WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The Eighteenth Annual Meeting of the Society was held in Bank Street Church, Ottawa, on the 17th, 18th and 19th of April. The church was prettily decorated and every preparation had been made for the cordial reception of the delegates, of whom there were present between two and three hundred. The President, Mrs. Ewart, presided at all the meetings. The opening session was held on Tuesday afternoon, and was devotional, the President being assisted by Mrs. Thorburn, Ottawa; Mrs. MacLaren, Toronto; Mrs. Dalkin, Quebec; Mrs. Maclennan, Owen Sound, and several others who voluntarily led in prayer. A devotional meeting was also held on Thursday morning, when Miss McWilliams, lately our missionary in India, gave an address which was particularly enjoyed.

The Society had the privilege and pleasure during the sessions of listening to an address from Dr. Marion Oliver, of Indore, on "The Medical Mission Work in India;" also to an account from Miss Baker, of Prince Albert, of work accomplished in the North-West. Mrs. Grant, Orillia, contributed a most thoughtful paper on "Duties of the Members of Our Society, and the Responsibilities of the Women of the Church to Foreign Mission Work." A discussion followed this which provoked many helpful suggestions. During one of the sessions, Mrs. Mackay, a native of Formosa, and the wife of our missionary, Dr. G. L. Mackay, occupied a seat on the platform, and was intro-

A communication from Lady Aberdeen was received, in which she regretted, owing to a prior engagement in Montreal, her inability to be present at any of the sessions.

Conference.

Later in the afternoon of Tuesday, and in the evening, the Board (comprising the thirty-six Managers and Presidents of Presbyterials, Auxiliaries and Mission Bands), with Presbyterial Secretaries and Treasurers, met for conference on several important matters connected with the working of the Society—the Annual Report, and suggested alterations in connection with it; the proposed Training Home; lessening the representation; allotment to Presbyterials of schools and reserves in the North-West, with other matters, were considered and discussed. The greater part of Wednesday morning was occupied in hearing the President's Address, and the Presbyterial Reports.

Greetings.

A telegram of greeting from the Eastern Division of the W.F. M.S., was presented by the Recording Secretary, who also read greetings from the Montreal Society ; the Woman's Board of the Methodist Church, Canada; the W.F.M.S., of Northern New York; from the Woman's Presbyterian Board of the South-West; the Woman's Board, North Pacific; the Woman's Board, 5th Avenue, New York; the Woman's Board of the North-West, Chicago; the Philadelphia Woman's Board; the Woman's Union Society, New York; the Occidental Woman's Board, San Francisco; and from the Lethbridge and Brandon Societies.

A circular letter from Mrs. Blaikie, Edinburgh, President of the International Conference, was read by Mrs. Thorburn, Ottawa. Encouragement in the work of their Societies is alluded to, also new lines of work undertaken and the number of new missionaries who have gone out to the foreign fields.

Reception of Delegates.

Mrs. Tilton, of the Episcopal Church, presented the greeting of their Society, recalling the last time our Society had met in Ottawa, and alluding to the inspiration drawn from such annual gatherings. Mrs. Mackay, representing Baptist Society; Mrs. Stevens, the Congregational Society; and Mrs. MacLaren, the McAll Association. Each spoke briefly of their own work, and expressed their hearty interest in our Society.

Training Home.

In reference to the Training Home, it was unanimously approved that the recommendation of the Board as expressed in the January Letter Leaflet be accepted, and left in their hands to carry out.

The notice of motion from last year to reduce the Representation, was, after discussion, not deemed expedient.

Annual Report.

The expression of opinion from the Toronto Presbyterial in reference to paying for the Annual Report was not considered advisable, though by way of reducing the size, a tabulated statement instead of the abstracts was approved of.

It was also agreed that the plan of allotting supplies for the schools and reserves to Presbyterial Societies remain as at present.

The suggestion that two ladies of the Board should, through the coming summer, visit our Schools and Reserves in the North-West, that matters pertaining to them may be better understood, was very heartily entertained and approved of.

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Public Meeting.

The Public Meeting in the evening was held in St. Andrew's Church. The spacious edifice was crowded in every part, even standing room was hardly available. Mr. Hamilton Cassels, Convener of the General Assembly's Foreign Mission Committee, presided. The Rev. Mr. Herridge, pastor of the church, extended a cordial welcome to the delegates and the returned missionaries from the foreign fields who were present. The Rev. Dr. Moore gave a brief account of the work accomplished by the W.F.M.S. since its organization. Addresses were delivered by the Rev. Mr. McVicar, late of Honan, China, and the Rev. G. L. Mackay, of Formosa. The devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Wardrope.

Allocation of the Money.

Moved by Mrs. Ross, Kingston, seconded by Mrs. Alexander, Ottawa, and agreed to : "That the further sum of \$600 be paid to Dr. Reid for transmission to the Foreign Mission Committee (Eastern Division), to be applied by them to the following objects : \$300 to Mrs. Morton and \$300 to Mrs. Grant for their respective objects : \$300 to Mrs.

Morton and \$300 to Mrs. Grant for their respective schools in Trinidad." 3rd. Moved by Mrs. Hossack, Lucan, seconded by Mrs McNair, Carlton Place, and agreed to: "That the further sum of \$600 be also transmitted through 1'r. Reid to the Foreign Mission Committee (Eastern Division), to be applied as follows: \$100 each to Mrs. Annand, Mrs. Robertson and Miss MacKenzie, for school work in the New Hebrides, and \$300 for mission work in the New Hebrides at the discretion of the the MacKenzie.

4th. Moved by Mrs. Needham, Orillia, seconded by Mrs. Byers, Gananoque, and agreed to : "That the sum of \$10,000 be also now paid to the Foreign Mission Committee, to meet salaries and other expenses in connection with the work of the W.F.M.S. during the coming year."

Next Place of Meeting.

Invitations to hold the next Annual Meeting were presented both from Peterboro' and Toronto. A vote being taken, it was decided that the next meeting should be held in Toronto.

Votes of Thanks.

Very cordial votes of thanks were passed to the friends in Ottawa for their kind and generous hospitality, to the Trustees and Managers of Bank street and St. Andrew's Churches, to the organists and choirs, to the Rev. Dr. Reid for auditing the Treasurer's books, and to the Railway Companies for reduced fares and special accommodation.

MY DEAR FRIENDS AND CO-WORKERS.—How can we sufficiently thank our Heavenly Father, for once more permitting so many of us to assemble at our Annual Meeting. this time. thousands, May I, in this connection, give you some helpful thoughts and suggestions found in an address given at the Annual Meeting of the A. B. C. F. M., and which impressed themselves very strongly on my mind. I do not attempt to give the whole of that address, but most of "Personal Factor" in the Missionary Problem, which is, "To carry the Gospel invitation as speedily as possible to every creature," it was said, "How to carry on this immense enterprise efficiently, and to call in the entire Church of Christ and its treasures, will remain an unpoints."

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1st. The Personal Leader.—Our enthroned Lord must be recognized as the One who gave, and still gives the imperative command, who gives the definite promise of His presence and guidance, who proevery event and detail in the prosecution of the work, and insures its complete success. This must be the living, supreme thought pervading a failure.

2nd. The *Personal Messenger*.—Whom shall we send and who will go for us? is the inquiry of this Personal Leader. Here am I; send me, is the response of the willing messenger; and being supplied with "Good Tidings" he runs swiftly bearing them gladly along the path appointed by the Divine Leader who makes no mistake as to His

3rd. The Personal Recipient.—If the individual soul, to whom the messenger delivers the message, accepts it, then the Lord Himself is brought into direct communion with that soul, and he is saved. But if not accepted, that one may become more civilized, more intelligent, more companionable; but he is not in communion with the Lord and is 4th. The Personal Source of Source o

The Personal Source of Supply. -Where are the rank and file to whom, individually, is addressed the command, "Go make disciples of all nations?" If the Personal Lord is in direct communication with all personal messengers, sending them to distant lands with a message to individual souls, and if it is the Divine method of fulfilling our trust, as recipients of Divine grace, then we are personally responsible to equip these messengers, to multiply their number, to fill their ranks as they fall, and to heartily support them by prayer, by sympathy and by generous gifts, and thus be kept in personal touch with them and the And it is His gracious will, that no disciple, however insignificant in his own estimation or in his opportunities of service, shall be excluded from this great honour ; the command and the promise belong to him as truly and as really as they belong to the messenger who directly carries the message. This personal factor in the Missionary Problem needs to be emphasized at the present time. want not only societies, associations and conferences, but individual We believers. Let each disciple recognize his or her own direct relation to the Personal Lord on the one side, and to the Personal Messenger on the other, and keep this personal responsibility and privilege in lively exercise by continuous, prayerful thought and generous offerings.

These thoughts and suggestions seem to me very appropriate at this time. But does it not strike you that with a deficit of several thousands, seriously threatening the Foreign Mission Scheme of our

Church, these responsibilities of sympathy, prayer, and generous gifts, are being ignored in some, or perhaps, I might say, in many congregations? And, unhappily, there is an inclination, in some quarters, to lay the blame of the deficit on the W.F.M.S. Why? Most probably because the relation of the W.F.M.S. to the other schemes of the Church is not understood, and yet it is difficult for us to quite realize this, seeing that we, as a Society, were organized by the Foreign Mission Committee, with the sanction of the General Assembly, for a specific department of work connected with Foreign Missions ; just as to Augmentation was assigned a specific department of Home Missions; and as a Society having undertaken to find the necessary funds for that department allotted to us, we were determined to make it a success, if possible. Immediately depending on the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we endeavoured in many ways to create and foster an interest in Foreign Missions. At the same time, we were not unmindful of the other departments of our Church work, being particularly anxious not to interfere with or injure any of them. In our first Annual Report this passage occurs: "with a view to establishing and stimulating systematic giving, we have adopted the envelope system by giving to each member one large envelope containing twelve small ones, and asking that one of these should be put into the Mission box each month, with just such a gift as God put it into the heart and power of each to give for this particular purpose. At the same time, we were careful to make it thoroughly understood that we did not wish anyone to take from any other scheme of the Church to give to this : but if they could not, by additional self-denial spare somewhat for this object, still we asked their prayers and attendance at our monthly meetings, that they might hear of all the ways our Lord and Master was leading us, and the doors that were everywhere open for His followers to go in, and spread the knowledge of His truth throughout the whole world." Each Annual Report since then contains a note to the same effect.

We cannot help thinking that the blame-if blame there be-might be traced (to a considerable extent) to what we have considered a mistake made at the outset of our organization, continued to the present time, and is misleading to those who do not carefully study the Annual Reports, viz.: In the Assembly's Blue Book the sum given by congregations and that given by the W.F.M.S. are added together and put in one column of the Statistical Report, thus conveying the idea that it is one scheme and not two, as decided and separate as Home Mission and Augmentation. The consequence is, that an unfair contrast is made as to what is given to Home, and what to Foreign, to the great injury of the latter. Take, for instance, the following figures from last year's report : One Presbytery gave \$8,649 to Home, \$6,301 to Augmentation, and apparently \$14,697 to Foreign. But deduct the sum given by the W.F.M.S. and the figures will read thus: \$8,649 to Home, \$6,301 to Augmentation, \$8,569 to Foreign and \$6,128 to the W.F.M.S. It is easily seen how misleading the former figures are when not separated. Then when the estimates are given by the Assembly for the next year they read thus : Home Mission-, Augmentation-, Foreign-. Again putting the F.M. scheme and the W.F. M.S. in one sum, so that congregations do not know what is required of them, apart from what is needed from the W.F.M.S.. If these two were given separately, there would be no difficulty in allocating the

sonal Mess of Supply and abund Saviour. Mission funds of the congregation at the end of the year; as the Foreign Mission scheme would be rated like the other schemes of the Church without any reference to the W.F.M.S., and inaccuracies in the Statistical Report of Presbyteries would be avoided.

Nor should it be forgotten that many of our members, both married and single, young and old, have means of their own, and, we hesitate not to say, are liberal givers to all the schemes of the Church ; and many of them—even the very young children—manage, by acts of self-denial and plans of various kinds, to secure gifts for both Home and Foreign work.

We regret exceedingly that it has seemed necessary, in simple justice to our Society, to make this explanation as to the *relation* of the W. F. M. S. to the other schemes of our Church, and trust we shall be understood. May I ask that the members will endeavour on their return home to make this matter clear to those around them.

Dear friends, in closing, may I ask you to remember the *four points* in the Missionary Problem – 1st, The Personal Leader; 2nd, The Personal Messenger; 3rd, The Personal Recipient; 4th, The Personal Source of Supply. May these dwell in each heart and spring up into much and abundant fruit to the praise and glory of our Blessed Lord and Saviour.

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

Another year has passed, and again we can report a conscientious desire on the part of members of the Board to fulfil the responsibility laid upon them, evinced by their faithful attendance at the weekly meetings, which this year number more than last. Forty-three in all have been held, at which the average attendance of the whole Board has been thirty, and of the managers, twenty-six. Twenty Executive meetings have also been necessary, when an average of thirteen have been present. Owing to lengthened absence from home, one member sent in her resignation, and Mrs. Ball, of Westminster Church, was appointed to fill the vacancy.

In May a committee of the Board met in conference with several members of the Foreign Mission Committee, when a number of subjects were presented for consideration, among others, the recommendation that the contributions of the W.F.M.S. be reported in the Blue book, separate from the General Foreign Mission Fund of the Church. This met with the approval of the members of the Committee present.

The suggestion has been frequently made, that a plan should be devised whereby valuable original papers read at meetings of the Presbyterial Societies, Auxiliaries or Mission Bands, might be passed on to other places where they could be of great use. Your Board decided to establish a Bureau for this purpose. The Corresponding Secretary, Miss Haight, has undertaken the charge of this department.

In order to relieve the Treasurer and prevent confusion in the work, Miss B. MacMurchy has been appointed to take charge of the Certificates of Life Membership.

It has been found that the Deaconess Home, established in Toronto during the year under the auspices of the Episcopal Church, could not be of use to us. A committee of the Board was, therefore, appointed to take the matter fully into consideration. After much careful thought, they recommend that in view of the importance of the work, arrangements be made, whereby women applying for service in the Foreign field may be *tested as to their suitability* for this difficult work, and may at least receive some preliminary training in Biblical subjects and in practical Mission work, before their applications are finally considered by the Foreign Mission Committee. The arrangements suggested will be found in the January Letter Leaflet.

gested will be found in the January Letter Leaflet. In common with other societies, the Board received a circular containing reasons for forming a "National Council of Women" and inviting the W. F. M. S. to affiliate with it. After due consideration it was decided that, "It seemed to the Board that while a 'National Council of Women' might be of benefit to charitable and other societies, it could hardly be so to the Foreign Missionary Societies belonging were Au could not Women." Your

Besides, we, as a Society, were Auxiliary to the Foreign Mission Committee of our Church and could not, or rather should not, affiliate with the 'National Council of Women.'"

Your Board felt that in order to fully understand the needs of our schools in the North-West, we should have some more definite information in regard to the amount of the Government maintenance, etc. The Foreign Mission Committee granted permission to correspond directly with the North-West Committee, and certain questions were put to and answered by Mr. Baird; but that matters pertaining to our schools may be better understood and managed, the proposal of sending one or more ladies to visit them has been favourably entertained by your Board, and they desire to bring the subject before you for consideration.

Under the impression that our Society held a large surplus, a request came from the Eastern Division, that we should aid them in their time of difficulty, to the extent of six thousand dollars. It was felt that this request could not be granted, as our estimates for the current year were likely to be very heavy, and in any case the Board could not pay over such a large sum without the sanction of the Society.

Co-operation with the Woman's Conference, held during the World's Fair, was not deemed to be advisable.

In June the Board had the privilege of greeting Dr. Marion Oliver, of Indore, at present home on furlough. At her request, and for the purpose of saving the strength of your missionary as much as possible, it was decided that the Board should make all arrangements for meetings to be addressed by her. Miss McWilliams, late of India; Miss Mc-Intosh, of Okanase, and the ladies who have recently gone out to the foreign field, have, at várious times, been present at our weekly meetings. It has also given us pleasure to welcome friends and fellowworkers from many of our branches.

The meeting for special prayer on behalf of Foreign Missions, under the auspices of the Board, was held during the week of prayer, was largely attended, and, we trust, may be the means of quickening and strengthening the interest in this part of the Master's work.

And now in closing the record of the eighteenth year of our existence as a society, let us look back with thankfulness over the past and forward to future work, earnestly desiring our God to give us new power and faithfulness and zeal. Let us in the coming year with grateful hearts, show "our faith by our works," and give more constant and earnest prayer, remembering that God's blessing alone can give power and efficiency to any human effort.

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FOREIGN SECRETARY'S REPORT.

"How beautiful are the feet of them that preach the Gospel, that bring glad tidings of good things !"—Rom. x. 15.

The general features of the work accomplished by the missionaries of our Society in heathen lands, and among the Indians of our own land, vary but little from year to year. In hospitals, dispensaries and the homes of the natives; in zenanas, villages and schools; in Bible classes, woman's meetings and Sunday schools; in industrial training of all kinds, our missionaries, teachers, and helpers, with faithfulness and patience sow the seed of the Word beside all waters.

Much of their work is educational, therefore preparatory; and as it is impossible fully to understand the scope of efforts thus largely educative, it is also impossible to sum up with accuracy the fruitbearing which must assuredly follow seed-sowing of this kind.

We can give figures and say what our missionaries (physicians, teachers and zenana visitors aim to do, and the means employed, but the *real* results are written, not only in the Lord's great Book of Remembrance, but in the changed lives, the happy homes and the improved communities which, by the blessing of God, are springing up in heathen lands under the fostering care and through the Christian teaching and consistent example of our missionaries.

But while much attention is naturally given to the training of the young in the various fields, woman's work in all its departments, medical, zenana and evangelistic, is steadily carried on, and always with more or less encouragement.

It need scarcely be stated that the *active* interest and efforts of our Society are centred mainly in the fields of Central India, Honan, Formosa, and the North-West and British Columbia in our own Dominion.

As space will allow, we shall, as concisely as possible, in view of the importance of the record, present a statement in detail of the work for women and children at the Missions of our Church in the countries indicated.

I. THE MISSION TO THE INDIANS OF THE NORTH-WEST AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The first Mission of the Presbyterian Church to the Indians, the heathen at our own doors, then the monarchs of the great North-West, was begun in 1866, when Rev. James Nesbit with his wife started from Kildonan to proceed overland by waggon five hundred miles farther west, to found the Mission to the Indians at Prince Albert. At present there are in the North-West and British Columbia, under the supervision of our Church, fourteen Indian Missions, with eight industrial and boarding schools and three day schools. The staff of workers includes principa interpre The during t

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the Regina i department, includes nine missionaries and twenty-four helpers, the latter being principals of schools, teachers, industrial instructors, matrons and

The following are the most important changes that have occurred during the year in this field :

At the close of '93 Mr. J. Wellbourn, principal of the boarding school at Stoney Plain, resigned on account of Mrs. Wellbourn's illhealth. A successor was appointed, but in the meantime the Calgary Presbytery recommended that the Mission be handed over to the Methodist Church, as several of the Indians were originally of Methodist training, and as all the other Indian Protestant schools in that part of the country are Methodist and naturally tributary to the Government school at Red Deer. For these reasons it was supposed that Arrangements re the transfer are now pending, the school has been closed, and Rev. D. H. McQueen is in charge of the Mission. Mr. and Mrs. Wellbourn did excellent work at Stoney Plain in spite of many difficulties and hindrances, and the N.-W. Committee expresses sincere regret at the loss of their services. Mr. Wellbourn is now engaged as teacher in the public school at Edmonton, and we trust that Mrs. Wellbourn will soon recover her usual health.

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For several years there has been a band of Salteaux Indians, at Rolling River, in the skirts of the Riding Mountain, in north-western These Indians are very degraded and troublesome, and spend most of their time in the outskirts of such towns as Minnedosa and Rapid City. Rev. Geo. Flett, the veteran missionary at Okanase, has paid them occasional visits, but distance and the burden of other work have prevented any continued or systematic effort for their Christianization. The Government has recently set apart a Reserve for them, upon which some fifty families have settled. The children of school age number sixty or more. These children are entirely without education, the adults being pagans in the fullest sense of the word. Among these people the Foreign Mission Committee has decided to establish a Mission, and Mr. W. J. Wright, for two years assistant at the Crowstand, has been selected to begin the work. Mr. Wright, accompanied by Mrs. Wright, formerly Miss Martha Armstrong, one of our most valued teachers at the Crowstand, and Mrs. Wright's sister, have already entered upon the new field of work. The description of the ignorance, degradation and sufferings from hunger and cold of these poor people is thrilling in the extreme. An effort will be made to open a school in the near future.

Miss E. M. Armstrong has, during the year, been obliged to withdraw from the work at the Crowstand on account of circumstances. Her removal is a real loss.

Early in the year the Rev. J. A. Macdonald found it necessary, because of ill health, to resign the charge of the work at Alberni, B.C. This was a severe blow to the young Mission, as Mr. Macdonald had proved himself an earnest and efficient missionary. For several months Miss Johnston and Miss Minnes have borne the burden of the work alone, but recently Mr. M. Swartout, of Parkdale, Toronto, has been appointed missionary in charge.

The only other matter of importance to be noted is the growth of the Regina school and the change in the management of the financial department, which has been authorized by the Government. The rapid growth of this school is owing to the fact that the older pupils from the Reserve schools in the vicinity have been, with the advice of the Government and the concurrence of the North-West Committee, drafted into it. Previous to this year, each item of expenditure was approved and each bill paid by the Government. The cost of each pupil per year by this plan was \$186. The Government has now arranged to grant a fixed sum; in this case it is \$120 per year for each pupil, the Church to assume the responsibility of making the receipts and expenditures balance. It is understood that, if the \$120 per year for each pupil is insufficient, a readjustment of the grant is to be made, which will make provision for necessary outlay.

A very important aid to the Indian educational work would be the adoption of the proposal for compulsory education. Hitherto, pressure of various kinds has been brought to bear upon chiefs, parents and children, to induce the attendance of the children at school, but, in spite of all these influences, there are still many Indian children growing up, almost within sight of the school building, without training of any kind. With these facts in view, it is not surprising that those who are specially interested in Indian Mission work favour a system of compulsory education.

Speaking generally of the work accomplished in the schools, it may be said that there is a gratifying advance in the attainments of the children, and that our schools occupy a creditable place among those in the North-West Superintendency.

An extensive exhibit of work done by Indian school children was made at the World's Fair last summer at Chicago. Visitors had there an opportunity of viewing not only the handiwork of the children, but the workers themselves, who went in bands for the purpose of illustrating what is being done in the way of Indian education and civilization.

Alberni (B.C.) Industrial and Boarding Schools.

MR. M. SWARTOUT, Missionary; MISS M. MINNES, Teacher; MISS B. I. JOHNSTON, Matron.

Our Society last year contributed the sum of \$2,010 to the purchase of the Mission property, and this year the estimates call for an additional amount of \$1,200. The school is prosperous and now numbers fourteen pupils—ten girls and four boys, two of the little boys being under tive years of age. The children are intelligent, affectionate and obedient, and evidences of the benefit resulting from regular training are not wanting. After school hours, the girls occupy the time not given to household work and play, in knitting and sewing—little girls of six years old knitting their own stockings. There is an interesting Sunday school, and the children study the International S. S. Lesson, and learn Bible texts during the week in preparation for Sabbath classes. The Alberni school is under the supervision of the Synod of B. Columbia.

File Hills Industrial School.

MR. ALEXANDER SKENE, Principal of School; MRS. SKENE, Matron.

There have been dark days in the past at this Mission, but the "silver lining" of the cloud now begins to appear, and Mr. Skene writes cheerfully of the future. In a letter recently received he says : "We during gradua a num ment few m especia are bu and ar not acc

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"We have now ten pupils-eight boys and two girls, two having died during the year. We have been working steadily, and our children are gradually improving. They now speak English quite readily, can sing a number of hymns, repeat verses of Scripture, read the New Testa-ment and little papers fairly well. The two children who died a few months ago went home trusting in Jesus; with little Ruth, especially, the end was truly peace. When not in school, the boys are busy with work of various kinds. The girls help in the house, and are a 'happy, contented little band.' The school building will not accommodate more than ten or twelve children."

Round Lake Industrial School.

REV. HUGH MACKAY, Missionary ; MRS. MACKAY, Matron ; MR. SAHLMARK, Teacher.

Since the establishment of the Regina School the number of scholars at Round Lake has been reduced to twenty-the outside number for which the Government will allow, at this Mission, a grant per capita per year for maintenance. This school is prosperous, and writing at the New Year, Mr. Mackay says : "We have our full number (20) of scholars, and they are doing well. We have had no sickness in the school this term; all are well; not one case of scrofula, of which we have had so much in past years. We have at present an equal number of boys and girls. The boys are kept busy, two hours each day, sawing wood and taking care of cattle, while the girls assist in house work, sewing, etc." The value of stock at this Mission is \$500. Mr. Mackay holds regular religious services at six different places on the Reserves, and at the December Communion received four communicants on confession of faith.

Lakesend Industrial School.

REV. W. S. MOORE, Missionary ; MRS. MOORE, Matron.

In November Mr. Moore writes : "We have now ten boarders and twelve day pupils attending, having secured four new boarders since I wrote you last. This is the number for which the Govern-ment has provided a grant for maintenance in this school." Earlier in the year Mrs. Moore says: "Our children now, I think, are quite equal to the average of white children of their ages. They can read, write, sew, knit, do housework, gardening, etc. We can send them to drive twelve miles, purchase our supplies alone, get our mail, and return. We grow all our own potatoes, make our own butter, and our hens supply us with eggs." Mr. Moore conducts religious services on three Reserves, and the Indians last year contributed the considerable sum of \$148 for the Missionary Schemes of the Church and the completion of the Pasqua church.

Regina Industrial School.

Rev. A. J. McLEOD, B.A., Principal ; MR. D. H. McLEOD, Vice-Principal ; MR. D. C. MUNRO, 1st Teacher ; MISS LILLY RUSSELL, 2nd Teacher ; MRS. LEOKIE, Matron.

This school now numbers 112 pupils, and, as indicated, has been placed by the Government on the same financial basis as our other schools, only that the grant is larger. In a letter dated January 9th, Miss Russell says: "It is a great pleasure to see these boys and girls advancing not only in their studies, but also in appearance and bearing. With the year we began the study of the International Sabbath School Lessons. The pupils have made great advancement in their study of the English language, and lately both boys and girls seem to be developing a greater taste for reading." A Boys' Brigade, a band for the practice of music, a Girls' Mission Band are about to be organized. As an illustration of the regard the Indians have for the school, we understand that thirteen children were sent from the vicinity of Duck Lake, 200 miles distant, by their parents, none of whom had ever seen either school or teachers.

Crowstand Industrial School.

REV. C. W. WHYTE, B.A., Missionary; MR. J. S. WHYTE, Farm Instructor; MISS K. GILLESPIE, Teacher; MRS. C. W. WHYTE, Matron; MISS B. Scott, Instructress in Sewing.

This school has not been so numerously attended, nor has it had as advanced pupils as in former years, on account of the transfer of a considerable number of the older scholars to Regina. From a letter dated Nov. 4th, '93, we learn that then there were thirty scholars in the school, and that in all thirty-seven had been sent to Regina. In February we have the following encouraging intelligence : "The number of children is greater than ever before since the exodus to Regina. Their health during the winter has been excellent. Their progress has also been good. We had an examination recently on all the work of the school, cooking, sewing, etc., school work and all. Some of them did very well and showed that they were able to put into practice what they had learned." Sabbath services are held by Mr. Whyte at several places, with more or less regularity.

Portage la Prairie Industrial School.

MISS ANNIE FRASER, Principal of School and Matron; MISS SARAH LAIDLAW, Teacher.

Good work has been done in this school and in the tepees this year. In November, '93, there was an attendance of seventeen, with nineteen names on the roll. Since that time, two new pupils have been admitted, one of them a babe of eighteen months—a bright little boy, whose mother went away and left him. Several of the older girls are improving steadily in household work, dressmaking, sewing, etc., two of them being considered sufficiently trained to take situations as domestics. A third has learned dressmaking and to cut and fit dresses by a system, and makes not only her own clothes, but helps with those of the others. Others assist with the household knitting and mending. The building is now very comfortable, there being a separate school-room, the old school-room being used as dining and living room for the children. A new kitchen, a sitting-room for the teacher, a pantry and cellar and woodshed have been erected, thus increasing the facilities for useful work. The services in the church tipi are most interesting and encouraging. Miss Fra dence of Year a signed th pupils in will susta such effic who went and efficie

Since the New Year a temperance meeting has been held, and a number have signed the pledge. There has been considerable sickness among the pupils in the school this year. Regret is felt at the loss the Mission will sustain through the removal of Mr. Mackay, who has given such efficient help in the past. We are glad to note that Miss Laidlaw, who went from Toronto to this Mission, is thoroughly interested and efficient in her work.

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Birtle Industrial School.

MR. G. G. McLAREN, Principal; MISS McLAREN, Matron; MISS MATILDA McLEOD, Assistant.

The new building was completed and opened about the 1st of Nov., '93. It is well adapted to the work, being fitted up with many modern conveniences. In one of her letters, Miss McLaren says that a prettier site could not have been found in Manitoba, that truly the new building is "beautiful for situation." During the summer, and up to the time of the opening of the new school, the attendance was twenty-eight. Soon after the moving had been accomplished and the family had settled down in their new quarters, a sad accident occurred, which for a time has cast a gloom over this most promising school. During Mr. McLaren's absence in the Reserves, several of the boys, unknown to either Miss McLaren or Miss McLeod, went down to the river. The ice broke and three of the little fellows were drowned before they could be rescued. A number of the children went home to the Reserves for the burial, and in February the attendance was stated as nineteen. We sympathize deeply and prayerfully with our missionaries and the . bereaved parents and friends in this time of trial and discouragement. The children have made marked progress both in the schoolroom and in their household duties. It was arranged that three of the larger girls should go to Chicago during the exhibition.

Mistawasis Reserve Day School.

REV. A. W. LEWIS, Missionary ; MISS LAURA MACINTOSH, Teacher.

The average attendance at this school is between twenty and twenty-five. Writing at Christmas of the work in the school, Mr. Lewis says: "Our new teacher has just finished her first quarter, and the improvement in the school is greatly to her credit. The punctuality is a marked advance, and so is the order. The way in which unseemly habits are being corrected and gentle behaviour learned is a strong argument in favour of *lady* teachers." The Government Agent has repaired the school building this year. This is the oldest Indian school under the care of our Church in the North-West, the Mission on this Reserve being the outcome of Mr. Nesbit's work at Prince Albert twenty-eight years ago. The venerable chief, Mistawasis, still lives, and is a prominent figure in the Mission, being "a power on the side of Christ and good govern-

Prince Albert Day School.

MISS L. M. BAKER, Principal (on furlough); MISS ANNIE CAMERON, Teacher.

This school was established four years ago for the benefit of the children of a wandering band of Sioux who had settled opposite the town of Prince Albert, on the north bank of the Saskatchewan. Miss Baker, who has done valuable work in the interests of the Church for a number of years in this vicinity, was placed in charge. The work prospered in her hands, and this year, as her health was very much broken, the Committee, with the hope that she may be able to return to the work, has given her an extended and well-deserved furlough. The work is moving on successfully under the care of Miss Cameron.

The school is made up of children and young men. The ages of the latter range from eighteen to thirty years, and, as may be expected, they cannot attend regularly. The average attendance is from seventeen to twenty. A Sabbath school has been established, and Miss Cameron visits the old people and reads to them. Miss Baker expresses the hope that the Government may give this wandering people a grant of land, as their scattered homes and unsettled habits are great obstacles to their enlightenment.

Okanase Reserve Day School.

REV. GEO. FLETT, Missionary ; MISS M. S. McINTOSH, Teacher.

Miss McIntosh, for several months a teacher at the Crownstand, entered upon her work in the Okanase school early in the year. Soon after appointment, she wrote as follows: "Everything has been going very smoothly at school, the children are interested in their work, and the attendance has been good." Some of the simpler kindergarten occupations are used, and these please and "interest the little ones immensely." There is a very interesting and encouraging Sabbath school held in the summer months under the care of the teacher.

A few weeks ago we were favoured with a visit from Miss Mc-Intosh, who had come east for a short holiday to visit her friends in Toronto.

Our missionary teacher gave a graphic account of her work, in which she is deeply interested, presenting, in an impressive manner, the encouragements and difficulties. In the course of her address, she alluded gratefully to the kindness of Mr. and Mrs. Flett, and the good work which they had done among the Indians of this and neighbouring Reserves.

MISSIONS WHERE THERE ARE NO SCHOOLS.

Bird Tail.

REV. JOHN MCARTHUR, Missionary.

The children from this Reserve are sent to the Birtle school.

Pipestone Sioux.

MR. JOHN URQUHART, Missionary.

Probably the children from this Reserve will be sent to the Regina school.

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MR. W. J. WRIGHT, Missionary.

It is hoped that a day school may be opened here in a few months. Christmas, in all the Mission schools, is made as happy as possible under the circumstances. By innocent amusements and the bestowal of gifts and prizes, the minds of the children are led to dwell upon God's great gift to the world, our blessed Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

Referring again to the reduction of the number of pupils in some of the Boarding and Industrial schools in Reserves such as Round Lake, Lakesend, the Crowstand, etc., by drafting the older scholars into the Government Industrial school, under the control of our Church at Regina, it may be said that this arrangement was the result of a conference between the Government commissioner and the members of the North-West Committee.

The reasons for the adoption of this plan are weighty, namely : the importance of removing the older children *entirely* from the Reserve influence; the fact that the moral and spiritual surroundings and instructions are the same as in the Reserve schools; that stricter discipline can be maintained, on account of facilities for better grading; improved mechanical training, because of advantages of regularly and systematically teaching several trades and the fact that the Government grant for the Regina school is sufficiently large, per capita, to for a portion of th^{\circ} maintenance, as is now the case in all but the Regina school.

An addititional reason, which weighed with the Committee, was that a diminution of the number in the Reserve school gives increased opportunities for the missionary or teacher in charge to undertake evangelistic work among the adult Indians.

This, of course, means that smaller school buildings on one or two of the Reserves might have answered. Rev. Hugh Mackay calls at tention to this view of the case in his last report, when he states that the school building on his Reserve is not used to its fullest capacity. But, from what has been stated, it will be seen that for the older children the industrial training so necessary for their future well-being as citizens can be given to better advantage and without expense to the Church at Regina.

The grant per capita at the Regina school is fixed at \$120; if this is insufficient, more will be given.

The grants for the schools, such as Kound Lake and others, are about \$72 per capita per year. This only covers part of the expense of maintenance. The grant to day schools is \$300 per year, with an additional sum of \$12 for each pupil, over the aggregate of twenty-five We quote the following testimony to the good work of our Society from the last report of the North-West Committee :

"No report of the Committee would be complete without grateful acknowledgment of the help received from the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. The large sum of money which it raises year by year for the evangelization of heathen women and children has made possible the recent extension of our work in the way of boarding and industrial schools—a system of training which is already achieving an improvement in the morals, the manners and the intelligence of the children such as never could have been expected by means of day schools, where the teaching during the day, however good, is too often neutralized by the blighting influences to which the pupil is subject morning and evening in a pagan home."

II. CHINA.

Formosa and Honan.

Missionaries : REV. G. L. MACKAY, D.D., REV. WM. GAULD.

In this field our Society pays the salaries of the native Bible women employed and the expenses of maintenance of the Girls' School at Tamsui. This year a sum sufficient to support twenty-five Bible women is placed in our estimates.

It may be asked, why do we contribute such a comparatively small sum for women's and children's work in connection with this Mission ? To this question we reply that Canadian women are not required as missionaries, and the outlay for native help is regulated by the Foreign Mission Committee according to the needs of the field as presented by Dr. Mackay.

Dr. Mackay, Mrs. Mackay, their children and a native student are now in Canada, and no doubt new interest and zeal in this prosperous Mission will be awakened.

Honan (Chu Wang).

REV. J. GOFORTH, REV. D. MACGILLIVRAY, B.D., WM. MCCLURE, M.D., WM. MALCOLM, M.D., REV. W. H. GRANT, Missionaries.

Mrs. Goforth, Mrs. McClure and Mrs. Malcolm have sent an interesting account of the work for women and children at this station, which is under their supervision.

From it we learn that the homes of our missionaries are always open to visitors, of whom there are a goodly number, especially at the three annual fairs; and who can calculate the good influences of a Christian home on the dark hearts of these heathen women, whose home life is often so unhappy?

The hospital work is most encouraging. This was introduced during a visit of Miss McIntosh and Miss Graham to Chu Wang. A Chinese man was persuaded to bring his wife to be treated by the lady doctor. Now both she and her husband are on probation as inquirers desiring baptism. There are at present a number of in-patients, and as these remain some time for treatment, regular opportunities for giving instruction are found.

A Bible class is held by Mrs. McClure on the Lord's Day, and is attended by several, among others Mrs. Wang, the wife of the teacher baptized last year. Mrs. Wang is an inquirer on probation. A week day service is held regularly at the home of this native woman.

In December of '92 Mrs. McClure opened a day school for boys. At first only three or four came, and these very irregularly. Now there are six regularly present. Last November Mrs. Goforth commenced a small Sabbath school,

Last November Mrs. Goforth commenced a small Sabbath school, which is now attended by others as well as by all the day school scholars. The answers given to questions asked on religious subjects display ledge. at which Mrs already Mrs. indeed, 1 asked for

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display a remarkable amount of intelligence as well as Bible know-Daily morning worship is held with the women in the Hospital, at which others connected with the Mission are present.

Mrs. Malcolm is industriously studying the language and has already proved herself an earnest helper.

Mrs. Goforth's little son, Paul, continues very delicate in health ; indeed, his life often trembles, as it were, in the balance. Prayer is asked for him and for the work of this Mission.

From Miss McIntosh's statement for the year we get a glimpse of the beginnings of what we trust may prove a blessed work among the women at this station.

Women from the vicinity and even from the more distant villages visit the Missionary Compound with frequency. At these visits they hear of Christ, and there seems to be a kindly feeling springing up in their hearts towards the missionaries. Miss McIntosh and Dr. Graham have spent the entire year at the station, with the exception of four months, when on account of sickness they were called to Chu Wang and Lin Ching.

Village Work .- Ho-tas, the home of the "Chows," has been visited twice, when many heard the Gospel for the first time. Another village within walking distance has been visited six times, also two other villages at intervals.

Medical Work .- Dr. Graham, though devoting much of her time to the study of the language, has treated a few special cases. Mrs. Wang, from the Yellow River District, came daily for treatment and instruction for a month or more. When she left she could repeat the Ten Commandments, the Lord's Prayer, the hymn "Jesus Loves Me," and a grace before meat. Several others came from this district and remained for some time. Since then a native helper has visited them in their homes, and in the spring they will be visited again.

Personal Work .- Mrs. Chow and her daughter-in-law from Ho-tas spent several weeks at the Mission, studying the Bible and the Catechism. They have now a good knowledge of the way of salvation, and will probably be baptized at no distant date.

Chinese worship is held every morning, conducted by the ladies in turn, when patients and others in the compound are expected to be

Bible Class.-The attendance at the Sabbath afternoon class has been good. Some eight or ten are generally present ; two of these have been coming more than a year.

The Christain Bible woman, Mrs. Wee, is a very great assistance to the work. She visits the women, who go to the Bible class, in their homes and gives instruction whenever and wherever there is an opening. Mr. and Mrs. MacVicar are at present in Canada for the benefit of

In this field the work is steadily expanding, and, though there is much to discourage, the regular and faithful efforts of our missionaries are meeting with a measure of success. As evidence of the expansion of the work, it may be noted that the company of Canadian Presbyterian missionaries sent this year to India was the largest in the history of the Mission. The party numbered nine, and included the names of Rev. W. A. and Mrs. Wilson, who were returning from furlough. Dr. C. R. and Mrs. Wood, Rev. F. H. Russell, Miss Butler and the three ladies sent by our Society, Miss White, Miss Grier and Miss Dougan.

Soon after the arrival of these friends in India, Miss Butler was united in marriage to Rev. W. J. Jamieson.

Dr. Marion Oliver and Miss Elizabeth McWilliams are at home this year—the former enjoying a time of rest from her labours in a foreign land, the latter on account of failing health. This, however, has not been ay ear of rest for Dr. Oliver ; coming home has been to her simply a change of employment, as, since her return, she has journeyed hundreds of miles and given scores of addresses to Presbyterial Societies, Auxiliaries and Mission Bands, in the interests of Missions.

The breaking down of Miss McWilliams and her consequent return is a matter of very deep regret, but, recently, there is a marked improvement in her general health, and hopes of her recovery are entertained. As strength would permit, Miss McWilliams has also visited societies and spoken of the needs of India.

Mr. and Mrs. Wilkie and Mr. and Mrs. Campbell are expected to return to Canada shortly—the former for a short season of rest, on account of Mr. Wilkie's health, and Mr. and Mrs. Campbell on the usual furlough.

Several applications for service in the field in Central India have been received this year, but various circumstances have, so far, prevented the appointment of any. As zenana workers and teachers are specially required, now, in connection with woman's work in our Indian Mission, may we be very earnest in praying the Lord of the harvest to send forth labourers into His harvest.

Medical Mission Work.

Our Society supports lady physicians in Indore, Mhow and Neemuch. At Ujjain, Medical Mission work for women is carried on under the supervision of Mrs. Buchanan, who is a physician.

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and Ceylon, assisted in tions and di to the study leave the fid with the assist names on the branches are of the childer the school renection with of a Sunday medical assist Indore.—The work here, in the Canadian Woman's Hospital and the Dispensary, has, this year, in the absence of Dr. Oliver, been in charge of Dr. Margaret O'Hara, assisted by Dr. Agnes Turnbull.

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Dr. O'Hara is very happy in her work and has been blessed with perfect health. The opening sentence of her report gives cause for sincere gratitude. "The medical work," she says, "has gone on without interruption during the year, and for perfect health and perfect enjoyment in the work, I must acknowledge the good hand of my God

The number of patients treated *in* the Hospital this year has been 224; of this number, 26 were Brahmins; 33 Christians; 17 Bairians; 47 Mohammedans; 1 Parsee; and the remainder, other caste Hindus.

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Those who are in a position to pay for treatment and medicines are expected to do so, and the amounts thus received are given to the Treasurer of the Mission Council.

The assistants are the same as last year, with the addition of a matron, a native Christian widow, who is an efficient helper, being able to take the morning and evening services in the Hospital, besides conducting the Sunday morning S.S. She is from the Free Church of Scotland Mission, and had received her medical training in a govern-

The S.S. has had an average attendance of 40. An interesting Bible Class for young men is also held. Jane and Rebecca have assisted Dr. O'Hara in giving daily instruction to the many women in the hospital. An interesting incident is mentioned of a woman brought by her husband from a distant village for treatment. As the case was serious, they remained some time, seemed impressed with the teaching given, and when they left, took with them a New Testament and of Hettebai, and the attendance was better than the teach of the teach

of Hettebai, and the attendance was better than that of last year. During Dr. O'Hara's absence for rest and change in South India and Ceylon, Dr. Turnbull had entire charge of the hospital. She has assisted in the dispensary work during the year and with operations and difficult cases. Much of Dr. Turnbull's time has been given to the study of the language, but when Miss McWilliams was obliged to leave the field, she took up her school work among high caste girls, with the assistance of two native Christian women. The number of names on the roll is 54; the daily average is 30. The simple English branches are taught, and much attention is given daily to the instruction of the children in the Word of God. Several married women come to the school regularly, and seem anxious to be taught. The S.S. in connection with this school is prosperous. Dr. Turnbull also takes charge of a Sunday afternoon Bible class in the hospital, composed of the medical assistants speaking English. A zenana worker is specially Neemuch.—The medical work at this station is promising. In June, Dr. Margaret McKellar opened a second dispensary in the camp, and the attendance has been good. When the work began a year ago, the largest daily attendance of patients was 7, now the highest number receiving treatment in one day in the two dispensaries was 143. One dispensary is open from 9 o'clock to 12 a.m., the other from 3 o'clock to 6 p.m. The number treated in the city dispensary has decreased somewhat since the opening of the second in the camp. A few in-patients are accommodated in the spaces around the court of the city dispensary.

This year Dr. McKellar expected to commence medical work in Mandsaur, a city between Neemuch and Rutlam, but it was found impossible to obtain a building.

For a large portion of the year two Bible women have been employed, their work being to hold Gospel services in the waiting rooms before the dispensaries opened and with those in waiting. They have also undertaken zenana visiting. A young Christian girl assists in the work, and recently a Christian widow from the Cama hospital, Bombay, who has had three years' practical experience in one of Lady Dufferin's hospitals, has been employed; the other two helpers are heathen. A short prayer meeting is held daily at the close of the work, with the assistants, when God's blessing is sought upon what has been done in His name.

In connection with this work there is a fully organized band of Bible women, whose duty it is to follow up the instruction given at the dispensary. These women present a written report weekly of their work, including statistics as to districts and homes visited, and number of women, children and men present at services. The course of Biblical studies for the use of the Bible women is so arranged that the Gospel s in the co worker i Dr.

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Gospel story in its completeness is brought before the regular hearers in the course of the year. The average number of visits made by each worker is 20 per week.

Dr. Fraser has been aided in the village work by Gungabai, a native Christain woman, who has been in training a year and a half. Regular medical work has been opened up in Bowaha, a large native city, Miss Louis, an English woman, and Francesbai being in charge. The attendance at the dispensary there is from 8 to 17 daily, though the work has been established only a few weeks. Dr. Fraser calls attention to the need of a hospital and dispensary building at Mhow and the difficulty in securing trained assistants.

Educational and Zenana Work.

Indore.—In writing of the Christian Girls' Boarding School, Miss Sinclair says:—"The past year has been the busiest I have had in India, and if known results were proportionate to labor expended, I would be able to give you a bright report." Meanwhile there is much to encourage, and the prospects for the future are very hopeful. There are now 27 boarders, four having been removed during the year; it is pleasing to note, that one of the four was married to a Christian in Neemuch, and has since been assisting Miss Jamieson in her school. Promotion examinations were held in December for the third and fourth grades. Out of twelve who tried, six were passed. Two of the larger girls have during the year united with the church, and at the Indore Sunday schools' examination several of the girls answered the questions proposed by the Committee very creditably. The amount received during the year as fees was, R565 13a.

In the Marathi girls' school, under Miss Sinclair's supervision, good work has been done by the head mistress, Renobai, who is a Christian. The school has not been closed, except for the most important Hindu holidays. The average attendance has been 64, the names on the roll numbering 100. In all 70 children have been promoted to higher grades during the year. The children now gladly buy their own books, and many of them bring their own slates and pencils as well. The Sunday school is very interesting and well attended. The girls who can sew well have been taught wool work, and this year, at the prize distribution, exhibited some very nice work. Inclosing her report Miss Sinclair writes :—I am very glad Miss Dougan is studying Marathi with a view to taking charge of this school. They are delightful children, and the school, together with the zenana work that will grow out of it, will supply plenty of work.

Mhow. -Miss Ross speaks gratefully of the comfort enjoyed in her work, and the very great advantage the new school building has been to her bazaar girls' school. The parents of the children who attend this school are very poor and the difficulties are many. Frequently an elder sister cannot go unless she takes with her the baby of the household, as the mother is busy helping to earn the food of the family ; then the little ones often go to school hungry and this is not favourable to mental effort. But in spite of these and other hindrances the number of scholars, especially of Hindoos and Mohammedans, has been increasing steadily. Last year, including the English, Eurasian, Portuguese and Parsee children, the averages per quarter were 60, 76, 104, 130. This year, excluding what is called the English division, the averages were 80, 75, 90, 135. the year with an attendance of from 20 to 50. Many of the heathen women seem untouched, but the Christian women are evidently growing in grace and knowledge. Two Bible women are employed in Miss Ross' work, one in Mhow,

the second in Borwaha. They read and explain portions of Scripture in the homes visited; 795 of these visits have been made in eight months. A few women in Mhow are taught to read in their homes, and many visits ave been made in zenanas by Miss Ross.

Miss Calder writes that much of her time this year has necessarily been given to the language, which she has not found as difficult as she expected. For the past few months she has had charge of the Pension-pura school, which we learn from Miss Ross is increasing both in attendance and interest, special attention being given by the children to the Bible lesson.

Encouraging meetings for women are held on Saturday mornings in the school building, as well as other meetings in different places, and some, Miss Calder says, seem anxious to hear the "old, old story."

Neemuch. —Miss Jamieson is very greatly encouraged in her work on account of the promise of two new school buildings which are to be erected as soon as possible.

The Chamar school, under her supervision, is still far from what it might be, or will be when there is a comfortable room in which to meet. The parents are very poor and their homes uninviting, and a pleasant school-room will be a great attraction to the little ones.

Those who have attended regularly have made fair progress; several having studied the history of the life of Christ in the New Testament, are now taking up Old Testament subjects. A well attended evening service for women is held occasionally in the courtyard.

The high caste girls' school has this year suffered materially by the marriages of many of the older girls. Here, too, good work has been done and the intelligent grasp of religious subjects by the children is surprising. Two married women have attended.

Some months ago a school for girls was opened in the city of Mandsaur. This school is taught, under the care of Miss Jamieson, by a Christian woman, with about 40 names on the roll.

A Bible class for Christian women and girls is held every Sunday afternoon and has resulted in blessing.

Considerable attention is given to zenana visitation, two Bible women being engaged for this special work. The results have been cheering.

Village work, to some extent, has also been undertaken.

Miss Duncan writes that, though busy with the acquiring of the language, this has been in other ways a year of preparation for future service. Through the aid of an intelligent young native .Christian woman, she has learned to use the language in speaking to some extent, and has for some time taken charge of the school and zenana work in the Camp bazaar, the needy district where Dr. McKellar carries on her medical work. The average attendance of girls at the school has been 35, and good progress was made, as some are reading in the Fourth book. The school is divided into three classes for the daily Bible lesson, each class receiving half an hour's instruction. The life of Christ and His work is ever a new and interesting study. On Friday repeatin A S Since work, ar assisting doors " in Clas ed part o

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A Sabbath school service is held for an hour on Sunday morning. Since November a Bible woman has been engaged for zenana work, and in that time over 600 visits have been made, Miss Duncan assisting in this work as opportunity offers. Many are the "open doors" into homes which they have not time to enter.

Classes for the teaching of the women in the compound were conducted part of the year, some men attending as well. These have been discontinued, and, instead, the women bring their children to the Bungalow on Sunday afternoon, and are taught Bible truths and to sing hymns.

Our missionaries in their reports speak hopefully of the future, and earnestly ask the prayers of God's people in the home land. The large increase in the staff of native Christian helpers is significant and

From their letters we learn that Miss White, Miss Grier and Miss Dougan are well, and have each entered upon the special line of study required for her appointed work, with commendable zeal, and we pray that God who can enrich them in all utterance and in all knowledge will be with them in this time of preparation.

The practical interest of our Society in the mission school work in Trinidad and the New Hebrides has been continued, and we have pleasure in thanking Miss Blackaddar for her kind letters, which have kept us in some measure informed of the educational work in Trinidad. We have greatly missed Mrs. Morton's bright and interesting letter this year, and earnestly hope that next year she may be able to favour us as in the past. From Mrs. Annand, Santo, New Hebrides, we learn that during their absence on furlough, in Australia, the Sabbath services were well kept up, Bomoli, a lad of fourteen, assisting in this good work.

We deeply sympathize with Rev. W. J. Mackenzie in the bereavement he has sustained this year in the "going home" of Mrs. Mackenzie. Words are powerless to give comfort in times of great affliction and loss like this, but the knowledge that the children of God in other lands are bearing up the afflicted one in the arms of Christian love and earnest prayer must assuredly give comfort and courage.

Again with gratitude we refer to the great encouragement in our work given us from time to time by the members of the Foreign Mission Committee and the North-West Committee, and their kindness in assisting us with wise counsel on various occasions.

In this record there is much that calls for thanksgiving, and again much that should lead to humble and thoughtful self-examination. We praise Him who by His blessed Spirit first prompted this great movement, for the loving service, the self-denial, the patience and the prayer given to the cause of missions by the women of the home land. We praise Him for the untiring labours, the devotion and the faithfulness of the workers in Foreign fields. But when we hear of "open doors" which cannot be entered, when we see our missionaries breaking down from overwork, as we listen to the call for more helpers, we humbly acknowledge the feebleness and the inadequacy of our efforts.

May the time speedily come when, in reference to the evangelization of the world, it may truthfully be said of every Presbyterian woman —"She hath done what she could." L. J. HARVIE,

HOME SECRETARY'S REPORT,

In some respects we cannot report the advance of previous year in the Home Department of our work, but faithfulness and activity, self-denial and devotion have, on the whole, characterized the efforts of our members. No large gifts reached our treasury, but there has been growth in systematic offering and ordinary giving. The envelope system has been more generally adopted, and many of the reports emphasize the fact that their funds were raised wholly by voluntary giving.

Business depression throughout the country told in some measure upon our work, but not to the extent our weak faith led us to fear. One Secretary writes: "It has been a hard year, especially in the farming districts, yet the money seems to have come in so willingly." From another we learn that, "on account of the depression in commercial circles, many left the city, consequently our society suffered both as regards numbers and means." Auxiliaries and Bands in the larger cities seem to have suffered most, but, notwithstanding difficulty and loss, the careful gathering of small sums by the "willing hearted" has resulted in a total greater than that of any previous year.

report many items of interest which speak for themselves. The officers, as in the past, have done faithful service, visiting and encouraging the workers within their bounds. To their kind and judicious oversight much of the success of our work is due. Several of our experienced officers have, through force of circumstances, been constrained to give up Presbyterial duties for the present. We very much regret the loss of these efficient helpers, but feel sure they will still take an interest in and aid the work as opportunity offers. While regretting the loss of these tried and valued officers we extend a cordial welcome to those who have undertaken to till the vacancies, and congratulate them on having been called to such honourable position in the Master's service. A little more than a year ago it was our privilege to welcome to our ranks an Auxiliary from outside our own denomination—the "Farringdon," Brantford. In a few, however, we find the disheartening words: "We have disbanded for the present." Varied reasons are given, and sometimes the words are accompanied by a small remittance, which, past experience leads us to fear, will prove the dying effort of discouraged ones. We know that many of our workers have great difficulties in their way, and with all such we truly sympathize; but we would most earnestly urge them not to disband without at least making known their difficulties to Presbyterial or Home Secretary. In not a few instances where this has been done the suggestions received have encouraged them to continued and successful service. Should the difficulties prove insurmountable hindrances to meeting as an Auxiliary, there is still the possibility of keeping in touch with the work as "Scattered Helpers."

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Only those who have passed through the experience can have any idea of the discouragement it is to learn from the reports, for the first time, that one and another of the Auxiliaries and Bands have dropped from the ranks. Another discouraging feature is the failure on the part of not a few Secretaries to send in any reports. Often a good contribution is sent to the Treasurer, but no word comes concerning the general work of the Auxiliary or Band. In some cases even the names of the officers are not given. We feel sure this neglect is not intentional, but all the same it adds very materially to the duties of those expected to report for Presbyterial or General Society.

We very much regret the loss of several Auxiliaries. One small band of brave workers lost nearly all its members through removals, and feels that at present the meetings cannot be continued. A struggling Auxiliary in the North-West has engaged in Home Missions, hoping in that way to better its own condition. A few seem to have given up from "lack of interest," and others because of difficulties which they found impossible to overcome.

Many of our workers have been inspired to renewed zeal through the thoughtful words of our missionaries. Although here for rest they have given themselves unsparingly, and the reports speak of the advantage it has been to hear from those who have practical knowledge of the foreign fields.

Excellent work has been done in most of our isolated Auxiliaries. "Ormstown"—always so faithful—heads the list. Those in Quebec, North-West and British Columbia give evidence of continued interest and earnest effort. The "Purab ka Tara," Indore, reports most interestingly of their meetings and of the work of their Bible-woman, who, since her appointment, has had entrance to twenty-five houses. "A monthly average of one hundred and eighty-five of our heathen sisters hear the story of our Saviour's love through her." Our faithful helpers in the "Beulah Reserve" Auxiliary continue to manifest selfdenying devotion in the Master's service. Their report, which appears in the Brandon Presbyterial abstracts, is full of interest.

"Scattered Helpers" have materially aided the work, but are not yet so fully reported as they should be. In some cases the amount contributed is stated without giving the number of Helpers; in other instances the number is given without the amount. "Richmond Church" Scattered Helpers are still working and have contributed liberally. Muscowpetung, no longer an Auxiliary, has those who still remember the work and generously aid it by their gifts.

MISSION BANDS

do not report the advance hoped for. In several of the Presbyterial Societies the membership has decreased. A number of the Bands have ceased to work. One withdrew to engage in Home Missions and another merged into the Christian Endeavour Society. Two or three Bands seem to have misunderstood the constitution of our Society, for, while nominally auxiliary to it, they have devoted their funds to outside objects. These are some of the discouraging features that appear in the reports, but we are glad to find in them much that is bright and hopeful. Many of the young people have been very faithful and brave, and have in large measure made up for the loss sustained in the failure of those already referred to.

Some of the senior Bands graduated into the Auxiliaries; in this way the number of Bands decreased, but the workers are not lost. Several Bands report that they have been encouraged and strengthened through the interest taken in them by their Auxiliaries. Many pleasing incidents are told of the children's self-denial and of their methods of work, showing that they are being trained to the true spirit of giving.

For watchful oversight of this work among our young people we must look to those in Presbyterial and local Societies who come in close contact with it. No part of our work needs more careful attention.

The appointment of a Mission Band Secretary in each Presbyterial, or at least in the larger ones, was recommended last year. The suggestion does not seem to have been carried out. We therefore again urge the desirability of having such an officer for the special work of supervising and fostering the Mission Bands. In these days of over much "organization" we need to see to it that our young people are encouraged to be faithful to this work which has an especial claim upon their interest and help.

Auxiliary and Mission Band "Records" have been more generally used. One Presbyterial Secretary writes that "they appear to be well liked," and another, that "There was an improvement in the 'Records' returned this year, when they fail it just proves how much such a thing was required." From some we learn that there is still much room for improvement, and it is hoped that each Secretary will in future carefully enter the items as directed. If the printed instructions are followed there need be no mistake in reporting, and the labours of Presbyterial Secretaries would be greatly lightened.

PRAYER.

We are glad to note that thank-offerings were held in nearly all of our Auxiliaries and in not a few of the Bands. Many of these meetings were truly "times of refreshing from the Lord."

Only a few Auxiliaries report meeting for special prayer Those who did, testify that they were strengthened, and we doubt not that the work and workers at home and abroad received special blessing through the prayers then offered. We know that our heavenly Father honours the prayer of faith and has revealed it to be His will that He should be enquired of concerning the things of His kingdom. It is our blessed privilege to ask of Him who has "all power in heaven and on earth," and there is much need that we be earnest and constant in the use of this privilege. Many of our strugg missionari constantly take an in to the thr the littlen many unay

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our struggling Auxiliaries ask for an interest in our prayers. Our missionaries frequently make the same request. In our reports we constantly meet the mournful refrain "so few in our congregation take an interest in this work." Have we not been slack in coming to the throne of grace on their behalf? May it not be because of the littleness of our faith that there are still in our congregations so many unawakened to their responsibility and opportunities.

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The record of our 18th year is closed. We rejoice in the progress made and in the measure of success granted, and ascribe all the glory to Him who so graciously led and prospered us. Our glance at the things that are behind has, we trust, been profitable to us, but we may not linger with the past, its opportunities are forever beyond our grasp. Let our aim be now to "press forward in humble trust and confidence to do what in us lies to win 'the world for Christ.'"

REPORT OF SUPPLIES TO MISSIONS.

"A circular appealing for clothing for Indian women and children in the North-West was sent to our Auxiliaries in October, 1884, which was heartily responded to by many of them from the extreme east to west to the extent of not less than two thousand dollars (\$2,000) in value." This is the opening sentence of the first Supply Report of the W.F.M.S. If the record of this branch of our work for the past ten years could be fully given, we would find that it has been a very important factor in the successful work carried on by our missionaries among the North-West Indians. Indeed they have repeatedly said that without the assistance thus given they could not carry on the work. The severity of the climate and the difficulty of finding employment suitable to Indian capacity, and we might add also their disinclination to manual labour, have compelled our missionaries to supply to some extent the necessary clothing. But the Board have felt for some time that there is great danger in thus relieving the Indians of all responsibility in the matter of providing clothing for themselves and their families, and have for the last few years requested the missionaries and teachers to give the clothing only to children and the old and feeble; and if any remained after the wants of these were supplied, able-bodied men and women should be permitted to buy what they required, paying for it either in labour or supplies for the Mission. It has been felt latterly that this arrangement is not entirely satisfactory ; owing, however, to distance from the Reserves and lack of knowledge from personal observation, the Board did not feel themselves in a position to decide what steps should be taken to put this matter on a more satisfactory basis. It was decided therefore to communicate with the North-West F. M. Committee, and the following is an extract from the reply received : "Our Committee have been much concerned lately about the growing practice of selling clothing sent from the East to able-bodied Indians in return for work. As you are aware when the policy of sending clothing to the Indian Reserves was begun, the clothing was intended for free distribution to relieve the suffering of infants on the one hand and the sick and aged on the other; and also to provide for the needs of school children. What was attempted at first was nothing but free distri-bution. When, however, by the generosity of the W.F.M.S. the gifts increased, there was more than was needed for the classes as above indicated, and the missionary welcomed the increase as a means of securing the good-will of the Indians who had hitherto held aloof. It soon became apparent that the indiscriminate giving of clothing to able bodied men and women had a demoralizing effect; thereupon the system of requiring some service in return was inaugurated. With the increase of the annual bales the distribution of this clothing has become a work of such magnitude as to absorb a very considerable portion of the missionaries' time in the months of early winter, partly in bargaining with the Indians and allocating the clothing and partly in superintending the work which the

The writer adds : "I am decidedly of opinion that the bales of clothing which have been sent have been an untold blessing to the Indians and a great help to the missionaries, both as a tangible proof of the sympathy of friends in the East, and as a means of commending the gospel to the heathen, but it is evident that this good work may be overdone." In view of the above opinion the Board decided to ask our Societies to send a smaller amount of clothing for adults, and also that greater care be exercised in re-packing in order that only such articles as will be useful be forwarded. In a report received from one of our teachers this year, it was stated that a number of short, tightfitting jackets had been sent which were absolutely useless for Indian women and girls, and asking permission to use them for some needy white people, which request was granted

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some needy white people, which request was granted. The amount paid for freight by the different societies for the past year was over seven hundred dollars (\$700), which, with the sums expended in the purchase of new material, is a heavy drain upon the money at the disposal of our members ; consequently every cent paid for useless freight is so much taken from what might be used for direct missionary work.

Our Societies responded loyally to the allotment made by the Board, and thirty-two thousand (32,000) pounds of warm clothing, quilts, blankets, etc., have been sent to the different schools and Reserves, all of which have been liberally supplied. One of our Presbyterial Societies prepared outfits for the children in one of our schools, the missionary sending the exact measurements. This was found to be very satisfactory and a great help to those in charge. The Ottawa Presbyterial Society sent a large supply of useful gifts and prizes for the children in the schools in Central India.

Chalmers' Church, Quebec, have again sent a valuable box to Mrs. Morton, Trinidad; but owing to Mrs. Morton's absence in England, on account of ill health, we have no acknowledgment of its arrival. Ormiston Auxiliary sent a box to Crowstand Reserve, and Howick Auxiliary one to Mis-ta-wa-sis. Our friends in the eastern Provinces have again been very liberal in the supplies sent to the different Reserves, and we thank them most heartily for their assistance. The usual supply from Salt Springs, N.S., was sent to Birtle from St. Stephen and St. John, N.B., to Regina, and from Fredericton, N.B., to Alberni. Two boxes were also sent from New Westminster, B.C., to Alberni, which, Miss Johnston writes, were filled with clothing for old and young, all nicely mended. I could not help saying, she adds : "God bless the women who looked over the things before they were sent." Cavendish and Kensington, P.E.I., sent clothing to Regina, and New London, P.E.I., to Birtle. Carman and Petral Societies (Man.) have also sent contributions, and other Societies in the North-West may have sent clothing of which the Board has received no report. We trust that all who have taken part in this work have indeed found it " more blessed to give than to receive." "Blessed is he that considereth the poor; the Lord will deliver him in time of trouble."

PUBLICATION REPORT

In recording the work of another year, we have as usual to report progress.

The promise made in our last Annual Report to enlarge the Leaflet to 28 pages has been carried out. Owing to this enlargement \$130.66 more has been spent upon it. We feel sure no one has felt that they have had too many letters from our missionaries, or received too much information regarding the work of the Board. This year closes the tenth year of the Letter Leaflet. Issues began in May, 1884, with a circulation of 150 per month. Before the end of the first year it had increased to 300. It will be remembered that for a time the Leaflet was sent free to the Presidents and Secretaries of Auxiliaries and Mission Bands.

I am indebted to our late Home Secretary, Mrs. Campbell, for the way in which the *Leaflet* was distributed during the first year. "Fiftythree were sent to Presidents and Secretaries of Auxiliaries and Mission Bands, 79 to Presbyterial Societies, 26 to members of the Board, 15 to sister societies, 20 to Halifax. Our missionaries also had the *Leaflet* sent to them" in 1884.

At such a period in our history, we naturally call to mind those members of our Board who were the first promoters of our *Leaflet*, begun, we doubt not, with earnest prayer for their undertaking and not a little anxiety regarding the success of the work. They are to-day reaping the reward of their well-directed judgment. Our President, late Home Secretary, and those associated with them have cause to rejoice that what was begun on such a small scale has, under God, proved such a help in building up the work of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society.

Faces are missed around our Board to-day who had much to do in the planning and carrying out of the work. But so long as our *Leaftet* is in circulation it will ever be a monument to their well-directed zeal and interest in the work.

We close the tenth year of our circulation with a list of 12,115 subscribers. Since 1890 there has been paid to the Treasurer of the General Society \$1,786.57 to help: orward the work of the Society With our large list of subscribers, we still miss the names of quite a few of our Auxiliaries and Mission Bands. Why should this be so?

We have, during the year, received from sales of *Letter Leaflets* \$1,392.90, and after meeting all expenses have handed to General Treasurer \$311. This, along with the extra \$130.66 spent on the enlargement of the *Leaflet*, show that we are still progressing.

We have only one plea to make for our *Leaflet*-the plea of interest in our missionaries and in the work of our Society.

To Miss Ferrier and our Band of Young Lady Helpers we are grateful; their reward for loving service the Master will not overlook. With feel encou our Lord accept wh cause.

With the success of our work for the past ten years we cannot but feel encouraged. Yet humbly would we lay our services at the feet of our Lord and Master, asking Him to overlook all imperfections and to accept what, in His sight, has been done from love to Him and His cause.

LITERATURE.

The interest in this department is still on the increase. We have sent out 20,248 more than last year, the total for the year being 69,962. We are glad to report more envelopes in use. Mite boxes have also increased. Our Thank-offering Leaflet and envelopes were largely in excess of last year. Twelve thousand Leaflets and 17,131 envelopes were ordered and sent to our Auxiliaries and Mission Bands. The Thank-offering meeting is now felt to be one of the most hopeful meetings of the year. Many more of our Auxiliaries are now adopting them. We have received from sales of literature \$333.55, and after meeting all expenses have a surplus of \$41.41. This, along with the \$311.00 from the Letter Leaflet, making in all \$352.41, we have handed to the General Treasurer. It will be noticed that the free distribution is large this year, but not more than the Literature Fund is able to meet.

Now that the work of the Publication Department has increased to such an extent, we think we are justified in asking from our subscribers a little attention to a few small matters of detail that would materially help to lighten the work of your Secretary.

The first is, in ordering your supplies always send the money with the order. This will save a large amount of book-keeping and postage, as well as time in sending out accounts. Don't hurry your Secretary too much as regards time. So many write at the last moment, and wish their parcel to be in time for their meeting, which is to be held the following day. A number of these small matters help to swell the work, and we feel sure we have only to name them to have them We would draw attention to our table of literature. On it rectified. will be found a Leaflet on the "Origin and Work of the W. F. M. S.," also rules to guide our presidents in conducting meetings. We have printed for the Annual Meeting six new Leaflets. We have also sample coples of the maps of Trinidad and New Hebrides, newly published by the F. M. S. of the Eastern Division; a pamphlet on our Indian Missions, by the Rev. Dr. McLaren ; one on Foreign Missions, by Rev. R. P. Mackay, Foreign Secretary ; the Report of the Missionary Conference held in Chicago. All these are worthy of careful study. We trust all will visit the table and show the interest they take in this part of the work.

This Society numbers twenty-four Auxiliaries and two Mission Bands, most of which have been visited during the year by the President, or one of the Vice-Presidents.

At our last annual meeting it was decided to change the date from March till June, in the hope of having a larger representation from the different branches. As each Auxiliary closes its year in December, this change will make no difference in sending our annual report to General Society.

There are many encouraging features in our year's work, though a tone of despondency is noted in some cases. Two Auxiliaries that had given up their meetings have re-organized, and are doing well. Two new Auxiliaries, McDonald and Burnside, are added to our number, and are likely to become prosperous Societies.

As usual, during the wintar months, several of the country Auxiliaries have been obliged to discontinue their meetings, but expect to resume them in early spring.

There seems to be a general desire for more systematic and thorough study of our mission fields, to this end the *Letter Leaflet* is well circulated, and additional literature and missionary maps procured.

We regret that our contribution is smaller than last year, but this does not mean less interest in our work. In this connection, one Secretary writes: "This year shows a decrease in numbers and contributons, but I am sure we have made great progress otherwise;" another says, "our smaller contribution does not mean a lack of interest, for much selfdenial and sacrifice has been practised in order to reach even the amount forwarded." Similar testimony is given in these words : "Though the amount of money we are able to send is less than last year, yet the strigency was greater, and the smaller amount represents, perhaps, greater self-denial and interest in the Master's cause." In presenting our ninth annual report, we do it with thankfulness. Though we have no advance in funds or membership, God has kept us, and death has caused no such blanks as recorded in some past years. Two of our newly organized Auxiliaries have been transferred to Saugeen Presbyterial Society. In two senior Mission Bands, the membership was so greatly diminished by marriage and removals, that the remainder united with their Auxiliaries. One juvenile Band, in a country place, without a minister, melted away so much, it was better to disband, and a fourth suffered so much from removals and sickness, that meetings have been dropped meanwhile. A juvenile Band has been added in Glenallan.

From various causes some of the societies show smaller numbers and giving, others have considerably increased in both.

As a rule, the Auxiliary and Mission Band report sheets sent in havebeen so meagre and without details, that it is difficult to get any knowledge of them or their ways of working. In many cases, only figures and names, with, perhaps, opposite two or three dates, "very interesting," and nothing more. The total giving of the Presbyterial Society is less this year. In one or two past years there were some large special donations and more new life memberships.

Fifteen hundred pounds of clothing and material were sent to Birtle School. All the societies did not contribute, but with what was sent from other sources, Miss McLaren had plenty.

It is with much pleasure and thankfulness that we present the eleventh annual report of this Society, and we would gratefully acknowledge God's goodness to us during the year.

As all congregations in our Presbytery, except one, have Auxiliaries or Mission Bands, we cannot be expected to report any great increase. Our numbers must now be kept up and increased by effort within our several Auxiliaries and Bands. However, we have been strengthened by the addition of one new Band, "Eganville," and the "New Gla-gow" Band was re-organized. We regret the loss of two Bands, "Perth," which has taken up the Home Mission work, and "St. Paul's," Smith Falls, which has merged into the Christian Endeavour. It is with thankful hearts that we present our tenth annual report, rejoicing that the past year has been the most successful of our existence.

One Mission Band has been added this year from the Mission Sabbath School of Park Avenue Church, London. It is called "The Columbia." We have now thirty-nine societies in all.

The value of clothing sent to the North-West was \$1,170.28, and the weight 2,400 lbs. Full rates were charged this year. Thus the expense of repacking in strong boxes and freightage amounted to \$62.00. Our societies responded generously to the taxation to make up this amount, shewing their appreciation of the hard and often unpleasant work done by the Secretary of Supplies.

Our money contribution is only about \$60.00 less than in 1889, when we had a legacy of \$500.00 left to one of our Mission Bands. Over \$55.00 were paid for *Letter Leaflets*.

The Thanksgiving service has been universal in all our societies, and the offerings generous. Our library is a great help to those who read the well-selected books. One volume was added during the year, donated by Mrs. McMillan of Thamesford.

We have cause for heartfelt regret that Mrs. Ball and Mrs. Roger have removed from our Presbytery. We will miss them sorely, and can scarcely imagine how we can go on without these two ladies, who have cheered and encouraged us during the past ten years.

The reports from the Auxiliaries and Bands, in nearly every case, speak of continued interest in the work, and a great many tell of the increased number among their members who are willing to take part in the meetings. We are sorry to report a falling off in the membership of the Mission Bands, which report 160 fewer members than last year. There are at present seventy-seven societies in the Presbytery — fifty-two Auxiliaries and twenty-five Mission Bands. We feel cheered and encouraged by the fact that five new Auxiliaries have been organized during the past year. No new bands have been formed, and several changes have taken place in the existing ones.

Our Society comprises fifteen Auxiliaries and four Mission Bands. One life member this year, a little maid of three summers; one Auxiliary and one Mission Band have been added. To our contribution should be added \$37.05 belonging to St. Andrew's Auxiliary, Winnipeg, but which is unfortunately locked up in the Commercial Bank failure. The Ladies' Aid Society, Swan Lake, contributed \$5.

Though the amount sent General Treasurer is less than last year, we are not discouraged, considering the present financial depression.

During the year we lost by removal an earnest helpful officer, Mrs. Herbert Crowe, and most of our Auxiliaries are mourning the loss of members by removal. One has gone to Colorado, and in a small town there has influenced the women to heed Christ's last command, and they are enlisted under a missionary society to obey. Another has organized two Bands—one for young women, the other for children, and our sister Society, Brandon, is receiving the benefit of her labours. Is it not a grand work to enlist the young in Christ's army? Some one has truly said : "Be careless if you will in old age, or even on the brink of the grave; but it is the supremest folly, almost the unpardonable sin, to be thoughtless in the golden hours of youth." And these child workers ; can we doubt but that they will be found in the ranks for Christ when they reach manhood aad womanhood? We doubt not but they will be on the roll-call of honor on that great day of final victory. The little one faithful in the little deed is God's hero. "Act well your part, there all the honour lies."

Two of our Auxiliaries are mourning the loss of loved workers by death. Early in the year Keewatin Auxiliary lost its dear President, Mrs. McLeod, and since then the work there has been inactive. South Plympton lost its first Secretary, Mrs. J. Robertson.

There are many discouraging, and many bright, hopeful testimonies from the different Societies, filling our hearts with thankfulness that God has so abundantly honoured the work and answered our prayers, May we all resolve, by God's help, to enter upon the work of the new year with renewed consecration to His service. If we would work well we must pray much. "Prayer is the preparation for every great work, and preceded every marked effort in the progress of Christianity," and Christ is our example.

Our Society has been a means of grace to many, leading them to a higher spiritual life. In all our Auxiliaries God's word is studied and there is a service of prayer.

I would ask every member to remember "our hour of prayer"— Sunday from five to six o'clock. We cannot afford to forget it, not alone for the good it will do us, but for the sake of those dear missionaries in the field, who plead for our prayers. and whose consolation is, "we have your prayers." For their sakes let us make this one of our especial duties and privileges.

From two Mission Bands and an Auxiliary comes the lament and prayer: "We are inactive. We have no leader. May one be raised up for us." If we are faithful in prayer and willingness to do the Lord's work, leaders will surely be given.

The monthly Letter Leaftet received regularly by the members has kept them in touch with the workers in the field. The thanks of the Society are due a friend of missions and every good work, for a donation of money to be spent in literature for the benefit of Auxiliaries. It has been a great source of help and was highly appreciated. In all of our Societies many excellent papers have been prepared and read. Your Secretary would suggest that every paper be collected in some way and passed on from one Society to another. In a small Auxiliary it is a tax on busy women to thus prepare a paper each month, and many have no access to missionary encyclopedias or other works ; thus increasing use could be made of the papers, and interest added to the regular monthly meetings.

We would call the attention of every Auxiliary to the Scattered Helper's scheme, which enlists those whom duty or distance prevent attending the regular monthly meetings.

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WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY

OF THE

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA

(WESTERN DIVISION).

CONSTITUTION.

Article 1.—This Society shall be called "THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA" (Western Division), and its central point of operation shall be in the City of Toronto.

Article 2.—Its object shall be to aid the Foreign Mission Committee and Board of Missions, by promoting its work among the women and children of heathen lands, and for this purpose it shall receive and disburse all money which shall be contributed to the Society, subject to the action of that Committee or Board, in the appointment of Missionaries supported by the Society, and fixing their salaries and locations. For the furtherance of this end it shall endeavour to organize similar Associations throughout the Church, and these Associations shall bear the name of "Auxiliary Societies to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada," and shall report their work to this Society at such times as the By-laws may direct.

Article 3.—Each woman paying one dollar annually, through an Auxiliary or direct to the Treasury, shall become a member of this Society. The payment of twenty-five dollars by one person, at one time, shall constitute a Life Membership.

Article 4.—The business of the Society shall be conducted by a Board of thirty-six Managers, including the President, four Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretaries and a Treasurer. These Managers shall be elected from the members of the Society annually, by the members who are present at the Annual Meeting. These members shall also have power to elect representative Vice-Presidents. The Board shall have power to elect the officers and to appoint corresponding members when the objects of the Society shall be promoted thereby; they shall also have authority to fill vacancies occurring in their body during the year.

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Article 5.—There shall be an Executive Committee, composed of the officers and four other Managers, to be elected annually. This Committee shall have power to transact such business as may require attention in the intervals between the stated meetings of the Board. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article 6.—The Annual Meeting shall be held in Toronto, or elsewhere, as the Society shall from year to year determine, beginning on Wednesday, in the third week in April, when the Board of Managers shall give in their Annual Report and the Officers and Managers for the ensuing year shall be elected by ballot after nomination. The Board may, however, for special reasons, postpone the Annual Meeting.

Article 7.—A Special Meeting of the Society may be called at any time by the President, upon the request of three Managers.

Article 8.—In addition to the thirty-six elected Managers who are entitled to entertainment during the Annual Meeting, each Presbyterial Society shall be entitled to send one delegate besides its President and Secretary. Each Auxiliary shall be entitled to one delegate besides its President or her substitute. Each Mission Band shall be represented by its President or her substitute. These delegates must be members of the General Society (thus entitled to vote), and shall be provided with entertainment during the Annual Meeting. All other members of the Society shall be welcome to attend the Annual Meeting and to vote but the Hospitality Committee shall not be responsible for the entertainment.

Article 9.—The Constitution may be altered at any regular meeting of the Society, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present; notice in writing of the intended alteration having been given at a previous meeting.

BY-LAWS.

Article 1.—The Board of Managers shall hold its stated meetings on the first Tuesday of every month at 3 o'clock p.m., and on the remaining Tuesdays of each month, at 10 o'clock a.m., in the Board Room of the Bible and Tract Societies, or at such time and place as it shall appoint. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article 2.—The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board, and perform such other duties as are incident to the office. She shall call special meetings upon the request of three members, and shall be exofficio a member of all standing committees. She shall sign all drafts upon the treasury before they are paid.

Article 3.—The 1st Vice-President shall in the absence of the President perform all the duties of her office.

Article 4.—The Recording Secretary shall keep a fair record of the proceedings of the Board, give proper notice of special and stated meetings, and prepare the Annual Report of the Board of Managers.

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Article 5.—The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct all correspondence addressed to the Board and not included in that of the other Secretaries or Treasurer.

Article 6—The Home Secretary shall correspond with branches, churches and individuals, and extend information in all proper directions, in order to awaken an interest in the branch of the missionary work for which this Society was formed. She shall prepare the Annual Report of the Home work.

Article 7.—The Foreign Secretary shall conduct official correspondence with the Foreign Mission Committee as directed from time to time by the Board of Managers, also with the missionaries, teachers and Bible readers supported by this Society, and with candidates for the foreign field. She shall prepare the Annual Report of the Foreign Work. Missionaries supported by this Society shall be required to make regular reports to her.

Article 8.—The Supply Secretary shall have charge of all supplies to be sent to the Indian Reserves or to Mission Stations. Any correspondence relating to the supplies and requiring to be forwarded to the Foreign Mission Committee shall be transmitted directly by her.

Article 9.—The Publication Secretary-Treasurer shall have charge of all literature, maps, receipt-books, and also the sending out of the MONTHLY LETTER LEAFLET to the various branches of the Society. The balance in her hands as Treasurer, after paying all expenses, shall be paid into the General Fund or disposed of as the Board shall direct.

Article 10.—The Treasurer shall receive, hold and keep an account of all money given to this Society and shall disburse it as the Board of Managers shall direct, and report the state of the Treasury at the first meeting of each month. She shall also obtain from the Foreign Mission Committee the expenditure for the past year and the estimates for the current year, and communicate with the Foreign Mission Committee regarding all matters connected with her department. Her Annual Keport shall be examined by an auditor appointed by the Board.

Article 11.—The Editor shall have full charge of the MONTHLY LETTER LEAFLET. All letters, items of interest or business, after being passed by the Board, shall be placed in her hands with power (if too extended), to condense or make extracts, so that the MONTHLY LETTER LEAFLET shall not exceed the specified number of pages, unless the Board specially directs otherwise.

Article 12.—Auxiliary Societies shall be required to make an Annual Report to the Board, on or before the first Tuesday in March.

Article 13.—Any Manager who shall be absent from the Board for three successive months without a satisfactory explanation, shall forfeit her position, and her place may be filled. Article 14.—These By-laws may be amended at a meeting of the Society, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, but notice of any proposed amendment must be given in writing, three months before the Annual Meeting, for publication in the LETTER LEAFLET.

Note 1.—Any member of this Society desiring to bring up matterss for discussion at the Annual Meeting, is requested to give notice to the Board of Management one month before the time of meeting ; or when such notice is not given, the matter will be referred to a Committee named at the time.

Note 2.—Should business arise at any time connected with any of the departments not specially arranged for in the By-laws. and requiring communication with the Foreign Mission Committee, the Secretary of the department shall conduct the correspondence.

CONSTITUTION.

FOR AN AUXILIARY TO THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Article 1.—This Society shall be called the————of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada (Western Division).

Article 2.—Its object shall be to aid the General Society in sending to foreign fields and sustaining female missionaries, Bible readers and teachers who shall labour among heathen women and children, and so far as possible to promote an interest in the work of Foreign Mission among the children of the congregation.

Article 3.- Any woman may become a member of this Society by the payment of annually.

Article 4.—The officers of this Society shall be a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer.

Article 5.—The President shall preside at all meetings, and have a general oversight of the work.

Article 6.—It shall be the duty of the Secretary to record the proceedings of the Society, give notice of meetings, conduct necessary correspondence and prepare the Annual Report, which must be submitted to the Annual meeting for approval, after which she shall forward it and the names of the newly elected officers, together with the report of the Juvenile Mission Band (and the report of the Young Woman's Band, if auxiliary to the Society) to the Secretary of the Presbyterian Society; if none exist, she shall then forward them to the Home Secretary or the General Society.

Article 7.—The Treasurer's duty shall be to report the state of the treasury at every meeting, and remit the funds of the Society and Juvenile Mission Band (also the funds of the Young Woman's Band, if auxiliary to this Society), yearly or quarterly to the Treasurer of the

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the and d, if the Presbyterial Society, where one exists; if not, to the Treasurer of the General Society. All money must be forwarded to the Treasurer of the Presbyterial Society before the middle of February, and to the General Treasurer on or before the first Tuesday in March.

Article 8.—The Society shall hold regular stated meetings, when all suitable measures shall be adopted to promote interest in this branch of missionary work; also an Annual Meeting to elect officers and hear the Annual Report.

Article 9.—The Juvenile Mission Band (if one exists) shall be auxiliary to the Society, and shall be required to report to it annually, and to pay to the Treasurer all moneys in hand at the close of the year.

The Juvenile Mission Band shall be represented at the Annual Meeting of this Society by its officers, or their substitutes, and two delegates. Only members of auxiliary are entitled to vote at this meeting.

If the Young Woman's Band be auxiliary to this Society, they shall report to it annually and pay to the Treasurer all moneys in hands at the close of the year.

CONSTITUTION.

YOUNG WOMAN'S BAND OF THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Article 1.—This Association, composed of Young Women, shall be called — Young Woman's Band of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada (Western Division), and shall be auxiliary, either to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the congregation in which the Band is formed, or to the Presbyterial Society in which it is situated.

Article 2.—It object shall be to arouse a greater interest and activity in the cause of Foreign Missions among the young women of the Church, and to aid the General Society in its work among heathen women and children.

Article 3.—Any young woman may become a member of this Band by the payment of ——annually to the Treasurer.

Article 4.—All money raised by this Band (after deducting necessary expenses), shall be given to the General Society to assist in its work among heathen women and children.

Article 6.—The officers of this Young's Woman's Band shall be a President (who must be a member of the General Society), two or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer, all to be elected annually. 8 Article 7.—The President, or, in her absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall preside at all meetings and have general oversight of the work.

Article 8.- It shall be the duty of the Secretary to record the proceedings of the Band, give notice of meetings, conduct necessary correspondence and prepare the Annual Report, which must be submitted to the Annual Meeting of the Band for approval, after which she shall forward it, together with the names of the newly elected officers, either to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the congregation in which it is formed, or to the Presbyterial Secretary.

Article 9.—The Treasurer shall receive and keep an accurate account of all funds and report the same each month to the Band. She shall also prepare a complete statement at the close of the year to be submitted for approval at the Annual Meeting, after which she shall forward it, together with all moneys in her hands, either to the Treasurer of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the congregation in which it is formed, or to the Pres'yterial Treasurer. The Treasurer shall also keep a roll containing the names of the members of the Band.

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Article 10.—An Auditor shall be appointed by the Band to examine and verify the Treasurer's accounts before they are submitted to the Annual Meeting.

DIRECTIONS

FOR FORMING JUVENILE MISSION BANDS.

A Juvenile Mission Band may be formed in, or in connection with any congregation. It may be composed of girls, or of girls and boyswho may meet together to select a name and adopt the following Constitution:—

CONSTITUTION

FOR JUVENILE MISSION BANDS.

Article 1.—This Association, composed of girls (or of girls and boys) shall be called the — Mission Band of — Presbyterian Church in — , and shall be auxiliary to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society in said church, (if none exist, the Band shall then be auxiliary to the Presbyterial Society of the Presbytery in which it is situated).

Article 2.—The object of this Band shall be to interest children in the work of Foreign Missions, and to educate them in the grace of giving.

Article 3.—The Band shall meet at stated times to read the Scriptures, for prayer, and praise, to receive missionary intelligence and instruction, and to contribute to the funds of the Band according to their ability. The Band shall also hold an Annual Meeting to receive and adopt the Annual Reports and to elect officers. ce-

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Scripe and ng to sceive Article 4.—Any girl or boy may become a member of the Band by payment of an annual fee of —— to the Treasurer.

Article 5.—The officers of the Band shall be a President (who must be an adult and a member of the General Society), two or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer, who shall all be elected annually

Article 6.—The President, or in her absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall preside at all meetings, and have a general oversight of the work.

Article 7.—It shall be the duty of the Secretary to record the proceedings of the Band, give notice of meetings, conduct necessary correspondence and prepare the Annual Report. This report must be submitted at the Annual Meeting of the Band for approval, after which the Secretary shall forward it, and the names of the newly elected officers, to the Secretary of the Society to which the Band is auxiliary.

Article 8.—The Treasurer shall receive and keep an accurate account of all funds, and report the same each month to the Band. She shall also prepare a complete statement at the end of the year, to be submitted at the Annual Meeting of the Band, after which she shall forward it, together with all moneys in her hands, to the Treasurer of the Society to which the Band is auxiliary. The Treasurer shall also keep a roll containing the names of the members of the Band.

Article 9.—An Auditor shall be appointed by the Band to examine and verify the Treasurer's accounts before they are submitted to the Annual Meeting.

CONSTITUTION.

OF THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY PRESBYTERIAL SOCIETY.

Article 1.—This Society shall be called "The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbytery of ————."

Article 2.—The officers shall be a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer—all to be elected annually, and to hold office until their successors are appointed.

Article 3.—The affairs of this Society shall be conducted by a body of Managers, viz.: The officers of the Presbyterial Society; the President, two Vice-Presidents, the Secretary, the Treasurer, or their substitutes, and two delegates from each Auxiliary; the President, or her substitute, and two delegates from each Young Woman's Band; and the President, or her substitute from each Juvenile Mission Band.

Article 4.—The object of this Society shall be to promote the formation of Auxiliaries to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in all the congregations of the Presbytery, to diffuse intelligence and excite missionary interest among the women and children of the Church. Article 5.—This Society shall be Auxiliary to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada (Western Division).

Article 6.—The Presbyterial Society shall hold its annual Meeting at ______ meeting of the Presbytery, and the Presbyterial officers shall meet in session with the Managers previously, for the election of officers for the ensuing year, and the transaction of all business connected with the Society. Five members constitute a quorum.

Article 7.—The President and Secretary of the Presbyterial Society, with the President of the Local Society where the meeting is held, shall be a Committee of Arrangements, selecting topics for discussion, and devising means to make the meeting interesting and profitable.

Article 8.—Reports shall be sent to this meeting from the Secretary of each Local Society.

Article 9.—A short abstract of these reports shall be sent to the Presbytery in Session, to be read, if approved, at their public meeting, to be followed, it is hoped, by at least one address upon this branch of work.

Article 10.—This Constitution may be altered at any regular meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, notice in writing of the intended alteration having been given at a previous meeting. th

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BY-LAWS.

Article 1.—The meeting of this Society shall always be opened with the reading of the Scriptures and prayer.

Article 2.—The President (or one of the Vice-Presidents) shall preside at all meetings; call extra meetings when requested by three Auxiliary Societies, and shall aid in forming congregational Auxiliaries when desired. She shall also take the general supervision of the work in the Presbytery, visiting every Auxiliary Society in the course of the year, and holding meetings with the ladies of as many of the unorganized churches as possible.

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Article 3.—It shall be the duty of the Secretary to record the proceedings of the Society, give notice of meetings, and prepare the Annual Report. She must keep the Home Secretary of the General Society informed of the condition of the Presbyterial Society, and shall forward to her annually a list of officers, together with the Annual Report of the Secretary and Treasurer, and shall attend generally to the correspondence of the Society.

Article 4.—The Treasurer shall receive the contributions of the congregational Auxiliaries in the Presbytery, and shall forward them to the Treasurer of the General Society before the first Tuesday in March.

MEMORANDA.

Any rules relating to the local affairs of the Society may be adopted, provided they do not conflict with the Constitution and Bylaws of the General Society.

Do not interfere with other organizations. Make no appeal that shall conflict with duties of Church members to any other benevolent work.

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
