





The condition of winter wheat in the United States is placed at \$2.7 per cent. this month. This compares with \$2.9 in 1895, and \$3.4 in 1894. During the month of April the crop, except in Ohio, Illinois and California, has improved, Kansas materially. The great changes will be in the three states of Kansas, California and Ohio. Last year the Ohio condition was \$5 on May 1, and the state board made it yesterday 53. In California last year the condition was 97, but reports indicate a considerable lowering from the April 1 condition, which was 91. Kansas last year, was only 48, and yesterday its agricultural bureau made the condition 97.
