-In reforence to the report to the effect that representatives of American and lizuropeah copper prolucers ind agreed to renew the compact between them, restricting , to output of copper, it is announced that the agreement is virtmally renowed of the compant entered into on July 11th, 1802. Aecording to terms of this compact the American producers undertook to limit the ixpo:ts of copper from the United Stetes to 40,000 tons a year. such travellers that here and there the work of ascent is lightened as well as raricd by occasionally reversing the proeess, droppoligg down hill âwhile until $\bar{a}$ favozable place is reached for starting on another climb.
We will do this with the foreign trade path of this country, as we have just reached an elevation higher than previously lenown to those on this road. With last month the fiseal year: 1893 ended. In, that year the total foreign trade of Canada will be shown to have reached about $\$ 263,000,000$. The increase over 1892 will be evenly divided between exports and imports; ench having increased close unin eleven millions. Let us take then a retrospective view.
In 1872 the exports were $\$ 82,639,000$, imports- $\$ 111,430,000$, a total foreign trade of $\$ 194,069,000$. 'This year the exports are $\$ 125,000,000$ and imports $\$ 138,000,000$, a total forcign trade of $\$ 203,000,000$. Taking the population of 1872 as 4 millions, and that of 1893 at 5 millions, these figures show that in $18 \pi 2$ our people sold abroad an average of 20.65 pee head, and bonght of ioreign dealers $\$ 27.86$ per jead, having in that year done a forcign trade of 848.51 per lead. That is since 1872 they hive decrensed their individual average purchases in forcigu markets by 26 cents, and increased their sales' in those marikets by $\$ 4.35$ per head.
It is surely a conclusive answer to those who declave that the exports of the country, are diminished by a protective tariff, to show that, in 1872, under a revenue tariff, the exports were $\$ 82,039,000$, while in 1893 under the present system, the explorts have been li $125,000,000$, the increase beling over f0 per cent, while our piopilation has, frot increased moic than 25 per centi; From i1872 to 1879, the exports averaged $\$ 80,915,000$, and imports $\$ 107,288,000$, a total averago foreiga
trade yearly of $\$ 188,203,000$. In 1803 the total of that foreign trade whll reacli $\$ 263,000,000$. The increase of the forelgn trade of 1803 over 1870 is $\$ 100$ 545,000, during a period when a protective policy has been in force. Yot, in tue very teeth of these facts, we are told that protection lills foreign trade.
The following thable exhibits the progress made in this business since 1872: 1872 to 1879 Total exports - $\$ 647,320,000$ yearly average $80,915,000$ Total imports $858,306,000$ yearly average $107,288,000$ 1880 to 1884 protal exports - $477, \$ 20,000$

The average yoarly excess of imports over exports since 1872 , was as follows : 1872 to 1879 - - - $\$ 20,373,000$ 1.880 to 1884 - - - . $1.6,412,000$ 1885 to 1891 - - - $22,236,000$ 1892 to 1893 - - - - $13,220,000$ That is, tuider a revenue tariff the imports excecded exports by $\$ 20,373,000$, whilio under the present policy', which is said to linve killed the export trade, the exports have increased 50: per cent., and the excess of imports lins been cut down b0 per cont.

It is also wortiny of notice that, while the total foreign trade in 1870 was ; $\$ 4,0,641,000$, less than that of 1872 having droppled from $\$ 194,060,000$ to $\$ 153,455,000$ under a revenue tarlif, that trade began in 1880, immediately after the new tariff was establishedi to spring upwarids, and has gone on cularging up to its puesent volume whicle Is about 100 millions of dollars in excess of the last year under tha old tarifi, an increase of over 65 pen cent.
It should also be borne in mind that
the above named increases have grone onf in spite of considerable depreciations in prices. Had there been such actual increase as we have pointed out, had the figures of lateriyears been the same as in earlicr ones, there would have been a large practical increase in our foreign trade, although the volume of such inercase would not lave been shown by the return of the gross valuest $A$. trader for instance may one year be doing $\$ 1000$ a week when he selly goods at a certain price. But, if a time comes when he is able to buy and to seli those goods at half their former price, and yet his sales keep up to $\$ 1000$ a week, it is clear that he must have enlarged his business by 100 per cent.

To resume our illustration, the path of foreigh traide for eight yours was downwards, while, since 1870 , when a lower point was reached than the stapting point the course has been a steady pull upwards.

The prosplect of the progress made In developing our foreign trade is one of which the country may justly feel proud.
Having achicved such an eminence it is not likely to favor any, polley which would take us in a fiscal toboggan slite back to the days of staghation and wetrogression.

MANITOBA BANK FAILORE.
It is deplorable that the high standing of the Canadian banks should be subjected to depreciation by such a failure as that of the Commerciall Bank of Mamitoba.
We do not affim that there was no opening for this institution, but there was certainly no opening for a bink in Winnlpeg, with elght branches through the Nodth West, so weak, or so badly organized as to collapse after so brief a career.
A pald up capital of ouly \$552,650 was much too slender a support for
operating mine banks, in a district so remote from finmacial centres.

Just a year ago, with note issues out of $\$ 31$ d, 000 it held only $\$ 27,803$ of specic and Dominion notes, which is under 9 per cent of the circulation, and since Jumary last these cash reserves Were redued below 8 per cent, the average of all the bunks being from 50 to (0) per eent,

While it hats been pushing out its resonrees in a higher ratio to its pala up capitall thath the average of Canadlatu bunks, its immedintely avaliable asp sets have been kept down to the dangerous minimum of 15 to $1(\%$ per cent op elreulation and deposits.
No wonder that in the Government bunk returns the Commercial Bank of Manitoba hats long stood ahmost alone as dependent on other banks for loans, of which it had $\$ 125,000$ a year ago and $\$ 160,000$ at end of last May, a sum which was "secured," a elear indictuthon of its botng in a tight place.
Whis collipse is therefore no surprise to those who have watched, and can weal intelligently the official returis.

It is a question worth coilsidering by the associated bunks, what policy should be putsued towards a bank that is manifestly drifting into trouble. It is eertainly not their Interest to watel ond of thelr neighbours slowly and surely sinking into difficulties which must pesnte in bringlug a certain mensure of diseredit on Cumadian fintuce.
Happaly there is a fair prospeet of there being no, or very smill, losses, by depositors, as it is cxpected that the assets will be sutfictent to meet liabillthes, withont any eah on shareholders.
We brust the waste and delay of haudation will be saved by the business belng taken over by some other bank.

## A HORGCAST OF U. S. TARTPI' changies.

Lhe vems of Mr Jis. Atkinson of Boston, are always worth attention, as the conclusions of it hlghly accomplishen cconomist.
He has been giving his idens as to to the changes desimble in the U. S. turiff. It is noticeable that he postpones Free Trade for 10 or 15 years, athd his dens as to what free trade menns, hike those of many in Cannda are execedingly foggt, and self-contriailctory.
We give the Globe's verslon of this emfnent writer's harlt views: "Mre. Attienson belleves that the first sten should the to free such raw materings as wool, dyestuffs, ores and coal. There
should then be an interval of at loast silx montins, to enable stocks onthand to be worked off before taxes are reduced on finisled goods. During this interval. he expects deficites' whitch he rould meet, elther by trecksury notess or by fo tomporary increase of 100 per cent. In the internal revenue taxes on beer. After that he expects a gradually increasing excesfs of revenue sufficient to pay off the outstanding interest-bear: ing bonds and mect any loss upon the disposal of the silver buliton on hand within the next ten years.
"'lie oujectire pu':, of practically free trade." he says, "is, therefore, within view in ten or fifteen years, in which interval our bonded debt will have been pald."
The deductions he recommended anlount in all to $\$ 26,812,601$. They include the complete freedom from tuxation of the following articles among others:-
Vegetables, fish, breadstuifs, animals, provisions, salt, haty, eggs, imports of $\$ 17,921,343$; piresent revenue, $\$ 5,008,845$.
Crude materials, wool, ores ferap hron, coal, flax, stone, wood and a fer petty articles; impplts, $883,080,280$; present revenue $812,783,217$.
Materials parily manufactured, ehemleals, drugs and dyes romitting opium and alkalies), lumber, paint, oils, etc.; luports,--430,579,800; paresent revenue $\$ 6,220,626 . "$
It is amusing to sce how so able a man is deluded when he is face to face with a difficulty. He proposes to mect a, deficit in revenue caused by tariff reforms by doubling the taxes on beer. Such it step would wreck any party that tried it.
He does not explain how the industries of America will be affected by free imports, nor how the purchasing power of the people can be lucreased by the wholesnle shatiting down of Americain factories. Indeed Mr atkinson deliberately shintes the real Free Trade problem dy avolding all mention of manufactured groods.

He makes "Free Trate" the objective polnt to be reached in $10^{\circ}$ or 15 years after all that longer termi of a protective policy.
This reminds us of the story of the burglar's offer. He told the Judge that if he would let hlme off he would read forthwith a wetter life, he had repented of "burgling," ard in future he would be a new man; he would never do anything foi some yenis worse than pocket pleking and other petty cimes,
and after then he would reach the"objective point" of carning his living honestly. Mr Atkinson's scheme is a parallel in economies, to the burglar's scheme in ethics.
If Free Trade is ever adopted in Cinada lt will not be reached by slow" stages on the road of protection. Irish pigs we know are driven easily to slaughter shambles if they are told they are going in another direction. Canadians are just now being treated as are those highly intelligent animals. They we told they are to be driven on the road to Free Trade, when, as a matter of fact, the drivers have no intention of going there, but mean to take them only to the slaughter market of a revenue tariff.

Mr Atkinson's revised tariff ignores manufactures. The omission is signiflcant. He has walked up to that difflculty like a dider to an insurmountable stone wall, and quietly concluded not to to thy a leap.

THE DUTHES ON PAINT.
The turiff disčussion is elfeiting statements in regard to the operation of the present duties which are exceedingly misleading.
Some of them are as fictitious as Baron Munchausen's tales. Others are based on mere infereness; others are only suppositious. Others are a cun* ning compound of falsehoods and facts, the former clement being the malnimass of the concoction, the latter a mere flavoring pate in to cover the real nature of the article.
A contemporary has been playing espicial attention to the specific duties question. It has just found out what every body knew yours ago, it has failed to discover what all are famillar with who have given the tariff something more than a superficial reading for the temporary parpose of a partisan writer.
It observes, for listance, that, the "duty on paint deserves some attention. from the Ministers." The Ministers some time ago paid special attentiow to paint dutios by Inviewing trade experts, from whom they acquired information that our contemporary might have had,-if he had desired to be well informed.

There is nothing more offenslve to business men than bogus sentiment, nothing is more absurd that an argument based on such aubbish. There is a fine specimen of this"speelfic" article in a recent editoral on paint duties.

Wo are told that the specific duty has a "lidden capacity for taxing the poor man that is excessively cruel." What a "hidden capacity" means, is a mystery, for the tarlif schedule puts down the specilic dity on the same line as the ad valoren, there is nothing "hidden."

One might conelude that the Collectors of Customs carry about a secret code of duties, which they guard Itke the Masoin's sccret grip, signs and pass words. Importers and tariff students smile at any part of the fiscal imports being "hidden." We believe however they were "hidden" from the writer of that article until a few days ago, "hidden" because he never examined a tarlff list before.
But, having found them, he is moved to compassion for the poor man, as they are, he says, "excessively cruel" on the poor. To prove how horrible is the torture of one specific duty he quotes the case of "enamel", which, the says, is taxed 57 per cent. Now, before any of our readers weep in symutathy we haston to tell them that "enamel" is a drawing room luxury, a fancy article, like Champagne, or Brussels Iace.
Poor men don't know what "enamel" is, or what it is for. Enamel is solely used to ormanent fancy furinture, such as ladies delight to place in boudoins and drawing rooms, not for use but appearance. To tax such an article, says our contemporary, is excessievlly cruel to the poor men," and the ppablic are called upon to weep'beeause of the distress caused to the noor by having to pay 57 pler cent duty on "cnampl," As we have sald, such bogus sentiment is an offensive as it is ludicrous.
But the "eruel" nature of the cinamel duties is not very apparent, even as they weigh on the rich: A can of enamel which will lastior lifetimeunless the husper has a craze for covering all her furniture with lt-can'be bought for the price of a cigar, and as cheaply as in England or the United States. The duties on one pound amount to six and, a half cents, that quantity is the average consump: tion of a lady furniture aritist. It is clear" then that, the cruelty of this tax is a very "uldden" quality indeed. The same remarks apply to other fancy paints for Which the "poor man" has no use and would not take as a gift.
"A worse case" is said to be, "that of drop black" in "Japan;" it is said, "Carriage builders, sign painters and
the like consume great quantitles of thils brand".

As no brand ls mentioned by our contemporary we aute puzzled to know to which he refers. This article is sald to bear an impost of 75 per cent. Now, if that article were subject to a duty of 1000 per cent it would not adda eent to its cost to "carriage builders, sign painters and the llke"
This affortis one of a huindred illustrations of the absolute nonsense of stating that every article named in the tariff is enhanced in cost to the consumer by the rate of duty. That class of paint, a body black, is as low in price In Canada as it is in London England, that is, aboút 18 cents a pound. The Free Trade painters of Britaln have to pay as much for this article as the terribly oppressef painters in Canada, who are "crushed" down by the tariff.
The last lissue of the "Oll, Paint and Drug Reporter," quotes as the current prices of that point cighteen and a hali to twenty cents, which is higher than Montrical prices for an article fully equal to the American "brand"..

As the Yankees were the first to "can"'this kind of black paint, they got the market, and held it. Our Canadian makers, however by the help of the Tariff, were enabled to establish thls manufactire at home, and to supply at a lower price as gooda quality as the American makers.
Those "earriage makers, sign painters and the like" who now buy the foreign article are no doubt so patriotic that they desire to contribute all they can to the revenue of their country. Uriah Heep loved to be despised so, It seemp, there are Canadians who love to be opplesed by "excessively cruel" Customs duties.
Here then are two articles, enamel, and black paint, which are paraded as awful examples of the oppression of specific duties, both of which are made. in Canada at as low andata lower cost than forelgn goods of the same chass. So that whoever pays any duties on such goods does so voluntapily, because of his more prejudice against home made articles. We shall examine other "cruel" cases next week.

AN ENGLISH JODGMENT ON MONTREAL FARBOR.
"Transport," which is the special organ of shipining, docks and harbor interests thus speaks of Montreal:
Montreal must certainly bo regarded as one of the most prospperous of ports

It the amount of tonnage firequenting It is to be accepted as an evidence of prosperity. The St. Laverence season promises to be exceptlonally brisk, and an exceedlugly large fleet of steamers has alyeady engaged in the trade. Last year's record was a good one, showing a marked advance on previous years. In 1892 there arrived in: Montreal, according to the offical statement made by Mr. Bulmer, the chailman of the Haplbour Commissioners, 735 seagoling vessels, with a total tomage of $1,036,707$, against 725 vessels, with a tonnage of 938,657 tons in 1891. The increase was entirely int stenm vessels.

As there are large quantities of grain near at hand for shipment, tonnage is now in demand to move it quickly. This chass of cargo goes to the vebsel which gives promp't despatch and lands the cargo speedily of the market. Thus it happpens that a largo lateness of the seuson has delayed shipments considerably. It is not safo for the owners of vessels outside the regular lines, however, to build too much upon the prospects of obtaining remunerative freights, for a large-amount of tomage is alieady at hand. It is not by any means certain that the sailing vessel will be entirely dispensed with in the trade, for it is unquestion-ably-the case that regards certain kinds of cargo procurable at the St. Lawrence River ports the suiling vessel is better adapted for dealing with it than the steamer. There are no now features. In the trade, the steamers are many, the rates of freight comparatively low, and the demand for tonnage may be far from brisk as the season advinces the large carries are likely to make money for thelr owners, but those of smaller tonnage, may, owing to keen competition, meet with disappointment.

Much has been done to overcome the natural disadvantages of the port of Montrical, and the Harbour Commissloners deserve great credit for their success in this direction, There are, however, still further improvements required below Cape a la Roche to enable vessels of deep draught to pass down at all states of tide. It is understood that the Public Works' Department is steadily working to attain that end, as well as to widen the curves in the uppler section of the channel. The financial statement of the Harbour Com: missioners, show that the revenue of the Board from all sources umounted last year to $\$ 291,430$, while the ox-
penditure, including interest account apart from the capptal aceount was $\$ 281,025$. The bonded indebtedness fo He hyor remains at $\$ 2,368,000$.
There has been no additional whari frontage frovided during the last yeur, but the filling in of the breast whar? at Hochelaga has been brought up to the propeder level and made available for use. The filling in required to bring uir to grade the distance from the present extension of the breast, wharf at Hochelaga to the Malsomeure whari hag been carried ouli sufficiently well, to enable two railwny tracks to be laid down. The - Grind Rrunk and the Gmadfan Paclfic Railway Companies have both appled for pormission to anve the harbour tracks extended to that point, and this the Board hats authorised to be done.
Whe work of constructing the guard pler was resumed on the opening of navigation last year, and continued until the close. A tirestle whari of 40 feet in width by 260 feet int length was built at the unper end of navigatbe low water, to serve as a landing and transhiphoing plate for the material to bo ased in making thie portion of the pler between that and the Vietoria Bridge, 5,600 feet in length.
From the whare upward, towards the bridge, a part of the pher itself, wats buthe, anving a length of 400 feet with at beatho of 140 fect at low water line, and a heigint of six feet above low water Jevel. Conmencing at it distance of 1.50 ft. below the trestle wharf and extending 700 feet downward or neanly to the intended lower end of the pier, thother portion was built: Most of this lower portion is submerged in deep whier, but phatis of th project above low water level to it height of 20 feet. These embankments, or portlons of the pier, the made wholly of dredgings. The demanink works aro to be pushed forward as rapridy as possible aluring the summer montlis.

## DEATLI OTS MR IOOVELAL.

The aleath of Mr Lovell, removes a citizen whose record is one of honor to himself as it has been one of honon und service to his country. Fits nome is a synongn for enterpulse in the business of his life, the printhge and publishing tande, of which he for many - years stood, facile princeps. He was the first printer and pathlisher of this Jourmal, when established by Its present propitelor. Intended for firm life his
strong literary instincts led himi when only thirteen to leave the plough for the printer's "stick," and "desk," where he acquired that practical knowledge which led him tof the front rank of his calling. In the tronblous days of 37 he gave top trade to engage in active military service of his country, in Which his charneteristic energy enabled him to distingulsh himself as a soldier. He hatd already acquired experifence as a publishier of several newsphapers, and on resuming business he started a literary magizen, which we believe was. the germ of the movement for providing Canalian schools with native primers, an enterprise into which he entered with such determination and skill that Lovell's school books soon replaced a series which had hither to been' imported. He was apppointed Government Printer, ph position he held for some jears. In 1850 the published his first Cunadian Directory, a class of most useful works with which his mame has ever since been and for years to come will be identified. Iris Dominion Directory lor 1870 is said to be the largest single volume ever published in Canada. Although not an active politician his convictions were strong, and were always expressed with much elearness and decisiveness. He was espectially in favor of the protection of native industries, of the suceess of which, and of the eapacity of which to suppyly homemade goods as cheaply as forcig'n ones under. favorable conditions, his own publications were allaz are a conispleuous moof. His mostentatious charities were large, as were also his contributions to religious enterprises all over the country. He had met reverses, but these seemed only to cinlarge hils sympathies with the needy, and with objects designed to advance the material, the literity or the moral interests of the city, and of the peonte aty large.

In 184.9 he married Miss Saralh danghter of the late N. P. M. Kurezyn i promlnent Montreal morelitnt. They have had twelve children, of whom four danghters and six sous still live. Tho cldest daughter: marricd the late Frank L. Wesson, of Springfield, Mass. The second dunghter is married to Dr. Malcolm Buker, of this city. In $1880^{\circ} \mathrm{Mr}$. Lovell associated with himself in busIness his eldest son, Robart K. Lovell, who will contimue the publishing and puinting business of the firm in Montreal, the fourth son, Joscphl B. Lovell,
having charge of the electrotype branchi.

The four other sons are actively engaged in the same business in the city of New York.

## THE LATE MR. HOLLIS SHORNY.

Montreal has recently been bereaved of citizens whom she can ill spare. The late Mr. Hollis Shorey was one of those whose enterprise, ability, and public sphrit lelped to give thls city the prominence it enjoys. Ho wast a son of Mr. Samuel E. Shorey, of Barnston, Stanstead County, where ho was born on Dec. 2, 1823 and where for many years he lived and did business. He was a public officer during ture trying, thmes, when coining money was carried on in Stanstead district by lawless men. Some of the incidents of his life while serving as an officer of of the law, in suppressing the counterfeiters, bordered on the heroic, and were told by himself on occasions to: confidential friends with a quaintiness all his own and he prided himself that he gilnays aid his dutyi as a citizem in idefending latw and order whien oc-i caskon arose. He hwas a member of the Board of Trade Council of which for many years he did good service. He was president of the City Improvement Association, represented St. Antoine Ward in the City Conneil untill heresigned to make way for Ald. Rolland. Works of public bencvolence were sure of his support, in circles associated with the faith lie professed and of the Cliureh, of whifel he was an honored member, he was very highly esteemed, as de was also by all classes of our citizens. The family will find consolation in the pride of his' memoryf whom they mourn.

INSURANGE JOURNALISMI:
It is certainly true as regards the insur. ance business in its various branches or departments, that the daily papers provide far noro that is misleading than statewonts of fact. It therefore becomes ob. vious that newspupers or journnls devoted to special lines of business or trade; which discuss tho subjects directly pertaining ho given lines of businoss were a mecessity to combercial and industrial enterprises, as the daily pross did not cover the ground. Hence many class publications, amoing them iusurance journals, were started " to fill a long felt want."
It is claimed, with some truth, that the circulation of any single insurance paper. is more or less limited. This is true of
all class papors, and itt is natural that it should be so. $A$ class paper treats of the technicalities, peculiarities, personalities and general nows relating to the industry it reprosents. It is desigued aspecially. for the workers in that cluss, its aim being to give information valunble and useful to them, and does not cater to the general public. All that can be reasonably expected of a elass jourual in the matter of circulation is that it shall cover the field of its own choosing in a thorough manner, so that its advertising patrous shall be brought into direct commaniention fwith those in their particular. lime of business. Usually the mission of the class journal is to disseminate the adreptisements of the manufacturers and Wholesale dealers, and news relating to their business, among the retail dealers in aimilar lincs throughont the country. To bring the producer into communicary tion with the consumer. Insurance journals aro essentially a medium ihrough which eompanies and general agents can communicate with locul arents, solicitors and others, who are to thom as the retail dealers in general morchundise aro to the producers. Some claim that the insuranee journals are not independent. It is the writer's belief that no class papers cail better afiord to be independeat than the insurance journals of the United States; in fuct, can less afford to be any company's organ. That they, anc independent has been repentediy shown by the fearless manner in which they huve. eriticised at different times some of the most influential companies, who wero liberal advertisers, and whose cards could be found in the shume issues that contained the critielisms. While it is unquestionably 'rum that the inituence of tho comat-iug-room is felt in the editorial depurtments ol all papers, daily journuils as well us class papers, it can be said with coniidence that adverse criticism in insurance journals ; jis seldom the result of a lack of advertising patrouage on the part of the company erisicised. Tho counting-room iminence manifests itself in the editorial columus rather in the way of special friendiness for the liberal advertiser und a warked roticence ns to non-advertisers. This is human nature. Wo aro all inclined to do a frlendly turn to those whol manifest an appreciation of our work, while as to those who do not we ignore them. 'hsuranee jourmals do not fall ypou and abuse' a compuny simply beeause it does noti advertise with them; neither do they manifest friendship for it orf special zeal to promoto its welfare.The more appreciative compayies, however, find ithat reciprocity is a governing rule in businctss as well as in shatesmanship,
the insurance journals often giving them pleasun't notices "without money and without pprice" that are worth more to them than the cost of a yenr's advertisy ing.
Many of us can recall tho question roised. some jears ago by the then insurance commissioner of Massachusatts regarding one of the eastern life insurance compnnies, and how the daily papees wero filled with loug accounts of the sume, well calculatpd to unsettle the policy-holders. The insurance journals, on the contrary, being familiar with the condition of the compaiy and the character of its management umanimously sided in this case ngainst the insurance commiesioner und sustained the
 anmou; action, the public press immediately fell into line, and so prevented an inn jury that would have come not only to the company in question, but to the business of life insurauce generally. To-day this company is coneded to be one of the strongest and best mamged of the smaller life insurance companies, fud the president stated to the wriker not long ago that the aid then; rendered by the insurance press was largely iustrumental in preventing his company from being driven to the wall. ;
It is a well known fact among insur: ance officials that whenever any question arikes in relation to the solvency or manarement of a company tho daily press is guided finally by the position that tho iusuranco press talees, and, therefore, directly or indirectly, the insurance journals mold publie seatiment. For this reason, if no other, the public owes a debt of gratitude to those independent journuls whose vigilance in matters of insurance never sleeps. Many other ways may bo cited ln which the insurance journals havo proved chemselves valuable and worthy coworkers in the insurance ranks, but their services are gencrally so well recognized that it is unnecessary. It is the writur's will, however, to record his personal apwreciation of them, and to state that in his judgment they are invaluable aids to Whe companies, to the general and local agents, and that their influence is always. in the best interests of legitimate insurance. We quote the above from an ard tiele in "Rough Notes," by Mr. John M. Crane.

## TIIE FINANCIAL SITUATION LN TLIE SIATES.

The financial situntion in the States lias some very eontradictory and anomalous fontures. So prolongod a strain has seldom lieen known, and certainly nover under similar conditions. The country is full of exportable produce, commercial affairs generally are admitted to be on a sound
bisis ; the enses of insolvency are not high; there is no exceptional distrust as to the quality of the collateral offered for loans, or of the paper offered for discount; , yot with these favorable conditions there is a sense of peril impending, n lack of confidence, which is highly disturbing. The Savings Banks of Dotroit have issued a joint circular appealing to depositors to abstain from withdrnwals, and informing them that the 60 dnys' notice will in all cases be required. The circular of Clews $\&$ Co. puts the whole responsibility for: this distrust upon the Government for delaying netion in regard to the Silver Bill. Purchases are still going on, despite the admitted mischiof of euch senseless accumulations of this metal. The circulas: says: What the situntion seems to ned is some bold intrusion on the distrust that will arrest universal attention and compel a quick rovival of confidence by the sheer strength of its assurances. The banks are now doing their part nobly to cyoke such confidence, butt thero is a limit to what they can do. There is but one man and one acit that can thus shake the money marlect out of the vague distrust into which it has fatlen. The man is President Cleveland ; the net is his immedinte call of a special session of Congress to repeal the law to which all this trouble is largely due. The one thing the coun'try needs to be assured of is thint we are' to be saved from a eilver enrrency. The existing disicess is mostly due to apprehension's of that danger ; and but little short of the declaration of Congress that not another dollar of silver shall polluta our currency can repair this wrecked con-i fidence.

I But this imperatively needed assurance iil order to be of any efficacy, must ba given without delay. This is felt to ba a matter too vital for mere hopes to satisfy. The public will eherish no confident trust in mere hopes of such action: The repenl of the Sherman Aat is a deed in which they will not believe uintil it is accomplished. The period for which they can afford to wait for that deed is limited very strietly by the highly strained condition of credit from which they are suffering.
They know that unless early mensures are fortheoming, they may continuo to sulfer seriously the conditions which they are now enduring. To tialk of a leisurely assembling of Congress some time in September, when members bave concluded their summer recreations and autumual breezes will yield the temperature conget nial to statesmanly deliberation, is liked telling a drowning man to wait untih you have finished your cigar. The situation is one that ndmits of no waiting: It demands the immediate attention which no other man or power than the President of the United States can give. If that aittention is not forthwith bestowed, there will be other and highly serious matters to be aecounted for bosides that over which the Administration secims to be deliberating so leisurely. Whatever blame may be due for the prescat condition of our silver laws, the blamo against whot ever assumed the responsibility of wrecking credit, through' neglecting the necessary moment for remedying ite suspen-
aion, wonld be far more relentless. It is but $n$ faip statement of fact to sny that the delay of the Administration in this matter is producing everywhere the most disfíenrtening disnppointment and must cause athl more serious consequences if the Govermment fails to net promptly.
Apart from the accessities of the comsercial community, the suspension of freo coinage ly the Govermment in India calls for immediate action by Congress. It has precipitated at further large decline in the price of silver. Ualess therefore the whole conatry has been mistaken in tho importance it athehes to this situation, Congress should le immediately summoned to consider this complicated question in all its bearings and to place the conntry beyond reach of further suffering from it. It would be an error to suppose that aify unsomal or otherwise dararerous elements exisit outside of this single question of'the daugers comected with silver. The ahomaly to he deall with is a generally gound condition of trade und industry conemrently with a dangerous parilysis of crebit arising from distrust as to tho fut wre of the moacy of payments.

The fruit markel of this continent is evidently of opinion that Camda is the country to which it belongs. The /St. Lawrence ronde is giving this cily such an advandage as a wholesale fritit dopot, that smphias for Americal the being rent to and distriluted at this port. As wo write an anciion sule of two carlonds of metons is heing conducied by Mr. Polter, who recently sold 69 curloads of fruit which the C. P. Ik shippel to American cities, hesides large quatities to places in Caniada. Alhough Boston and New. Fork are large fruit centres they bought heavily at the sales of the Charrington, Fremom, Dracom, and Escalom. Montreal was ably represunted by such fine biders as Mr. Frank J. Hait, Ald. McBride, Mr. J. J. Vipond, Mr. T. S. Vipond; Messrs. Bary \& Son, Montreal Fruit Exchange, Messys. Bowes \& MeWilliams, MeBride, Itarris \& Co., Mr. Walter Paul Mr. Sytwester and others. It is expeetel, thate next spring will see six or eight big ships in port wifh fruit. The next neve business will be the California sales, a fonture of which will the the sale of carloads of raisins of the Valencin and Londou varieties. This will be the inflial sale of driod fruits, and will be looked forward to with interest by tho trade. California, claims great thing's in the raisin line. Where is urgent need of better accommodation, at better sules room, for condueting this growing and alrendy most important, business. Tho sents ued to be no phaced as to put buyers into ensy touch with the auctioneer, so that quict bide by sigus can be recognized, and bidders need not shout to bo heard. Mr. W. W. Ogilvie is reported to he oxerting himsolf to secure this. When a room of good acdoustic properties is properly fitted up, oo that no bid will bo missed, the sales will bo more successful than ever, and will run smoolhly and quickly. At present the salcsman is at $n$ great disadvantage. and buyeps also are incouvenienced.

REWARDS FOR CONVIOTING CRMINALS GULLTY ON ARSON.
The National Board of U. S. Fire Underwiters at each annual meeting makes an interesting report bearing upon the reward aystem o feccuring conviction of a class of criminals that are a terror to property owners and to fire underwriters. The following details from the Spectator will be found of interest:
Rewards paid: 1878 to May 1802, 168 ; May 1892 to May 1898, 7.
Total convictions: 1878 to May 1892, 829 ; May 1802 to May 1893, 8.
Since 1878 there have been $\$ 40,400$ paid for rewards; 15 lifo sentences have heen imposed, and two death sentences.
Since the establishment of the fund rewards have been offered aggregating $\$ 1,-$ 055,075 , of which but $\$ \$ 49,400$, or 4.62 per cent. have been paid.
The standing committec on incendiarism: and arson submitted a report of its work for the year, which twas briefly as follows:
Ls will be ecen by the tables there have been more rewards offered during the year than'in why other gene since the fund was subseribed hin 1883 . There were 212 offers representing in the aggregate, $\$ 74$,T00, i. e., 43 more in mumber, and $\$ 17,075$ more in amount than during the twelve months immediately preading. In all Gere have becin offered 2,970 rewards amounting to $\$ 1,050,070$.
Seven rewards have been paid during The year, amonating to $\$ 1,900$, and seeuring eight convietions. Since the fund, was ustablished 156 rewards have been paid, resulting in 237 convictions at a total expenditure of $857,581.94$.

Australia is very wealthy, but has been imitating the Amerienn style of fimuce, hence has got into similar struits to those which are pinching our neighbours, and bringing thein bauks down by the dozen-amongst them, one at Buffalo... Our "Milling World". friend has been rending the pessimist patpers too much, and its vicious attacks on Canada show the effect of "duo ruin"?
journalism, it brings on us the scorn 1 of fopeigners. There is not a country on the face of the carth in a healthier financial and nocial condition than Canada.

THE CATILE EMBARGO.
Mr. Herbert Gardner, President of the British Board of Agriculture, states that a microscopic exnmination of the lungs of animals, landed from the steamer "Lake Wimipers," from Montreal, has proved that the animals had been affected with' contagious pleuro-pneumonia.
The prohibition against the importation of Cauadian cattle must, thercfore, be maintained.
Swain and Sons, of Edinburgh, say that 1220 Canadian animals which arrived at Shiclds have suffered to the extent of two pounds per head, owing to compulsory: slaughter. A cable to the Star says: "In Canadian and Scotch circles there is, a disposition even now to question tha ateuracy of the Government expert's test. They base their dissent on the fact that the lungs of the suspected Canadian catthe do not at all resemble those taken from Luglish eattle which had the disesue, and they quote the opinions of Hunting and other " mofficial" experts; who, after having examined the eattle's langs, doelared the disease was non-contabious.". 'lhe unprecedenied death ol Iodder in Engtand, owing to drought and heat, is causing a large number of cattle to bo slaughtered. This no doupt hats more to do 'with the embargo ou our eattle being kepi up than lung disetse. This will bring pits own cure ere long as the shutiting out of catitle imports will so far lower the home stocks that the demand will have to be met by supplise from this bidu.

A contemporary status that the post offies department is sending out cinculars to postmasters in certain districts in Quebee for the parpose of acquiring information as to the circulations of some newspapers in that section. There is every year an "enumeration week " when postmasters are required to keep count, for slatistical purposes, of the number of letters and newspetpers posted during that week at each ofice but this is the first time, so far as is known, that an effort has been made to find out the circulation of purticular papers. It is alleged that some action is afoot to curtail mewspaper privileges, which seem to be riewed with a jealous cye by P. O. officiels. We wonld ndvise the Govermment to leave newspapirs alone, whatever privileges they have are got so much to their advantrge as for the convenicnee, and the welfare, and the pleasue of the public at largo. The old iotion that newspapers ought to be saddled, and bridled, and made.

Fletcher," adorn the magazine by their two stories. $A$ pieture of Shadow Lake, Muskolia is the froutispicee. Mr. Mowat, who edits the "Canadinu," is well qualified ior the post, and will avoid the policy which brought its forerumacr to srief. The C. ## wages of women in gernany.

The Alail quotes recently issued statisties showing the wages earned by womens in Germany, whore nearly ono-half the women are forced to manum labor of some kind. In the paper factories of Breslani the arerage enimings of a woman are only 90 eents a week. In cane factories: the average in $\$ 1.71$; in picture frame factories, $\$ 1.51$; in cigar factories, $\$ 1.03$; in eloak factories, S 1.62 ; in artificial flower fatorics, $\$ 1.88$; and ins furriers, " 1.30 . These are the average wagos, buth from the lowest to the highest the distance is very great: In the Berlin factories the whges are higher, but this advancement is overbalaneed by the greatier cost of living. The working day consists of from 12 to 10 hours. In Posen, piece workers ou lineu goods, by working from day: break until 0 or 10 o'clock atinight, cant carn from 12 to 15 marks weekly; thati is to eny, by working hard for 15 hours a day a girl can enrn $\$ 2.85$,in a week. In Erfurt, a sowing womin, with the aid of a machine, can carn froim ' $\$ 1,40$,t'a $\$ 2.14$ a week, while those sowinigt by
hand caunot earn more than $\$ 1.19$ a week. We get in these figures a clue to the cheapness of certain classes of goods sold in this city. The question as to whether a country like this, which justly prides ittelf on maintaining a high standard of comior't amonget the people, should permit unrestricted competition with the pauperised labor of other countries is $a_{1}$ very grave one.

## a Visit to dorchester.

A trapelling correspondent in the lower provinces has come to the conclusion that too little is said about the excellence of our public institutions and sends us $\Omega$ few. notes alout the maritime penitentiary at Dorchester. The building is situated on an elevation 100 fect above the water level of the Bay of Fundy, commanding one of the finest yiews in the province. It is erected in the form of a cross of native free sandstone, gothic style, with high tower. There is accommodation for 850 , but less than half that number are confined at present. The prison reservation comprises 700 acres luit ouly about 200 are in actual cultivation. The convicts take their moals togehor in a large roCundar in the centre oi the building. Sani(ary alifirs are well looked after and the building is a model of cleanliness from bascment to roof reflecting "the highes't eredit upon Warden John B. Forster. The ehapel, used ly all denominations, is pretn tily decorated with stained glass windows and paintinge, the latter done by skilled pupils. The inmadties are tauglit. the usual trades and a matter that debrives attention is the manufacture of pails and butter tubs. These are mude in inrge quantities and sold to the E.B. Eddy Company, Hull, Que., who handles nearly all the articles made by the convicts. There is a good library comprising about $\mathbf{0 , 0 0 0}$ volumes.

## mislleading Returns of fallurge.

A return of failures for six months, published by a well known firm, gives totals of the total amounts of linbilities and assets of insolvents, which has misled on number of our contemporaries, and their readers. Those totals have been usod to throw disciedit on statements by our baukers us to tho satisfactory condition of 'the country. Leit us look at them. The total liabilities of insolvents in 1892 ard given as $\$ 7,225,238$, and for 1893 , as $\$ 8$,215,759, an increase of $\$ 990,521$. Truly an alarming increase in 6 months 1 But, in the total for 1892, Newfoundland is down for only $\$ 4,000$, whilo in 1893 the, Island is down for $\$ 900,580$. So that of the above increase of $\$ 990,521$, no less. than 8896,530 belongs to Newfoundland. This leaves the total incrense due to Canada ouly $\$ 08,991$, which is less than 10. pery cent. of that increase upon which certain cronkers have boon commencing with so , much ghoulish delightt". Taking the ass sets fotals, and throwing out those of Newfoundland, we find those of 1808 larger by $\$ 51,074$ than those of 1892 , 80 that the net rasult of this examination is that the total net increase in the deficit of insolvents in 1803 is $\$ 42,237$. On such a bagntelle the cry has been raised that
" our failures have increased about a million dollars in six months."

A waruing voice has been rased by The Fishery Gazette ns to the danger of dostroying the salmon packing industry in the West by the same reckless methods which have made the buffulo almost an extinct animal. This grand fish is doomed if more consorvaitive methods do not obtain. The recently issued report of the Canadinn Fisherics reveals the extent of the relentless was that is waged agaiust this fish. The Indians of the Northwest provinces, who consume and waste enormously of this fish, are the principal offendors. The Canadian Govermment does not
appear to be able to place any restraint upon them other than the occasioual visit of a Fisheries inspector to report upon the anischief which is being done. Tha Indians catch the baby salmon on their way from the inland waters to the sen. Those they do not consume they allow to rot upou the growid. This refers particularly to the blue black salmon, the most valuable lind foume in tho Fraser river. However, there is comfort in the fact that on the Atlantic coastl salmon receive greater protection. In the Nova Scotia district these fishes havo been more numerous than for many yenrs past. The same is true of New Brunswick, while the north shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence was particularly:

a FREE TRADE ORGAN FALLLS FROM grace.
Although the tone of Free Trade ndvoeates is too often marked by an arrogance of superior virtue that would be offensive in an archangel, they drop occasionally low enough to prove that, after all, they are poor weak mortals like other follis.
The chief organ of this party, or rather policy-for a Free Trade party does not exist in Canadr-has been berating thoso who favor protection to any extent, in terms such as are used by judges, who add to the dieh of thoir verdicts, a dash of mustard and vinegar in the way of a reprimand Those, we are told, who are not Free Traders, are unpriucipled, they enro for nothing but office and boodle, they are in two woids, a " bad lot," generally.
Considering that, for about fourteen years a large majority of cur people havo steadily upheld a protectivo policy, and have kept in power successive Administrations pledged to its maintenance, the people of this country inust be, morally, fin a "parlous pitate," and intellectunlly bo "mostly fools," to lave so long stood firmly by those who are unpriacipled, and sup. ported a policy which is said to be wholly destitute of rationality.
If, as the Free Trade organ declares, the elcetors of Canada, aro mainly idiots and

rogues, surely those who are appenling for the support of such a constituency, in order to mecure olfiee, ario not very particulia as to the sources from which they hopo to gel the necessary support for success. Persons so tremendonsly elevated abovo their fellow ereatures in purity should be carciul of contact with the defiled, lest their henven-like rohe of innotence be soilled.
Upon what ground is this elatrge of lack of principle made against those who faror some degree of protection? It is simply this: they dectare that fiseal questions nre not governed by immutable laws like those of elementary momitity, or of seience, but are based apon expediency. Protection recognizes the right of a free people to fix the terms upon which forcigners shanll trado in their murkets. That right is based upon a principle, one of the most sacred principles recognisuble by man, the dight of a people to self government under its own laws.
Joes the organ deny that right to Canadians? Does it demand that the fiseal laws of this country shall be dietaited by Sir Richard Cartwright and his organs, as those of Russin are by the Czar and his alvisers?
Wo stand by the people, what they rogard us expedient for their combtry, wo must regard us a "principle" for the practical conduct of our afinirs.
But, in the last analysis, Free Trade and Protection rest on the alame bedrock of expediency. Would Free Trade ever be advocated if it were regarded as inexpedicul? All the argumentes for this policy -line very forcible argaments we adnitdepive their whole strugth from the plea of * expediency. Tride expediency out of Tree Trade advocacy and itt would vanish like a soap bubble.
But the Iree I'rade advoentes hero, have not the thost of au idell of any intention to adopt such a policy if they get into power. Nol they admit the imperative claims of expediency, by proposing to adopt'n "tariff for revenue" only. Their wings of wax are good for show, but when praction work hats to be done, they come down to earth like those whose debaseuent they havo crowed over in the upper air of theorising.

grain froight. It contends that, inas. much as that railway was partially built out of public funds, it ought to carry grain for lenevolence, and not for "revenue only," like their proposed tariff.
That contention, boiled down into plain Euglish, simply means that, the resourecs of the whole country ought to be utilized for the protection of grain growers in $a_{1}$ particular section. It implies that, in the opinion of a Free Trader, every shipper of fyeiglit outside that section, and every traveller on the line, ought to pay something to the railway to recompense it for lowering freight rates from that section.
That,we admit,would be "expedient" for: those in that favored, that protected district, but from' a business point of view it would be as unprincipled as "robbing Peter to pay Paul."
We do not recognise much archangelic morality about-such a policy. But wo do see in the top-loftical moral claims of those who advocnte it, moro hypocrisy arid.
more fiscal confusion beltween right and wrong, than bonsters about "principle" would show, if they had enough expen diency to be angumentatively honest, and enough honesty to go to the country as the Free Trade party, which is not on their programme.
Those who declare themselves free traders by conviction, on principle, yet propose a' revenuo tariff, should not boast of their principle, as it manifests that they are as rendy to eacrifice conviction to ex. pediency as Artemus Ward was to sacrifice his wife's relations for the good of tho country.
