## MEETINGS OF TOWN COUNCIL.

New Air Chamber for Town Pump Promised by Canadian Fairbanks Co.

### DISPUTE OVER BYELAWS.

The Civic Statutes to be Re-Drafted Some Time in the Future.

The adjourned meeting of the Town Council was held in the Town Hall on Wednesday evening. There were present Ald. Allison, Belyea, John Clark, T. A. Clarke, Falconer and Morrissy.

On motion, Ald. John Clark was appointed chairman.

A communication was received from the Canadian Fairbanks Company re new air chamber, which he company agreed to supply for the pump. Received and filed. Another was read from Intercolonial Coal Mining Company of Westville, N. S., urging the Council to place more immediate orders for coal, as the I. C. R. authorities were threatening to charge more for transportation after the close of navigation. Filed. The Town Clerk was instructed to write the company that the town can probably take one car per week from his date forward.

The by-laws were then brought up for further discussion. Much talk was found by Ald. Belyea, John Clark and Morrissy with the Mayor for having the by-laws drawn up without consulting the by-law committee, and the mayor being absent, nothing was done with the work. Council adjourned to meet on Friday, September 27.

At this meeting the Mayor, and Ald. Belyea, T. A. Clarke, John Clark, Falconer, Morrissy and McMurdo, were present.

A letter was read from G. Boudreau, offering to rent town hall or a moving picture show. The own Clerk was authorized to inform him the council could not accept his offer.

After vigorous discussion, it was moved by Ald. T. A. Clarke, and seconded by Ald. Falconer, that the draft of By-Laws now before the Council be referred to the By-law committee for them to compare with the originals and report.

Ald. Belyea and Morrissy moved amendment That the By-Law committee call for tenders for a typewriter to go into the Town Clerk's office, and in conjunction with the By-Law committee and Town Clerk to have a copy of the by-laws made from the Minutes. Amendment was carried.

On motion of Ald. T. A. Clarke and McMurdo, the Finance Committee were authorized to procure the services of an Auditor, and to make the best arrangement possible.

On motion of Ald. Clarke and Falconer, it was carried, that the sum of forty dollars yearly be charged to the school funds and placed to the credit of the water rates.

On motion adjourned.

## WILL INSPECT THE CENTRAL.

Commissioners and Guests Will go Over the Road Next Tuesday.

On October 8th a party of inspection will be taken over the Central Railway by Senator King and Geo. McAvity, the two commissioners in charge of the line. The purpose of this tour is to make known to the public the great improvements made in the railway since it was taken over by the commission.

The party will leave St. John at 7.15 a. m. and will return the same evening. A special car will be chartered and will go as far as Minto, Queens county. Opportunity of inspecting the line and the various bridges on it will be given. The coal fields of Queens county will also be examined at close quarters. Construction work on the National Transcontinental is expected to be under way near Chipman and the party on inspection will be able to take that in also. Invitations have already been issued by the commissioners. Members of the provincial and federal governments, irrespective of party, have been asked to attend. Representatives of the press will be present and many of the large coal consumers of the province have been invited to join the party.

## DOUKHOBORS MOVING.

Winnipeg, Sept. 27.—Superintendent Bury, of the C. P. R., has sent a message to Premier Roblin and a telegram to Sir Wilfrid Laurier calling attention to the fact that there is a party of forty Doukhobors at Kenora and one of forty-four at Whitemouth, both intending to walk along the railway track to Montreal. Mr. Bury states that with heavy traffic on the railway there is every probability of their being run over. He urges that, in the interest of humanity, some action be taken and the Doukhobors be not allowed to undertake the journey, with dangers from accident and from the cold weather.

The C. P. R. has offered to transfer the whole party free of charge back to Yorkton, but the Doukhobors have absolutely refused to go. They are almost starving but they say they will reach Montreal on die.

## Local and Provincial News

Of Special Interest to Our Readers, Gathered  
By Our Reporters from Many Sources,  
Whirl of the Town.

The Moncton Exhibition Association in 1908 will be run one week, passed fixing Thursday, Oct. 31 probably between Sept. 10 and 20, for Thanksgiving Day.

At a special convocation of the University of Toronto held on Thursday the honorary degree of LL. D. was conferred upon Prof. Cecil C. Jones, of the University of New Brunswick.

Mr. F. O. Landry, of Bathurst has removed from the Opera House to the building formerly occupied by Robertson & Melanson, and has greatly added to his stock. New fittings have been put in, and Mr. Landry has now one of the nicest jewelry stores in the province.

Mr. Alphonse E. Turgeon, son of O. Turgeon, M. P., for Gloucester, has been sworn in as attorney-General of Saskatchewan, to succeed his law partner, Hon. J. H. Lamont, who was recently appointed to fill the vacancy on the supreme court bench. Mr. Turgeon will likely contest the bye-election which takes place on October 13th.

From the breadth of Canada in the month of August there were reported to the labor department twenty-six trade disputes which affected two hundred establishments and some six thousand employees. As the result of these disputes there were lost 99,860 working days.

The University of New Brunswick examinations began on Thursday last, and the lectures on Monday of this week. There were three new professors—Prof. Carsen, in chemistry; Dr. Philip Cox in Political Cartilage. The engineering camp of construction, which has been going on at Onomotto, disbanded last week.

A convention of the opposition to the local government will be held in Carleton Place on October 10th. Parish meetings to elect delegates will be held between now and the convention date. On the evening of the convention there will be a public meeting addressed by J. D. Hazen, M. P., leader of the Opposition, and John Morrissey, M. P., and others. The same speakers will address a meeting in Bathurst on the evening of Oct. 11.

It having been reported by the Secretary of school trustees that the account is considerably overdrawn at the Bank and that he has failed to obtain any payment on this year's assessment, it was suggested that the teachers may have been enrolled among the so-called great inconvenience if their pay is not forthcoming at the first of the month. An effort will be made to overcome this.—Fredericton Gleaner.

On and after October 1, the postal rate on letters to Great Britain, Egypt and all parts of the British Empire, excepting Australia and Rhodesia, will be two cents an ounce, while the rates to all other postal union countries, excepting the United States and Mexico, will be five cents for the first ounce and three cents for the succeeding ounces. For the rates now prevailing, it will, after October 1, be possible to send a letter twice as heavy as at present. Now the rates are for letters weighing half an ounce.

put in the field by Mr. James K. Pinder, for the County of York, is the subject of a good deal of amusement in well-informed circles.

The only member of it, who is favorably known in this county is Mr. John A. Young, of Zionville, who is a respectable citizen, although he is in company with some violent and impudent partisans.

A prominent friend of the opposition party, on Saturday, when he saw the alleged convention coming out of the court house said pathetically: "Is this the state the opposition has been reduced to in this country?" It was not to be expected that such a convention would select candidates of any weight who would command the confidence of the electors.

Mr. Robinson, who hails from Manners-Sutton, has for several years represented the opposition at the poll in his own parish, and has always been so unfortunate as to be defeated, a contingency which is certain to produce bad feeling and recrimination and a lack of confidence in the manner in which Mr. Robinson used the "arguments" at his disposal.

It is unnecessary to say anything about Mr. Pinder, except that his heart fairly bleeds for honesty and purity in politics. It is true that Mr. Pinder gets snowed up occasionally on the eve of an election, but he has fairly promised Mr. Hazen not to regard the state of the weather on this occasion.

Mr. Pinder, as a candidate, is amusing, and if there are any persons in the county of York who have any confidence in him they have not yet disclosed themselves. The lamentable condition of the Opposition is best shown by the fact that Mr. Pinder, in default of respected men, has become their leader in this county. In fact, Mr. Pinder stated at the convention on Saturday, that if it had not been for him there would not have been any opposition in this county.

Mr. Harry McLeod who was nominated on Saturday, but hesitated before accepting, was nominated as a matter of form from failure of the convention to find a better man. Mr. Hooe, who is well known to the electors, declined to accept the nomination because he knows the contest is hopeless.

And the putting up of such a ticket insures its defeat by a majority which Mr. Alex. Gibson said at the convention of the government party would be about 2,000. It is perhaps needless to say that the combination is the laughing stock of the city.

## G. P. R. LAKE BOATS.

Montreal, Sept. 24.—The second of the C. P. R. new lake boats, the Keewatin, reached Montreal this morning and began the discharge of 1,000 tons of general cargo which she brought across the Atlantic. She with her sister ship, the Assiniboia, will be the two largest and best steamers in the C. P. R. lake service. As soon as her cargo is unloaded the Keewatin will return to Lewis, where she will be cut in two. She will then be towed up the St. Lawrence and the lakes as far as Buffalo, where she will be put together again.

PRESBYTERY.

New Clergymen for Chatham and  
New Richmond—Three  
Bursaries Established.

The Presbytery of Miramichi resumed its session Tuesday afternoon, Sept. 24th, the moderator, Rev. J. G. A. Colquhoun, in the chair.

The treasurer's statement showed a balance of \$82.26 on hand. The call of Rev. W. M. McCullum of Philadelphia Presbytery, Penn., to the congregation of New Richmond was supported by Rev. Geo. Tattler, of New Carlisle, Moderator in the call, and agreed to. Arrangements were made for his induction on Tuesday, October 8th at 7 p. m. Mr. Tattler to preside, induct and preach, Mr. McPherson, to address the minister and Mr. Hardie the people.

The Moderator reported that he had moderated in a call to St. Andrew's Church, Chatham, on Sept. 4th, which came out in favor of Rev. Geo. Wood, Amherst. The call was signed by 178 communicants and 183 adherents, and was accompanied by a guaranteed stipend of \$1200 and manse and one month's vacation. Mayor MacLachlan, Messrs. Frank Carruthers and John Sinclair were heard in support of the call. On motion of Rev. D. Henderson and Dr. Carr, the call was sustained and ordered to be forwarded to Presbytery, to issue the matter with all possible speed. Provisional arrangements for the induction of Mr. Wood were made as follows:—the Moderator to preside and induct; Mr. McArthur to preach, Mr. Simpson to address the minister and Mr. Fraser the people.

Rev. A. B. Dickie was nominated for Moderator of Synod, which meets in Halifax this week. The Presbytery agreed to establish three bursaries of the value of \$50 each to be awarded annually to deserving students studying for the ministry of the church. The bursars will be required to prosecute their studies either at the U. N. B. or at Dalhousie, Halifax.

The Presbytery adjourned to meet at Synod in Halifax at the call of the Moderator.



## AMERICANS BUY MORE MILLS.

Purchase the Property of Summer and Co. in Gloucester County.

One of the biggest lumber deals in the history of the North Shore counties of New Brunswick was consummated the other day, when Summer & Co. sold their entire property in Gloucester County to American capitalists. The property sold includes a large sawmill at Bathurst, a general store at the same place, and extensive lumber areas throughout the country. The price paid is said to be in the neighborhood of \$250,000. On Aug. 1st, the new company took over the timber limits and they will take over the mill and store on Dec. 1. The company will carry on the business in a much larger scale than heretofore. At present they have 310 men in the woods. The machinery of the mill will be changed so as to cut American standards instead of British. The new company will find the market for its output in the United States. It is their intention to build a branch road from the I. C. R. to the mill. All shipments will be made by rail. The property of Summer & Co. is the fourth industry on the North Shore to be gobbled up by Americans within the past year or two.

## HAD SPITE AGAINST GERMANS.

Shocking Treatment of German Boys by Captain and Mate of Norwegian Vessel.

BROUGHT TO JUSTICE.

Mate Fined \$100 and Sentenced to Jail for Three Months.  
—Captain Fined Also.

At New Carlisle, on Thursday, Capt. K. S. Kristiansen, of the Norwegian bark Agat, was fined \$100; and the first mate, was fined \$100 and also sentenced to three months in jail for cruelty to a German boy on board their vessel at Bonaventure.

It appears that the story leaked out through Stevedore Gallagher and his men who were loading the Agat. One morning they found the boy tied to a ringbolt on deck. Both his hands and his feet were tied and he could scarcely move a foot. He was kept in that position for days, it is alleged, and the only food handed out to him consisted of burned crusts and water. He told the stevedore that the mate had thumped his head against the deck until it had driven him mad. Mr. Gallagher asked the captain why he kept the boy in that position and the captain's only reply was that the boy wouldn't work. Another time the men saw the boy taken; bound as he was, a rope attached to him, and lowered over the side of the vessel, then dipped several times into the water and at length brought out more dead than alive. On another occasion the longshoremen saw the mate with an iron bar chase the boy up through the rigging, the boy all the while screaming in a terrified manner. Baring his shoulders and neck the boy showed Oswald Smith, of Campbellton, and others, marks which he said had been inflicted by the mate with a red hot iron. Mr. Smith remonstrated with the captain saying that the boy could not understand orders. The captain replied that the boy could understand, but all that could be got out of the unfortunate young fellow was "No stand."

At last the local authorities communicated with the German consul at Montreal, and the captain and mate were arrested. The testimony at the trial was particularly revolting. It was brought out that while the boy was tied hand and foot, a cat was tied to him, and that he was subjected to other horrifying cruelties.

Another German boy, who was also the victim of ill-treatment on board the Agat, ran away. He was located by the authorities and was one of the witnesses against the mate.

## IMPORTANT TO FARMERS.

Professor McBride Announces That Product of Wheat Fields Can be Doubled by Cross Breeding.

Professor McBride, of McGill University has just returned from Cambridge University, where he investigated the new process of wheat crossing. He believes that the question has been solved. He claims that the qualities of certain kinds of wheat are due to heredity and are not the result of the climate. By a process of cross-breeding he has got a product which combines the good qualities of Manitoba hard with those of English wheat. The large soft heads of English wheat and the hard qualities of Manitoba No. 1 make an ideal product and one which will double the yield of the Canadian wheat fields.



## MILITARY TRAINING IN SCHOOLS.

The militia department is arranging with the provincial educational authorities to have military drill taught to the school children of Nova Scotia, to have boys of fourteen instructed in bearing arms, and older boys in rifle practice.

A paper in favor of a similar plan for New Brunswick was read by a prominent military man at the provincial teachers' institute in Chatham in June, 1906, and was strongly opposed by the secretary-treasurer of the N. B. Teachers' Union, now editor of the Union Advocate. Not a single member of the institute spoke in favor of military training for school children, and the matter was quietly dropped.

That the new departure is not unanimously endorsed in Nova Scotia is evident from a recent editorial in the New Glasgow Eastern Chronicle, one of the chief government organs in that province. Not having space to reprint the whole, we reproduce the opening—and much the milder—paragraphs, which read as follows:—

"We republish from the Morning Chronicle an account of the raid being planned on the public schools by the Minister of Militia, Sir Frederick Borden; the Superintendent of Education, Dr. A. H. McKay; and General Lake. The Chronicle prints a column and a half editorial warmly commending the project. We do not agree with any one of the quartette of, shall we say, conspirators. The school authorities of the province have their hands quite full with teaching the school children the overwhelming and overloaded curriculum the Superintendent of Education has placed upon them without a military education and a rifle to boot. Just fancy our boys of fourteen being sent to school with loaded rifles in their hands, indeed! What in the name of common sense would the school ma'ams do with them? There may be conditions in cities and large towns for forming what is called 'Cadet Corps,' but let them be kept out of our school houses and school playgrounds.

"We sincerely hope the Council of Public Instruction will not be led away with the glamour of this fool scheme of the War Minister and the Superintendent of Education, not to mention the great General in the plot. What makes the distressing announcement harder to bear is the statement that members of the Government were at the painful 'scance' and were giving it their countenance. In Heaven's name, what were they at? Convert our public schools into military camps, forsooth! Better by far, expend a little energy in teaching religion and moral ethics in the schools than loading the 1 vs down with rifles and teaching them to shoot. The public schools never were intended for

such uses as military men alone think the greatest and best in the world."

## ISOLATING GERMANY.

Britain and Russia have signed a treaty settling all possible causes of boundary disputes for many years to come. The agreement relates to Tibet, Afghanistan, and Persia, the three countries that connect the British and Russian empires in Asia. Tibet is mutually recognized as belonging to China; Afghanistan is acknowledged to be wholly within the British sphere of influence; while Russian interests are to be supreme in the northern and greater part of Persia and British in the seacoast provinces. Some years ago, Russia formally agreed to Britain's ownership of Egypt, which includes both sides of the Suez canal. The treaty appears to be decidedly in favor of Britain; but it is thought that Russia acquiesces in Britain's supremacy in Egypt, Arabia and the shores of the Persian Gulf in return for the latter's friendship when Russia attempts to seize the small states of Southeastern Europe over which Germany is trying to establish a protectorate. In any dispute between Germany and Russia, Britain's assistance or neutrality would be invaluable to either party. The prospects for any considerable increase of German territory and influence in the near future now look very unfavorable.

## ENOUGH PROTECTION NOW.

The President of the Canadian Association voices the perennial lament of that high-tariff organization when he calls for "more protection" to "preserve the home market." The facts, however, are all against Mr. Cockshutt. There is scarcely a factory in the whole country which is not running at full capacity and still cannot meet the demand for its product. And in the face of this great activity we have a demand for "a more adequate protective tariff" which would simply mean making the consumer pay the piper for goods which the Canadian manufacturer cannot supply. Talk about "preserving the home markets"—why President Cockshutt knows that the manufacturers are turning down orders from the "home market" every day of the week.—Halifax Chronicle.

## FURTHER VINDICATION OF JEWISH SCRIPTURES.

Recent despatches announce that Brugsch Bey, the famous Egyptologist, has discovered hieroglyphics which confirm the story in the Book of Genesis as to the "seven lean years" in Egypt 1,700 years before the Christian era. The inscription shows that about that time the Nile failed to rise for seven consecutive years, and as a consequence there was a great famine throughout the land. Biblical students and theologians are eagerly awaiting the publication of the inscription. Most of the Old Testament history has already been corroborated from independent Egyptian and Asiatic sources, and every year new evidence testifies to the truth of the Bible narrative.

## THE PAPER MILL.

What has become of the paper mill project? Is Mr. Beveridge going to build here, or is he not? It was intimated some time ago that a public meeting would be called to lay the proposed agreement before the ratepayers. But there has been no such public meeting held. The Town Council has met three times since, but has passed most of its time wrangling over His Worship's drafting of the bye-laws rather than in consideration of the town's industrial progress. True, the constitutional question involved in the bye-laws dispute is an important one; but there are other problems also pressing for solution. If there are any obstacles in the way of the paper mill being established here, let us have a public meeting and the details of the question thrashed out before the citizens. Free discussion is best in such cases. Let the people hear and decide for themselves.

## ANOTHER LIBEL SUIT.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley, minister of public works, takes exception to the statement of the Toronto World of Sept. 21st, that "There

Dr. Pugsley is to be commended for his prompt action in taking steps to clear his own reputation; and the World, which confesses that it would like to know the truth about the famous deal, defends the action presumably from an unselfish desire to help out the investigation. Much good should come from the suit.

Mr. Pugsley recently made very damaging statements regarding the Opposition leader's campaign funds in the election of 1904, and challenged Mr. Borden to bring suit against either himself or the St. John Sun, which published his speech. But Mr. Borden has not yet accepted the challenge; and people are wondering why he does not do so.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST.

**Homestead Regulations.**  
Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.  
Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead conditions under one of the following plans:  
(1.) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.  
(2.) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person, residing with the father or mother.  
(3.) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.  
Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

## TEMPERANCE IN QUEBEC GAINING.

Archbishops Bruchesi and Begin and Other Prominent Frenchmen Address Big Meeting.

Six to seven thousand people attended the public gathering of the Anti-Alcohol League of Quebec, held Wednesday night in the drill hall at Quebec city, when addresses were delivered by a number of prominent public men. The temperance wave is decidedly strong in Quebec and played a considerable part in the election of several of the city aldermen at the last municipal elections.

Chief Justice Sir Francis Langelle presided, supported by the Lieutenant Governor Sir Louis Jette, Archbishop Begin, Archbishop Bruchesi, Mgrs. ## SHOOTS WITHOUT ANY REASON.

Montreal Woman Tries to Kill a Man And Then Shoots Herself.

Montreal, Sept. 27.—A jealous or crazy woman turned the main billiard room of the Checky and Chess Club, east St. Catharines street, into a scene of the wildest confusion this afternoon, when Miss Elaine LaPointe, a dressmaker, fired a revolver at the manager, Ludger Houle, wounding him, and then shot herself. The woman is now in the Notre Dame Hospital, where the medical superintendent states that her life is despaired of, as a 32 calibre bullet is lodged in the back of the head and has just been located.

Mr. Houle was fired at while his back was turned to the woman, and the bullet entered behind his right ear but surgeons were able to extract it a short time after he had been conveyed to the Notre Dame Hospital, and he will probably entirely recover from its effects in a few days.

What the woman's motive was in thus firing at a man with whom she had been more or less acquainted during the past ten years, is still a mystery. Mr. Houle himself says he cannot account for the occurrence, except by supposing that Miss LaPointe was temporarily insane, but at the boarding house where the latter was staying the landlady asserts that the woman had never given any sign of being out of her mind.

"I cannot account for the affair at all," said Mr. Houle. "If there had been any question of love between us it might be explained, but there never was anything of the kind. I think the poor girl must have had hard times lately and gone out of her mind."


