At the conclusion, a Collection was made amounting to fifty-six dollars.

7th.—Brother David Harris, employed as a Missionary the last season read his Journal, which excited much interest. The Association voted its thanks to Brother Harris for his faithful services.

8th.—Voted to adjourn till 10 o'Clock to-morrow.—Prayer meeting at 5 in the morning.

THURSDAY, JUNE 25.

9th.—Assembled at time appointed, the Moderator fervently prayed for the Divine blessing upon the Meeting and the Churches we represent.

10th.—Read and approved the Circular and Corresponding Letters.
11th.—Considered the proposed division of the Association, and

voted that it continue as usual for the present.

12.—Voted that the Association be held in the Baptist Meeting. House, in the City of St. John, N. B. on the first Wednesday after the 20th June next year.

13th.—That Brother Griffin write the Circular Letter, and Brother Manning the Corresponding Letter, for the ensuing year.

14th.—Brother Joseph Dimock to Preach the introductory Ser-

15th.—Voted, that the Churches composing this Association, observe the twenty-fifth day of November next as a day of thanksgiving, and the first day of January next as a day of fasting and prayer.

16th.—That Brother Joseph Crandal be our Messenger to Cor-

responding Associations.

17th.—That 600 Copies of our Minutes be printed, and that Bro-

ther Griffin superintend the printing of them.

18th.—That a Committee be appointed to superintend the Missionary concerns in these Provinces—that the Brethren who desire to engage as Missionaries make application to them, who are empowered to accept or reject them.

19th.—That the Committee for the present year be composed of the following Brethren: T. H. Chipman, Edward Manning, T. S. Harding, Simon Fitch, Daniel Lockhart, George Dimock, and Williams, S. M. C. S. C.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

The Ministers and Messengers of the Nova-Scotia and New-Brunswick Baptist Association, convened at Newport, N. S. June 24 and 25, unto the Churches they represent, send Christian salutation.

DEAR BRETHREN,

Being permitted by Him who walketh in the midst of the Churches and holdeth their stars in his right hand, to meet together, our hearts are gladdened by your Messengers and Epistles. We perceive some of you are in Sackcloth; and truly mourning, fasting and prayer become us, when the bridegroom is withdrawn, and that we enquire what hath separated between us and our God. We rejoice in your stedfastness in the doctriues, laws, and ordinances of God our Saviour, and particularly that the Lord hath sent down a gracious shower of the refreshing influences of his spirit upon some of the fields of Zion, and caused a joyful harvest—may the Lord make it universal.

Dear Brethren, we may never all address you again, as many of us may end our mortal race before the ensuing year, and knew the worth or want of the religion of Jesus Christ; therefore in view of our journey's end, and in prospect of a judgment seat, we would address a few lines to you on the nature and excellencies of that Religion, which we conceive no one can have right views of without some acquaintance with its Divine author, and his design in the

Gospel scheme.

Religion is of high and heavenly birth and essentially resembles its parent, for he is possessed of every divine excellence in perfectior, surely if a man speak thereof he shall be swallowed up. He is universal in goodness, infinite in wisdom and Almighty in power. From his goodness we are led to expect, he will desire to do and perform to the utmost extent, all that is good, and from his wisdom we are fully persuaded that he cannot err or mistake in judgment, but must know what is good, what is the greater and only good-in permitting, determining and doing, this grand impulse must move the mighty wheel; and from his power we are made to believe, he is able to do and perform all his good pleasure. To suppose that his goodness and wisdom wills or desires what his power does not perform, would be to suppose one attribute over balanced the other. Sceptics will ever cavil by which their minds are darkened and their hearts hardened, they ask, why such a God should create man in to mutable a state? Why diversify his bounty to characters equally unworthy or deserving? or hestow the luxuries of life on the vilest, while the griping hand of poverty and distress lies heavy on a portion of the pious few, as the Scriptures teach, " not many rich, wine or noble are called, but the poor in this world, rich in faith, are heirs of the kingdom."

Again, why is the Gospel sent to so few of the Nations comparatively, for centuries past? and to few of those to whom it comes, does it prove the power of God to Salvation. To such persons and such thoughts, we wish you to say "who art thou that replieth

The wisdom of God hath something ir it too sublime in planning and working, to be arraigned at the bar of human reason. It is enough for us to believe what is written and be deeply humbled with our ignorance of that which is beyond our reach, for truly if Revelation did not go far beyond our reach and his works beyond our shallow conception, the Gospel would not be a great mystery, and his works unworthy a being of infinite perfection. To complain of that we do not understand, is highly impious, the permission of many outrages is perfeetly consistent with the purity, goodness and wildom of God, yet too high for us to comprehend. The crucifying of our Lord was according to the determinate council and foreknowledge of God, yet in the deed as it respected the actors, there was every thing of impiety, treachery, ingratitude and cruelty, yet God is glorified and salvation secured to an innumerable multitude of the fallen race. The love of God is the Fountain from whence the healing streams of Salvation flow, to guilty sinners through a Saviour's voins. In this mysterious plan, of salvation by the great sacrifice of the Lamb of God, shine conspicuously all the divine perfections, the goodness, holiness, wisdom and love of God.

The design of the sacred three seem manifestly to glorify all his perfections in all his works and ways, to over rule the fall of angels and men to his own glory, that in the person of a Redeemer, anercy and truth should meet together, righteousness and peace embrace and kiss each other. By our Jesus the law was magnified and made hexorable; Satan defeated, God's works and ways honored, and his chosen people honorably acquitted, sanctimed and made meet for glory. The love, wisdom, power and goodness of Father, Scn and Holy Spirit is revealed in the Gospel in choosing, atoning for, and sancrifying his people. This finished salvation adopts, justifies and sanctifies the Lord's people, but the latter is the work of the spirit, changing, washing, rerewing and creating them in Christ to good works, by which the soul is cast in the Gospel mould, and stamped with the image of God's dear son, their spirits are framed to love and serve the Lord their God from the noblest principles. They delight in the perfections, hows and ordinances of God, as far as they know them, and say, what we know not Lord teach us, and when taught, they make haste to keep his commands. It produces love to the Saints, not for the name they bear or are known by, but the Cross of Christ and Image they bear, those who resemble the lowly Lamb of God most, stand highest in their esteem.

We are led to judge of our own religion and that of others, not from the length and fluency of our prayers and other religious improvements, but our deadness to the world, to our own righteousness, and all expectation of help from the sayings or doings of any creature—by our entire trust in the great sacrifice—our hearty embracing the Cross of Christ, and its consequent doctrines of free Grace, which set the Crown on the great Jehovah's head, and lay every creature at his sovereign feet, the Glory of God and the Salvation of sinners lie near our hearts. Amen.
