



Saskatchewan and Alberta, except ing 8 and 26, not reserved, may the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate Entry by proxy may, however, b made on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead conditions under one of the following plans: (1.) At least six months' resi-

dence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2.) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the omesteader resides upon a farm ir the vicinity of the land entered for

may be satisfied by such person, residing with the father or mother (3.) If the settler has his peremanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements residence upon the said land.
