Town and County News

ST. BARTHOLOMEW'S—Rev. Father
Hammill, of Montreal, will preach in
this church to-morrow morning at the
usual hour.

THE STANDARD—The Elora Standard
has been resuscitated, and treats in-
stead of a week to a page of interesting
reading matter by publishing the Voters'
List for the Township of Peel. This is
not sarcastic.

BOATING—We are informed that Mr.
John W. Clarke is about to establish
the boat business on our river and that
he has secured the steam-boat built by
Mr. Arms, for the rest of the season.
This will no doubt be good news to the
lovers of boating.

CHERRIES—Mr. Elias Witmer, of
Punlich, was very mindful of the printers
this morning, and brought us in a lot
of large and rich black ox-heart
cherries. We thank Mr. Witmer for his
thoughtfulness; hope he will always
have a good crop of cherries, and some
to spare for the printers.

DEPISCABLE HOAX—Some designing
knave the other day sent us a notice of
the marriage of Mr. Andrew Smart, of
Elora, which turns out to be bogus. We
regret having been the innocent cause of
wasting Mr. Smart's feelings, and have
done all in our power to help to bring
the guilty party to light, by sending the
manuscript of the notice to Mr. Smart's
lawyer in Elora. We trust it will lead
to his identification.

RIFLE ACCIDENT—On Tuesday evening,
14th inst., William Hearn, eldest
son of Mr. Robert Cousins, 14th line,
Peel, while talking to a friend with his
loaded rifle resting on the ground, it ac-
cidentally went off, the ball passing
through the palm of the right hand, and
leaving the bones and making an ugly
wound. It will be some time before he
has the use of that hand again.

ANOTHER CANADIAN VICTORY—In ad-
dition to the achievements of our base
ball players, and of the Canadian Wim-
bledon team, we notice that at the recent
International boat race at Springfield,
Mass., George Brown, of Halifax, beat
William Scharff, of Pittsburg, Pa., carry-
ing off the title of Champion of America,
and 85,000 gold. There was much en-
thusiasm in Halifax when the news ar-
rived there.

TO PREVENT SUNSTROKE—In view of
the occurrence of sunstroke during the
heated term, we give the following simple
rule, which will be found to act as a cer-
tain preventative:—Remove the lining
out of your hat and substitute one of
orange yellow and another of green; the
material may be either silk or paper.
The most powerful rays of the sun can
then be endured without the fear of sun-
stroke. The injury does not, as many
suppose, proceed from the ray of heat,
but, as has been proved, from the chemi-
cal ray. The green color will arrest the
former, and the orange the latter.

MUNICIPAL LOAN FUND—Mr. John
Prain, Receiver of Minto, and Mr. A. C. R.
Stearns, Clerk, have exchanged the
money coming to the Township, for
debentures, to their entire satisfaction.
The amount of grant to the Township
was \$23,903.83, bearing interest at 5
per cent. for 160 days, amounting to
\$23.83, making a total due to the town-
ship, of \$24,127.65. By adding \$211.65,
the balance in the Township Treasury, they
were able to purchase \$24,000 of debentures
and interest.

ACCIDENT—This (Saturday) morning
Mr. R. Hadden, insurance agent, was
driving with his young son in a light
wagon, the horses being exchanged,
stopped on turning a corner near Mr.
Hadden's residence, and on making a
spring, the seat, not being properly
fastened, upset. The two occupants were
thrown to the ground, and Mr. Hadden—
who was just recovering from his recent
prolonged illness—sustained serious
injuries. Dr. Keating was promptly in
attendance, and under his good care we
hope to see the injured gentleman about
shortly. Fortunately no bones were
broken.

CONVENTION OF TEACHERS—On Fri-
day a Convention of the delegates nomi-
nated by the teachers of the Province of
Ontario to select candidates for the
forthcoming election of a member to re-
present them in the Council of Public
Instruction, was held in the Theatre of
the Normal School. The Globe says that
the proceedings during the earlier stages
were quiet, but towards the close the ut-
most confusion prevailed, the friends of
one candidate, resorting to all the subterfuges
which their limited knowledge of Parlia-
mentary proceedings could suggest to
place obstacles in the way of a free ex-
pression of opinion, and the obtaining of
a true estimate of the prevailing feeling
of the Convention. As it was, however,
the vote was finally taken, resulting in
favor of Dr. Sangster by a majority of
two, the numbers being, Sangster 27,
Goldwin Smith 25, McCabe 1. Messrs.
A. McPherson and D. Nairn were the
delegates from the County of Wellington.

DEATH FROM STARVATION—A few
days since an unknown man applied for
admission to the St. Catharines hospital,
being in a very exhausted condition.
He was admitted, and in a few minutes
expired. On an examination, it was
found that the lungs of the deceased
were almost gone from disease, but no
trace of food was found in the stomach.
The immediate cause of death was want
of food.

Local and Other Items.

EARLY HARVESTING—Mr. Wm. Osborne,
of Galt, commenced cutting his wheat on
Tuesday last.

OVER A DOZEN car loads of freight were
taken outwards over the Galt branch of
the Grand Trunk Railway in one day
recently.

IT IS STATED on high chemical authority
that the best gail of milk drawn from a
cow is sixteen times richer in cream than
the first portion.

THE GORDON HOUSE, Orangeville, has
changed hands, Mr. W. J. Middleton being
succeeded by Messrs. Lawrence &
Badgeron.

AMERICAN JOURNALS are discussing a
rumor that Her Britannic Majesty is
about to confer a title upon Mr. Sartoris,
who recently married the daughter of
President Grant.

BALLERINI, a Jesuit, was recently sen-
tenced to Milan to three months' impris-
onment, on a fine of 2,000 francs for
satisfying Victor Emmanuel in a romance
entitled "Julio; or The Hunter of the
Alps."

WILLIAM BALLANTYNE, of the firm of
Ballantyne & Fowler, of the Wingham
saw mill and stove factory, the other day
cut 43,000 staves in the short space of 7
hours and 40 minutes, which is an average
of over five cords per hour.

PROF. GOLDWIN SMITH has returned
from England and again taken up his
residence in Toronto, where he is said to
be about to act as editor of the Nation.
It is understood that the Prof. now in-
tends to make Canada his permanent
home.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE AT OWEN SOUND.
—On Tuesday, 14th inst., a fire in John
Harviston's planing mill, Owen Sound,
destroyed about a million feet of lumber.
Total loss about \$15,000. The property
was insured in the Waterloo Mutual for
\$5,000, causing a dead loss of \$10,000.

THE NEWS reaches us from England
that the broken 1866 cable has been re-
paired and is now in working order. The
Great Eastern left on Monday evening
on May 30 of that year, and on the
13th of the following month started for
Valencia, paying out as she proceeded.
She arrived at Trinity Bay on the 27th,
the shore end being spliced the following
day.

**CHELTY TO HORSES ON THE WELAND
CANAL**—A gentleman writing from Port
Dalhousie says that it is really pitiful to
witness the cruel manner in which the
two horses on the Weland Canal are
overworked, in some cases one horse
having to do enough work for two. He
was witness last week where one driver
left his team of horses, when the ther-
mometer stood about 95 deg., all day
without food or water. Numerous in-
stances of a similar kind might also be
given.

ANOTHER OUTRAGE—The Spectator
has, with the assistance of some other
Tory journals, unearthed another outrage
—declaring that "Mr. John McGlashan,
the father-in-law of the Premier's
brother, has been appointed Collector of
Inland Revenue at Sarnia, and that a
worthy officer has to be displaced to
make room for him." It appears, how-
ever, that there is just one little difficulty
in the way of establishing this outrage,
and that is, that Mr. McGlashan was ap-
pointed Collector at Sarnia in 1864, years
before he became father-in-law to the
Premier's brother. Will the Spectator be
so kind as to unravel this little discrep-
ancy?—Dundas Banner.

RUMORED RAILWAY ARRANGEMENTS.
—The Toronto Mail in a long article on
Tuesday, on the policy of economy now
being adopted by the different railroad
companies throughout the country, gives
the following item which will be of in-
terest to our readers:—"There is a rum-
or that the Grand Trunk and Great
Western authorities, under the pressure
of hard times, have harmonized their
differences, and that ere long cars be-
longing to each respectively will regu-
larly run over the other's road. This rumor
may not be the exact truth, but we sus-
pect that ere long it will be verified as a
tolerably close approximation."

RAILWAY SURVEY—Mr. D. F. Mc-
Donald, formerly of Punlich, who accom-
panied Mr. Hazlewood, C.E., on his
explorations for a route for the Pacific
Railway from Parry Sound to within 20
miles of Lake Nipissing, and from thence
to French River, has returned. Mr. Mc-
Donald reports the country from the
Nipissing road to French River, a dis-
tance of 75 miles, to be a tolerably level
country, composed mainly of flat rocks
and swamp, timbered with scrubby pine.
Mr. McDonald left Mr. Hazlewood and
his party at the mouth of the French
River, from which point they return by
way of Lake Nipissing to their depot
camp.

WALKERTON—Walkerton at the present
moment is exhibiting more signs of vital-
ity and progress than at any period sub-
sequent to its being incorporated into a
county town. Between twenty and thirty
new buildings are in course of erection,
and as many more are expected to crop
up before the building season is over.
The new Catholic and Presbyterian
churches are to be of brick, and when
finished will certainly be the handsomest
in town. The private dwellings also, as
a whole, are on a more magnificent scale
than anything that has been attempted
in this heretofore. This is chiefly
due to the high rent, and great demand
for first-class houses.

DISCIPLINE IN THE GERMAN ARMY—In
an article on the railway battalion which
is now forming part of the German Army,
the Militar-Wochenblatt says that, in order
to make the officers and men thoroughly
acquainted with all the details of railway
construction, they have been employed
by detachments, for several months at a
time, on both the Government and private
railways. In the years 1872 and
1873 these detachments laid down on
various lines 65 kilometers of rails, and
built or enlarged twelve new railway
stations. The battalion has also frequen-
tly been called upon to replace rails and
bridges which had been damaged in rail-
way accidents. The sub-officers and men
have been trained on the Government
railways as engineers, station-masters,
drivers, and telegraphists; but the train-
ing of the officers in the details of rail-
way management has as yet been very
incomplete, owing to the difficulty of
finding opportunities for employing them
on lines used for general traffic.

London, July 17.—A despatch from
Lausanne, Switzerland, announces the
death in that city of Rev. Mr. Goodrich,
grandson of Noah Webster.

fined the limits of the Kenely inquiry
to the fact whether or not he is the
editor of the "Englishman."

London, July 18.—The Licensing Bill
has passed in the House of Lords.

The Times correspondent at Santander
telegraphs that the probability of foreign
intervention in Spain, is much discussed
there.

A special to the Daily News from Vi-
enna says that journals in that city sug-
gest that the European powers collective-
ly urge France to prohibit French sup-
port to Carlisle who crosses the Spanish
frontier, on account of barbarities prac-
ticed by their forces.

A despatch from India announces that
the inundations are subsiding.

Queenston, July 17.—Arrived S. S.
Calabria from New York.

New York, July 17.—The S. S. Mace-
donia arrived from Glasgow.

Saratoga, N. Y., July 17.—It is un-
derstood the University race will be rowed
to-morrow forenoon about ten o'clock, as
the lake has been smooth daily at that
time.

New York, July 18.—Specials from
Saratoga state that there is a great deal
of grumbling at the bungling manner in
which the regatta affair has been man-
aged, and the interest in the race is a great
part has subsided, owing to repeated dis-
appointments.

New York, July 17.—Tracy Robinson,
special agent of the Panama R. R., was
arrested in this city on the charge of
appropriating the Company's funds to
the amount of \$100,000.

Louisville, Ky., July 17.—Daniel Math-
eny was shot at Harrodsburg by James
Slaughter. The latter charged the former
with criminal intimacy with his (Slaughter's)
wife, which Matheny admitted.

Chicago, July 17.—A fire broke out in
Princeton, Ill., this morning, destroying
eight business houses. Loss \$20,000; no
insurance.

Lawrence, Kansas, July 17.—The Ex-
ecutive Committee of Friends on Indian
Affairs have adopted a minute request-
ing the agent, John D. Miles, to resign
on account of the warlike tenor of his
recent despatch to the Commissioner of
Indian Affairs. The committee say in-
formation has been received that of the
tribes under their charge, a large propor-
tion are in a very prosperous condition.
Schools and industrial operations are
flourishing. In the three south-western
agencies, chiefly owing to the intrusions
of white men who kill the buffalo, trade
in whiskey, and steal horses from some
of the chiefs, the young men of a few of
the tribes have resolved upon retaliating.

The Brooklyn Eagle says Beecher's
statement is ready for the Committee.
He denies he ever made an impure inti-
mation to Mrs. Tilton. He acknowledges
Mrs. Tilton complained to him of her
husband; spoke of his going with strange
women, and proved her statement was
true, and finally begged him (Mr. Bee-
cher) to advise her as a man and minis-
ter what to do. Mr. Beecher, after long
deliberation and considerable hesitancy
advised her, if she felt she could not re-
claim her husband, to leave him. After a
time Mr. Beecher felt that he had made
a mistake in giving this advice. He
thought that perhaps if left to the
impulses of his own generous nature
Tilton would have abandoned the
strange women after whom
he had been running, and return to the
place of his own household. In this con-
dition of mind he apologized to Mr. Til-
ton for what he had done, promised to
extend to him the right hand of fellow-
ship in future, and to bury the past utterly.
Mr. Tilton's forthcoming statement will,
it is said, disappoint the public greatly.
It is understood he has resolved to re-
main reticent in regard to his own family,
but will attempt to show that Mr. Bee-
cher outraged, not the Tiltons, but some
other household. The consistency of
Tilton's position will be best judged of
by the public when his statement appears
and its contents are compared with his
promises.

BASE BALL ITEMS.
ACTION MAKERS VS. TRIMMERS.

Shameful Treatment.

A case has just come to light and is
revealed by the Hamilton Times, which
shows the most shameful treatment on
the part of a dissipated husband who for
some time lived in Galt. For the pre-
sent the names are suppressed, but the
parties are probably known to some of
our readers.

About ten years ago a young couple
were married in one of the rural districts
of Scotland; contrary, however, to the
wishes of the girl's parents, who being
well-to-do thought their daughter was
not making a good match, as the young
man was of a drunken and irregular
habit. However, the marriage was con-
summated and the two lived in Scotland
until about eight months ago, when they
decided to come to Canada, and chose
Galt as their home. After some little
time both were employed, but while the
wife worked hard and industriously, the
husband began to spend his time loafing
about the town, and on several occasions
made himself acquainted with the police.
About ten days ago, the husband took a
notion to leave Galt, and having obtained
the consent of his wife the two went to
Hamilton. Here their endeavors to ob-
tain work were totally fruitless, and after
three days in the city, homeless, friend-
less and penniless, they fell in with a
gaily-dressed gentleman (?) who advised
the husband to go to Wellington
Square, where he could get work on the
new railway. For the woman he said if
she would go out to service, he could get
her a good place with an English man-
ager. She agreed to do this, and the trio
stopped into a grocery near by and the
stranger wrote a note addressed to the
keeper of a bagnio in the city. This he
gave to the husband, and having added
the necessary directions about the locality
left the two to find it out. After a long
search the woman was found at the
husband, with a malicious twinkle in his
eye, gave the wife the note, and making
some excuse sent her to the door, where
she rang the bell. When the door was
opened, a female appeared, who took the
note, and after she had read it, laughed
and invited the woman in, telling her
she thought she could give her a place.
The wife said she would call her husband,
which made the female reticent about ad-
mitting her; but when the search was made
for the husband he was not to be seen,
and the two women went into the house
together. The young wife's suspicions
were aroused when she entered at the
door, but as she was left alone and kept
very busy she said nothing, but made up
her mind to leave as soon as she had earned
some little money. Overtures were made
to her, but without success. At the end
of four days she left the house, feeling,
however, less than any money. She then
went to the Y. M. C. A. where a lady
took her case in hand and obtained a
situation for her in Galt, giving her a
pass to that town. She seemed to be
satisfied, but the desire to find her hus-
band was so great that she left it and
went back to Hamilton, where on Thurs-
day she got into some trouble at a hotel,
which had been represented to her as
being respectable, but where she was
abused, and, leaving that, she has gone
back to Galt. She is the sister of a
banker in Scotland, who has been em-
barrassed with her husband, who has
squandered all this money. She has
received several hundreds of dollars from
home, but squandered it all, nothing is
known of the inhuman husband.

Disgraceful Tory Journalism.

in the immediate neighborhood.

Rev. John Gemley, formerly of the
Wesleyan denomination, will be ordained
minister of the Church of England in
the chapter-house of the Cathedral of
the Holy Trinity, London, on Sunday
next, when he will also be installed as
Curate of St. Paul's.

The corner stone of the Female Prison,
to be erected conjointly by the Govern-
ment and the city of Montreal, was laid
on Thursday by the Hon. Mr. Archambault,
Minister of Agriculture and Public Works,
Hon. Mr. O'Connell, Premier of Quebec, and
Hon. Mr. Fortin were present. The
prison is to be under the charge of the
Sisters of the Good Shepherd.

A primary meeting of lumber manu-
facturers was held in Ottawa on Thurs-
day, to arrange for a general meeting to
be held there on the 22nd inst., to take
into consideration the present state and
prospects of the trade, which is now at
a stand still. It is said that if the banks
do not come to their assistance a general
stoppage of work must inevitably ensue.

Attorney-General Walkem has finally
made up his mind to go to England.

Grieving for the Loss of "Pap."

The Guelph Herald, like his brother in distress—the Ottawa Citizen—is bitterly lamenting over the loss of some official advertising, and indulges in occasional fits of weeping because he is deprived of his accustomed "pap."

In old times, before Confederation, the advertising of the List of Convictions in this County was given out by tender. Since the formation of the Local Government, this advertising has been considered to be part of their patronage, though we are aware that in some Counties this was disputed.

NEW BRUNSWICK SCHOOL LAW.—A despatch has been received to the effect that the appeal made by the Catholics of New Brunswick to the Privy Council in England against the School Law of that Province has been dismissed with costs, without having heard respondent's counsel.

MR. BARBER, M. P. P., has been nominated by the Reformers of Halton as their candidate for the coming general elections for the Province of Ontario.

THE Manitoba Free Press says that the movement for ousting the late Government in that Province emanated from the French side of the House, and before the English members joined in, they received a guarantee from their French colleagues that they would support a new and more liberal redistribution bill.

A FAVOURABLE COMPARISON.—We notice in the Cornwall Gazette a letter from Mr. J. P. McMillan, of Guelph, in which he contrasts the miserable roads they have in and about Cornwall with the fine roads in the County of Wellington, and tries to impress on the people the importance of making good roads, which are a great means of advancing the prosperity of a County, and are of inestimable benefit to the settlers.

A NEW and desirable class of immigrants are being attracted to the Dominion of Canada. They are ice-landers, of whom 100 or more are now on their way to Nova Scotia. Hardy, industrious, and intelligent, the ice-landers are people who will probably form a valuable addition to our population, if they can be induced to come in any considerable numbers and to remain after they get here.

The Irvine Bridge.

It will be remembered that at the sitting of the County Council in June, a motion made by Mr. Dalby for a grant of \$1,000 towards building this bridge, was lost. Shortly after, a deputation was sent from the Elora Council to Toronto, to arrange with the Government about the surplus, and while in that city they obtained the legal opinion of Mr. Edward Blake, which was engrossed on the minutes of the Council.

The following are the questions asked Mr. Blake: 1. Is this Bridge a County Bridge, and is the County bound to repair it? 2. Who is responsible in case of accident happening through its want of repair?

Mr. Blake's opinion is as follows:—1. The Bridge is within the exclusive jurisdiction of the County, which is bound to repair it. 2. The County is responsible in case of accident happening through its want of repair.

It would be well to give the County notice that the village holds the County liable, and has itself no control over it; and to put up notices on the highway, and at each end of the bridge to the same effect.

Of course all these answers are subject to the reservation that the statute is yet unconstructed by a Court and cannot be authoritatively construed by Counsel. (Signed) EDWARD BLAKE, June 27, 1874.

Hamilton, July 15.—The Executive Committee of the Ontario Industrial Association will hold a preliminary meeting at the Rossin House, Toronto, on Wednesday next, 22nd inst., at 1.30 p.m., with the view of making arrangements for a large general meeting at an early day, to take into consideration the proposed Reciprocity Treaty.

AGNES STRICKLAND.—Miss Agnes Strickland, whose death is announced by cable, was the third daughter of Mr. Thomas Strickland, of Reydon Hall, Suffolk, was born early in the century, and manifested in childhood a taste for poetical composition. Her chief works were the "Lives of Scottish Queens," in six volumes, and twelve volumes of "Lives of the Queens of England." She published in 1892 "The Bachelor Kings of England," as a companion volume to the Lives of the Queens of England and of the Queens of Scotland. It contains the Lives of William Rufus, Edward V., and Edward VI., the only three unmarried sovereigns of England. This third work completes her chain of royal and domestic historical biography from the Norman Conquest. Her latest works are "How will it End?" published in 1865; "Lives of the Seven Bishops," in 1866; and an abridged edition of the "Queens of England" for the use of schools and libraries. In 1871 she received a Civil Pension of £100 in recognition of the services she rendered in her literary works.

A Memorial from the Directors of the Guelph General Hospital, presented by Dr. Keating, was read and taken into consideration. The Council cordially resolved to grant \$300 towards the Building Fund of the Hospital. The clerk was instructed to transmit the petition of William E. May and others to Guelph Township Council for consideration. Letters and petitions from Messrs. David Holm, John Scott, James Macklin, James Anderson, Peter Gilchrist, William Reid and Allan McLarty, sen., soliciting aid for roads and bridges, were referred to the examining Committees. The Township Treasurer presented his semi-annual statement, which was on motion received, read, and ordered to be engrossed. The sum of \$5.40 collected for statute labour within the bounds allotted to Mr. John Fifo, path-master, was ordered to be paid to him. On motion of Mr. Nicoll, seconded by Mr. Cockburn, a By-law was introduced, carried through the different stages and passed, authorizing the Trustees of School Section, No. 10, to borrow money for school purposes. A By-law taxing all the rateable property within the municipality for County, School and Township purposes, was introduced, carried through the various readings, and passed. On motion duly made and seconded, the Reeve issued his order in favour of Mr. Gilchrist, Tavern Inspector, for \$6. expenses incurred attending prosecution under the License Act. The account of Mr. Wm. M. Todd for sundry repairs on Town Hall and Council Chamber, \$16.10, was ordered to be paid. Messrs. Leslie, Smith and Cockburn were constituted a Committee to examine roads and bridges, petitioned for on the south side of the Brock Road, and all petitions from that quarter referred to them. Messrs. Nicoll and Gaultfield were constituted a Committee for the same purpose on the north side of Brock Road, and all petitions from that quarter referred to them. The Council adjourned to meet again on Monday, August 24th, at one o'clock, p. m.
