In Winnipeg at 2 o'clock this morning the thermometer registered forty-three above, and as the prospects today are for fine and warmer weather, any immediate danger from frost, which still would injure a certain quantity of the standing grain, seems past.

BABY FOUND IN DOORWAY OF CITY RESIDENCE

Blue Eyed Girl, Nicely Dressed, in Wicker Basket at Entrance to Dorchester Street Home

A beautiful blue eyed baby was found in a doorway by Dorchester street this morning. It is a little girl, about two weeks old, fully developed and riotously healthy. Clad in fine clothing on which some one had spent much labor and care, and provided with outdoor coat and lace bonnet as well as a complete change of other clothes it was evident that the person who had left the little one had not done so because of lack of thought for it. The baby was found about 10.30 o'clock and had been left in the vestibule some time after nine o'clock in the morning.

MAY BE MORE TROUBLE WITH THE WELSH MINERS

London, Aug. 24—The decision of Walter Runciman, president of the Board of Trade, who acted as arbitrator on numerous disputed questions in the South Wales coal strike, was announced last evening. The decision is highly technical, but some of the miners' demands are rejected, although some concessions are made.

THEFT AND KILLING OF SHEEP CHARGED

An Arrest at Sheffield—Earl of Kingston, Visitor Here, Out of War Hospital

Frederick N. B. Aug. 24—Archie McKeehan of Sheffield is in custody here charged with stealing and killing four sheep belonging to Brunswick & Lawson, also of Sheffield. He acknowledged the offence. Several other readings of Sheffield are said to be implicated, and other arrests may follow.

ANOTHER RECRUITING CAMPAIGN HERE IS BEING PLANNED

Plans for another recruiting campaign in St. John and elsewhere in New Brunswick are to be considered and a strong effort made to stimulate the flow of recruits who are needed to fill up the New Brunswick battalions.

QUESTION JURISDICTION OF UTILITIES COMMISSION

A special meeting of the New Brunswick public utilities commission is being held this afternoon in the provincial government rooms, Prince William street, to hear a petition in connection with the Sackville Electric Light Company. The company has notified its patrons that it intends to discontinue supplying current for power purposes and to use the current for lighting.

STIRRING SCENES IN THE RIGA BATTLE

London, Aug. 24—The naval operations in the Gulf of Riga are described in a semi-official statement issued at Petrograd and transmitted to the Rector Telegram Company, as an unequal combat between the old Russian battleship Slava and German dreadnoughts.

ST. JOHN OFFICER ON WAY HOME ON FURLOUGH AFTER BEING WOUNDED

Lieutenant Hugh Teed of this city, who left with the first contingent and who has been on the invalid list as the result of wounds received in action, is on his way home to spend a two months' furlough. He left the hospital and went to Shorncliffe to take up other duties there, but it was found that he was not well enough for active service and was given leave to return home to complete his recovery.

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HEAVY LOSS IN MONCTON FIRE

Moncton, N. B., Aug. 24—The stock of I. W. Keirstead, druggist, was consigned today to a total loss, the result of an early morning fire in the Barker building. The loss is estimated at \$10,000, insurance \$9,000.

PEACE TALK IS HEARD IN BERLIN

A New York dispatch to J. M. Robinson & Sons today says: "London hears that Berlin is talking peace. 'Edison predicts seven years of prosperity for the United States and twelve months more of war.'"

HOW LONG WILL THIS FARCE LAST?

It must be difficult for Conservative statesmen like the Hon. George J. Clarke, and for Conservative newspapers and other newspapers friendly to the administration, to keep up the farce of discussing in the closing days of the present summer this route and that route for the Valley Railway.

Do these gentlemen suppose the public is too careless or too stupid to overlook the significance of the fact that they are still canvassing the routes for this railway at a date when the railway was supposed to have been finished? Here is Mr. Premier Clarke gravely giving out cryptic statements concerning new soundings or borings for a crossing of the St. John River, only a few weeks after Mr. Guelina, presumably speaking for the Minister of Railways, said that the Valley road should come down the western bank of the river and enter St. John city by a bridge across Navy Island.

This suggestion was perhaps intended to cover up or to weaken the public effect of the knowledge that Mr. Guelina was only repeating what the Minister of Railways has said in conversation on several occasions, and what was said to members of the Board of Trade by two ministers of the Crown, and in a very emphatic fashion, only a few weeks ago.

Has anyone inquired from the local government clique how it happens that they are today still "making borings" for the proposed purpose of comparing one route with another, in spite of the fact that they have said again and again that they employed the best engineering talent in the country to decide this very point a year ago, or eighteen months ago, if not two years ago?

The people of St. John and the people of New Brunswick have signed a very heavy mortgage for the creation of a new railway to open up the productive country between this city and Grand Falls. The railway is not the private enterprise of a mere group of politicians, although the manner in which these politicians have juggled with it, and have played fast and loose with the public interest, suggests that they are governed by the astonishing delusion that the province has been given over to them for their entertainment and their profit, whereas the province has employed them temporarily as its servants, and is angrily awaiting an opportunity to dismiss them for conduct which can only be described truly in rather vigorous language.

ARMORED CAR SHAPED LIKE A TURTLE So evidently efficient for war purposes is an armored car recently invented by a naturalized American that the military authorities of several of the warring countries are said to be negotiating with the inventor for its use in the European conflict. The body of the car is made of armor plate and is elliptical in shape, so that from a distance the car part is so curved that a projectile fired from any direction and striking the car at any point will have a tendency to glance up or down or horizontally. Even the wheels are protected by curved armor that hangs to a point within a few inches of the ground. At the top of the body is a large porthole for rifles, and the arrangement being such that the gun can be fired at any angle. At the inside the body is space for four men to stand erect. The driver, who observes the road and the movements of the enemy through a periscope, is entirely concealed and protected from the fire of the enemy. A picture of this armored car is a feature of the September Popular Mechanics Magazine.
