THE CENTRAL SCHOOL.

It was the intention not to refer again to the Central School difficulty but circumstances have led to a decision to write a few sentences and to clear the discussion off so far as this paper is concerned.

With reference to the causes that have led to the unfortunate state of affairs in this school district perhaps the less said about them the better. Like almost every serious difference between parties there are two sides.

The Central School is now a fixed fact and seems to be doing good and satisfactory work. The trustees have been fortunate in getting good men to take charge of the new school. The attendance is such that an assistant may have to be employed.

The cat was out of the bag.
