# ANNUAL MEETING.

The Fourth Annual Meeting of the Toronto District W. C. T. U.

was held in Richmond Hall, 25th September.

Executive met at 10.30 a.m.; President in the chair; 16 members Meeting opened by singing and prayer, led by Mrs. Recording Secretary read the Minutes of last Executive present. On motion, they were adopted.

It was moved and seconded, that a deputation from the District W. C. T. U. visit the Convention of the "Association for the Advancement of Women," to be held in Toronto, 14th October and following days. It was left in the hands of the President to prepare an address

of welcome and select the deputation.

A good deal of routine business and settling of accounts in connection with the Fair was got through in the hour and a-half before noon. The noontide hour of prayer was observed in silent devotion, after which Mrs. Hooker led in prayer, and the meeting adjourned till 2.30 p.m.

## AFTERNOON SESSION.

The meeting was opened at 2.30. The President in the chair. Devotional exercises were conducted by Mrs. D. L. Scott.

The President then read her Annual Address. The Recording Secretary read Minutes of morning Executive Meeting, which were

The Recording Secretary presented a summary report of the confirmed. District year, as follows:-Thirty-three meetings were held, sixteen of which were regular meetings of the Executive; average attendance, twenty-five; seven in the interest of headquarters, nine devotional, and one public meeting. Number of Unions, eleven; number of members, 381; honorary members, 126. Amount raised and expended by Unions for local work, about \$1,535. Amount raised for headquarters, written by the The Treas

Reports of Unions read by Corresponding Secretary, or delegate from each Union.

Reports from Superintendents of Departments.

There being no report from Corresponding Secretary of District Union (who early in the year had been obliged to resign, and no one appointed in her place), it was moved by Mrs. D. Cowan, seconded by Mrs. Fawcett, "That in future a report from the Corresponding Secretary be presented at the Annual District Meeting."—Carried.

Mrs. Jacob Spence reported on the work of the committee which had been appointed at the Executive Meeting, 27th March, to visit each Union in the District, and ascertain who were in favor of severing affiliated connection with the County of York. Eight Unions of the eleven which compose the District signified their wish to withdraw from this affiliation.

The question was then put to the meeting, when more than twothirds rose in favor of separation.

Mrs. Spence was instructed to convey this decision to the County of York Annual Convention, also to prepare a memorial to the coming Provincial Convention, to be held in Kingston in October, requesting that the Toronto District Union be placed on the same standing and with the same privileges as an organized county.

Mrs. Spence reported that the committee which had been ap-

pointed at the Executive Meeting, of 27th April, to revise the District Constitution, had met at her house, and the amendments were now ready to be presented.

The Constitution, as amended, was then read. After some slight alterations, it was moved by Mrs. Hooker, seconded by Mrs. Porter,

"That the Constitution, as amended, be adopted."—Carried.

By-laws were then read.

Moved by Miss Skinner, seconded by Mrs. Forster, "That the District Union return to the former arrangement of holding quarterly meetings—having three quarterly and one annual meeting—making each third monthly meeting an open one, which all members are requested to attend."—Carried.

Moved by Mrs. Cowan, seconded by Mrs. Porter, "That Mesdames Lucas and Fawcett present the prizes which were offered for the best essay on 'Scientific Temperance,' by the scholars of the Public Schools, to be presented in the Pavilion, 26th September."

Mrs. Cowan proposed that, as 25th October was the day appointed by the National W. C. T. U. to be observed as a day of prayer, we also observe the same day in like manner. Arrangements for this

were left in the hands of Mrs. Cowan.

Election of officers then took place, which resulted as follows:—
President, Mrs. D. V. Lucas; Vice-President, Mrs. Wm. Carlyle;
Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Jacob Spence; Recording Secretary,
Mrs. James Forster; Treasurer, Mrs. Hugh McMath. As the hour
was late, it was decided to leave appointment of Superintendents and
other business to a meeting of the Executive, to be called by the
President for that purpose at an early date.

Meeting closed with prayer.

4th October.—A special meeting of the Executive was held at the residence of the President; twelve members present. Mrs. A. M. Phillips led in prayer. Superintendents were nominated. Recording Secretary was to inform each of her nomination. If any one declined to accept the position, the President and Recording Secretary had power to appoint another.

Mrs. Forster moved, Mrs. Emory seconded, "That Mrs. Mc-Donell retain her position as Honorary President" (this was an over-

sight at Annual Meeting).—Carried unanimously.

Moved by Mrs. McMath, seconded by Mrs. Coxhead, "That the various Unions be asked to write such a report of their work as they wish to have printed in District Report, paying for the same at the rate of ninety-five cents per page."

It was decided to have an entertainment, on a large scale, at the

latter end of November, for the benefit of Headquarters funds.

Mrs. Spence was asked to read the amended Constitution and By-Laws, which she did.

Meeting closed with doxology and prayer.

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# PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

We cannot quite agree with the old Roman emperor who said: "Leave the future to Providence, the present to duty, and the past to oblivion." The present is, indeed, for duty; the future is with the Almighty; but the past shall not be consigned to oblivion. Here forgetfulness would be a sin. We cherish the memory of the past, and to day, as we glance backward over the months and years that have forever gone, and recall the days of affliction and days of rejoicing, the days of perplexity and days of deliverance, days of sowing and days of reaping, days of darkness and days of gladness, we exclaim with Esther, "These are days to be remembered."

From the varied experiences of the past we learn the better how to perform the duties of the present; so, while we look ever forward with glad anticipation, we look backward with gratitude profound. In our organization we have reached another anniversary day, and are met to review our work and plan for something grander and better.

During the year we have all had some bitter disappointments and humiliating failures; cherished plans have been thwarted, our grandest ideas have been but lightly esteemed, and we have found it necessary to abide by the judgment of others. Then, there have been times when we have felt disheartened and paralyzed by the apathy of those from whom we have a right to expect sympathy and aid, and the enormity of the evils against which we have to contend. But while there have been difficulties and perplexities, the work has been full of compensation, for we have been granted prosperity in all our departments. Headquarters, the glorious *dream* of the past, has, during the year, become a reality.

A few earnest souls have hoped, and planned, and toiled for this for many years. Sometimes the desire of their hearts seemed almost to be realized, then mountains of difficulty anon loomed up before them, and what had seemed so near was still a great way off. For those who conceived the idea of this "Temperance Temple" we should cherish the most grateful remembrance. Some of them have gone home to heaven, and from amid its glories we like to think they may perhaps find delight in watching the progress we make. For those who have now the heavy responsibility upon them, we bespeak your heartiest sympathy, a sympathy that must needs be expressed in something more tangible than words. There are, perhaps, a few who excuse themselves by saying, "We have enough to do in our own Union;" or, "It won't do us any good; let those who expect to use it pay for it," etc., etc. We should hardly expect to find such people in sympathy with missionary work, or, indeed, any work of a philanthropic character. How much good, in the sense of personal use, will the great Temperance Temple, at Chicago, be to the women at

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California, Texas, or the Dakotas? As Miss Willard says: "It is the esprit de corps that will do us good;" the turning of all our faces toward one point, and uniting our hands in one grand endeavor. It belongs to us, and we belong to it-Headquarters belongs to every W. C. T. U. woman of Toronto-and if all the good women of Toronto belonged to the W. C. T. U., what magnificent headquarters we could have, and what grand work we could accomplish for God,

home and humanity.

Shall we not make a tremendous effort to increase our membership this year? But, whether we be many or few, we must not relax our efforts until every dollar of indebtedness is cancelled, and we can say "We owe no man anything, but to love one another." Then, I am sure, we will not cease to pray that the blessing of the Lord may rest and abide upon everything that may be planned within its walls-that it may be as a light in a dark place, its blessed work apparent to all. When we gain possession, I hope it will be possible to maintain the noontide hour of prayer, and evening Bible-classes and evangelistic services. Then there ought to be a library for the use of the members, and a reading-room that will serve as a safe retreat for the dear girls who now spend their evenings promenading the streets. There will be room for the Provincial and Dominion literature, and ample accommodation for the "Y's"; for their cooking schools, and night-schools, their flower mission workers and Bands of Hope, for anything and everything their wisdom and ingenuity may devise. I trust they and we will be very happy in the new home, and that their work and ours will so increase and grow that a more commodious one may be required (and when required, forthcoming); and, as the years come and go, may each succeeding one find us still advancing, until victory shall crown our efforts and God shall say, "Well done!"

It is an inspiration to feel that in our organization there is ample room for growth and expansion. We are not confined to few and narrow paths. Every one may find a place suited to her taste or talent; special work awaits the specialist, and for the one who "does not know how to do anything," something helpful can always be found. Strange there should be any willing to be "counted out" of such an army; yet, excellent as the organization is, there are some who think they see grave defects, in that it embraces too much, and so they advocate doing away with some of the departments they consider unimportant or unnecessary, such as Heredity and Franchise. Franchise, they say, should be left with the Woman's Enfranchisement Association. To me this looks like retrogression, and our motto is advance. If we believe the franchise is woman's right, shall we not seek to obtain it?

We cannot blind our eyes to the need of woman's voice in the laws that govern women. We need the woman-half of the race to be represented throughout the realm of government, because government should meet the wants of a two-fold humanity. The ages that have 'It is the passed have not made man more sufficient in himself than when God our faces pronounced, "It is not good for man to be alone." avor. It The ballot in the hands of women will aid greatly in the solution of to every

the dark problem of the liquor traffic, we cannot, therefore, afford to do

without this department.

We must not forget that our work is as much, indeed more, educational or preventive as reformative. All our evangelistic work is classed reformative, including work in police stations, gaols, fire halls, among

soldiers, sailors, lumbermen, etc., etc.

All efforts to relieve suffering and distress are praiseworthy and not to be neglected, still there is something better to be done, viz.: seek to raise humanity to a higher plane, and so we have our so-called preventive work. The betterment of the race from generation to generation is the one object supremely worthy of Christian effort and selfsacrifice.

It grieves me to have so little attention paid to the department of "Heredity and Hygiene." A proper study of Heredity will awaken in any breast the deepest reverence to the holy office of motherhood, and is, we believe, the best method a woman can adopt to reach a just conception of the responsibilities of womanhood. I hope the strong utterances of the Prison Reform Commission will open the eyes of our women to the importance of this department of our work.

Temperance work in the Sunday-schools and day-schools is also

preventive, and full of promise for the years to come.

With regard to our White Cross and White Shield work, we must endeavor to bring society up to the standard of Bible purity; purity for the individual, regardless of sex, or, as quaint Samantha Allen puts

it, "teach people that purity is both masculine and feminine."

The eighty Japanese girls of Nagasaki, Japan, composing the Y. W. C. T. U., give special attention to this work of social purity, and it is said form the strongest organization of the kind in the empire. Our young ladies can circulate both the pledges and literature of this department without any danger of becoming demoralized. departments specified on our plan of work are important, and we would not dispense with any one of them; and while each superintendent should be particularly interested in her own department, there should be the heartiest sympathy manifested for every other department, so shall we aid and strengthen each other and best conserve the interests of the whole Society.

We believe intensely in individual work, and we also believe intensely in doing our utmost to help forward every social, political and educational movement that tends to better the condition, physical, mental or moral, of any class or classes of society. I sometimes wonder if we apprehend how much it means to be engaged in this battle for God and home and native land. Do we understand how the work and influence in the home and society is going to bear on time and on

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eternity? We belong to our homes, to the church and society, to the W. C. T. U., and it may be to many other organizations; but, in a broader and more important sense, we belong to the great brotherhood and sisterhood of the race. As pebbles cast into the stream produce ripples which multiply and extend even to the other shore, so we, mothers of men and women that are to be, produce on them influences whose extent and effect upon our race only eternity can measure. While feeling our responsibility we need not despair, for God has interposed to help us. Hopefulness ought to characterize our work more largely than it does; we ought to have bright hopes of every one to whom we can bring such a Saviour as we have proved Christ to be in our own lives. Our hope, our joy, our strength are in Him in whom We have in Him not only a blessed memory of all fulness dwells. Eden, but a perfect model for this life and a glad prophecy of heaven. So let us labor on, knowing that the Lord of Hosts is with us, and light and victory will come at last. Individual self-surrender is the only true source of power with God and man, so let us "ascend unto the hill of God" that we may be clear-sighted for the battle, and may a personal Pentecost be the portion of every one who wears the white ribbon.

The Central Union has a membership of eighty-seven. Thirty regular meetings and one special were held during the year, these being partly devotional and partly business, with an average attendance of nineteen. Our Union has a large membership, but not more than the average number of active workers, and our President, anxious that the members should be increased, sent invitations to all on the roll for an "At Home." The object, of course, was that ladies might become better acquainted with each other and with W. C. T. U. work and become active in this work.

Good work has been carried on in thirteen departments. The Evangelistic includes two weekly visits a month to the gaol, where a short service is held for the female prisoners, and literature distributed. Mothers' meetings were carried on for a short time. No special work

has been done in the Social Purity Department. Literature was sent to the lumbermen, fire halls, boats, and also distributed at the W.C.T.U. tent at the Exhibition Grounds. The Central took charge of the meetings, etc., in the tent two different days. Nothing new was done in the departments of Franchise, Sabbath Observance, and Unfermented Wine. Reports of the meetings were sent regularly to the daily papers, hoping in this way to interest the public in temperance work. Subscribers were obtained for the Woman's Journal, our W.C.T.U. organ. A new department of Sabbath-school work was taken up, Pledge-books being placed in the different Sunday-schools where they before had none. A great many teachers and scholars signed the pledge. In this way children grow up to be strong temperance men and women.

Supplied two visitors for the gaol, who distributed more than 3,400 pages of literature, and held prayer-meetings and Bible-readings with the women. Supplied fire halls with literature, also the boats at the Yonge Street wharf.

Hold Gospel Temperance meetings once a month, in the Y. M. C.∙A. rooms.

#### PARKDALE.

Hold Gospel Temperance meetings on Sabbath afternoon, along with the Good Templars; visit and assist the poor and distribute literature.

#### NORTHERN.

Visited the poor and distributed literature at the fire hall.

#### GORDON.

Did good work in this department. Held sixteen meetings in Sackville Street Mission Hall last winter, which were well attended. I believe we should petition our law makers to make it illegal to sell tobacco to minors. We are told that the use of tobacco is on the increase among the children, and that they are injured both mentally and physically by its use; also that the pictures that they get with the cigarettes are of an immoral nature. We should look after this matter. It is high time that we were roused to the defence of our boys and girls. Last fall the Grand Jury recommended that legislation should be obtained for the regulation of houses of "ill-fame," similar to that which exists in some of the European cities. At the next meeting of our District the following resolution was unanimously carried, and sent to Alderman Gillespie by your Superintendent:— Moved by Mrs. W. L. Scott, and seconded by Mrs. Hughes: "We, the members of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, of Toronto, in council assembled, do most emphatically protest against the recommendation of the Grand Jury of the County of York, advising those in authority to seek such legislation as would enable them to license houses of 'ill-fame,' as we believe to license such an evil would be an outrage on the moral sentiment of the community, against which all womanhood must revolt." At the time of the elections the question was asked each of our candidates for alderman if they were in favor of such a license. We were thankful for the decided stand taken by so many Christian people at the time, showing that the leaven of purity is working. May God grant that it may spread and grow until intemperance and impurity of every kind is driven from our beloved country.

# SABBATH-SCHOOLS.

In submitting my report on the condition of the Temperance work in Sabbath-schools throughout the city, I have not been able to observe anything like uniformity, as the information obtained from the churches and officers of the schools has varied so much that I found a uniform report impossible, and have, therefore, tried to condense, in the best manner possible, the information obtained. The only possible way of getting these reports in anything like uniform, or even satisfactory shape, will be to prepare a set of blanks, asking for the exact information we require, place these in the hands of the officers of each school, asking them to fill them out and return them to the Superintendent of this department.

Reports from eighty-three schools:—Fifty-two have Temperance pledges in the schools; 7,889 children pledged to total abstinence; six schools promised to introduce the pledge.

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# SCIENTIFIC TEMPERANCE.

Four medals were given in the higher classes of the public schools for the best essays on "Scientific Temperance." Scientific Temperance has also been taught by the Central "Y's" in the Girl's Home and Truant School.

# SAILORS.

The Superintendent made twelve visits to the different steamboats during the summer, supplying the sailors with a variety of reading matter, viz.: sixty-one magazines, forty four pamphlets, forty-five papers, 963 tracts; these were in all instances kindly received.

## FRANCHISE.

In this department, the principal work done was at the time of the municipal elections, canvassing and bringing to the polls lady voters in the interest of the Temperance candidates. There was not anything undertaken in the city last year by the W. C. T. U. on the line of Enfranchisement for Women.

## LITERATURE.

Reports have not been received from all the Unions of amount of literature circulated. One Union says, "Thousands of pages of literature," etc., etc. Some have sent to lumber camps without keeping any record of what was sent. Summary of reports received from Unions makes 51,700 pages of literature circulated, besides magazines, books, and religious newspapers.

### PRESS.

Mrs. Hooker was appointed, with the Superintendent, Mrs. Carman, to secure regular space once a week in the daily papers. Two papers replied. *The Globe* declared itself a temperance advocate,

Four hundred and thirteen items were sent to the various papers in the city from the different unions during the past year.

# FAIR.

Space was secured at the Exhibition Grounds for a tent, which was kindly loaned by the Parkdale Gospel Temperance Union. Meetings were here held daily, the different unions in the city alternately taking charge each day. An organist was engaged, and there was an interesting service of song every morning and afternoon. Addresses were also given at these services by ministers, laymen, and W. C. T. U. workers; 26,000 pages of temperance literature were distributed, seventy-six persons signed the Temperance pledge, 117 the White Shield, and thirty-four the White Cross pledges; 214 signatures were obtained to the World's Petition. Collection, \$102.31.

# "WOMAN'S JOURNAL."

Only five Unions have subscribers to the *Woman's Journal*, namely: Central, twenty-one; Willard, twelve; Northern, ten; Gordon, six; Central "Y's," twenty-two; total, seventy-one. The *Journal* is the organ of our W. C. T. U., both for the Dominion and Province of Ontario. Our Unions would be much helped and encouraged by subscribing to this *our own paper*; they would come into touch with Unions all through the Province, and interest in our own work would be quickened thereby. We hope to have a better report for next year.

# FLOWER MISSION.

I am sorry to have only one active Flower Mission to report. The Central "Y's" distributed bouquets, with texts of Scripture attached, 7,850; glasses of delicacies, 885; baskets of fruit, forty; eggs, thirty-five dozen; Easter cards, 285; literature, 2,400 pages; Christmas cards, holly tied with white ribbon, and texts of Scripture to the children of hospital. Money expended for the sick during the year, \$48.80. The Northern Union distributed twenty-six bouquets.

I would respectfully urge upon the Parkdale Union the taking up of this work for the benefit of the sufferers in the Home for Incurables. The Centr Home, regul Truant Scho had about eigeighteen in o

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# KITCHEN GARDEN.

The Central "Y" conducted, through the Misses Howland and Burritt, one Kitchen Garden class of twenty members during the past year, and united with the Bands of Hope in giving a "May Festival." We also had a cooking class for poor children, consisting of ten members. These were taught plain, wholesome, economical cookery, by Miss Rose; and we are sure the lessons thus learned will be felt in some of the homes of the future, if not in the present.

The North Toronto Union had a Kitchen Garden class in the school-room of the Bond Street Congregational Church, but as I have not received any official report, I cannot say with what success it was attended.

The Girls' Home have requested that a course of Kitchen Garden lessons be given to the little girls this fall if possible.

The Gordon "Y" organized a Kitchen Garden class in Sackville Street Mission Hall, in June, 1889; another was formed in the fall. The two classes, numbering thirty-six children, have been successfully carried on during the year. A series of parlor socials and exhibitions of Kitchen Garden work by the children were given, by these means the utensils were paid for. The Kindergarten chairs, necessary to complete the outfit, were the gift of Dr. Thomas Henderson, whose kindness and liberality we thankfully acknowledge.

# BANDS OF HOPE.

The Central "Y's" have taught Scientific Temperance in the Girls' Home, regularly every week, to about sixty children; also in the Truant School, to between forty and fifty. In addition to this, we had about eighty children in our Sackville Street Band of Hope, and eighteen in our Central, making in all, 238 children under our care.

North Toronto carried on a Band of thirty-nine children during the winter.

Willard has a successful Band, numbering sixty, all of whom have signed the pledge. Average attendance, thirty.

Western.—The highest place in this department must be assigned to the Western Union, which carries on successfully three Bands, with a membership of 500 and an average attendance of 215. These are carried on for nine months and are taught by the Superintendent, from the desk, with the help of the blackboard.

There are children everywhere who, by-and-by, will be the voters, the members of our Legislative Assemblies, and our executive officers. It is for us to try and bring temperance instruction to bear upon their characters during this their formative period, so that the time of victory and rejoicing may sooner come to those of us working "For God, and Home, and Native Land."

The foregoing reports from Unions and Superintendents of Departments do not by any means indicate the amount of work done. In the Literature Department the number of pages reported as distributed is not anything approaching the quantity circulated. Only four Unions give figures—some have sent to lumber camps, sailors, fire halls, barber shops, railways—some say, thousands of pages, etc., distributed. We hope that more accurate accounts will be kept the current year.

Parlor socials have not been reported, but several were given by ladies, to help the funds of their respective Unions. Mesdames Lucas and Walker each gave a social in aid of the Headquarters Fund. Cooke's Church was kindly placed at our service for a lecture given by Dr. Fulton, also in the interest of Headquarters.

A social was given to the city school teachers in Richmond Hall; all the teachers were invited—there were about 400 present, Mr. J. L. Hughes in the chair. Addresses were given by the President, Mrs. Lucas; Mrs. Kate Tennant Woods, the well-known authoress; Mrs. Colby, editor of *Woman's Tribune*, Nebraska; Mrs. Parker, wife of Colonel Parker, of Chicago.

A circular was received from the Prisoners' Aid Association, asking for the co-operation of the District Union. The officers signed on behalf of the Union.

A petition was also signed by the officers, in the name of the Union, in favor of Mr. Charlton's bill on "Sabbath Observance," to be presented to the House of Commons.

# HEADQUARTERS.

For three years past the Toronto District Union have been desirous to secure a suitable place to establish their Headquarters. They felt the need of a centre which would be a rallying point for their members, and where their work would be concentrated. Two thousand dollars had been collected and invested for this purpose. Many places came under consideration during that time, but none were deemed suitable. In March of this year an offer was made of a

A mass meeting was called for 20th March, which met in the parlor of the Central "Y's," on Elm Street, to consult on the desirability of this place; the President in the chair. Several of the members, who had interviewed the place, reported favorably. A letter was read from the owner, Dr. Emory, offering the property named on the following terms: \$2,000 to be paid when agreement would be perfected, \$1,000 in thirty days, \$1,000 in sixty days; Dr. Emory would give \$1,000 as donation to our work, and the balance, \$10,000, to remain as mortgage on the property, at six per cent. per annum. Any time any part of that amount could be paid it would be received, and so lessen our interest. After careful and prayerful consultation, it was moved by Mrs. Porter, seconded by Mrs. Cowan, "That we purchase Dr. Emory's property on these terms."—Carried unanimously. President and Recording Secretary were requested to sign the papers, in the name of the Toronto District W. C. T. U.; Mesdames D. Cowan and W. H. Howland as witnesses. The house, etc., purchased being at the time in possession of Mr. W. D. Matthews, as tenant, at a rent of \$70 a month. An agreement was entered into with him, that he retain occupancy until the summer of 1891, when we hope to take possession and enter on work in "Our Headquarters."

We are thankful to our heavenly Father for the measure of success which has attended our labors during the past year—much of it done in very great weakness and in face of many difficulties; thankful to the noble band of workers in our District Union, who have accomplished so much. Figures can never represent the amount of self-denying labor, and the energy which has been expended in the work done. We are thankful to the friends outside our organization who have extended a helping hand or spoken to us a cheering word. We ask members of Christian churches to look more closely than they have done hitherto into the aims and modes of working of our organization, and see if it does not commend itself as worthy their cooperation.

"Our Headquarters" is the work which, at present, bears most heavily on our hearts and efforts. We need it so much, and we want to take possession of it during the coming summer, equipped for the work we hope to accomplish, and which has been heretofore retarded for want of a suitable place in which to successfully carry out our plans. But to effect this we need money; and surely, in this great Christian city, there are those who will come to our help; who, out of the abundance God has given them, will aid us in our work for "God, and Home, and Humanity!"

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# CONSTITUTION OF THE TORONTO DISTRICT W. C. T. U.

## ARTICLE I.

This organization shall be known as the Toronto District Woman's Christian Temperance Union, auxiliary to the Provincial Woman's Christian Temperance Union.

# ARTICLE II.

The objects of this Union shall be:-

I. The centralization of the work of the various Toronto Local Unions for more effectively carrying out the objects for which they were formed.

2. Joint consultation and advice on plans for future work.

3. The formation of new Unions in the city, where it may be deemed advisable.

## ARTICLE III.

The officers of this Union shall be:—President, Vice-President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, and Treasurer. These officers shall be elected by ballot, after open nominations or informal ballot, at Annual Meeting. Presidents of Local Unions shall be Vice-Presidents ex officio of the District Union.

## ARTICLE IV

The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-President, Secretaries, Treasurer, Presidents and Secretaries of Local Unions, and Superintendents of Departments, appointed by the District Union, five of whom, including the President and one of the Secretaries shall form a quorum. Should any of the representatives of Local Unions be unable to attend, that Union should appoint a substitute. This Committee shall have general management of affairs in the Union, and nominate Superintendents of Departments of work required in the city.

# ARTICLE V.

The Annual Meeting shall be held in——(time and place to be settled at previous meeting of the Executive). The Executive shall meet monthly.

# ARTICLE VI.

This Constitution may be amended at the Annual Meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present, notice having been given at the Executive meeting three months previous to the Annual.

# ISTRICT

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# BY-LAWS.

1. The duties of the President shall be to preside at all meetings, have supervision of work in the city, organize new Unions, and issue calls for meetings, and, at the written request of eight members, call special meetings.

2. Vice-President shall assist in managing the work of the Union,

and shall preside in the absence of the President.

3. Local Presidents shall assist in managing the work of the Union, and aim to create and stimulate interest in the same; assist in organization, and preside in the absence of the President and Vice-President of the District.

4. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Union, notify Local Unions of new branches of work; secure reports of Corresponding Secretaries of Local Unions, from which she shall formulate a report for the Annual Meeting; assist the President in preparing programme, etc., for the same; and send Annual Report of the District Union to the Provincial Corresponding Secretary.

5. The Recording Secretary shall attend all meetings of the Union and of the Executive Committee, and keep a correct record of their proceedings; and send to each member of the Executive Committee notice of such meetings. She shall apprise all members of committees of their appointment and duties; notify the public of its meetings;

and fyle and sign all orders at the request of the President.

6. The Treasurer shall pay bills, on order of the President and Recording Secretary; keep an exact book account, and present a monthly report of the same. She shall endeavor to secure contributions for District work; collect unpaid affiliation District fees, and forward to the Provincial Treasurer the half-yearly affiliation fee received from Local Unions.

7. Superintendents of Departments shall advise and encourage each local Superintendent in the prosecution of her branch of work, subject to the approval of the Executive; secure reports of same, and embody each separately in their representative reports to the Provin-

cial Convention, giving each Union credit by name.

8. All members of Local Unions in the city of Toronto, affiliated with the District Union by the payment of five cents per member, shall be members of this Union, and have votes at the Annual Meeting. Every third monthly meeting is called "The Quarterly," and every member of the W. C. T. U. is privileged to attend.

9. Funds for carrying on the District work may be raised by any

means determined on by the Executive.

10. These By-Laws may be amended at any Annual Meeting, by a two-thirds vote of the members present, notice having been given at the previous Executive meeting.
