MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

VENUS will be evening star till Octr. 5th, thence morning star. JUPITER will be morning star till Apr. 11th, thence evening star till Octr. 22nd, and then again morning star. MARS will be morning star till March 12; thence evening star through the year. SATURN will be morning star till May 28th, thence evening star till Decr. 5th, and then again morning star.

VERNAL EQUINOX, March 21st, 2h. 40m.

Summer Solstice, June 21st, 11h. 46m.

Autumnal Equinox, Sept. 23rd, 1h. 37m.

Winter Solstice, Decr. 22nd, 7h. 9m.

ECLIPSES IN 1839.

There will be but two Eclipses this year; and when they take place, they are both always of the Sun; and are like all the others, both, grand and beautiful: but the visible scene is an interesting phenomena, which this year be in the British Provinces.

The first will be a great and total Eclipse on Friday, March 15th, at 9h. 47m. morning, but by reason of the Moon's South latitude, her shadow will not touch any part of North America. The course of the general Eclipse will be from Southwest to North east, from the Pacific Ocean, a little west of Chili to the Arabian Gulf and South East part of the Mediterranean Sea. The principal cities and places that will be totally shadowed in this eclipse, are Valparaiso, Mendoza, Cordova, Assumption, St. Salvador and Pernambuco in South America; and Sierra Leone, Tombucto, and Accra in Africa. At each of these places the duration of total darkness will be from one to six minutes, and several of the planets and fixed stars will probably be visible. The second will also be a great and beautiful eclipse on Saturday, Sept. 7th, at about sunset, but on account of the Moon's low latitude, and her being so late in the afternoon, no part of it will be visible in North America. Its whole course will be from the Pacific Ocean, near the island of Nippon, in the east of Asia, to Juan Fernandez, near the southwestern coast of South America, and in the sky a right line from the great and populous city of Jeddo in Japan, to within a few leagues of Valparaiso. It will be central and annular, similar to the eclipse of Sept. 1838. Its path will be nearly parallel to the western coast of America, at the distance of about 2500 miles from it. The only people of our terrestrial planet who will have an opportunity of witnessing these beautiful and sublime phenomenon will be the inhabitants of the aforesaid islands, and of the Sandwich and Society groups: except perchance some few others who in pursuit of the mighty Leviathan of the deep, "go down to the sea in ships, and do business on the great waters."

EXPLANATION OF THE CALENDAR PAGES.

First Column, contains the days of the month.

Second, the days of the week.

Third, Holidays, Anniversaries, Weather, &c.

Fourth, Rising of the Sun.

Fifth, Setting of the Sun.

Sixth, Sun's Declination taken from the Nautical Almanack, in hours and minutes, at mean noon. It denotes the apparent position of the true Sun with reference to the equator, and the true equinox, at the instant the Greenwich mean time clock, or chronometer, indicates Oh. Om. Os., or when the hour angle of the true sun is equal to the equation of time.

Seventh, Rising and Setting of the Moon.

Eighth, Moon's Southing—when the moon comes to the Meridian of the place, or twelve o'clock hour-line, she is then due south with respect to that place, and this is termed the moon's southing.

Ninth, also shows the time of High Water at Parroboro', Horton, Cornwallis, Windsor, Newport, &c.

Tenth, Moon's place in the Signs. The meaning of these characters may be learned from the "explanation of characters" on page 2.

Time of High Water at Halifax, of that tide which arrives when the moon is nearest to the meridian—the time of the tide which happens when the moon is farthest from the meridian may be easily ascertained by the addition of half the difference of the times of high water on the preceding and following days.

The top of the columns shows the Moon's phases, or the times of New and Full Moon, and of the first and last quarter, or two quadratures with the Sun.

To find the length of the day, add 12 hours to the time of the Sun's setting, and from the sum subtract the time of rising.

The Farmer's Calendar is placed at the foot of the columns of each month.

All the calculations are in *Apparent or Solar time*; that is the time shown by the Sun. If you would wish to set a clock which should show *Mean time*, observe when the sun is on the meridian by a noon mark on sun dial, when it is at six o'clock, add the equation, if fast, subtract it, from 12 o'clock, and it gives the true clock time.

A table of the *Equation of Time* will be found on the next page after the Calendar.

As for the Weather, we are still determined to have now and then a guess at it, hit or miss, and we hope that at least, they will be found as often right as wrong; at any rate, we shall endeavor not to confound winter snows with summer showers.

Improve every opportunity to increase your wood pile. It is a comfortable thing to sit down by a good fire and have plenty of it these cold nights. Winter evenings are seasons for domestic comfort, mental application, and sociality. They are delightful periods of time. The mind participates in the little comforts the body feels. These evenings should be the means of great and permanent good to the young. They should not be frittered away in listless idleness, accumulating nothing, but squandering inestimable treasure.

Visit your barn with as much punctuality as the sun comes to the meridian. Morning, noon and night your four footed dependents, the sources of your wealth as well as the objects of your bounty, should be fed and looked after, with as much solicitude as if they composed a part of your family—cattle well wintered are half summered. Sheep should be allowed the best of hay, and ewes with lamb should be well and regularly fed, but not made too fat. It is said pine boughs, given to sheep in 2 or 3 days will cure their colds and promote their general health. If they are weak, give them the first day or two a small quantity of milk warm, 3 or 4 times a day.

It is a good general rule to plough in the fall, most of the land intended for grain or head crops. His Excellency John Frost, with his invisible pulverizers, will in case of fall ploughing, perform wonders as regards subduing a hard and rough soil. But if your land is naturally light and loose, it will be injured by fall ploughing. Freezings and thawings destroy the little adhesiveness, belonging to a light loam, and its most fertilizing particles will be given to the winds and waters which wait on winter.

It is not uncommon in April, for influenza to prevail: other diseases, too, are frequent. Now if you have any disease, and think it necessary to have medical aid, go to a regular physician, who has knowledge and experience; and not to some quack who has neither. In this way you will probably get cured; in any other, you will probably lose your money, and your health, and be April-fooled.

Grass should not be cut before it has obtained its full growth, lest it shrink too much in drying, neither should it be suffered to stand till quite ripe, lest it shell out while making into hay, besides by cutting hay early, you have longer days for drying grass, and shorter nights for wetting the hay with dew. Mow the thickest or that which has lodged, or is in danger of lodging first, then the thinnest, and finish with cutting the middle sized, or that which is on a medium between the thick and thin grass. Clover hay should be stirred no more than is absolutely necessary to save it, otherwise its leaves and flowers, the most nutritious parts, will "waste their sweetness on the air." Clover and indeed any kind of hay will require less drying if salted, when deposited in the mow, and the benefit the hay receives, is more than fourtimes the value of the salt. Hoe and rake over all vacant ground, where your early crops grew, and sow succession crops for fall and winter supplies.

The time in which your grain crops should be cut, is when the straw begins to shrink and becomes white, about half an inch below the ear. By cutting early it will yield more and whiter flour; the harvesting will be expedited, so as to prevent waste in shelling, by having the last cuttings become too ripe, and the straw will be more valuable by its retaining a part of the natural juices. When a severe blight or rust has struck wheat or rye, it should be immediately cut, even if the grain be in a milky state; and it should lie on the ground, but not so close as to injure the heads, until the straw has become dry and the grain somewhat hardened.

Now is the time to benefit yourself and your posterity by draining swamps; in making drains begin at the lowest place and work upwards, in which the water will always pass from the workmen. This is the best way for destroying bushes.

The year is now on the wane. It has reached a "certain age." It has reached the summit of the hill, and is not only looking, but descending into the valley below. If September is not so bright with promise and so buoyant with hope as May, it is still the fulfiller of promises, the fruition of all hopes, the era of all completeness. The time is now coming to gather and secure your potatoes. Farmers are apt to err by gathering them too early. The roots continue to grow larger and better after the tops have attained their full growth. Still they should be harvested before the occurrence of those soaking rains which generally precede the setting in of winter. Gather your windfall and wormy apples, pears, &c. and boil them together with a little indian meal, potatoes, &c. and give them to your swine. You will thus destroy the worms which said fruit may contain, and prevent future generations of insects from devouring your substance. Keep an eye to the weeds. Gather seeds as they ripen. Earth up celery as it advances in growth, but be careful to avoid covering the hearts of the plants. This work should be done in a dry day.

And this is autumn, the beautiful, easy, sliding transition of the seasons, from the scorching heats of summer, to the chilly frosts and snows of winter. The symptoms of the departure of the one and approach of the other become every day more apparent, though the change is so gradual, and one goes out as the other glides in by such easy and gentle steps, that we scarcely seem sensible of it till admonished by the first snows. Apples should be suffered to hang on the trees to as late a period as possible in Octr. or till hard frosts have loosened the stalks, and they are in imminent danger of being blown down by high winds; such as have already fallen should be carefully gathered and inspected, and the best put up for early wintering. If the husks and bottoms of your corn, when stowed away for winter, are sprinkled with a strong solution of salt in water, and when dealt out cut fine with a strawcutter, they will make excellent fodder for your cattle.

Winter is a noisy, blustering, bustling season, though in general he keeps himself cool. Even as early as November he seems already impatient to begin his sway. If you leave a door ajar, he slams it wide open and comes puffing in, and blows the newspaper into the fire, overturns the clothes-horse, and cuts sundry other capers of the sort. He takes advantage of every still night to steal into the garden and pinch off the heads of the flowers. He mounts every black cloud, and from it sends down a flurry of sleet, hail or snow, he clutches the reins of government, and in a few days "congeals every brook." In many places it will be very good husbandry to rake up all the leaves of trees, and the mould which has been produced by their decay, which can be procured at a reasonable expense, and cart and spread them in your barn yard to absorb the liquid manure from cattle. The leaves may also be placed in heaps in stacks under sheds, &c. where they can be obtained to litter stables, &c.

EQUATION TABLE.

1839.

The Equation of Time is the difference between Apparent and Mean Time, and therefore serves for the conversion of either time into the other. The numbers here given, show for Greenwich Apparent Noon, the distance of the Mean Sun, from the Meridian, or the portion of time to be *added to*, or *subtracted from*, Greenwich Apparent Noon to obtain the corresponding Mean Time at the same Meridian, or the time which ought to be shown by the Mean Time Clock.—Where time is deduced from observations of the Sun, the *immediate* result is *apparent* time; to convert it into mean time, the equation of time is necessary, and it is to be applied to apparent time, according to the precept at the head of the column.
