DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Regulating the Live Stock Trade Between England and Canada.

Purse Seines and Mackerel Fishing

OTTAWA, July 30.—A bill to regulate the live stock trade between England and Canada was introduced to-day, and Mr. Tupper in introducing it said that last year there was introduced into the English House of Commons a bill proposing to abolish altegether or to prohibit the shipping of live stock by vessels across the occan. That measure threatened to become a great damage to one of the most important industries of Canada. A short time after the introduction of the bill there was a departmental committee organized under the presidency of the president of the Board of Trade, Mr. Chaplin, and on the recommendation of that president of the Bosa a president of that lin, and on the recommendation of that committee the bill was referred to the Canacommittee the bill was referred to the bill was referred dian Government for consideration, and their views were invited on a matter that interested shippers of live stock, owners of eattle and underwriters, in fact all those who took an active part in the discussion of the subject. The bill proposed that the cost of inspection should be secured by the imposition of a small tax upon the animals shipped, and out of those fees the salaries of the inspectors would be provided. Mr. Davies, while approving of the provisions of the bill, objected to several of the penalties prescribed. It was proposed that an offender should have his vessel confiscated by a convicting judge with an appeal to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

Mr. Tupper contended that the bill was demanded by the fishermen of the Atlantic coast, as purse seine fishing was destroying mackerel fishing. It was necessary to prescribe such penalties as would make the act effective.

DEWDNEY'S DISGRACE.

The most contemptible appropriation of public money that has so far been brought out by the Public Accounts Committee is that laid at the door of Hon. Mr. Dewdney, Minister of the Interior, who holds his position in the Cabinet by virtue of the fact that his wife and the wife of the late Minister of the Crown, who last year drew a salary of \$8,000 and traveling expenses amounting to several hundred dollars, has been in the habit of compelling public servants to spend their time in working for his private benefit. For example, one carpenter was for weeks employed making furniture for the private residence of the Minister, partly in his own home and partly in the workshop of the department, his remaneration coming out of vate residence as Mr. Dewdney's butler valet, though he receives an annual salary to give his whole time to work in the department. Mr. Somerville and other members endeavored to abstract from the witness the full par-ticulars of this case, but the friends of the Minister, with an unfairness that betokened their fear that a thorough exposure would still further injure his case, refused to let the witness answer. This is all the more to be regretted, in view of the fact all events, is the theory. that it is in Mr. Dewdney's department that so many of the gross irregularities recently laid bare, have been discovered. It is to be lamented that a well-paid man like Mr. Dewdney should have so far for-gotten what he owes to his oath of office as encourage peculation for his benefit. 


