To PREVENT SUNSTROKE.—In view of the occurrence of sunstroke during the neated term, we give the following simple rule, which will be found to act as a certain preventative:—Remove the lining out of your hat and substitute one of orange yellow and another of green; the out of your hat and substitute one of orange yellow and another of green; the material may be either silk or paper. The most powerful rays of the sun can then be endured without the fear of sunstroke. The injury does not, as many suppose, proceed from the ray of heat, but, as has been proved, from the chemical ray. The green color will arrest the former, and the orange the latter.
