Obituary.

The death occurred on Sunday night of Rev. J. A. Dowler, a supernumerary Methodist minister, at his late residence, 14 Bernard-avenue, after an illness of several months' duration. Deceased was 55 years of age, and was a native of Ireland. For 35 years he was in active ministry, being stationed most of the time in Quebec and in Eastern Ontario. He retired in 1894. He is survived by a widow, two sons, W. J. Dowler, city clerk of Victoria, B.C., and W. A. Dowler, K.C., of Toronto, and two daughters, Mrs. (Rev.) J. S. Stevenson of Severn Bridge, and Mrs. Carrie Dowler of Ald. W. T. Stewart, died in South Lancastr. in Glengarry County, on Saturday. Mr. Stewart had reached his 90th year, and was one of the oldest settlers in Glengarry. He came to Canada from Glengarry 70 years ago. He leaves two sons and two daughters.

STRONG WILL RETIRE.

Chief Justice of the Supreme Court Makes Application.

Ottawa, March 31.—Sir Henry Strong, Chief Justice of Canada, will retire from the Supreme Court bench in September next. He has applied to the Minister of Justice to be retired. Justice Strong has been in the service of the Chief Justice since 1874 and is very likely that Justice Strong of Toronto will become vacant through the promotion of Justice Taschereau. The idea prevalent here is that Justice Strong is about the best man available for the position.

The Chief Justice of the Rev.

The Chief Justice of the Rev. Samuel S. Strong, sometime acting chaplain to the forces in Quebec and rector at Ottawa, according to reports, was a student here in Toronto under the late Henry Eccles, was called to the bar in 1874 and practised for many years with Mr. Eccles. Also with former Chief Justice Taylor of Manitoba, the late Hon. James D. Edgar and Dr. John Hoskin. He was appointed a judge in 1893 and has been a member of the Supreme Court since its formation in 1874. He was promoted to the Chief Justiceship in 1892, on the death of Sir W. J. Ritchie.

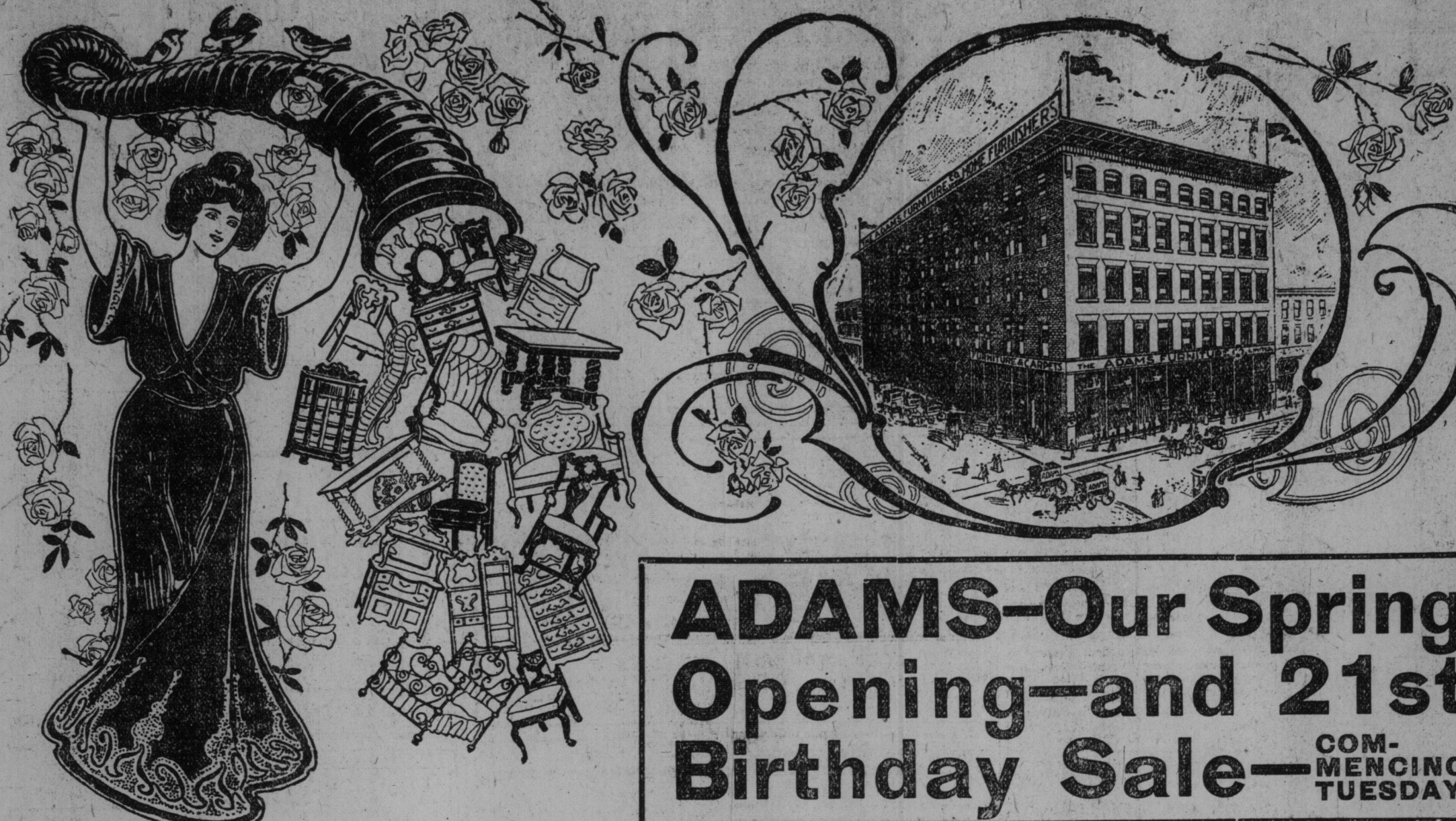
