CIVIC GRANTS FOR CHARITY

INQUIRY INTO THEIR VALUE AND NECESSITY

The Health Machinery—Costly Management—Many Charities Overlap—One Million Dollars in 15 Years—Ratepayers to Report Next Week—Institutions Out of Proportion to Population.

In pursuance of a resolution of the Executive Committee, Assistant City Treasurer Patterson, and before the charities sub-committee yesterday afternoon a comprehensive compilation of statistics prepared from statements furnished by the various charitable organizations that receive financial aid from the corporation.

The total city grant last year was \$108,657; the number of officials employed in connection with these charities is 254, whose salaries amount to \$28,832. The land held by the charities is valued at \$421,704 and the buildings \$88,437. The property is mortgaged for \$171,776, which entails an interest charge of \$11,415.

Only two societies report that no expense is incurred in connection with the distribution of their funds. These are the Hebrew Benevolent Society and the Ladies' Maccabean Society, both Jewish organizations.

Last year the city contributed to charitable organizations, exclusive of hospitals, \$47,250, as against the sum of \$12,500 in 1930; \$14,850 in 1931; \$15,100 in 1932; \$16,100 in 1933; \$19,800 in 1934; \$16,700 in 1935; \$18,050 in 1936; \$20,789 in 1937; \$27,800 in 1938; \$40,800 in 1939; \$35,405 in 1939 and \$39,400 in 1938.

The aggregate for 15 years was as follows: City charities, \$395,144; \$12,018 Toronto General Hospital, \$210,688; sundry hospitals and homes, \$12,500; Jubilee grant of \$20,000 to St. Children's Hospital, \$73,189; Isolation and Smallpox Hospital, \$85,666; Industrial Schools, including grant for building purposes of \$39,906 to Victoria and Alexandra Industrial School, \$128,838 (since 1888 only); interest on poor persons, \$9376; grand total, \$914,837.

Societies Represented Yesterday. Those present were Aid, Jolliffe, chairman; Ald. Hallam, Mayor, Messrs. D. M. DeLoe, Dr. Thompson, Richard Reynolds, Ratepayers' Association, J. E. Bell, George G. Gorman; City Relief Officer Taylor, Dr. Roseburgh, Prisoners' Aid Society; Rev. A. H. Baldwin, Rev. H. A. Brogden, House of Industry; W. T. J. Lee, House of Providence, and other Roman Catholic societies; Mrs. Patterson, Mrs. Harrison, Toronto Relief Society.

The chairman said the official statistics presented were a result of the agitation of the ratepayers' association. He suggested a careful perusal of the figures and a report found thereon to be presented next Wednesday. If the sub-committee approved of the recommendations a report would be submitted to the council and on to council in time for consideration of the estimates.

Grant of Fifty Charities. Ald. J. J. Graham concurred in the present state of taxation and depression it was not to be thought of that the large city grants could be given to 50 charities. A scheme should be devised whereby the grants could be curtailed and the societies and ratepayers be satisfied.

The chairman said this was the feeling of the year, and the cutting of the amalgamation of charities was suggested. Then, ladies and ministers came down to the City Hall, where the ratepayers' men gave way and altered their previous vote, and the societies got the grants in the same order as before. This, however, had got to stop. (Hear, hear.)

T. J. Lee said a scheme should be devised that would place all the charities of the city on the same footing, irrespective of religion or denomination. The city grant should be in proportion to work done and the number of inmates, wherever they might be.

Ald. Hallam was opposed to any sectarianism. The city should not recognize any Catholic orphan's home nor Protestant orphan's home, but only a city orphan's home. (Applause.) If money was given it should go where the most good was being done, no matter who was doing it. This was the true principle of charity.

Richard Reynolds reiterated his statement that of the sums granted 75 per cent goes in management and other ways and only 25 per cent for relief. Payments were being made of the children in the Boys' Home, who were sent out with their mothers from door to door. All the relief in the city could be done by three institutions far better than it is done now and at one-third of the cost to the ratepayers.

Another question which the Executive committee should consider is the large amount of property which these institutions hold, which, being exempt from taxation, represents a yearly loss to the city of \$18,000.

Six men undertook to rob the southbound No. 3 Queen's Crescent train, which left Cincinnati last night. One of the robbers was killed outright; another died at 4 o'clock this morning; a third, giving the name of Miller, now lies here severely wounded, and the other three have not been heard from. The train was delayed more than ten minutes.
