His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to open the Session by a gracious Speech to both Houses.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I am glad to be again enabled to summon you to meet for the despatch of business, at the time which has been considered best suited to the convenience of members.

During the recess I visited the Province of British Columbia, and had much satisfaction in becoming acquainted with the people of that interesting part of the Dominion, and with the climate and resources of their Province.

The surveys of the *Pacific* Railway have been prosecuted with the utmost vigour and at a larger cost during the past than in any previous year, but it has not been found possible, as yet, to complete the location of the line, and I have consequently been obliged to postpone the inviting of tenders for its construction on the terms indicated by the Act of 1874.

A further correspondence on the subjects at issue between my Government and

British Columbia will be laid before you.

During the recent suspension of the Extradition arrangements with the *United States*, I took care that the importance to *Canada* of a speedy resumption of these arrangements should be represented to Her Majesty's Government, whose attention has been further invited to the expediency of largely extending the provisions of the existing Treaty.

I am glad to be able to state that while the operation of the Treaty has been resumed, negotiations are in progress for a convention more liberal and better suited

to the circumstances of the two countries.

The attention of my Government having been directed to some anomalies in the Royal Commission and Royal Instructions to the Governor-General, particularly with regard to the exercise of the Prerogative of Pardon, steps have been taken towards the amendment of these instruments.

Papers on this subject, as well as on that of the Extradition question, will be laid

before you.

The great public works connected with the St. Lawrence navigation, and the canals required to complete the system, have been prosecuted with success during the past year.

Nearly all the works on the Welland and Lachine Canals have been placed under

contract on terms favourable to the country.

The active prosecution of these works during the last three years has necessarily increased the public debt, and, though expectations are entertained that the outlay may ultimately be repaid to the country, it may be considered advisable not to press all the works, contemplated in the earlier years of Confederation, to completion at present.

I am happy to state that the Intercolonial Railway was opened for traffic, throughout its length, early in the summer, with as favourable results as could have

been expected.

One of the immediate advantages of the completion of the Railway was the delivery and reception of the British Mails at *Halifax* after the closing of the *St. Lawrence*; and I am happy to say that up to the present time mails and passengers have been successfully carried over the lines without any interruption.

The exhibition of Canadian products, manufactures, and works of art at the *United States* National Exposition at *Philadelphia*, was eminently successful, and proclaimed to the world that *Canada* has already taken a high place as a farming, manufacturing and mining country.

It is gratifying to be able to state that the expenditure was kept well within the

estimate.

It is but just that I should acknowledge that the success achieved by the enterprise of our people was largely aided by the energy and wisdom of the Commissioners who had charge of the arrangements.

I have considered it advisable in the interest of the country to make arrangements for exhibiting Canadian products at the Exhibition to be held at Sydney, New

South Wales, for which you will be asked to make provision.

Notwithstanding the loss of revenue, consequent chiefly on the diminution of our importations, the reductions effected during the current year have gone far to restore the equilibrium between income and expenditure, though great economy will be still needful to attain this object.

I regret that I am still unable to announce any progress in obtaining a settlement of the Fishery claims under the Washington Treaty, though my Government

has made every effort to secure that result.

My Commissioners have made further Treaty arrangements with certain of the Indian tribes of the North-West Territories, by which their title is extinguished to a very large portion of the territories west of Treaty No. 4; and although some of the provisions of this Treaty are of a somewhat onerous and exceptional character, I have thought it, nevertheless, advisable, on the whole, to ratify it. This Treaty will be placed before you. I have made an engagement to negotiate a Treaty with the remaining tribes east of the Rocky Mountains.

The expenditure incurred by the Indian Treaties is undoubtedly large, but the Canadian policy is, nevertheless, the cheapest, ultimately, if we compare the results with those of other countries; and it is above all a humane, just, and Christian

Notwithstanding the deplorable war waged between the Indian tribes in the United States territories, and the Government of that country, during the last year, no difficulty has arisen with the Canadian tribes living in the immediate vicinity of

the scene of hostilities.

You will be asked to consider the expediency of making such changes in the Joint Stock Companies' Act as may obviate for the future the passage of special Acts of Parliament for the incorporation of various classes of Companies, including such corporations as seek to engage in the borrowing and lending of money, by providing for their organization by Letters Patent.

The desirability of affording additional security to policy-holders of Life Assurance Companies has engaged the attention of my Government, and I trust that the

measure which will be submitted will accomplish the desired object.

A measure will be submitted to you for the purpose of extending to the navigation of the great inland waters, rights and remedies at present confined to waters within the jurisdiction of the Courts of Vice Admiralty.

You will be asked to amend and consolidate the laws relating to Customs.

I have considered it advisable to provide for the permanent prosecution of the Geological Survey which has heretofore been carried on under temporary enactments, and to make this a distinct branch of the Civil Service; your attention will be invited to a Bill for that purpose.

Measures will be submitted also for the amendment of the Weights and Measures

Act, the Excise laws, and other Acts, and also a Bill relating to Shipping.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

The accounts of the past year will be laid before you.

The Estimates of the next financial year will also be submitted, and will, I trust, be found to be framed with a view to meet the existing circumstances of the country, while at the same time, providing for carrying on the administration of affairs with efficiency.

TO THE HONOURABLE THE SENATE OF CANADA IN PARLIAMENT ASSEMBLED.

THE REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN OF PARLIAMENT, RESPECTFULLY SHEWETH:-

It is with much satisfaction that your Librarian reports that the transfer of the Library of Parliament, to the beautiful building erected for its reception, has at length taken place. Owing to the time required for the completion of the interior fittings, it was not until the middle of the month of October that the removal commenced. The labor involved in re-arranging and classifying a collection of such magnitude, within such a short period, has been very considerable; and much still remains to be done before the work is properly completed.

At the outset, a formidable difficulty presented itself. It was found that the new Chamber was wholly inadequate, in its dimensions and apportionment, to contain the number of volumes proposed to be placed therein. Up to the time when this was ascertained, it had been taken for granted that the New Building was capable of holding, at least one hundred thousand (100,000) volumes: agreeably to the original intentions of the Government, in its construction, and in conformity with the direc-

tions given to the Superintending Architect.

So far back as the 14th May, 1859, when the erection of Parliament Buildings in Ottawa was first determined upon, the undersigned submitted to the Board of Works a Memorandum, specifying the nature and extent of the accommodation

required for the Library.

This Memorandum pointed out that the Library premises should include "one large Apartment, with three tiers of light iron galleries," capable of containing 200,000 volumes. Likewise rooms, to be grouped around the Central Chamber, for the exhibition of Maps and Pictures, for offices, for private study, and for necessary uses in the administration of a large and growing department. Full particulars as to the size and disposition of these rooms were embodied in this Memorandum; including the exact number of feet of shelving required for the number of volumes which, it was estimated that the Library would hereafter contain. By this calculation it was shewn that at least 25,000 feet of shelving would be needed to hold 200,000 volumes, of the average size.

This Memorandum was approved by the Board of Works; and printed copies of it were sent to all competing Architects, with instructions to prepare their plans in strict conformity thereto. The plan finally chosen corresponded, in general design, with your Librarian's suggestion, and he was notified by Mr. Samuel Keefer, the then Secretary of the Board, that his recommendations on behalf of the Library would be

unreservedly carried out.

As the new building approached completion, and it became necessary to prepare for the transfer of the Books, your Librarian caused measurements to be made, to ascertain the shelving at his disposal for the various classes and divisions of the Library, when, to his surprise and disappointment, it was discovered that only about 7,000 feet of shelving had been placed in the Central Room, which, accordingly, could not con-

tain more than about 56,000 volumes.

It was then too late to make any material alteration in the fitting up of this Chamber; and under these circumstances he was compelled to alter all his intended arrangements for the classification of the Books, and in respect to the use to which it had been proposed to apply the various Apartments surrounding the Library, and to devote every available foot of space for shelves. This has been successfully accomplished, and not only has sufficient space been obtained for the immediate wants of the Library, but also for its probable increase for some two or three years to come. To effect this, however, it was indispensable to retain the gallery over the old Library, for the deposit of books, and to abandon the attempt to set apart a special room for the exhibition and consultation of maps; a loss which will be increasingly felt until it can be remedied.

Upon a careful review of the case, a plan has occurred to your Librarian, by the adoption of which he believes that the great and unexpected loss of space, through the structural deficiency of the New Building, could be fully compensated; and a result attained more in accordance with the actual wants of the Library, even than the

original design.

He would propose that the suite of apartments formerly occupied by the Library, and now assigned for the occupancy of the Supreme Court, should, as speedily as possible, be restored to the use of the Library; and that all the books needful for reference in connection with Legislation should be placed therein. In other large Libraries, on this Continent, appertaining to Legislative Bodies,—such as the Congressional Library, at Washington, and the New York State Library, at Albany,—separate provision is made for the Law Library. If, in like manner, our large and valuable collections of works upon legal and legislative subjects could thus be brought into immediate proximity to the Senate and House of Commons, it would greatly conduce to the comfort and convenience of the Members, during Session; as it would secure to them quiet rooms for study and research; whilst the General Library would be available for the use and entertainment of all who should be privileged to have access thereto. Such an arrangement, moreover, would afford ample scope for the increase and improvement of the Library, in all its branches: a result which cannot be attained under present circumstances.

The last annual grant for the purchase of Books has been carefully expended; with special attention to the augmentation of the Law Library. A Supplementary Catalogue of these accessions has been printed for distribution, and a Classified Catalogue of Law Books is in preparation. A large invoice of Books on French Law, selected or approved by the Judges of the Supreme Court, has just been received, and

the books will shortly be placed upon the shelves.

Lists of Donations to the Library, and of Works received under the Copyright

Act, since last year, are hereunto appended.

The number of Volumes in the Library at the last Report was estimated at 79,486. Since then, about 4,397 volumes have been added, making a total of 83,883 volumes.

We thank Your Excellency for the information that the attention of Your Excellency's Government having been directed to some anomalies in the Royal Commission, and Royal Instructions to the Governor General, particularly with regard to the exercise of the Prerogative of Pardon, steps have been taken towards the amendment of these instruments.

Our careful attention will not fail to be given to the papers on this subject, as well as on that of the Extradition Question, which Your Excellency has been pleased

to say will be laid before us,

It affords us much pleasure to hear from Your Excellency that the great public works connected with the St. Lawrence navigation, and the canals required to complete the system, have been prosecuted with success during the past year, and that nearly all the works on the Welland and Lachine Canals have been placed under contract on terms favourable to the country.

But we are not surprised to learn from Your Excellency that the active prosecution of these works during the last three years have necessarily increased the public debt, though expectations are entertained that the outlay may ultimately be repaid to the country, it may be considered advisable not to press all the works, con-

templated in the earlier years of Confederation, to completion at present.

We unite with Your Excellency in rejoicing that the Intercolonial Railway was opened for traffic, throughout its entire length, early in the summer, with as favourable results as could have been expected; that one of the immediate advantages of the completion of the Railway was the delivery and reception of the British Mails at Halifax after the closing of the St Lawrence; and that up to the present time mails and passengers have been successfully carried over the line without any interruption.

It is with great pride and satisfaction that we find Your Excellency bearing testimony to the fact that the Exhibition of Canadian products, manufactures and works of art at the *United States* National Exposition at *Philadelphia*, was eminently successful, and proclaimed to the world that *Canada* has already taken a high place

as a farming, manufacturing and mining country.

And it is gratifying to us to learn as it can be to Your Excellency to be able to

state, that the expenditure was kept well within the estimate.

We rejoice that Your Excellency has been able with justice to acknowledge that the success achieved by the enterprise of our people was largely aided by the energy and wisdom of the Commissioners who had charge of the arrangements.

And we are glad to hear that Your Excellency has considered it advisable in the interest of the country to make arrangements for exhibiting Canadian products at the Exhibition to be held at Sydney, New South Wales, for which Parliament will be

asked to make provision.

We are thankful to Your Excellency for the very welcome information that, notwithstanding the loss of revenue, consequent chiefly on the diminution of our importations, the reductions effected during the current year have gone far to restore the equilibrium between income and expenditure; though we agree with Your Excellency that great economy will be still needful to attain this object.

We participate in Your Excellency's regret at being still unable to announce any progress in obtaining a settlement of the Fishery claims under the Washington Treaty, though Your Excellency's Government has made every effort to secure that result.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that Your Commissioners have made further treaty arrangements with certain of the Indian tribes of the North-West Territories, by which their title is extinguished to a very large portion of the territories west of Treaty No. 4; that, although some of the provisions of this treaty are of a somewhat onerous and exceptional character, Your Excellency has thought it nevertheless advisable on the whole to ratify it; that this treaty will be placed before us; and that Your Excellency has made an engagement to negotiate a treaty with the remaining tribes east of the Rocky Mountains.

We agree with Your Excellency in thinking that, although the expenditure incurred by the Indian Treaties is undoubtedly large, the Canadian policy is nevertheless the cheapest, ultimately, if we compare the results with those of other

countries; and that it is above all a humane, just, and Christian policy.

And it has afforded us great pleasure to learn from Your Excellency that notwithstanding the deplorable war waged between the Indian tribes in the *United* States territories and the Government of that country during the last year, no difficulty has arisen with the Canadian tribes living in the immediate vicinity of the scene of hostilities.

We shall be prepared to consider, as Your Excellency has been pleased to say we shall be asked to do, the expediency of making such changes in the Joint Stock Com-

panies' Act as may obviate for the future the passage of Special Acts of Parliament for the incorporation of various classes of Companies, including such incorporations as seek to engage in the borrowing and lending of money, by providing for their organization by Letters Patent.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that the desirability of affording

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that the desirability of affording additional security to policy holders of Life Assurance Companies has engaged the attention of your Government, and we shall give our earnest attention to any measure

intended to accomplish the desired object which may be submitted.

Your Excellency having been pleased to intimate that a measure will be submitted to us for the purpose of extending to the navigation of the great inland waters, rights and remedies at present confined to waters within the jurisdiction of the Courts of Vice-Admiralty, and that we shall be asked to amend and consolidate the laws relating to customs, we beg leave to assure Your Excellency that neither measure will fail to receive our most attentive consideration.

And Your Excellency having further informed us that you have considered it advisable to provide for the permanent prosecution of the Geological Survey, which has heretofore been carried on under temporary enactments, and to make this a distinct branch of the Civil Service, we beg leave to say that our attention will not

be invited in vain to any Bill for that purpose.

3. I now wish to explain to you that on the 18th of December last, I addressed a despatch to the Governor General of *Canada* (No. 362) setting forth at length the views of Her Majesty's Government, in regard to the Railway question.

4. A copy of that despatch has I am informed by Lord Dufferin been transmitted to you, and it is my desire that it should be regarded as addressed as much to the Province of British Columbia in answer to the representations received from the

Council and Assembly as to the Government of the Dominion.

5. I feel assured that your Government and Legislature will give due weight to the recommendations therein contained, and that they will accept my assurance that after careful and anxious consideration of the subject I feel that any attempt at this precise moment to come to a final decision would be inexpedient in the interest of any party, and would create fresh difficulties to the settlement of the question on that just and satisfactory footing which Her Majesty's Government so earnestly desire.

6. As you are well aware, it is not usual for the Secretary of State to correspond direct with a Provincial Government, the Rules of the Service requiring that all such communications should be made to the Governor General. As, however, I have been led to understand that in the present case your Government have expected a direct communication from Her Majesty's Government, I have addressed this Despatch to you, and have explained to the Governor General the circumstances under which I have done so.

My Lord,-I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, No. 34, of the 26th January, enclosing copy of an approved Report of a Committee of the Privy Council recommending that six Members be added to the Senate in accordance with

a Memorandum by Mr. Mackenzie of the 22nd December.

2. After careful examination of the question, which is one of considerable importance, I am satisfied that the intention of the framers of the 26th Section of "The British North American Act, 1867" was that this power should be vested in Her Majesty in order to provide a means of bringing the Senate into accord with the House of Commons in the event of an actual collision of opinion between the two Houses.

3. You will readily understand that Her Majesty could not be advised to take the responsibility of interfering with the Constitution of the Senate, except upon an occasion when it had been made apparent that a difference had arisen between the two Houses of so serious and permanent a character, that the Government could not be carried on without Her intervention, and when it could be shown that the limited creation of Senators allowed by the Act would apply an adequate remedy.

4. This view is, I may observe, strongly confirmed by the provisions of the 27th Section, which show that the addition to the Senate is only to be temporary, and that the Senate is to be reduced to its usual number as soon as possible after the necessity

for the exercise of the special power has passed away.

5. It follows from what I have said that I am not prepared to advise Her Majesty to direct the proposed addition to the Senate.

"57. Upon the making and perfecting of the said agreement and act of consolid-"ation, as provided in the next preceding section, and the filing of the said agreement "as in the said section provided, the several societies, parties thereto, shall be deemed "and taken to be consolidated, and to form one corporation by the name in the said "agreement, provided with a common seal, and shall possess all the rights, privileges

"and franchises of each of such corporations.

"58. Upon the consummation of such act of consolidation as aforesaid, all and singular the business property, real, personal and mixed, and all rights and incidents appurtenant thereto, all stock, mortgages or other securities, subscriptions and other debts due on whatever account, and other things in action belonging to such

"corporations or either of them, shall be taken or deemed to be transferred to and "vested in such new corporation without further act or deed; provided, however, "that all rights of creditors and liens upon the property of either of such corpora-"tions shall be unimpaired by such consolidation, and all debts, liabilities, and duties "of either of the said corporations shall thenceforth attach to the new corporation, "and be enforced against it to the same extent as if the said debts, liabilities, and "duties had been incurred or been contracted by it; and provided also, that no action "or proceeding, legal or equitable, by or against the said corporations so consolidated, "or either of them, shall abate, or be affected by such consolidation, but for all the "purposes of such action or proceeding such corporation may be deemed still to "exist; or the new corporation may be substituted in such action or proceeding in "the place thereof."

3rd. That legislation on this subject to the extent mentioned in the foregoing resolutions being clearly within the powers of this Parliament, and involving no question of jurisdiction requiring to be decided by the Supreme Court,—it is in the opinion of this House desirable and expedient that an Act should be passed to prohibit the manufacture and importation of intoxicating liquors in the cases specified in the foregoing resolutions.

That the Parliament of Canada has all the power necessary for making provision

for the extradition from Canada of Fugitive Criminals.

That the Parliament and Government of Canada have all the powers proper for performing the obligations of Canada, as part of the British Empire, towards Foreign States, arising under Treaties between the Empire and Foreign States.

That several Extradition arrangements extending to Canada have been made between Your Majesty and Foreign States, and that other such arrangements may

from time to time be made.

That it is proper to make provision by one Canadian law, for the execution as

respects Canada, of all such arrangements.

That a Bill has passed both Houses of the Parliament of Canada and now awaits Your Majesty's assent providing for the execution, as respects Canada, of all such arrangements as soon as the operation of the Extradition Act of 1870, of the Parliament of the United Kingdom shall have ceased or been suspended within Canada.

That by the said Act of the Parliament of the United Kingdom certain provisions are made for the extradition of fugitive criminals, and by the seventeenth section it is enacted that the Act when applied by Order in Council shall, unless it is otherwise provided by such Order, extend to the several British Possessions in the same manner as if throughout the Act the British Possessions were substituted for England as the case may require, with certain modifications, and by the eighteenth section it is enacted that if by any law or ordinance, made before or after the passing of the said Act, by the Legislature of any British Possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such Possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British Possession, Your Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the Act, in the case of any Foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, either suspend the operation within any such British Possession of the Act or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such Foreign State, and so long as such law or ordinance continues in force there, and no longer, or direct that such law or ordinance, or any part thereof, shall have effect in such British Possession, with or without modifications and alterations, as if it were part of the Act.

That the provisions of the said Act of 1870 are unsuitable to Canada.

That when the said Bill now awaiting Your Majesty's assent becomes law it will

be expedient that the said Act of 1870 should not extend to Canada.

We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to invite such legislation in the Parliament of the United Kingdom as will cause the operation of the said Act of the Parliament of the United Kingdom to cease in Canada, and that in the meantime Your Majesty will be graciously pleased by Order in Council to suspend the operation within Canada of the said Act so far as it relates to any Foreign State with which there may be an extradition arrangement.

"2. The liability of shareholders to persons who were, at the time of the reduc-"tion of the capital, creditors of the Company, shall remain as though the capital

" had not been decreased."

Clause C.

"After such sanction of such by-law notice thereof shall be forthwith given by "the Secretary or other officer of the Company in the Carada Gazette and in a news-"paper or newspapers published at or near the place or places where the Company "may be carrying on its business, setting forth that the shareholders of the Company "have sanctioned a by-law whereby the capital stock of the Company is decreased: "and the amount of the decrease, and of the capital stock as decreased: and there-"upon from the date of such notice the capital stock of the Company shall be and "remain decreased to the amount and in the manner and subject to the conditions " set forth in such by-law."

THE SENATE,

COMMITTEE ROOM, 8th April, 1876.

The Select Committee to whom was referred the Bill intituled: "An Act for the "relief of Robert Campbell," and to whom was referred back the Petition of Eliza Maria Campbell and the evidence annexed to their former report, with instructions to inquire into the truth of the material allegations contained in the said Petition, and if the same are found to be true, then, with instructions to report such amendments to the said Bill as will secure to the said Robert Campbell and Eliza Maria Campbell, respectively, the rights and privileges which would be secured to them under a decree for judicial separation in England, have, in obedience to the order of reference of the fifth instant, examined the said Petition and considered the same; and again considered the said evidence,—and now beg leave to report thereon as follows:—

Your Committee find that the material allegations contained in the said Petition

are true, according to the said evidence.

Thereupon the Counsel for the said Petitioner, Eliza Maria Campbell, submitted to Your Committee certain clauses proposed by him to be substituted for those of the Bill, with certain additions to the preamble of the same. But in view of the late period of the Session, and the want of time maturely to consider the proposed clauses which would form a new precedent in legislation, Your Committee recommend that the considerations of these amendments be deferred until next Session, when the same can be considered, if Your Honorable House think fit, on the further hearing of the Bill.

And Your Committee append hereto, and submit herewith, the said proposed clauses and amendments.

All which is respectfully submitted.

R. B. DICKEY, Chairman. Page 2, Line 33.—Leave out from "follows" to the end of the Bill, and insert Clauses A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, and J.

Clause A was then read as follows:-

Clause A.

"1. From and after the commencement of this Act the said Eliza Maria Camp-"bell shall be and shall remain separated from the bed and board of her husband the "said Robert Campbell."

Which was agreed to on a division.

Clause B was then read as follows:-

Clause B.

"2. The separation hereby authorized and provided shall have the same force and the same consequences, as a judicial separation in *England*, under a decree for judicial separation pronounced by the proper Court there, at the commencement of this Act."

It was then moved that the said Clause be amended to read as follows:-

Clause B.

"2. The separation hereby authorized and provided shall, except as hereinafter provided, have the same force, and the same consequences, as a judicial separation in England under a decree for judicial separation pronounced by the proper Court there at the commencement of this Act," which was agreed to on a division.

Clause C was then read as follows: -

Clause C.

"3. The said Robert Campbell shall pay annually to his said wife for her sup-"port and maintenance the sum of dollars during her separation as afore-"said, in twelve equal instalments payable on the first day of each month."

It was then moved that Clause C be amended to read as follows:-

Clause C.

"3. The said Robert Campbell shall pay annually to his said wife for her support and maintenance the sum of \$600 during her separation as aforesaid, in two equal half-yearly instalments payable on the first days of May and November in every year."

Which being objected to, It was moved in amendment,

"That this Committee is of opinion that there is not evidence before it to justify "the Committee in recommending any specific sum to be inserted in the blank left "in Clause C."

Which being also agreed to.

Clause D.

"4. The said Eliza Maria Campbell may after the commencement of this Act, "have the custody and care of two of the children of the said marriage, viz.: Edith "Holmes Campbell and Francis William Campbell, during her separation as aforesaid."

Clause D.

"4. The said Eliza Maria Campbell may, after the commencement of this Act, have the custody and care of one of the children of the said marriage, viz: Francis William Campbell, during her separation as aforesaid," which was agreed to.

Clause E.

"5. The said Robert Campbell shall pay annually to his wife, the said Eliza Maria "Campbell, the sum of \$ for the support and education of the said children while "they remain in her custody during her separation as aforesaid. The said sum of shall be payable in equal monthly instalments of \$ on the first day of each month, but subject to reduction on the order of a Judge of one of the Superior "Courts, on proof by the said Robert Campbell that either or both of the said children "is, or are dead."

It was then moved that the said clause be amended to read as follows:—

Clause E.

"5. The said Robert Campbell shall pay annually to his wife, the said Eliza "Maria Campbell, the sum of \$200 for the support and education of the said child "while he remains in her custody during her separation as aforesaid. The said sum "of \$200 shall be payable half yearly in equal instalments of \$100, on the first days of "May and November in every year during the minority of the said child."

Which was agreed to on a division.

Clause F was then read as follows:-

Clause F.

"5. It shall be lawful for the said Eliza Maria Campbell at any time or times hereafter to apply to a Judge of one of the Superior Courts of Ontario, and the said Judge is hereby authorized and empowered to grant her application for a rule or summons to the said Robert Campbell, to show cause why he should not pay to the said Eliza Maria Campbell an additional sum for her support and maintenance, and if the said Judge shall find that the said sum of sis not equal to one-third of the annual income of the said Robert Campbell, he may order and direct the said Robert Campbell to pay to his wife, Eliza Maria Campbell, in monthly instalments as afore-said, such additional sum as shall, together with the said sum of be equal to one-third of the annual income from every source of the said Robert Campbell."

It was then moved that the said clause be amended to read as follows:-

Clause F.

"5. It shall be lawful for the said Eliza Maria Campbell at any time or times hereafter to apply to a Judge of one of the Superior Courts of Ontario, and the said Judge is hereby authorized and empowered to grant her application for a rule or summons to the said Robert Campbell, to shew cause why he should not pay to the said Eliza Maria Campbell an additional sum for her support and maintenance, and if the said Judge shall find that the said sum of \$600 is not equal to the one-third of the annual income of the said Robert Campbell, he may order and direct the said Robert Campbell to pay to his wife, Eliza Maria Campbell, in half-yearly instalments as aforesaid, such additional sum as shall, together with the said sum of \$600, be equal to one-third of the annual income from every source of the said Robert Campbell."

Which was agreed to on a division.

Clause G was then read as follows:--

Clause G.

"7. If the said Robert Campbell shall neglect or refuse for the space of ten days "after the same is due, to pay or cause to be paid into the hands of the said Eliza "Maria Campbell, or her attorney, lawfully appointed, any one of the said instalments, "or any instalment so increased by the Order of a Judge as aforesaid, he shall be "deemed guilty of a contempt of Court."

Which being objected to, was agreed to on a division.

Clauses H was then read as follows:-

Clause H.

"8. The said Robert Campbell and the said Eliza Maria Campbell may agree that "upon the payment of a certain sum of money in hand, or upon the conveyance of a "certain amount of property to her for her sole and separate use, the said Robert "Campbell shall no longer be liable to pay the monthly instalments aforesaid, or any "of them, but no such agreement shall have any force or effect until it has been "approved by a Judge of one of the Superior Courts of Ontario, whose approval, "after hearing the parties, shall be endorsed on the instrument containing the agreement.

It was then moved that the said clause be amended to read as follows:--

Clause H.

"8. The said Robert Campbell and the said Eliza Maria Campbell may agree that upon the payment of a certain sum of money in hand, or upon the conveyance of a certain amount of property to her for her sole and separate use, the said Robert "Campbell shall no longer be liable to pay the half-yearly instalments aforesaid, or any of them, but no such agreement shall have any force or effect until it has been approved by a Judge of one of the Superior Courts of Ontario, whose approval, after hearing the parties, shall be endorsed on the instrument containing the agreement.

The question of concurrence being put thereon, the same was agreed to.

Clauses I and J were then read as follows:-

Clause I.

"9. Before and until the making and approval of an agreement as aforesaid, this "Act may be registered in any Registry Office in *Ontario*, and such registration shall "have the same force and effect as the registration of an Order or Decree of the "Court of Chancery under section four of the Act of the late Province of *Canada*, "entitled: 'An Act to amend the Consolidated Statute respecting the Court of "'Chancery,' passed in the seventeenth year of Her Majesty's reign."

Clause J.

"10. If, and whenever the said *Eliza Maria Campbell* and *Robert Campbell* shall become reconciled and cohabit as man and wife, this Act shall thereafter have no "further or other operation or effect than a decree for judicial separation would have "in *England* under like circumstances."

The question of concurrence being put on each, they were severally agreed to.

The Preamble, as amended, was then as follows:-

In the Preamble.

Page 2, Line 30.—Leave out from "legitimate" to "therefore 'in line 31, and insert:—

"And whereas the said Eliza Maria Campbell hath by her Petition humbly set forth that she was lawfully married to said Robert Campbell in her father's house at "Whitby on the sixth day of April. A.D., 1863, that on the 25th August, A.D. 1873, about four months before the birth of the fourth and last child, issue of the said marriage, the said Robert Campbell, without sufficient cause, treacherously deserted her, took away from her their three children, and has since lived and kept the said children apart from her; that on the 24th September, A.D. 1873, the said Robert Campbell, with force and violence and with two constables, but without warrant,

"removed her from his house, and has ever since refused to receive her or their "youngest child therein; that he has since refused to maintain her or their child or "to furnish them with necessaries according to his means and condition; that he has "repeatedly accused her of adultery, and endeavoured to prove her guilty; that she has not been guilty of adultery; that he has petitioned Parliament for the dissolu "tion of his marriage with her; that the said Robert Campbell has treated her with "cruelty, and ill-used and insulted her; that there is no prospect of reconciliation; "that she, the petitioner, desires to be divorced a menso et thoro; that there is no "Court in Ontario by whose decree such divorce can be effected; that she is without "means for her own or for her child or children's support; that the Court of "Chancery of Ontario having refused her petition for alimony, she is without means "to secure a revision of that judgment, and that she desires to have the care and cus-"tody of her youngest child and of her only daughter; and the said Eliza Maria "Campbell prayed that the said Bill might not be passed without amendments, which "would make it an Act providing for such a separation between her and the said "Robert Campbell as would be effected in England by a decree for 'judicial separa-"tion,' and compelling the said Robert Campbell to make adequate provision for her "support and the support of her children, and giving her the care and custody of at "least the two youngest of her children.

" Eliza Maria Campbell for a Divorce from bed and board."

PROTEST.

To appear on the Journals of the Senate of Thursday, the 19th April instant, to third reading of the Bill intituled: "An Act for the relief of Robert Campbell and Eliza Maria Campbell."

DISSENTIENT.

First.—Because the Bill was not presented by Notice and Petition, as required by the Rules of the House, from Eliza Maria Campbell, in whose behalf the Bill was ultimately passed.

Second.—Because the Bill as passed reverses every provision in the original Bill and grants a separation from bed and board at the instance of the wife; whereas,

that Bill sought for a divorce, a vinculo, at the instance of the husband.

Third,—Because the provision of the British North America Act conferring upon Parliament the power to deal with questions of marriage and divorce does not include the power to deal with questions of simple separation from bed and board.

Fourth.—Because questions of alimony and questions regarding the custody of children dealt with in this Bill, in this instance can be heard and disposed of in each

of the Provinces of the Dominion, by the ordinary tribunals of the country.

Fifth.—Because the question of alimony in this case has already been decided by a Court of competent jurisdiction in the Province where the parties reside, and that such a decision should not be overruled by an Act of Parliament.

Sixth.—Because the said Bill deals with matters which under the British North America Act 1867, come under the exclusive jurisdiction of the Provincial Legisla-

tures.

Seventh.—Because even admitting the competency of this Parliament to deal with the matters affected by this Bill, the proceedings have been unusual and contrary to rules and precedent in their character, in this that no Bill was referred to the Committee of the Whole, but simply the Report of a Select Committee of last Session which did not even recommend the Bill now passed to the House, but simply appended to their Report the suggestion of Counsel of certain proposed clauses; and in this, that the Bill passed was never submitted for a first or second reading, and, in fact, has had no such readings, and therefore was not in a position to be read a third time.



That after a careful enquiry your Committee are of opinion that the defective ventilation and foul air that enters the Chamber and Committee Rooms are traceable in a greater degree to the impurities created by extensive kitchens and closets in the basement of the building than to any impurity traceable to the cold air duct, although they by no means approve of the principle of ventilating a building through an underground passage.

They also find that there is not sufficient means at all times to force the foul air to escape either by fans or heated flues; and as regards some of the Committee Rooms, there is no convenient means of direct ventilation, or of controling the heat.

Your Committee, therefore, recommend that the present appliances for heating and ventilation be perfected and made workable, rather than to change the whole system of ventilation before the present one has been fairly tried, and with that view

beg to recommend:-1st. That the flue for the escape of foul air be so improved as to render it at all

times efficient. 2nd. That means of ventilation be provided in the sash or windows of such of the Committee Rooms and Offices as are not already provided with such appliances. 3rd. That such escape be provided for all effluvia from the kitchens in the base-

ment as will effectually prevent its entering into other parts of the building.

4th. That such improvement be made in the heating apparatus as will allow the heat to be controlled in each Committee Poom.

5th. That a ventilating shaft should be connected with the sewers.

Your Committee are of the opinion that with the above improvements, and a little more care and watchfulness on the part of the officers in charge, great benefit may be realised.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Your Committee have devoted much time and patient attention to the investigation of the subject submitted to them by the Order of Reference; they have examined numerous witnesses, Chief Engineers and Land Surveyors; amongst the former was the Government Engineer-in-Chief, Mr. Sandford Fleming; and your

Committee beg to report herewith the evidence of said witnesses, and

1st. With reference to the line between Keewatin and Selkirk, your Committee premise that the work being under contract, and some portions of it far advanced towards completion, and \$260,000 expended thereon, no change is recommended.

2nd. As to the difference in length between the located line from Keewatin to Caerlaverock, which latter station may be assumed as a Point common to the located

ine as well as to the more Southern route which, it is supposed, might prove more eligible as being shorter, easier of construction, and passing through a country more fertile and attractive. Your Committee report that the exact length of the located line is known; it is 619 miles; but the length of the suggested line can only be estimated by measuring air lines over the map; and that if an estimate made on that basis is adopted (without allowing for curvature), it would appear that the length of the two lines is nearly equal. One statement submitted to your Committee gives the length of the located line as 505 miles from Selkirk to Caerlaverock, at the north elbow of the Saskatchewan, and of the suggested line, as 503 miles; another statement makes the difference of length in favor of the Southern route, 11 miles.

3rd. As to the cost of construction of the respective lines, it is impossible to speak with precision, inasmuch as the projected southern line has not been located. No instrumental surveys south of the *Little Saskatchewan* cart trail have been undertaken, in consequence of the unfavourable indication presented in that locality, the line now located was therefore adopted. Much evidence, however, has been taken by your Committee, which leads them to believe it possible that a favourable route may be found passing through a desirable country, and unobstructed by many of the difficulties which induced the Engineer-in-Chief to relinquish the idea of finding an

available route south of Lake Manitoba.

4th. As to the comparative fitness of the land in the vicinity of the respective lines for settlement your Committee can only venture to speak in very general terms. That there is a large area of settled lands and lands available for settlement, of unsurpassed fertility in the Province of *Manitoba*, is well known, and the best of these would be intersected by the suggested line; but beyond and westward of the settled and surveyed districts much variety of soil exists.

On the located line some fertile land is reached beyond Selkirk, and considerable tracts are found about the north-west shores of Lake Manitoba, Dauphin Lake, and the valley of Swan River; much useful timber is also growing between Selkirk and Northcote, while further west the line traverses a region of great extent and

adapted for settlement.

5th. Your Committee observe that the Engineer in Chief retains his opinion that the located line is, on the whole, the best that can be chosen: without challenging the accuracy of that opinion, but in view of the fact that a southern route would intersect a fertile district inhabited by prosperous settlers who would contribute much to the successful working of the line, and whose interest, so far as they are compatible with those of the public, ought not to be lost sight of; in view also of the fact that the said route might possibly prove less costly than the located line;

Your Committee advise that an instrumental survey of the southern route crossing the Little Saskatchewan from 10 to 15 miles south of the "Cart Trail" thence westerly and north-westerly to the Assinniboine, at a point above the junction of the Qu'Appelle River, thence in a north-westerly direction through the Touchwood Hills to the elbow of the North Saskatchewan at Cae laverock on the located line be made during the ensuing summer; and your Committee feel they are justified in making this suggestion in conformity with the wishes of the people of Manitoba, inasmuch as the Engineer-in-Chief has stated that such a survey might be accomplished by two parties of Engineers in one season at a moderate cost.

All which is respectfully submitted.

To these Bills the Clerk of the House, by His Excellency's command, did thereupon say:-

"His Excellency the Governor General doth reserve these Bills for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon."

Then the Honorable the Speaker of the House of Commons addressed His Excellency the Governor General, as followeth:—

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,--

In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Excellency a Bill intituled: "An "Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for defraying "certain expenses of the Public Service, for the financial years ending respectively "the 30th June, 1877, and 30th of June, 1878, and for other purposes relating to the "Public Service," to which I humbly request Your Excellency's assent.

To this Bill the Clerk of this House, by His Excellency's command, did thereupon say:—

"His Excellency the Governor General thanks Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal "subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill in Her Majesty's name."

Then His Excellency the Governor General was then pleased to deliver the following Speech:—

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate: Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

In relieving you from further attendance in Parliament, I beg to convey to you my thanks for the diligence with which you have applied yourselves to the performance of your duties.

Among the numerous measures you have passed, are several of considerable

public importance.

The improved provision for the incorporation of Joint Stock Companies will, I trust, tend to the establishment of such companies under the operation of sound general rules, rather than by special and exceptional legislation.

The law as to Insurance Companies will add to the existing securities of

Canadian insurers.

The alteration of the duties on petroleum will confer a great boon to the masses

of the population.

The vast shipping interests of our great inland seas will be benefitted by the extension to the trade on those waters of rights and remedies the utility of which has been recognized by long experience.

The law providing for the extradition of fugitive criminals will enable Canada to discharge efficiently her part of the engagements of the Empire in this

important particular.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

In Her Majesty's name, I thank you for the Supplies you have so cheerfully voted. I will take care that they are expended with due regard to economy.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate: Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

The Commissioners to be named under the Treaty of Washington having been at length appointed, the Commission will shortly be organized at Halifax. I have taken steps to ensure a full and fair presentation of the case of Canada. I trust the

negociations may realize all our expectations.

I have now only to give expression to my earnest hope that on your return to your several homes you may meet with evidences of growing prosperity, and that before you are again called upon to meet together in your representative capacity the passing cloud on our Trade and Commerce will have disappeared.

Then the Honorable the Speaker of the Senate said :---

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate: Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

It is His Excellency the Governor General's will and pleasure that this Parliament be prorogued until Thursday, the Seventh day of June, next, to be here holden, and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued until Thursday, the Seventh day of June next.
