NOT ONE BRITISH VESSEL SUNK BY GERMAN SUBMARINES IN A WEEK

London, July 22—So far as British vessels are concerned the German submarines drew a blank during the week ending yesterday. Not a single British merchant ship or fishing craft was sunk.

This was the first week since the commencement of the war that some loes to British shipping has not been occasioned by either German cruisers, mines, or submarines. 

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
