

## VETERANS CONSIDER **CLEMENCY IN ORDER**

Would Have Government Reinstate Vocational Students Who Offended.

Consequent on the cancellation by the government of about one hundred vocational training courses of veterans who falsely obtained money from the federal emergency employment fund while receiving pay and allowance from the D. S. C. R., ciemency will in all probability be invoked by the local veterans' associations. A round-table conference of the various organizations will be called early various organizations will be called early next week, when the matter will oc thoroly discussed and immediate action decided upon.

Among the students whose courses are canceled there are several who will suffer acute distress as a result of the ac-

fer acute distress as a result of the ac-tion of the government, and hope is ex-pressed by representative leaders among pressed by representative leaders among the veterans here that the government's purpose is but to give the men concerned a lesson, and that it will be open to consider a policy of reinstatement of those who are facing hardship. For some time the government has been aware that the unemployment fund was being abused by men who were actually in employment, and by others whose families were not in need. These cases, however, the government could not track however, the government could not track, but, having the files of vocational students, they had the necessary proof to confirm their suspicions, and these men were penalized by cancelation of their

the minister of justice to prosecute the offenders, J. A. McEirov of the Toronto and York Patriotic Fund stated yesterday that they were not taking legal ac-tion. He further said that ne did not appreciate the action of the minister of justice in attempting to place the re-sponsibility for prosescution upon his ulders.
Drastic Action Necessary.

Opinion among authorities connected with the returned soldiers in Toronto varies concerning the advisability of the government's action. On one hand, sev eral veteran leaders declare frankly that those whose courses have been canceled are culpable, and that the offence of making the false statements in order to draw unemployment pay can in no way be excused. It is also the general belief that the government was forced to take some drastic action in order to stop the practice of duplication of pay from the two sources. At the same time, it hoped that the government will consider clem-

"There is no use in our hying into a tirade against the government," declared Dr. C. E. Wilson of Central Branch of the G.W.V.A. "It must be impressed on all returned men that they ought to play the game, and that by acting as these men did they are simply injuring their comrades. At the same time, the government's action has probably taught them a lesson and it is now a question. them a lesson, and it is now a question of showing a little clemency. Those courses have been canceled will

Simplicity, Not Slickness.
Col. A. T. Hunter, president of Parkdene G.W.V.A., expressed himself against the treatment afforded the veterans.

"It is not surprising if some of these it is not surprising if some of these hard-up disability cases got money that was much-bremendously much-less than they had lost by being abroad, but which was not intended for them," he which was not intended for them," he roid. "It was, however, simplicity, not a ckness. It was not clever, like splitting up the sittings of a parliament into two sessions per annum, so as to get two indemnities. It was just a case of eating their emergency rations. The authorities, of course, must maintain discipline, even among the sick and disabled. But they cannot afford to be merciless. If they ruin these poor fellows by cutting off their hope of future employment, they punish the rest of us the general community, who are bound by the most sacred ties of patriotism to take care of them."

The customs department at Ottawa is still oblivious of the fact that the American dollar in Canada is worth \$1.15, and the English pound only \$3.45. It is still reckoning the pound at \$4.86, and, for that matter, it is still reckoning the French franc, and no doubt the German mark at par.

The result is to eat up the British preference thru over-valuation. The Canadian importer brings in goods from England which cost £20. For purposes of duty they are declared by the government to be worth \$100 instead of \$70. On the other hand goods which cost in New York \$1,000, are estimated for purposes of duty at the customs department at \$1,000 instead of at \$1,150.

Thus the duty on British goods is artificially increased and the duty on American goods is artificially diminished. The United States treasury department has adopted the opposite rule; and translates into their market value in American money the invoices accompanying goods from foreign countries. Our government may have some reason for not following the lead of the United States in this respect as a permanent policy. But for the time at least it should be followed, because it is most important just now to increase our imports from Britain and diminish our imports from the United States. Otherwise the trade and exchange situation will grow more awkward, if not more perilous, every day.



## **EPIDEMICS AT LAST CLEARLY ON WANE**

#### Reports From Toronto Show Back of Trouble Broken.

There is absolutely no doubt now in the minds of public health officials, but that the three dread epidemics, influenza, the Wane. Dr. mastings was a busy man yesterday, and was not enscended in his office during the afternoon, our narry Rowiana, the department secretary, assured the world that conditions were becoming brighter every day, and that with due caution and no reaxation on the part of hearth officals, the fiu would are a natural death in the near future. "There are sure to be cases cropping up here and where," he said, "but it is rapidly being brought under control."

Forty-two deaths have obcurred in Toronto during the past 24 hours. Of these 2c are due to influenza, 7 to pneumonia, and the rest to other causes. Altho this figure is somewhat in advance of a week ago today when only six deaths occurred, it must be vemembered that previous to that the death toll had been exceptionally heavy.

Volunteers Needed.

But it is from the ked Cross emergency branch at the city hall that the most cheering reports emanate. Yesterday there were only 723 cases of influenza and pneumonia under the city's care, compared with 752 on Thursday, and f32 a week ago. In spite of this encouraging news, the need for volunteer nurses to aid stricken families is still acute, and their work will receive a decided set-back unless their ranks are reinforced. Twenty-one calls for assistance were received yest-rday, and nine of them were answered immediately. Six volunteers were registered, and sent out on cases.

There have been no deaths from smallpox reported in the last 24 hours, and only three new cases have been brought to the notice of the authorities.

### MORE WAR HONORS FOR CANADIANS

Issue Certificates Expressing Appreciation of King of Soldiers "Mentioned in Despatches."

Ottawa, Feb. 20.-(By Canadian Press).—Certificates expressing the thanks of his majesty to those officers and men of the Canadian expeditionary force who were "mentioned in despatches," have been received and are now being distributed by the militia department. The first instalment of these certificates received from the war office numbers 1,200, but the total number will be in the neighborhood of 5,400. The certhe neighborhood of 5.400. The certificates, which bear the signature of Winston Churchill, British secretary of state for war, are headed, "The War of 1914-'18." They state that the soldier specified has been mentioned in a despatch from Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig for gallant and distinguished services in the field, and that his majesty has commanded that his high appreciation of these services be recorded.

When the certificates are despatched when the certhicates are despatched to those who have been awarded them, there will be enclosed with them a covering letter of congratulation from the minister of militia. It is unnecessary to make application for them, as they will be sent out from departmental records.

#### PETITION FOR POWER TO RAISE SUGAR PRICE

Montreal, Feb. 20.-A petition to be allowed to increase the price of sugar by two cents a pound, bringing the cost to the retailer to eighteen cents a pound, was made on the board of nmerce this morning by the refining companies.

Judge Robson of the board of commerce promised that a decision would be handed down at an early date. He remarked that Canada had been very fortunate in regard to sugar during the past five weeks, and had been one of the cheapest countries in the world in this respect.

In adjourning the hearing Judge Robson said that he knew the public would raise a protest at any increase in the price of sugar, but hoped the public would keep itself informed thru the press reports of the board's meetings what causes were operating to make price increases compulsory.
