purposes, and Police men steal the property they are detailed to guard, and

Fremont burn the houses they are paid to protect, and Aldermen send to the

drunken debauches, it is time for practical

Christianity to take the place of specu-

The Fredericton Land Scandal.

The papers submitted to Parliament

on the subject of the "sale" of certain

land at Fredericton, N. B., to the F. B. R. Co.,

to Temple and Barpe, or other parties, show

that the land was sold for \$6,000, the money

accepted and receipted for, the surveys

made on which the letters patent were

to be based, and the sale cancelled by the

Premier when the transaction had begun

to be too grossly discussed by the public.

The Premier publicly denied the sale,

but the papers show that only an arbitrary

exercise of authority cancelled it.

The land was valued by T. Col. Munroe,

on data obtained, as he writes to the

Department, from the President of the

Company and Mr. Pickard, at \$6,000, and

the recommendation made that the land

should be sold only for railway purposes.

Notwithstanding the fact that tele-

grams and letters from the Mayor, and

resolutions of the City Council and

Board of Trade, were sent to Ottawa

protesting in the strongest terms against

the transfer of the land to the railway,

giving reasons why the transfer should

not be made, and announcing the decision

of the Council not to grant the Railway

Co. the right of way to the land, the

Government proceeded to assemble, Jan. 1,

ordered, on a recommendation of the

Honorable the Minister of the Interior

to execute in favor of the Colon Railway

Company for the consideration of six

thousand dollars, to take effect from the

11th January 1875. By a letter dated

11th January the Dep. Min. of the Interior

informed Mr. Temple of this order, and

asked him to prepare a plan to be

submitted to the Hon. the Minister of the

Interior, and to be prepared by a

Prov. Land Surveyor, authenticated in

compliance with the law of New Brunswick,

showing the land with its subdivisions,

and on payment of the purchase money,

and on the production of the plan above

referred to, Letters Patent will be prepared

conveying the property to the "Iron Ry

Co." On the 20th Feb. the Dep. Min. of the

Interior acknowledged the receipt of the

\$6,000 from the Company, and asks for the

required plan. Mr. Temple replies that the

plan has been prepared, and is submitted

to the Hon. the Minister of the Interior,

and suggests a reduction in the price on

account of their being less land than the

price was based on. In the meantime,

curiously enough, Mr. Pickard, who seems

to have been acting with Mr. Temple all

along, has applied to the Militia Department

for the land in the name of the County of

York! The Minister of Militia, who had

promised that no lease should be granted

without giving a hearing to the City

Council, and in whose absence the sale

was ordered, wrote to the Minister of the

Interior, and directed him to proceed, and

Major Wetmore laid a vigorous memorial

before the Privy Council in opposition to

the transfer of the land to the Company,

the newspapers let the cat out of the

bag as to the ownership of the "Iron Ry

Co." and the Premier cancelled the

agreement for the purpose of quieting

scandal.

Conscience and the Pope—The Com-

ing Crisis.

Rev. Dr. Newman has made a conclu-

sive reply to Mr. Gladstone's last

pamphlet, by showing that, when the

Pope's commands conflict with the dic-

tates of conscience, the Pope is not to

be obeyed. There is one little fact,

however, that will mar the Protestant

world's satisfaction at Dr. Newman's

argumentative triumph—the fact that the

Pope will repudiate Dr. Newman's

definition of the relative importance of

the commands of the Vatican and the

dictates of conscience. There is no

place in the Catholic Church for con-

sciences whose dictates conflict with the

teachings of the Vicar of Christ. The

Rev. O. Brownson, one of the ablest of

Catholic controversialists in America,

in a lecture at Boston the other day,

stated the Roman Catholic theory with

respect to the relative rank of church

and state to be that the Divine Sover-

eignty, which is universal, is represent-

ed in human affairs by the Pope, the

Vicar of Christ, and that the civil law,

when it conflicts with the ecclesiastical

law, is to be wholly ignored. How,

then, can Dr. Newman consistently con-

ceive of a *christian* conscience re-

quiring obedience to laws that conflict

with Papal decrees—of Christ in man

resisting the commands of Christ at the

head of His Church? "But these behind

us, the Church's own making, are there

signs of a disposition to deprive the

Church of any of its present authority.

Cardinal Manning seems to have re-

ceived his scarlet hat with a feeling akin

to that with which the Highlandman

uses to receive the fiery cross. He an-

nounces that "the regards himself as

having been entrusted with a commis-

sion of warfare, for he believes that the

Church is approaching a crisis the most

terrible for 300 years." The crisis, if any

is at hand, will be of the Church's own

**THE SALARY GRAB LEGISLATION.**

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY. (Special Telegram to the Tribune.) FREDERICTON, April 10. The Surveyor-General this morning announced that the Government, having considered the matter of equalization of the stumpage charges, had decided to regulate the same to the conclusion to fix the rate on spruce and pine logs at 60 cents per M in the whole Province and that the stumpage on bark and unmanufactured lumber shall be 10 per cent. less than that on the logs. Further, that on the stumpage being renewed on the 1st July next no increase on these rates will be made.

**THE SALARY GRAB LEGISLATION.**

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY. (Special Telegram to the Tribune.) FREDERICTON, April 10. The House was prorogued to-day. At half-past twelve the Governor and Aide-Camp were met in the Council Chamber by the Speaker and members of the House, and the House assembled at 10 o'clock. The House was called to order by the Speaker, His Honor in relieving the members of their attendance, expressed his appreciation of the diligence with which the business of the country had been carried on. He referred to the act relating to rates and taxes, which he trusted established a basis for the annual complaints, and to the amendments to the act which he trusted would be approved. He trusted that the establishment of such institutions upon a public basis, and from your own funds, would be a great benefit to the country.

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
