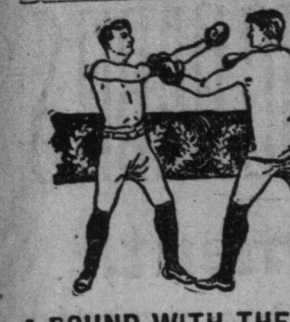

LAVIGNE BEAT WALCOTT.
The Saginaw Fugitist Proved Too Much
for the Colored Boy, Who Got His
First Whipping.

San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 29.-On no other
occasion has such a crowd assembled in
Mechanics Pavilion as that which poured
into the big building tonight to witness
the Lavigne-Walcott fight.
Setting on the fight has been brisk all
day. Thousands of dollars were poured
into the pool-rooms to-night, the great bulk
of which was placed on Lavigne. Two days

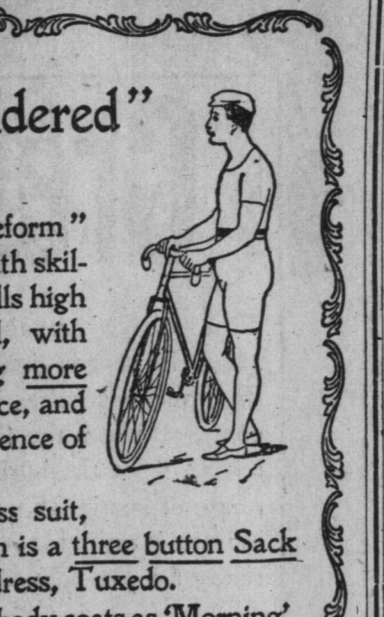

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OUR OVERCROWDED SCHOOLS

More Accommodation Must Be Given at Once.

\$100,000 IS THE AMOUNT

School Board Demands From the Board of Control Without Delay.

Basements in Churches, the Doctors Say, Are Not Healthy Places for School Children—The Controllers Equally Divided on the Question of Lighting the City by a Municipal Plant—An Election Fud Appears.

The Board of Control held a long session yesterday morning fraught with great importance to the people of this city. The controllers are equally divided on the question of obtaining electric power and light.

Another important feature of the meeting was the request of a committee of the Public School Board for a grant of \$25,000 to provide better school accommodation.

The Public School Board deputation consisted of Trustees S. Burns, Kent, James Burns, Davis, Noble, Gidens, Buck, Lee, Clarke, Inspector Hughes and a number of others.

Mr. S. Burns, the first speaker, told a startling story of the crowded condition of Toronto schools. He said that in most cases the board had to bring into service basements and woodsheds, not to mention the rooms in public buildings, and even private houses which were brought into requisition.

Mr. W. S. Lee was next in order of speaking. He asked for an issue of from \$100,000 to \$150,000 to meet the needs of a city growing so fast as Toronto.

It was decided to go into towards the Toronto Publicity, Pigeon and Pet Stock Association in December.

The Mayor intimated to Mr. J. H. Boyle that his proposition for a new city building would be considered at the next meeting.

Mr. Leslie concurred, and made a surmise suggestion that the Mayor buy in a house worth the amount of the arrears of taxes, and three years' taxes, in addition, giving the owners two or three years to redeem their lands.

Mr. E. A. Macdonald provoked a definite declaration of platform when he once more faced the board with an application for a franchise to use the streets of the city to supply electricity by competition with the existing company.

Mr. Macdonald made in response an offer to furnish 15,000 horse-power every 24 hours at the rate of one cent per kilowatt.

The Treasurer Coady was given permission to advertise for tenders for an issue of \$25,000 sterling of general debentures, at a minimum price of \$101.10, a maximum

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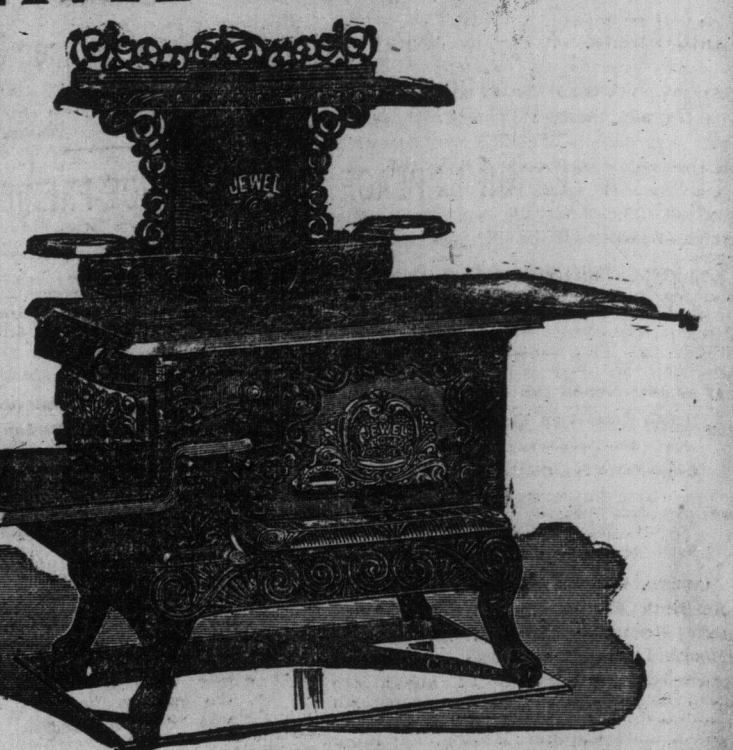

Stocks of grain at Liverpool, Oct. 29 were 16,700 bushels, against 13,800 bushels the month previous and 17,600 bushels last year.

Germany has taken 12,000,000 bushels of corn from the United States in the past eight months, or more than in any other increase over the same time last year.
