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FLAG FALLS AT WOODBINE TO-DAY WEATHER PROMISED--FINE, WARM

Inferno, Will King and Maid of Barrie, They Should Finish in Plate.

The weather man appreciates the importance of opening day of the Ontario Jockey Club, and the historic race for the Plate. So naturally the climatic conditions for this spring's guinea, which looks almost a toss-up between the representatives of Seagram and Dymally, were correct, and the afternoon will be fine and warm.

The track at Woodbine will be fast, which according to expert evidence, is a point in favor of Inferno. Each stable will send a pair to the front, and the Seagram colt is selected to win the Dymally, but he has to be ridden out of the place and show, of the outside, Chappell Boy and Cross of Gold have received late support. Tommy Burns was sent for to ride Will King—\$1000 if he won, which sum he asked to win or lose.

There is altogether a program of seven races, the better features including the Minto selling stakes and the Royal Canadian steeplechase. First is the opening dash, with such good ones as Tongador, Claude and Capet Scurry, then a half-mile incident with twenty-two two-year-olds and the three stakes which are followed by the Carleton purse and the extra race, which is the seventh and last.

Starter Murray will take the horses in hand for the first event at 4:30, a half-hour being allowed for each race up to the King's Plate, at 4:30. The official luncheon will take place at the clubhouse at 12:45 p.m., and the governor-general is expected to be in attendance. His excellency will present the King's Plate to the owner of the winner after the race.

Opposing the bill ought to state their reasons, but Mr. Downey said it was not necessary to open up the whole discussion. They had been led to believe that there was a chance of an exclusive and perpetual franchise.

James Rutledge, ex-mayor of Whitby, and president of the Whitty Spinning Co., pleaded for railway facilities which the town did not enjoy at the moment.

Mr. Neely said after hearing the statement of the premier it should be reported, as the people were satisfied, and Mr. Rathburn said the committee would be studying the bill in favor of it on Wednesday.

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BY EXHIBITION BOARD

Private Bills Committee Throws Out Bill Designed to Legislate Stewart Houston Out of Court.

The Industrial Exhibition Association, assisted by the solicitor's department of the City of Toronto, attempted what looks very like a piece of sharp practice on Thursday before the private bills committee.

It happened that the Industrial Exhibition Association has an action pending with Stewart Houston, a defendant in the Black Watch band, in which Mr. Houston is his defence and counsel.

On Thursday morning Dr. Orr, the exhibition manager, stated to the private bills committee that there was an objection to the bill, and it was passed in committee. By accident late on Thursday afternoon the House rejected the bill and conferred at once with Mr. Carleton, M.L.A., chairman of the committee.

Mr. Houston pointed out that it is not fair to deprive him of a right in an action at law, in other words, his rights as a citizen, and was a manifest injustice and a piece of sharp practice which any public body should be ashamed to commit.

Prohibit Export of Gas. JESSOP'S PLEA TO HOUSE

Subject One for Dominion Parliament to Deal With, Says Premier.

The exportation of natural gas from the province into the United States was discussed at the evening session of the legislature. Dr. Jessop had a resolution on the paper, the object of which was to prohibit the exportation, etc.





Street Ry. Co. Goes to Court of Last Resort.

The Toronto Railway Company yesterday filed a bond to cover the costs of appealing the mileage suit to the privy council. The city obtained a judgment for \$23,212. Day, the amount was confirmed by the Court of Appeal, but the interest on the amount was reduced from six to four per cent. There is a narrow vein of silver-cobalt ore in the location, which has not been worked, and of course the property may turn out to be much richer than is supposed. Mr. Trethewey is the owner of the famous silver-cobalt mine bearing his name, near Cobalt.



New York, May 19.—A despatch from Washington says an experiment of great interest is to be made by Dr. Frederick Sohon of this city, who was in the Arctic regions twice with Peary.

This experiment consists of a radical application of the outdoor treatment for consumption in an ideal climate and atmosphere secured thru the agency of a steamer especially fitted as a sea-going sanitarium, in which three summer months will be spent in Greenland, above the Arctic circle. The steamer Havana has been fitted up and will sail from Halifax June 15, returning Sept. 20.

Site for Palace of Peace

The Hague, May 19.—The second chamber of the states general, to-day, by 16 to 5 votes, appropriated the sum of \$280,000, to purchase the ground on which to erect the palace of peace, for which Andrew Carnegie donated \$1,500,000.

Dangers of Floating Mines.

St. Petersburg, May 19.—The Russian newspapers call attention to the indifference with which the powers contemplate the danger involved in drifting far eastern waters, owing to the Japanese floating mines, constraining this with the harsh criticism earlier in the war when the Russians planted mines outside Port Arthur.

Japs on Aggressive.

Gunshu Pass, Manchuria, May 19.—The weather has cleared and the roads washed out by the recent rains are impassable quagmires, but they will soon dry.
