COUNCIL BUYS MOTOR TRUCK

Fire Equipment to be Brought Up-to-Date—War Trophies For Campbellton.

A meeting of the town council was held Tuesday evening His Worship Mayor Murray in the Chair with Councillors Dickie, Matthews, Devereaux, Ingram and Belle-Isle present.

Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed.

A communication was read from Poor Commissioner Wm. Savidant recommending that a bill of \$13. for board of one of the town charges be paid at \$11. On motion the Poor Commissioner's recommendation was adopted.

A communication was read from the Canadian Alio Chambers Co. stating that the electric motor rented by the town to drive the water pump had arrived back in good condition, and the Company would make no charge for the use of the motor. Clerk instructed to acknowledge receipt of letter and to thank the Company for their generosity in the matter.

A communication was read from Mr. D. K. Graham, Secretary of the L.O.L. of Restigouche protesting against one of the town policemen stopping innocent games at the 12th of July Celebration and asking for an explanation as to why it was done. Laid on table to be taken up later.

A communication was read from the Town Solicitor with reference to the desiring over to the town of a piece of land to widen Central street by the members of the Church of Our Lady of the Snows. The Solicitor pointed out the deed was given in good faith, but it appeared they had no authority to give it. Authority would be obtained for this at the next meeting of the Provincial Legislature when a legal deed would be accepted. Laid on the table.

A communication was read from the Sun Insurance Co. in connection with the temporary buildings vacated by the town on King street. The company claimed these buildings were badly in need of repairs, also that the grounds about them should be tidied up and kept clean. Laid on table.

His Worship the Mayor then read a letter received by him from the Department at Ottawa notifying the town that one 77m German Gun and four machine guns had been awarded Campbellton. The question of where these guns would be located on arrival here was left in the hands of the Educational and Improvement Committee.

His Worship received an urgent call and deputy Mayor Ingram was called to the Chair.

An application for a license to conduct a refreshment business from Geo. Dow was read, also an application from S. M. Moores for an auctioneer's license. Both applications were referred to the Police and License Committee.

The usual departmental accounts were then gone into and ordered paid.

The report of Mr. Tremblay, formerly Chief of the Montreal Fire Department, and Chief A. E. O'Donnell, who had been requested by the council to look into the needs of the Campbellton Fire Department was read.

This report was a lengthy one, going fully into the necessary articles to bring our equipment to a high state of efficiency. The total cost of the material required was in the vicinity of \$5,000. A motor driven combination chemical engine and hose car, value \$3,150, was recommended. Extension ladders to the value of \$460, twelve salvage covers, \$50 each, twelve fire extinguishers for firemen's homes, \$16 each. Four of these extinguishers to be placed in each ward, so that firemen close to a fire and on the spot early may have an opportunity of doing effective work before the arrival of the department. Many other smaller but most necessary articles were recommended. There was much discussion over this report and the various items were carefully considered. During this discussion His Worship returned and resumed the chair. All councillors were in hearty accord with the report, and on motion it was decided to purchase at once the above mentioned articles, delivery to be made in thirty days time.

WAR TROPHIES FOR CAMPBELLTON

German 77m Gun and Four German Machine Guns Now on Way Here.

It will be remembered shortly after the close of the war, His Worship Mayor Murray wrote the Department at Ottawa making application for war trophies. In acknowledging the receipt of His Worship's letter Lieut. Col. A. G. Doughty stated that at that time no promise of war trophies could be made, but his application would be kept in mind.

In February last His Worship again took up the matter of war trophies for Campbellton and several letters passed between himself and the Department in which His Worship put forth Campbellton's claim to receive at least some recognition for the service rendered, pointing out that Campbellton had supplied more men during the war than had any other Canadian town, according to population. Finally word was received that Campbellton would be awarded some war trophies.

On Saturday last His Worship received the following letter from Lieut. Col. Doughty which speaks for itself: PUBLIC ARCHIVES OF CANADA, Ottawa, July 23, 1920.

Sir,—

In accordance with the distribution of war trophies approved by the Government, the Town of Campbellton has been allotted the following trophies:—

One German 77m Gun, No. 2402, and four German Machine Guns.

These trophies, which have been declared the property of the people of Canada, are sent to you with the understanding that proper care will be taken of them and in taking over these guns, it is understood that you agree to this condition.

On motion it was ordered "That Mr. D. K. Graham, Secretary of the L. O. L. of Restigouche, be notified that the action of Policeman Chas. B. Gray in interfering with the playing of innocent games near the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital on July 12th was undertaken on his own responsibility and was not ordered or authorized by the Town Council or Police and License Committee or any person responsible thereto, and we regret that such an incident has occurred."

The hour being late council then adjourned.

LIQUOR CASES UP FOR TRIAL

Some Activity in Prohibition Matters During Past Week—Fines Imposed.

It has been said that much liquor is offered for sale contrary to the Liquor Law, both in town and in the country districts. From the evidence at hand it seems that the assertion is all too true. We are glad to see that a start has been made to round some of these illegal dealers up.

Mr. John Morrissey of Dalhousie was on Saturday convicted of having liquor in a place other than his private dwelling and was fined \$75.00 and costs.

On July 16th, Arthur Brideau of Arsenau Siding was convicted of selling liquor without a license, and was fined \$90 and cost. Joseph Dion, of St. Quentin was also fined \$75 and costs for having liquor in a public place. Both these cases were tried before Justice of the Peace Somers at St. Quentin.

On Saturday Police Magistrate Matheson imposed a fine of \$75.00 and costs upon Joseph Labby of Arsenau Siding for selling liquor illegally. Fines were also imposed on Nicholas Roy, Mrs. Joshua Cooling and Mrs. F. Dugas, all of Ferguson Manor, for having their licensed beer premises open on Sunday.

An interesting case was before Police Magistrate Matheson Tuesday. The informant in the case Raoul Rochette had information laid against Adela Labby, Onetime Labby, Pea Beaulieu, Francois Beaulieu and Hilaire, who were accused of stealing or taking from the informant a quantity of liquor to the value of \$1,200. All the accused were sent up for trial. Several charges are being laid against informant relative to the prohibition act, as a result of the preliminary examination.

SHAMROCK LOSES CUP RACES

Resolute Wins Final Race of Series Tuesday Afternoon and Shamrock Wins Cup.

Shamrock's upset on Monday cost the challenger Shamrock's chance of giving the Regatta a fourth year. The worst drubbing of the series today winning boat for boat thirteen minutes and forty-five seconds—and the America's famous yachting cup remains in the United States.

Overcoming a forty second lead the advantage of a windward berth which Shamrock had taken at the start, the defender held a lead of four minutes and eight seconds at the half-way stake of the thirty mile course, and crossed the finish line thirteen minutes and five seconds ahead. Including her handicap of six minutes and forty seconds, Resolute won by eighteen minutes and forty-five seconds.

As the challenger crossed the mark her British crew let out three ringing cheers for the victor, and the conquerors responded with lusty cheers for Shamrock and her crew.

NEW YORK WRITER BOOSTS CANADA

Former Winnipeg Girl Says the Dominion Has Call—Great Possibilities Before It.

Winnipeg, July 24.—"Wake up Canada." This was the daron call brought to Winnipeg by a former Winnipeg girl, Miss Agnes C. Lant, now a New York financial writer, who came here to visit with friends before "roughing it" on vacation, on Mackenzie River. Incidentally Miss Lant hinted with a significant flick of the right eye, that "You never can tell which a person will stumble on virgin oil fields."

"If Canada pulls together, if labor and capital and east and west bury their grievances in stomach unity of war days, this Dominion will see a prosperity boom not even dreamt of by real estate dealers."

She said: "There's a panic coming in the United States. It may come all of a lump; it may come in germs. But the handwritings are on the wall. Factories are cutting down to two days a week schedules, and banks are calling in their paper."

With hard times this winter, American labor, hundreds of thousands of skilled men and women, will look about for employment. Europe is impossible and Canada offers the only field. American capital, too, must inevitably turn to the Dominion at about \$1,000 million of American money should come here in the next few years. But Canada today is thinking in small town figures, when the world demands billion-dollar programs. The mines here are sending out a third of what they should; shortage of labor will mean a one-half crop in the east, and a three-fourths crop here in the west.

"In ten years the United States will not produce enough grain to feed its people. Either Canada or the Argentine will get the grain trade."

OUR OVERDRAFT.

The overdraft which the Town of Campbellton is today carrying should be a matter of deep concern to every citizen.

The Graphic understands that the amount is about sixty thousand dollars.

To the Bank of Nova Scotia we, as a town, are paying the current rate of interest. But the alarming statement was made recently by the Treasurer that on and after August 1st all cities, towns and municipalities were required by the recent excise and luxury tax legislation to pay two per cent per month on all overdrafts.

If this statement is correct, (we can hardly credit it) it means that Campbellton will be required to pay twelve hundred dollars a month tax on the overdraft, or at the rate of twenty-four per cent per year.

Under these circumstances it should be the policy of our finance committee and in fact the whole Council to spend every energy to wipe out this overdraft and thus save this exorbitant tax.

In fact our citizens should insist that something be done at once to relieve the ratepayers of this added burden.



A FATAL JEWEL.

The Emperor's Fall Led to 11-Starred Diamond.

An 11-starred diamond, which last night was the crown of the Emperor of Persia, is now credited with having been a factor in bringing about the ruin of the Hohenzollern dynasty. It is known as the "Blaze of Glory."

According to the tale about it, the diamond was given by King Solomon to the Queen of Sheba, having been plucked by him from his temple for her adornment. Curious carvings on two sides of it are supposed to be heraldic crests of the two emperors. Tales of the gem were carried into Persia, where they credited the great of the Sassanid King Bahram II, who robbed the Queen of Sheba's grave to secure it for himself. Within two weeks thereafter he was slain in his palace, and thereafter, through the caprices of fate and chance, the gem came to the hands of a merchant of Brandenburgh, whose house started the Prussian dynasty, found the gem on a Jewish merchant in one of the Emperor's raids into Silesia, and set it, declaring that he would place it in the crown of a great kingdom he was to establish. The merchant was instantly slain when he ventured to remind the emperor of the evil influence of the diamond. It seems to have been handed down the Prussian line, until finally it reached the one-time emperor now in retreat in Holland.

It is said that Herr Zankendorf, a learned antiquary, who had learned the fateful history of the gem and who to some way had forecasted that ruin would come to its owner between the years 1918 and 1922, implored the young emperor to rid himself of it before his coronation, and that to this entreaty William replied: "You must understand that I am crowned by the Spirit of God and the will of my people. The Hohenzollerns must endure forever. No curse of evil can harm our dynasty." So he kept the gem in his crown, and tradition seems to have justified itself.—The Watch on the Rhine.

PANCAKES FOR THE POOR.

Perhaps you profess ignorance as to how the pancakes first came to be introduced? Well, the story is very interesting, and worth telling.

Monks were the originators of pancakes, and we are told that on Shrove Tuesday, their supper consisted of thin cakes made in a pan with flour, milk, eggs, fat, lard, etc.—hence pancakes. In its olden days the poor people would gather round various monastery gates, it being the custom for the monks to distribute what pancakes they had left after supper amongst the hungry almshouse dwellers. Shrove-Tuesday, and Shrove Tuesday, by the way, were in the first place, called Shrove-days. They were so called from the fact that in the Roman Catholic Church confessions are then made and received preparatory to the Fast of Lent. Shrove, which meant confession, later came to be called Shrove—thus we now get Shrove Sunday and Shrove Tuesday.

Following this is Ash Wednesday, which gets its name from the custom, in the Roman Catholic Church, of using ashes as a sign of penitence. These ashes were strewn on the head of the penitent on that particular day, consequently it came to be known as "Ash" Wednesday.




