IRISH POLICE.

LONDON, Feb. 20. Submitting a supplementary vote in the Commons today of £1,500,000 for the police force in Ireland, Hamar Greenwood, Secretary for Ireland, said this represented the final charge upon the British tax payers for policing Ireland. Since the signing of the Anglo-Irish Treaty, the Secretary said, six thousand officers and men of the Royal Irish Constabulary, who had been recruited in Britain, and 16,000 of all ranks of the auxiliary police had been disbanded. The force in Southern Ireland was now almost entirely Irish and predominantly Catholic, he added.

THE ITALIAN CRISIS.

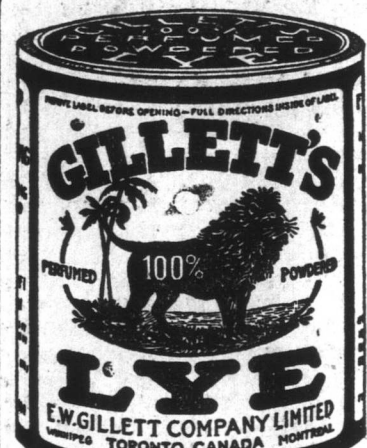
ROME, Feb. 20. The latest plan of King Victor Emmanuel for solution of Italian ministerial crisis was understood today to be his decision to invite former Premier Giolitti to form a new Cabinet, which would include former Premier Orlando and Enrico de Nicola, President of Chamber of Deputies.

BOTTOMLEY AGAIN.

LONDON, Feb. 20. The jury after two minutes' deliberation at the Shropshire assizes found Reuben Bigland not guilty of the charge brought against him by three persons to blackmail Bottomley during a bye-election in 1920. Bigland under examination, declared he had helped Bottomley to launch a bogus law suit in which Bottomley obtained a verdict before Mr. Justice Darling, who heard the present case, of 500 pounds. Mr. Justice Darling remarked on Bottomley's refusal to enter the witness box and also the fact that he had not said a word in contradiction of the almost incredible story about a lawsuit.

Historical Flags.

COLOURS OF NEWFOUNDLAND FENCIBLES ARRIVE. The flags of the historic "Newfoundland Fencibles," which for many years have reposed in a Jersey Church, have arrived in this country and will be placed in the Museum. Many of the engagements in which this regiment took part were recounted in the Telegram last year. The following letter was recently received by Mr. H. F. Shortis from Sir Edgar Bowring:

February 6th, 1922.

Dear Sir,—With reference to our former correspondence in connection with the Flags of the Newfoundland Fencible Regiment, I have now to advise that these banners have been repaired and covered with netting, and are being shipped by the s.s. Sachem, which sails from Liverpool on Wednesday next, the 8th February.

In accordance with instructions from the Government, the banners have been addressed to the Department of the Colonial Secretary, where you can doubtless arrange to see them after their arrival. S.S. Canadian Sapper was due to leave Halifax today with general cargo for this port.

Crew of Gaspe Had Trying Experience.

According to Capt. Robert Wakeham and crew of the ill-fated barque, Gaspe, who returned home by the s.s. Kyle, their vessel was in a sinking condition for some 10 days before they were rescued. The Gaspe left Pernambuco on Dec. 27th for this port in ballast, and reached within 280 miles of this coast. The excellent weather which prevailed during the passage did not long continue, and on January 22nd the vessel encountered a hurricane. A heavy sea boarded the Gaspe carrying away the bowsprit. The foretopmast, main topmast, yards and rigging all gave way as a result. Owing to the terrific storm which raged it took the crew two days to clear away the wreckage. The vessel was found to be leaking badly, and all hands were obliged to man the pumps. For ten days the crew worked like trojans to keep the bulk afloat, meanwhile the wreck drifted before the gale. On February 2nd the steamer Queen Louise hove in sight and preparations to abandon were made. The lifeboat was no sooner launched than it was smashed to matchwood. The Queen Louise, however, managed to get two boats off and after several hours battling with the seas the Gaspe's crew were transferred to the steamer, and landed at Bermuda. The Queen Louise was 17 days out from Southampton bound to Port Arthur, but as a result of the storms her fuel oil ran short and she was obliged to run to Bermuda to replenish.

Bell Island Poultry Association.

EGG LAYING CONTEST. The egg laying contest conducted by the Bell Island Poultry Association started on January 15th and will continue till November 15th. Two prizes of \$20 and \$10 are offered for the highest average number of eggs per hen during the above period. The following is the record for the 17 days of January; arranged in the order of descending averages:— J. J. Hookey—29 hens, average per hen, 9.4 eggs. J. B. Murphy—13 hens, average 8.9 eggs. T. Blackwood—14 hens, average 8 eggs. Willie E. Carnochan—22 hens, average 5.25. J. T. Lawton—10 hens, average 4.9. J. B. Gilliat—36 hens, average 4.7. J. H. Morley—18 hens, average 3.6. J. B. Petrie—29 hens, average 1.7. Mrs. Mike Fitzgerald—20 hens, average 1.2. J. A. Hughes—12 hens, average 7.5. Mr. Hughes's low average could be partly accounted for by the fact that he had only 5 hens in lay condition, 5 of his flock being late hatched pullets and 2 very old hens which he had been keeping for sitters. Five more contestants entered; but presumably the productive efficiency of their flocks did not come up to their expectations, and they were unwilling to hurt the feelings of faithful litter performers that may establish a record before the contest is over. In the above list of 203 hens, there were 76 Scrubs, 61 Rhode Island Reds, 16 Barred Rocks, 15 Black Minorcas, 9 Buff Orpingtons, 9 White Rocks, 3 White Wyandottes, 4 Anconas, 3 Brown Leghorns, and 2 White Leghorns. These 203 hens laid 949 eggs in 15 days—an average of 4.6 eggs per hen. It means also daily average output of 55.8 eggs—a 25 per cent. yield, which is low. The report for February will undoubtedly change the relative positions of the flocks, as the poor layers during January are beginning to pull up, whilst the high layers are commencing to slacken off. Report of the Officers

THE BEVOLENT IRISH SOCIETY FOR YEAR ENDING FEB. 21, 1922.

The Officers desire to extend their congratulations to the Society on the completion of its One Hundred and Tenth Anniversary to-night.

In accordance with the time-honored custom, the members assembled at the meeting of St. Patrick's Day, accompanied by the bands of the Lads Brigade and Catholic Corps, proceeded from the Hall along the usual route to Patrick's Day, where the priests of the parishes of St. Patrick's, St. John's and St. James' Streets to Government House. Here the President on behalf of the Society presented Resolutions in respect to the situation in Ireland at that time, which resolutions were received very graciously by His Majesty's Government and the members of the House of Commons.

The Government House the Society proceeded to the Cathedral where Mass was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. Mons. McDermott and the parish priest of the Cathedral, the Rev. Father Flynn. After the members assembled in the hall, where His Grace, the Archbishop Patron of the Society, presided at the morning of February 21st when Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated for His Holiness, the late Pope, Benedict XV.

Dealing now with the other side of the year's work, we are again in a position to congratulate the Society upon its large parade and reception of its good work. He thanked the Society for the sympathy which was tendered him because of the situation of the Palace and warmly expressed his appreciation of the Society's offer to assist him whenever needed in the matter of its restoration.

In any event the people of Ireland will very shortly have an opportunity by their votes to finally decide upon the new conditions.

In thanking the members generally for their loyal co-operation during the year we have to remind them that the large membership which has now been reached, carries with it all the greater responsibility to continue and

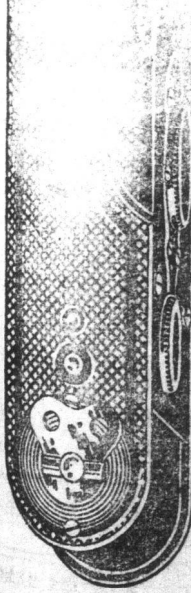

AS OTHERS SEE US,

And As We See Ourselves.

(BY A CASUAL OBSERVER.)

FROM THE FRENCH POINT OF VIEW.

In 1892 M. Charles Laroche, in summing up the results of a three months visit to Newfoundland, said in the columns of the Nouvelle Revue for April of that year:—"The granting of responsible government to the Colony was not a successful measure. Its resources are too small to sustain the additional burden; the principal source of revenue being so uncertain that the Government could not hope to make the island pay its own expenses. The Colonial Office probably thought that such difficult questions of ways and means would sufficiently occupy the attention of the turbulent colony and prevent it from giving further trouble. In this they were disappointed, for from the first day of Newfoundland's independence she has never ceased to create embarrassment for the Home Government."

Then, referring to the Bait Act passed by the Thoburn Government in 1885, he (M. Laroche) observed:—"Among the eccentricities provoked by the application of the Act may be mentioned the nomination by the Newfoundland Government of an 'appointed spy' in the French colony of St. Pierre-Miquelon. This individual—subsequently dignified by the title of Consul—was said to have fled from St. John's to escape his creditors. He informed against the captain of an American vessel who had bought bait

for sale to the French; the captain was fined, and the true reason of the Consul's presence at St. Pierre was soon made public in the American papers. All the English residing in the island shut their doors upon him, and the injured captain, meeting him in the street, fell upon him and thrashed him. The following morning he left the island and returned to St. John's, where—though indignation, as a rule, is easily aroused—there was this time no meeting."

AN ITCH FOR NOTORIETY.
One could have a sneaking regard for certain prominent men in public life to-day were it not for their "unbounded self-esteem and intolerable ostentatiousness." Their actions remind me forcibly of the following characteristic extract from Carlyle, written some years before his death:—"Examine the man who lives in misery because he does not shine above other men; who goes about producing himself, prudently anxious about his gifts and claims; struggling to force everybody, as it were, to acknowledge him a great man, and set him over the heads of men! Such a creature is among the wretchedest sights seen under the sun. A great man? A poor, prudent, empty man; fitter for the ward of a hospital than for a prominent position among men. I advise you to keep out of his way. He cannot walk on quiet

paths; unless you will look at him, wonder at him; write paragraphs about him, he cannot live. It is the emptiness of the individual, not his greatness."

A STRONG MAN AS A REPRESENTATIVE.

The hope that Sir Robert Bond will re-enter the political arena, I notice, is more freely expressed every day. His fellow-countrymen still place implicit confidence in him, and believe that at this important juncture in our public affairs his services are imperatively necessary. But it is not an Admirable Criticism of the Twentieth Century that he commands the homage of his compatriots. Newfoundlanders seldom are enthusiastic about mere intellectual versatility in the smartest mental gymnast. We are at bottom a profoundly religious community, and those who would arouse the enthusiasm of our people must touch the heart rather than the head of the Dominion. Sir Robert Bond is great in Parliamentary cut and thrust and parry. He is wonderful in a great debate, and beyond all rivalry as a platform speaker; but the great secret of his hold upon the popular heart is the prevailing conviction that he is at bottom not a mere old Parliamentary hand, or skillful orator, but a knight and a hero who can always be relied upon to act like a knight and a hero whenever there is any knightly and heroic task to be done. "It is all humbug," says his Tory opponent, "he is a self-seeker like the rest of us." But that is just what the masses, the people generally, will not believe. To them Sir Robert Bond is the one man left in politics, now that Sir William Whiteway is dead, who is capable of self-sacrifice. If a gulf opened in our Forum and the cry went forth for a Newfoundland Quintus Curtius, it is from Whitbourne that most people would expect the answer to come. He represents the element of the ideal in our local political strife. He is the statesman of aspiration and of enthusiasm; he is the man of faith, the leader of the forlorn hope, the heaven-sent champion of the poor and the oppressed. Many of us for years needed no other watchword than "Bond!" to nerve us for the fray—These lines

"Presse where you see my white plume shine amid the ranks of war, And be your oriflamme to-day, the helmet of Navarre." always occur to my mind when thinking over the most famous of these dashing, heading charges which Sir Robert Bond led against the serried ranks of the supporters of the Tories oppressors in 1900 and 1904. The great secret of Sir Robert's hold upon the colony's heart is the belief which has become a fixed conviction with the majority of the voters that he is animated by a supreme regard for the welfare of the common people. He is a man whose intellect they respect, even if they do not understand. "He is a capable man, a practical man, a ripe scholar, and an experienced statesman; if it is good enough for him, it is good enough for us." So reason many men more or less logically. As "a knight of liberty," sworn to the cause of the oppressed, Sir Robert has already done inestimable services to the men of this generation. In the midst of the banalities and pettinesses which often degrade politics to the low level of a butler's pantry, he has towered aloft, majestic even when mistaken, serving the good cause even when he opposed it better than many of those who tendered it their support from sordid motives or the mean calculations of the political huckster. Much has been written of Sir Robert Bond as an orator, and only those who have been under the spell of the magician can rightly understand the hold which he exercises over his audience. James Russell Lowell, speaking of Theodore Parker, described the secret of his oratory in words which may well be applied to Sir Robert:—"Every word that he spoke has been fiercely furnished in the blast of a life that has struggled in earnest. . . . His periods fall on you stroke after stroke. Like the blows of a lumberer felling an oak."

THE GRAND JURY AND CRIME.
The other day the Grand Jury, at

the suggestion of His Lordship Chief Justice Sir William Horwood, again visited the public institutions. I have not yet seen any reference to their report in the public press; but I presume it will appear in due time. The Grand Inquest on this occasion, I notice, embraces a most intelligent and therefore, reasonable to assume that whenever their presentments are made, they will be carefully considered by the proper authorities. From what I can learn, the increase of crime here is not in the serious class of offences against person and property, known as "felonies," but in petty offences on misdemeanors which include the increasing number of "drunks" and vagrants that appear daily in our police court, where I heard the monotonous sentence by Judge Morris, "Thirty days," or "Three months," according to the character of the offender. This is the strategic point for the application of a "reform system." This, however, cannot be applied without a change in our criminal codes and some of the police regulations. In making these changes the Government should abandon all idea of short sentences to the Penitentiary as punishment. Imprisonment for the first offence, except in aggravated cases, should be isolated, so that the bad may not get worse, and those that are not inherently criminal may not be contaminated by the criminal element. Later on, with the telegram's permission, I shall deal more fully with this interesting and highly important subject.

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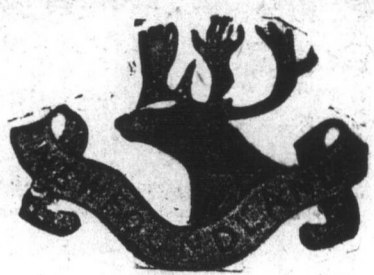

ment, and amiable character of her
worthy Captain, John Feild, also his
officers and crew. Leaving St. John's
on Friday, the 12th January, with full
cargo of freight, mails and passengers,
we arrived at Trinity, landed mails,
passengers and freight, and on to
Port Union, where we were delayed
midnight. Having landed mails and
freight at Catalina and Port Union we
proceeded to King's Cove, from there
to Alexander Bay and Rocky
Bay, the two latter being extra and
most out of the way ports of call.
Having landed large quantities of
freight at those ports we left for
Greenland, and on to Valby, where
where we landed our old and esteemed
friend Captain Job Kneib. But before
allowing him to disembark one of our
local poets, I think it was "Jimmy"
by name, composed a little ditty, the
last verse I think was something like
this:—
"Here's to Captain Job, now leaving us,
We will drink 'a wee Doch and
Doris."
While the Captain stands before us,
and we'll all sing this chorus,
Captain Kneib, "we will miss you when
you're gone."
Our next port of call was Westley-
ville. Arriving there Sunday morning
we passed through quite a lot of ice
between Westleyville and Pick-
ford's Island, which was passed at
noon. Arriving at Seldom Come Bay at
one p.m. where we had to butt through
half mile of harbor ice to land freight
and passengers. Thence on to Seal
Cove, but owing to ice in the Run, we
had to go out around Fogo Island.
Arriving at Seal Cove we had to butt
another mile or more of ice to land
passengers, freight and mails. And on
to Change Islands, arriving there at
dark, landing mails, etc., and thence
to Herring Neck, from there to Twil-
light. There our Sunday end,
making about sixty hours from St.
John's. Monday afternoon saw us at
Springdale, Hall's Bay—the home of
the herring—"King of the Sea," hap-
ping called at Morston's Harbor, Es-
-plote, Fortune Harbor, leading to the
ice and Pilley's Island. We had to do
a considerable amount of ice-butting
at all of these ports. The inside run
from here (Pilley's Island) to Spring-
dale being frozen over, the captain
had to go outside of Pilley's Island

and Triton Islands and through Long
Tickle to Hall's Bay. We were detain-
ed at Springdale for about 20 hours,
discharging freight and taking in
herring, as the captain consider-
ed it unwise to call at Springdale on his
return trip South. But in that matter
he seems to have been overruled by
the powers that be, presumably to
satisfy some shortsighted persons,
who are now berating his misfor-
tune. It might be truly said of them
"Ye know not what ye ask." Seeing
that the latest news from the Pros-
pero is, that she was jammed in the
ice near Exploit's Harbor, they know
now, that had the captain been allow-
ed to use his own judgment he cer-
tainly would have made the best
round trip ever made at this season of
the year, having cleaned up all her-
ring that were ready for shipping, and
could have returned direct from La
Scie to St. John's, he would have com-
pleted the round trip in eight days,
and his freight of several thousand
barrels of herring could now be in
the markets in New York. We have
already stated had the captain been
allowed to use his own judgment and
not compelled to call at Springdale
the second time to land a paltry
forty or fifty barrels of salt, taken on
board at Little Bay Islands. The
question is asked why should the Gov-
ernment take such risk in ordering
the ship to Springdale at that season
of the year to land a few barrels of
salt, and the with such a valuable
freight on board? The answer is
simple, in the opinion of the writers,
because they don't understand ice and
weather conditions in Notre Dame
Bay in the latter part of January, and
apparently won't be advised. The pity
of it all, is the direct loss to the ship-

pers, and of course, an indirect loss
to the country by not getting the herring
to market in the proper time.
In conclusion, Mr. Editor, we can't
speak too highly of Captain Feild. The
men all love to obey his orders, which
are given in a mild and unassuming
manner. The Purser, Mr. C. White,
is the very embodiment of a "Baby
Purser." Chief Engineer ("Jimmy Mc
Kinley") as the boys on board ship
love to call him, is certainly "the man
behind the gun," both in the Engine
Room and in the Smoking Room.
First and Second Officers Saunders
are sure to be in the right place
when wanted, and the men "before
the mast" one and all go to their
work like men would go to their din-
ner, after a hard forenoon's work
with a determination to get outside of
a good dish of fresh beef and vege-
tables. And sure the man that would
overlook or forget the Chief Steward
(Billy Grills) and his staff and the
Stewards, Mrs. Kennedy, would
certainly forget his mother. In fact,
Mr. Editor, the Prospero's crew, from
her gallant captain down to the
Stewards, are what we "Green Bay
men" would call "the pick of the
Bay."
