THE EXTENSION OF GERRARD-STREET TO EAST TORONTO.

What Aldermen and Prominent Citi

a long and urgent letter to the City Clerk, pointing out the need of better street car accommodation in the northeast portion of the city. The letter was read at the follow-ing meeting of the council and referred to the Board of Works. By the latter body it was favorably received and was handed over to the City Engineer for report. What is petitioned for is the extension of the present street railway in Gerrard-street

east to Jones-avenue and thence northward on to Danforth-road. This would undoubted on to Danforth-road. This would undoubtedly be a convenience to those residing in the district concerned, but it will not be anything like the improvement which is also at the present time being advocated, namely, the extension of Gerrard-street straight through into East Toronto.

Ald. Lamb, chairman of the Board of Works, said yesterday that he and the aldermen of Ward No. 1, who were familiar with the needs of the district, very favorably entertained the proposition of ex-Ald. Galbraith. As the streets for which the proposed extension are not very much built on Ald. Lamb said the city would not be warranted in putting down a permanent foundation costing \$20,000 a mile.

An Agreement is Being Drafted by the City Solicitor, which will probably be accepted by the council and the Street Rail-way Company, by which these roads can be formed of ordinary ballast by the Street Railway Company, the city foregoing the nileage of \$800.

The extension of Gerrard-street for a mile would connect it with the Kingston-road. Being half way between Danforth-avenue and Queen-street this new thoroughfare would be a decided convenience both for city and country residents.


