Attempt at Suicide Failing, Invents Tarn of Murder.

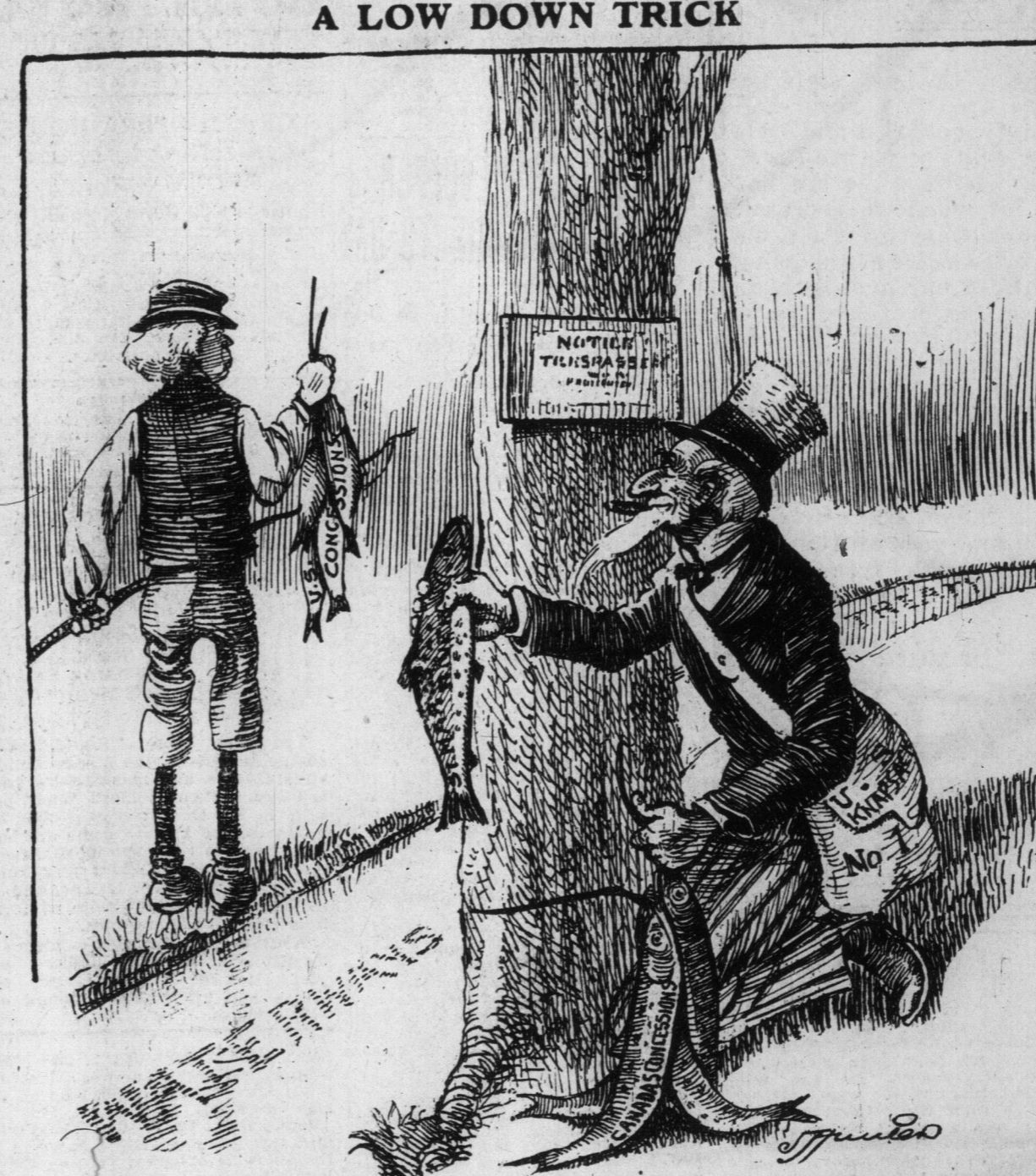

AN ANALYSIS OF THE KIRRADE EVIDENCE

Facts Which Sustain Theory That Shooting Was Act of Some Person Suffering From Mania.

When a murder is committed almost invariably the first effort of the defence is to establish an alibi. Upon this point it will be found that the whole case turns in the Hamilton tragedy to two weeks ago.

As The World suggested yesterday the tragedy must have occurred after 12:30 p.m. when Gertrude Kinrade left for school. If the person who did the deed endeavored to prove an alibi the evidence given points quite clearly to the solution of the mystery.

SEARCH FOR REVOLVER TO CONTINUE TO-DAY

Pipe Leading to Street to Be Dug Up—Witnesses Who Say They Saw Ethel on the Street.

HAMILTON, March 15.—(Special).—The police this afternoon secured an order from the civil sewers department to open up the sewer leading from the Kinrade house. When the plumber was at work in the house it was discovered that the plumbing was large enough to allow a large package to go through. It was found, however, where the pipe from the house joins the city sewer, which would block any large substance, and the pipe leading from the house was well by sight and it is satisfied that it was Ethel he saw. The police claim to be able to produce a woman who saw Ethel etched blowing away from her home at 3 o'clock on the afternoon of the tragedy.

C. Montrose Wright will be called as a witness when the inquest is reopened. Sadie Chambers, who has been mentioned in the evidence, was engaged at the Manhattan restaurant for some time under her maiden name was Moorehead, and she was visited by a woman named Mrs. Robinson. She is now said to be in Toronto.

Interest in the Kinrade case is intense here, and all day newspaper bulletins were eagerly scanned. It was learned to-day that the murdered girl and Florence were here last summer on a visit, and Kingstonians who knew the young lady speak in the highest terms of them, and say that both were lovely and loving sisters. Claude Elliott mentioned in the inquest as Miss Kinrade in Gorderich, is unknown here.

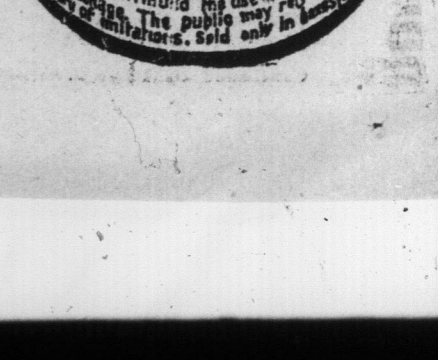
Not a day in the last three months but some falsehood had been promulgated by men paid to promulgate these things, by men who will not come out for their own signatures to say, these are the facts.

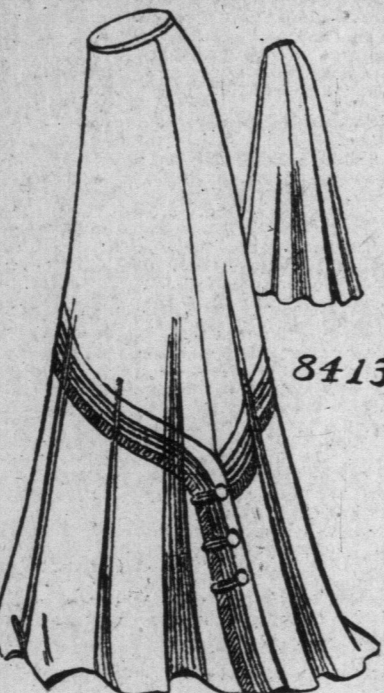

CONGRESS GETS BUSY IN A STORMY SESSION

Democrat's Resolution to Amend Rules Adopted—Party Lines Not Held.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—After one of the stormiest sessions in its history the house of representatives to-day, regardless of party alignment, adopted 211 to 172 a resolution by Mr. Fitzgerald (Democrat) of New York, whereby the rules were amended in several important particulars.

It was adopted with the aid of the Democrats, with one or two exceptions, had won a decided preliminary victory by voting down a resolution by Mr. Daize of Pennsylvania, making the unamended rules of the sixtieth congress applicable to those of the present congress.

Shortly afterward, when Mr. Fitzgerald's resolution was up, Mr. Fitzgerald was drawn into a colloquy with Mr. Clark, who desired him to yield for a question. Much bitterness was displayed by the two men.

Second.—When consideration of a bill is concluded and the previous question is ordered, no member shall have provided for a motion to commit with or without instructions.

It has been the practice to recognize a member of the majority party to make this motion and thus prevent the minority from offering such instructions as may desire.

Fourth.—It is also claimed that the amendment provides for the appointment of a committee of 15 members to revise, amend and codify the rules, and much of the opposition to it was because of this.

PASTOR LEVIED ON RAIN SUPPLY FOR BACK WAGES

Couldn't Collect Pay, So Prayed for Drought, Which Lasted Till He Prayed It Off Again.

BOKHOMA, Okla., March 15.—Like Moses of old, calling down judgments on a drought, which the Rev. Charles Ford, a holiness preacher, publicly called down a plague on Bokhoma, in the form of a drought. That was three months ago, since then scarcely a drop of rain fell here until yesterday, when the minister prayed for the drought to end.

The remarkable prayer was made after Mr. Ford had been denied a sum of money which he claimed as back pay from the Frisco Lumber Co. During the drought, he had moved his families in actual want, to other parts of the state.

The congregation at Bokhoma is small and in addition to his clerical duties the minister worked at the mill of the Frisco Lumber Co. Last September the pastor left for the mill, asserting that he had not received all the wages due him. He then announced his intention of asking the board to withhold rain from this locality indefinitely.

The following Sunday he made his prayer from the pulpit. Within a radius of 50 miles of this town rain was plentiful on every side, but the nearest town on Bokhoma got was a thunderstorm and a drenched Saturday. The water supply gradually grew smaller and the mills shut down. At the end of four months the big pump which supplied water for the Frisco Lumber Co. was dry and the plant was forced to shut down.

When the workmen's families began to suffer Mr. Ford announced that he would pray for enough rain to enable the mills to resume operations for a week, but cautioned the men to be careful of their earnings and make them go as far as possible. His advice this time was heard by men outside his congregation. As if in answer to his supplication, a heavy rain fell that night and continued through the next day and the mills started up and work resumed eight days before the supply again gave out and operations ceased.

Despite this remarkable state of affairs the mill manager insisted that he should insure a rain supply by satisfying the preacher's claims. "In his farewell sermon the Rev. Mr. Ford told his congregation he would pray for rain as soon as he had crossed the river into another county, and made them to prepare to return to work three hours after he left Bokhoma the heaviest rain in more than a year set in. For six hours it poured in torrents.

MORE IMPROVEMENT MADE IN THE COBALT SECURITIES

Larger Public Buying and a Scarcity of Stocks Cause Advances in Several Stocks.

Monday Evening, March 15.
The betterment in the mining market was apparent at the close of last week, and there was even more public buying orders than for a long time and this together with a scarcity of stock in the street easily forced advances in several of the issues which were acquired after.

The most active stocks were Cobalt Lake and Nova Scotia, both of which advanced considerably above last week's prices.

The move in Cobalt Lake was due more than anything else to active manipulation, and to support the advance in the price of the shares a report was circulated that a big find had been struck on the property. There was no confirmation of this, however, and until there is direct proof of this rumor both traders and investors will be suspicious of today's movement.

The impression which has gone abroad that Nova Scotia will decline is accounted for by much of today's buying. This stock has declined almost without a rally from the active day's rise of two or three points is only a natural recovery under new buying power.

The more standard issues were generally firmer, Nipissing and LaRose, despite the weakness of the big New York exchange, held almost the entire advance made last week and offerings were absorbed with very little influence on the prices.

Chambers-Perland will be bought and the price of this stock only affected by profit-taking from traders who picked up the shares last week below 80 cents. Temiskaming was active on the recovery from last week's dip.

On the whole the market was firm. The shipments from Cobalt for the week were highly favorable to the market, ten properties composing the output, which totalled over 27 tons. A scarcity of many stocks in the only noteworthy feature to outsiders last week, and this might easily conduce to further advances.

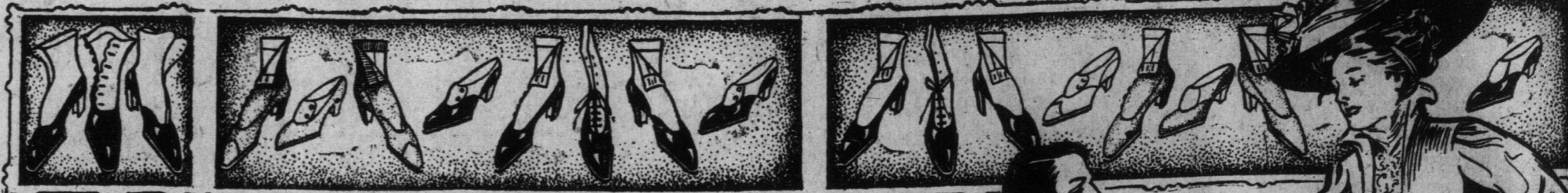
