Grain marketed along the Canadian Pacific Railway in 1923 totalled 187,642,224 bushels.

Government statistics estimate the apple crop of Canada for 1923 at 10,794,500 boxes.

AMENDMENT TO HIGHWAYS ACT. An Act to Amend Chapter 3, Acts of 1917, "The Public Highways Act as Amended." (Passed the 23rd day of April, A. D., 1923). Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, as follows: 1. Sub-section (2) of Section 32 of Chapter 3, Acts of 1917, "The Public Highways Act, as amended," is hereby repealed and the following substituted: 2. (a) All male persons physically fit between the ages of 14 and 60, residing within the section, are required to work with their shovels, horses, oxen, and teams, on the highways during the Winter whenever the highways become impassable from snow. Providing, however, that youths actually in regular attendance at any public school shall not during school hours be required to work under this section. (b) If any such person or persons do not attend for work as aforesaid it shall be the duty of such overseer to order such person or persons to attend for work as aforesaid, forthwith, or at any time or hour of the day on which he or they are required to attend, as the overseer designates: (c) every person so liable to attend for work, who fails or neglects to comply with such order, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than three dollars nor more than ten dollars; (d) such order of the overseer shall be sufficiently communicated if sent to or left, or given verbally or in writing at the usual place of residence of such person, with some inmate thereof apparently not under sixteen years of age.

Societies show that more than 11,000 women and girls were reported missing during 1922 in thirty-three American cities; approximately 900 of these had not been found by Dec. 31st of last year. A survey of 37 cities gave a total of 31,838 men, women and children who disappeared, about 2500 of whom were not found. Police reports show that 1652 girls under 21 were reported missing in New York City during the year.

The Rink Situation.

There are several phases of the above question that we wish to bring before the public and particularly those who are more or less interested in the provision of the cleanest and most healthful amusement that a town can provide for its people.

The Rink does not interfere with the religious activities of the town. Our people, especially the young, are bound to have amusement and the rink provides amusement that is not questionable and deserves the aid rather than the censure of the best class of people in the town. We open on Wednesday evenings at 8.30 to allow any who wish to attend prayer meetings to do so.

If the service has not been perfect this year any thoughtful person will know that it is due entirely to the season and compares very favorably with that of the other rinks of the Valley.

Some two hundred persons subscribed for stock in this enterprise. Some have paid in full like men. Some have paid part and are shielding themselves by some supposed legal technicality from the necessity of completing payment, and some are minors and are evading the fulfilment of their obligations because of the impossibility of collection by legal means.

To the first we want to express our appreciation of their action as good business men.

We appeal to the decency of the second class to make settlement voluntarily; we are giving them every opportunity to do so before taking legal proceedings and collect principal, interest and costs.

To the third class we want to cite the example of Borden Tupper who voluntarily paid his in full, though he will probably never have any chance to enjoy the rink.

To all those who have not completed payment we would like to say that we are paying interest for them on approximately twelve hundred dollars which they are morally or legally bound to pay. To a straight business man it should never come to a question of legal responsibility.

There is another class of citizens who want the privileges of the rink without paying for them, and who are offended if we do not see the matter in this light. We refrain from making any comment on these people for fear of becoming profane.

To the Curling Club we offer no apology for not providing a rink before, but we ask the members of the club to remember that most of the expenses in connection with this part of the rink, such as ice-making, interest on capital, etc., are going on and instead of cursing the management for what is beyond their control in weather conditions it would be well to pay up even if they do not get a whole season's curling.

To all we urge that view which considers that this thing belongs to the town and is a good thing for the town and give it all the help they can.

We want to express our appreciation of the service being given by the band. They are living up to their contract, giving us good music with an extra number occasionally, and the Friday night practice also helps out.
