THE TARIFF ISSUE IN GREAT BRITAIN.

The tariff question has become a live issue in Im-perial politics. It will continue to be an active issue until the existing one-sided free trade policy gives place to another system. For nearly two-thirds of a century Great Britain has tested the system of free Imports, with a few reservations. For at least a third of a century this doctrine was practically the unques-tioned creed of the nation. There were a few dissent-ers, as there are from the doctrine of gravitation of the santh The provided free trade policy gives and quite infirm. Sir Wilfrid Laurier will continue to make his annual lamentation that the senate is almost wholly composed of one party, but he will go on ap-pointing his own supporters, and probably choosing the least capable and independent out of these ranks.

The trade as it is in England, which, of course, is not free trade but only free imports, must now fight for its life in parliament. The contest in the country was mixed up with many other issues, and the reutent that is not decisive. Sena-tor Baker was appointed to the Upper House in 1896, having sat five terms in the Commons, and one in the Legislature of Quebec. He was solicitor general of his own province thirty years ago. In the Commons he was chairman of important committees, and in the Senate one of the men exerting the strongest personal influence. Mr. Baker was seventy-six years of age. THE BRIDGE.
