

Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Congregation.

TORONTO, January 17th, 1894.

Pursuant to notice read from the pulpit on the two preceding Sabbaths the annual meeting was held this evening in the lecture hall.

The meeting was opened by prayer by the Rev. Mr. Hume.

The Rey, Alex, Gilray occupied the chair.

It was moved by Mr. C. R. Peterkin, and seconded by Mr. R. E. Walker, that Mr. Jas. Brown act as v secretary. Carried.

It was suggested by the chairman that the minutesof the last annual meeting as printed in the year book be held as read.

The minutes of the special congregational meeting, held on April 19th, were then read, and approved.

On referring to the election of managers, it was moved by D.W. Clark, seconded by Wm. Clark, that the election managers be held according to the old way. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Acheson, seconded by Rev. Mr. Hume, that the nomination and election of members for the Board be made separately, so that three Elders shall always be on the Board. After a short discussion this amendment was carried.

Nominations for the Board were then proceeded with, and resulted in the election of Messrs. James Brown, A. E. Bastedo, and A. Lang, for three years; Mr. Joseph Calhoun, two years; Mr. W. J. McCullough for one year, the scrutineers in this case being Messrs. Turnbull, D. W. Clark, Walker, Acheson, and Elder.

The Elders elected to the Board were Messrs. P. B. Martin and D. Cameron, for three years, the scrutineers in this case being Messrs. Turnbull, D. W. Clark, Acheson, Lloyd, and Sinclair.

The chairman stated that Mr. W. F. Sorley had tendered his resignation as a member of the Board for personal reasons. It was moved by Mr. Joss, seconded by Mr. R. E. Walker, that Mr. Sorley's resignation be accepted with regret. Carried.

The Session's report was read by the Rev. Mr. Gilray, who moved its acceptance, seconded by Rev. Mr. Hume. Carried.

The report for the Board of Managers was read by Mr. James Brown, who moved its acceptance, seconded by Mr. Peterkin. Carried.

The Building Committee's report was read by Mr. W. F. Sorley, who moved its acceptance in the following motion, seconded by Mr. C. R. Peterkin : "That the report of the Building Committee be received and adopted, the building accepted by the congregation, the Committee discharged, and the unpaid accounts of Messrs. S. R. Warren & Son, and the architect, be assumed by the Board of Managers." Carried.

The Sunday School report was read by Mr. W. A. Findlay, who moved its acceptance. Carried.

The Women's Auxiliary report was read on behalf of Miss Woolley by the Secretary of the meeting, who moved its acceptance. Carried.

The Speedwell Mission Band report was read by Miss J. Hamner, who moved its acceptance. Carried. The Junior Y.P.S.C.E. report was read by Miss

M. Caddell, who moved its acceptance. Carried.

The Bible Class report was read by Mr. Chas. Hume, who moved its acceptance. Carried.

The Women's Foreign Missionary Society report was read by Miss Abbie Grimason on behalf of Miss E. Clark, who moved its acceptance. Carried.

The Y.P.S.C.E. report was read by Miss M. Grant, who moved its acceptance. Carried.

The Church Treasurer's Financial report was

accepted by the congregation as it appeared on the printed statements then in their hands.

It was moved by Mr. G. E. Dalby, seconded by Mr. C. R. Peterkin, that the following gentlemen be the trustees for 1894: Messrs. Jas. Turnbull, B.A., Wm. Melville, J. Joss.

Messrs. Gardiner and Smith were re-elected auditors for the coming year, and were tendered the congregation's thanks for their services.

It was moved by Mr. Gardiner, seconded by Mr. Wm. Clark, "That the following be a committee to compile the annual report, and that the minutes of this meeting be inserted therein: Rev Alex. Gilray, C. R. Peterkin, and James Brown." Carried.

Mr. Turnbull in the course of some remarks made the following suggestion : That the Board should keep the ushers for a longer time in the vestibule than at present, as he contended that by appointing new ones every two months they had only become acquainted with their work when they retired. He also suggested that the names of the choir, with the different parts taken by each, be printed in the year book, and in conjunction with this that the thanks of the congregation be tendered the choir for their services, and he moved to this effect, seconded by Mr. Jas. Brown. Carried.

The Rev. Mr. Hume moved, seconded by Mr. Wm. Elder, that the thanks of the congregation be tendered our pastor for the deep interest he had taken in everything connected with the church during the past year. This motion was unanimously carried, and very feelingly replied to by Mr. Gilray.

The following motion was moved by Mr. C. R. Peterkin, seconded by Mr. Gardiner : "That in the event of its being found necessary, in re-arranging the floating debt, to increase the mortgage, that the pastor and representative elder be a deputation to the Presbytery to obtain the necessary authority, and the

Board of Management are hereby authorized to make necessary arrangements for the same." Mr. Peterkin in moving this resolution stated that the reason for making this motion was that if it was found necessary to re-arrange the loan during the year it could be done without the necessity of calling a special congregational meeting to sanction the same. Carried.

Mr. Joss moved, seconded by Mr. Grant, "That in view of the very efficient work done by our managers during the past year, especially in connection with the renovating of our church, making it not only pleasing to the eye, but very comfortable to worship in, and also finishing the details of the new Sabbath-school building, spending much time and thought to make the building worthy of the congregation, we extend to them a very hearty vote of thanks." Carried by a standing yote.

Mr. Adams thought that we ought to have the names of the tunes placed conspicuously in some part of the church. It was moved by Mr. Whytock, seconded by Mr. Lyon, "That this matter be referred to the session, and if it is practicable, to instruct the managers to have the same attended to."

It was brought to the attention of the meeting by Mr. Lloyd, that as the lecture hall is a very difficult place to speak in, some arrangement should be made whereby its acoustic properties would be improved.

It was moved by Mr. Geo. E. Dalby, seconded by Mr. Turnbull, "That the Executive Committee of the Building Committee receive the hearty thanks of the congregation for the excellent work done by them in the carrying out of the building of the new Sabbathschool to such a successful finish. Carried unanimously.

Mr. Thos. Wilson asked the session, as a member of the congregation, what position they had taken with reference to the *psalter*, and said that he understood from the newspapers that it had been decided by the Toronto

Presbytery that a new edition be made to exclude many of the Psalms. Mr. Gilray explained that although the Presbytery had decided on the change, it was a matter for the General Assembly to decide, and that they only could act in the matter. Mr. Wilson moved, seconded by Rev. Mr. Hume, the following resolution : "That this congregation learns with regret the action taken by the Presbytery of the city of Toronto in moving for a re-arrangement of the psalter as it is now used in the Presbyterian Church in Canada, so as to leave many of the Psalms out. Be it resolved that the members of the College Street Presbyterian Church place themselves on record as opposed to any change in the *psalter* from its present form, and that the Secretary of this meeting be instructed to forward a copy of this resolution to the Toronto Presbytery." After a short discussion the matter was carried unanimously.

There being no further business the meeting closed with the Benediction.

Note.—No summary is made of any of the reports received in the above minutes, as each of them is printed in full on the following pages.

Report of Session.

The additions to the membership during the past year were one hundred and sixteen. Number removed by certificate—forty-six; by death—seven. Forty-five names were removed for the reason of irregularity and non-attendance. The Session desire on the one hand to do all that is possible to encourage any who have fallen off from regular attendance on the ordinances of God's House when they *are able* to do so, but do not feel it wise or even helpful to continue the names of those who have ceased to attend the worship of God without any reasonable cause. Nine names have been

retired, thus making in all 107. The membership in Jan., 1893, was 791; now it is 800. There have been 31 Baptisms -one adult and thirty infants.

In conclusion the Session feel deeply grateful to Almighty God for His sustaining goodness in the midst of all the work undertaken in the various departments in the congregation. In everyone of these good service has been rendered.

The S. S. entered into its new home in February last. The Session are thankful that after much faithful work on the part of the Building Committee such satisfactory results have been reached in the completion of the S. S. Room. In a word there has been great cause for encouragement in all the organizations of the church. May the years to come in College St. be signalized with much nobler service than ever we have seen in the past, to the glory of Christ who is Head over all.

Managers' Annual Report.

In presenting the annual report of the Board for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-three, we have every reason to be thankful for God's goodness to us. The various reports which will be presented this evening, and which you have a synopsis of in your hands, indicate a very considerable increase in the work of the various departments, and we have every reason to believe from a spiritual standpoint that a satisfactory advance has been made, and we commence the new year with good prospects for the future, and it is the sincere wish of the Board that these hopes will be realized.

Before commenting on the figures of any of the reports, we would draw the congregation's attention specially to the Sabbath School Share Fund. As you are well aware shortly before the last congregational meeting it was decided that a canvass of the congregation be made to solicit subscriptions to this fund, and what success the Committee's work has been crowned with is shown in the report. Although there are only 161 out of our large congregation of 800 using envelopes systematically, the sum of \$353.83 has been received, and when we take into consideration the amount received from the Sabbath School and Bible class, the total amount collected was \$716.68. This we are sure all will be pleased to note, and the Board trust that during 1894 the number using these share envelopes will be greatly increased and would ask those not using the share envelopes to adopt them. If another two hundred members would systematically use the envelopes and simply contribute 10 cents each per month the sum of \$240.00 more would be raised, and there is no reason why at least four hundred more of the congregation should not adopt them. In asking you to do this we feel that we are not asking too much, as it only means an increase of \$1.20 each per member per year.

During the year the renovation of the church was undertaken by the Board, at the request of the congregation. This work was successfully completed, and the church reopened in June last. The benefit derived in every way from this much-needed improvement, has been felt to be considerable. This work along with the other repairs found necessary for the proper preservation of the property entailed an exceptionally heavy additional expense, and when we consider the depressing times generally, it will be seen that we have made good progress.

* The total revenue of the church from all sources during the year was \$8,257.24, and when this is com-

pared with the revenue of 1892, \$7,377.54, it shows a net increase for the year just closed of \$879.70.

It is pleasing to note in connection with this that the number using the envelopes has increased as well. The number using envelopes in 1892 being 322, and in 1893, 332, an increase of 10. You will see at a glance from this that there is still considerable room for improvement and the Board trust that the members not using the envelopes will do so, as this is our recognized system, and the main one from which our revenue is derived.

The following is the total revenue received by our Treasurer: Open collections \$1,138.83. From the same source during 1892 \$1,148.57, a decrease of \$9.74. The revenue received from the envelopes was \$3,896.68 as compared with \$3,816.34 received during 1892, being an increase of \$80.34, or a total increase of the direct revenue for the year of \$70.60.

The average collection for the year was \$95.00 per Sabbath, while that of 1892 was \$95.47; or a decrease of 47c. per Sabbath in the year just closed. The reason this shows a decrease is that there were fifty-three Sabbaths in the year which is exceptional.

We cannot close our report without again returning thanks to God for his goodness to us as a congregation, and although we have made such satisfactory progress in a year like the one just closed, we are not to feel satisfied, but we would ask all to feel that they are individually responsible for the work in connection with our church, and if all do this neither our pastor nor any of the executive officers will feel anxious about the result of the year's work upon which we have just entered.

In submitting the report of the Bible Class for the year 1893, the teacher and class must offer their thanks to the officers and members of the Church for the pleasant room that they have been pleased to prepare for them. In point of comfort and suitability it has been greatly appreciated by the members of the Bible class. The interest displayed by the members of the class betokens the profit that has been received from the careful teaching of Mr. Gardner.

The total attendance for the year was 1,000; the average attendance was about 40, distributed thus, females, 23; males, 17. The largest attendance was on the 5th of March, 80 being present; the smallest was on the 20th of August, 6 being present.

The total collections for the year were \$73.70, of which \$45.65 comes from the average Sunday collections and \$28.05 as share fund.

The average collection for the 48 Sabbaths on which the class met was 95 cents. The largest collection, \$2, was on Feb. 19th, the day on which our new school room was opened; the smallest collection was on Aug. 20th, and amounted to 36 cents.

As regards the share fund the amount obtained was \$28.05. This fund, owing to the change of secretaries, has not done quite so well as it did under the able management of Mr. James Brown, whom we are sorry to lose; but as it is again picking up we hope to bring it up to its old standing, shortly.

In closing the report we might say that both the teacher and the class would be glad to see many of the young people of the church, who have not yet joined our class, become members and enjoy the series of lessons. CHARLES HUME, Secretary.

It is with a thankful though humble heart that we, as a society, submit our report this year. It has been in every respect a most successful year with us. Though the raising of money is not our chief aim, we have done more in that respect than ever before, our total receipts for the year being nearly double that of previous years. This is partly due to the "Fulton" or "two cent a week" system, which has been introduced and carried on with much success during the past year and a half. The subject of systematic giving does not receive so much attention as we would wish, but the tendency is in the right direction.

Through the aid of the different committees, a systematic plan of work is being carried on. The Relief Committee, besides giving material aid where it is necessary, hold each week at least one cottage prayermeeting, and the Flower Committee distribute each week four bouquets, with scripture verses attached,

among the sick in the congregation. The Missionary Committe endeavor to hold a missionary meeting every six weeks, and during the year seven very interesting missionary meetings were held. Through the instrümentality of the Look-Out Committee, twenty-five new names were added to the roll during the year, while eight of our members left the society, thus making our total gain in numbers, thirteen; our present membership being exactly one hundred. The average attendance during the year on Monday evenings is sixty-five, on Sabbath evenings the attendance being much larger, owing to large numbers of the congregation being present.

In presenting our report for 1893, we are very much encouraged in our work by tokens of God's blessing on our hearts and in our lives. This Society, which is just a younger branch of the older Christian Endeavor, was organized in 1891, so it is about three years old, but though we are young we can be learning to take our place in the church of Jesus Christ when we get older, and we believe we can do this best by setting before ourselves something definite to do for Him, and when God through His Son has spoken so clearly in His Holy Word, should we not be anxious to gladly obey Him when He says to us : "Learn of me for I am meek and lowly, and ye shall find rest unto your souls." May we remember Christ's word : "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ve have done it unto me." We have now on the roll 57 members, of whom 16 are in connection with the church; 13 girls, and only three boys. Three of our members have been transferred to the older Society, and we miss their familiar voice in our meetings, but we are glad to know they are doing good work where they have been placed. We have raised this year \$17.12, as against \$5.84 last year, and it has been put to the best possible advantage. The officers of the Society for this six months are, Rev. Alex. Gilray, Superintendent ; Mr. John Joss, Assistant Superintendent; Alex. Smith, President; Nellie Morrice, Vice-President; Alice Grant, Treasurer; Miss McIntyre, Organist; Marion Caddell, Secretary. May we not then take for our motto as a Society, and as individuals: "Onward and Upward?" We trust that our hearts may be gladdened by seeing many more of our boys and girls from ten to sixteen years of age coming to join us; we would say : "Come thou with us and we will do thee good."


