# POLAND; FEW WORDS FROM BATTLELINE IN FRA

Curtain Still Drawn Around Action Along Aisne --Nothing 'New to Report Except Lively Engagement in Region of Roye, Paris War Office Announces --- Varying Reports From Antwerp -French Squadron Appears Before Gravosa and Ragusa, in Adriatic -- Russians Take Ten Thousand Prisoners and 40 Cannon in Fight on East Prussian Frontier.

Paris, Oct. 9, 11.09 p. m.—The following official communication was issued here this evening:-

"There is nothing new to report except that there has een a lively engagement in the region of Roye, where in the last two days we have captured 1,600 prisoners,

The war chancellories of the allies and the Germans have not seen fit to lift the curtain of secrecy high enough for the public to obtain an insight into the conditions which prevail along the battle line in France. "There is nothing to re-port," says the French war office, "except that there has been a lively engagement in the region of Roye, where in the last two days we have captured 1,600 prisoners." That is all. From the British and the Germans came nothing.

Of the situation in the east the Russians declare that near the East Prussian frontier in Russian Poland they are still pressing the Germans hard and at several points have obtained successes over them.

While one morning newspaper in London has been informed "on good authority" that Antwerp has fallen, neither the British official press bureau, nor the Belgian minister, are

able to confirm the report.

The last advices from Belgium had the Germans still hammering away with their artillery against Antwerp. One despatch said 200 big German guns were in operation there. Ostend advices reported thousands of refugees arriving in that city.

A Berlin despatch says that King Albert of Belgium, who has been reported to have left Antwerp at the head of a portion of his troops, has been slightly wounded.

British aeroplanes have visited Dusseldorf, Germany. A British official report says an aerial squadron succeeded in blowing up a Zeppelin airship shed in Dusseldorf, and destroying dirigible balloon in it. The three aviators engaged in the raid escaped, but lost their machines.

Austria has temporarily lifted the customs duties on corn, flour and vegetables.

Belgium has protested to the Washington government against Germany's alleged action in commandeering all food supplies in Brussels, and "reducing the native population to famine."

That the Canadian public, in this time of disturbed conditions, should, whenever possible, insist on purchasing goods "Made in Canada" is nothing more than a simple duty. It has been repeatedly pointed out that one of the great necessities of the day is to keep business conditions in Canada as near as can be at the normal standard. To do this it is necessary to prevent undue diminution of production in our manufactories, to keep the wheels of industry in operation and our workingmen employed. The war in Europe will not mean the crippling of any line of Canadian industry. It may mean a readjustment until the world situation changes but there is no reason why it should add to compare all or financial depression.

crippling of any line of Canadian Industry. It may mean a readjustment until the world situation changes but there is no reason why it should add to commercial or financial depression if our own people mark out for themselves a policy which will assist in bringing about the condition we all desire.

In times of peace, the Canadian manufacturer, with world wide markets to choose from, can cater to his export business but at present conditions are not as usual. Many foreign markets are temporarily closed, and if we would prevent stagnation and curtailment of industry with the accompanying depreciation of wages and lack of employment we should take steps to develop the home market. The manufacturers in Canada are doing their part. Some plants are being kept in operation merely to provide employment to faithful workers, but with foreign markets cut off there must be surplus stocks unless the home market is developed to a point where it can absorb the goods produced here.

One of the steps most likely to lead to the stage where the home market is sufficiently profitable to allow the manufacturers to keep their looms busy and their furnace fires lighted is to demand "Made in Canada" goods, and be satisfied with none other. Such a course does not entail a sacrifice, for the Canadian workman and the Canadian plant in all lines can produce as good an article as can be made elsewhere. The workman himself will be the first to make this claim and and if he is justified in it it is not too much to expect that he will purchase the product of his fellow workmen.
