Ottawa, Aug. 29—For the year ended June 30 last the Intercolonial Railway shows a surplus of \$400,000 compared with \$62,000 the year previous. For the nine months ended March 31st, the surplus was \$219,000. In 1905 the deficit on the Intercolonial was \$1,725,000 and the year before that it was \$900,000.





At a meeting of the Hygiene Committee yesterday afternoon he submitted a report from City Analyist Hersey, in which it was stated that a compound in which it was stated that a compound consisting of ordinary lime and cane sugar syrup was being rather extensively used in the city for the purpose of thickening cream. Though not really harmful in small quantities, dealers selling cream thickened by this preparation were guilty of adulty ration.

of adulteration.

Dr. Laberge pointed out that if some dealers in cream were allowed to use the compound it was unfair to the others. Those using it had an apparently thick, rich cream, which deceived buyers. It should, therefore, be prohibited. He wished to have instruction from the committee to communicate with the government in the interest of the honest dealers.

The committee gave full instruction in that regard, and those using the compound in future will have to answer to the charge of adulterating food.



This matter of washing out milk cans is a very much more important one than is generally supposed, as unwashed milk cans, especially in warm weather, afford splendid breeding grounds for bacteria. It is when the milk has been recently emptied out of the cans and they have not had time to dry that the washing must be done to be efficacious, and the inspection organized by the department has caused this to be done.

Dr. McCarry is of the opinion that an afternoon delivery of milk would be beneficial to the city. Customers would then get milk on the same day as it was sent to Montreal. The new milk by-law will be brought up this fall for consideration. Among other things it will limit the delivery of milk to tewnty-four hours after milking time, fix the number of bacteria at 100,000, and raise the standard of butter fat from three to three and a quarter.





