Parliament is Dissolved

Governor-General Assents to Request of Premier Meighen

London Follows Visit of Prime Minister to King This Morning; Meighen to Proceed with Formation of Cabinet... Ottawa, July 2.—Parliament has been dissolved. Official announcement to this effect was made this morning.

THE SITUATION NOW

PLANNING TO LOOT DETROIT INSTITUTE OF ART BY PIRATE GANG BLOCKED

DETROIT, Mich., July 2.—Confession of Paxton Howard, 29, Sarnia, Ont., the theft of a rare Persian rug valued at \$75,000 from the Detroit Institute of Art yesterday, was schemed by a ring of antique "pirates" backed by a millionaire, followed recovery of the rug last night in the checkroom of the Michigan Central Railroad station. Traced by a pair of gloves dropped near the scene of the robbery, Howard told the police that nearly a dozen men were involved in the plan to loot a storeroom of the Art Institute of valued art pieces.

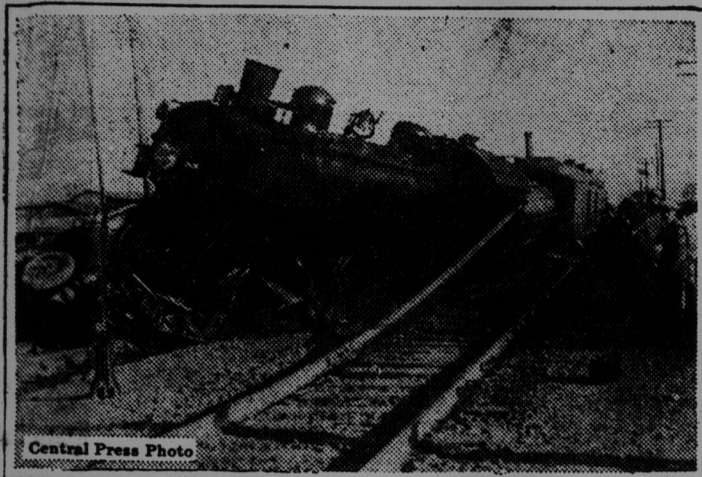
