**Lack of Proper Care.**

The death of Samuel McDowell, who was  
crushed under a tank at the Imperial Oil  
Works, was investigated by Coroner Flock's  
jury last night and a verdict returned to the  
effect that the death was caused on account of  
want of proper care in the execution of the  
work, and that the foreman, George Min-  
hinick, is and was responsible for the want  
of care. After the evidence from John  
Sloan recognizing the body, from Dr.  
Moore as to death being instantaneous, and  
from George Billings, stating that he had  
seen the deceased at the same kind of work  
previously, George Minhinick, fore-  
man of the work, was examined.  
He stated that when the de-  
ceased occurred the south end of the  
condenser was up on two oil barrels. A  
plank of two inches was stretched across.  
The north end was resting on two pieces of  
steel timber, about 12 feet long. This was  
the end they were jacking up, and it had  
been raised about a foot from the ground.  
John Marshall, who was working with Mc-  
Dowell, testified that the deceased went under  
the tank to take out some of the plank-  
ing and before doing so removed some of the  
blocking which was in his way. When  
witness saw the condenser begin to slide he  
saw the deceased to look out for him-  
self, but it was too late. Maurice Baldwin  
testified that it was dangerous to use but  
one jack as had been done by the workmen.  
He thought that proper care had not been  
used. No one need have gone underneath.  
The jury returned a verdict as above  
stated.
