

Science Explains Strange Phonomics of Nature.

An interesting attempt is made by writer in Science to explain the writer in Science to explain the inring sands of Lake Michigas. These extend along its eastern shore roun Gary, at the southern extremity, o Mackinac, at the northern, with comparatively few breaks or interpretations. Throughout this region the sands near the water's edge, in dry weather, emit a peculiar but densite and unmistakable sound when the foot of the pedeatrian punhes through them in an abrasive way. This unusual sound is produced not only by the leather-shod foot, but is smitted also if the bare foot or hand is struck through the grains or if a stick is trailed, boy-fashion, behind. Thoreau, in the Journal, said it was like the sound made by rubbing ever glass with your inger or by waxing a table. It was a squeaking sound, as of one particle rubbing against another.

"My hypothesis, briefly stated, is this," says a writer in Science. "The sand grains on the lower beach and as far as the upper limit of the storm beach are batch periodically by the waters of the lake, which con-

There are no fish in Great Salt take, and many have asked how the pelicans live. Inquiry shows that the older pelicans fly every morning to Utah Lake, about thirty miles distant, and consume a meal of freshwater fish, and then return with their pouches full to feed the younger pelicans.

Bird Island is nothing more than a rocky structure. There is no human habitation there. Neither is there any wegetation. The reason for the pelicans remaining at Bird Island and making the duily flight of another lake for food has never been fully explained, although fish and game officials say that the pelicans understand that they cannot be moiested at the islands, and that therefore the sanctuary in Great Sult Lake will always continue as their permanent abode.—Popular Science Magazine.






