Mr. Byrne, who is accompanied by his wife and son, told a "Witness" reporter that he had already traveled more than 40,000 miles, and spent more than \$10,000 in verifying his right to the estate left him by the late Robert Byrne, a traveling stock broker, of

Australia.

But the long waiting and trouble is mearly over, he says, for he has just had a letter from the lawyers telling him of the final proofs that will be required, expressing regret that they are obliged to give him so much seemingly unnecessary trouble, and telling him that they expect everything will be settled up at a meeting of the beneficiaries, which will take place in September.

Mr. Byrne owes his enormous inheritance to the fact that in April, 1907, he went to Chicago to look for a brother whom he supposed was living there, but whom he had not seen for many years. 

No indication is given of the strength of the Bulgarian column at this point, but the Bulgarians claim to have defeated the Servians and captured five guns and a quantity of other war material, and by the occupation of the passes to have opened the road to Nish.

There is heavy fighting also between the Servians and Bulgarians to the south of Istip and in the neighborhood of Kotchana. About two hundred thousand men are engaged, and the losses on both sides appear to be terrible.

Bulgaria's strategy appears to be to hold the Greeks in check, probably with comparatively small forces, while she deals with Servia. This assumption, if correct, would explain the victorious advance of the Greek army.

Unconfirmed reports credit the Bulgarians with victories near Koprili, giving them the key to Uskup, and with an outflanging movement from the south of Tahynes Lake which would cut off the Greek retreat.

Saloniki despatches continue to report Greek victories. The Greeks are said to have captured sixteen guns at Doiran. Evidences of desperate fighting is found in the arrival of '8,000 wounded at Saloniki, taxing the town's accommodations and resources to the uttermost.

A conservative estimate of the killed or disabled in last week's fighting fixes the number at from 30,000 to 40,000. Thousands of destitute refugees from the scene of the fighting are pouring into Saloniki.

The Greeks have made wholesale charges against the Bulgarians of burning and pillaging all the villages they abandon and of committing murders, mutilations and other horrors. More than 4,000 refugees are concentrated at Nigrita and adjacent villages.


RECENT DEATHS

CAPTAIN CAREY OF C.P.R. FIFTY YEARS AT SEA

Was Pioneer of Winter Port Steamship Business Here

DECK BOY TO COMMODORE

Now in Command of the Tyrolia, at Montreal From Mediterranean -Veteran Recalls Stirring Incidents of Danger and Daring

The following from the Montreal Witness will interest many St. John friends of the subject of the sketch—Captain Frank Carey, of the C. P. R., the pioneer captain in St. John's business as a winter port. The Witness says:—

A half century at sea, the years crowded with thrilling experiences, has just been completed by Captain Frank Carey, of the C. P. R. liner Tyrolia, which plys between /Montreal and Trieste and Naples. Capt. Carey came into port here this morning, with his big ship, and on the deck of his vessel today, he told a 'Witness' reporter the story of his long career at sea.

From deck boy to commodore of the Atlantic fleet of the C. P. R. is a big rise, but that is the one that Captain Carey has taken since he sailed from his first port as a deck boy in 1868. That was in the days of sailing vessels, the big steamers of this century being then but vague dreams.

He was the first of the Carey family The following from the Montreal Wit-

big steamers of this century being then but vague dreams.

He was the first of the Carey family to choose the sea as a life calling and so, when he cleared on the old sailing bark 'Catherine' for Quebec, his parents feared for his future. But for half a century since then he has sailed the seas of the wide world, with honor to himself and deep satisfaction to his employers.

From deck boy he rose rapidly until he became mate of the sailing vessels. Then he transferred to the steam ships, sailing for a time in the tramp vessels. ailing for a time in the tramp with the Allans, then he entered the service of the old Beaver Line, and with it he was transferred to the C. P. R. fleet. He has been with the Beaver and C. P. R. Company since 1880, being commodore of the Atlantic fleet, now, and the oldest captain in years of service with the company.

Saved Sailors in a Wild Sea

The captain has had an adventurous career. When he was second officer of the 'Lake Winnipeg,' one terrible February day he fought with the waves in mid-Atlantic to save six sailors who were almost frozen to death in the rigging of a Norwegian bark. It was a Thursday when the wreck was seen first. The sea was wild great waves washing. Thursday when the wreck was seen first. The sea was wild, great waves washing clear over the decks. On the Monday preceding the bark had been struck by a sudden hurricane and thrown on her side. She was full of timber and water. The crew climbed upon the upturned bottom of the wreck and waited for rescue. One by one the hungry sea claimed them, until only six remained out of the seventeen who had been aboard. Then by a strange freak of the wild waves, the bark was turned back to its proper position. The six benumbed sailors climbed into the rigging and waited for rescue or

Captain Carey, then chief officer of the Lake Winnipeg, went to their aid, and after heroic efforts succeeded in getting a line aboard and saving the six. One of them had broken his leg on the Monday, and was in a serious state when brought to medical attention.

For this act of conspicuous bravery at sea he was awarded a medal by the Norwegian government, another from the Shipwreck and Humane Society, and a third by the Mercantile Marine Association.

How about the hammock for the porch or the lawn?

Want to know how to make the most durable and safest hammock in the world that will give the service of the \$5 sort and will cost not more than a few minutes' labor and a dime or two?

Get a couple of old barrels that have stout staves. Sugar barrels are the best Cut a notch on each side of each end of the stave, just where the groove in them comes. Then get some bale fire or good strong, insulated wire. You'll want two perfect pieces for each side.

Hope will do if you can't get the wire, and a common clothes line will serve to mand the bottom rope on the top. Do this with each stave until you have your hammock long enough. Fasten the rope or wire together securely over the last stave.

The materials all at hand, fasten your wire or rope together in two lengths so that each length wil consist of two long pieces. And this fastening wants to be done securely. Take your first barrel stave and slip it between the pieces of rope in each strand so that the rope will fit in the notches you have woven your hammock. It is really best and safest to fasten the hangers to the rope or wire rather than to the staves. Then all you have to do is to find a place to hang the hammock and hang it.

Fiftieth Anniversary of Great Battle in Civil War Marked by Fervid Addresses of Many Former Fire-Eaters to Sink Any Differences.

Gettysburg, Pa., July 2—The United Veterans of America—no more Confed-rate Veterans, no more Grand Army of veterans of America—no more Confederate Veterans, no more Grand Army of the Republic, but a united organization of the men of both sides in the great conflict of the Civil War—that is the keynote of the plan which the gnthusiasts of the North and of the South are discussing ardently today. It sounds asts of the North and of the South are discussing ardently today. It sounds at first hand the remarkable spirit demonstrated at this most remarkable of celebration, it is not so impossible.

The Gettysburg celebration has entered upon a new phase with the inception of thi idea. It is no longer merely the observance of the fiftieth anniversary of the greatest battle of the Civil War, with an underlying strain of patriotism. It has blossomed out into a simon-pure evangel of the higher patriotism, a movement for the complete abandonment of all sectional ties.

The most conspicuous element of this new conception of the celebration of the battle is religious. The scenes to be witnessed in the Confederate camp last night emphasized that phase. It was as night emphas


