ONTARIO'S MINERAL WEALTH A more interesting report than that just issued by Mr. Archibald Blue, director of the Bureau of Mines of Ontario, has not been issued by any Government for many a Though the Bureau was only estabblished last year, and Mr. Blue did not begin his duties till midsummer, he has succeeded in gathering together a vast amount of useful information regarding the mines, mineral deposits and other products of the earth. This he has only accomplished by much travel and industrious personal Inquiry, and by the co-operation of the in-

Though many natural products in On-tario have been discovered and worked as far as a profitable market has presented itself for them, important discoveries are itself for them, important discoveries are being made every year and doubtless much of our wealth yet lies hidden in the earth. To collect and publish information and statistics on the mineral resources and the mining industries of the Province is declared to be one the chief objects of the Bureau of Mines, and well has Mr. Blue performed his duties in the initial year of his directorship. He points out, as showhis directorship. He points out, as show-ing the necessity for constant watchful-ness over our natural resources, that the ing the necessity for constant waterfulness over our natural resources, that the deposits of iron ore on the Atik-Okan and Mattawa Rivers, which are believed to be of wast extent, have for the most part been discovered within the last two years. The nickel ores of the Sudbury district were unknown six years ago, and during the past year many large and rich finds have been made. Promising gold leads have been found at various points between the Thessalon River and Temagami Lake, as well as in the county of Hastings. Extensive beds of kaolin are now known to exist on the eastern and western tributaries of the Moose River, the Abittibl and Missinaibi, valuable for the manufacture of fine pottery, and perhaps more valuable still for the production of aluminium, a semi-noble metal that seems likely to become almost as useful in the arts as iron itself. Then it is only four years ago that we became considered that having a clay suitable for the as useful in the acts as that we became con-scieus of having a clay suitable for the manufacture of pressed brick and archi-tectural terra cotta of the very best quality, tectural terra cotta of the very best quality, and we know now, what was not suspected at first, that a bed of it in the Medina formation is 400 to 600 feet in depth and lies exposed for feet in depth and lies exposed for more than 100 miles within easy reach of the principal cities of the Province. We know also that a lower formation (the Hudson River shales), upon which the city of Toronto stands, yields a clay which, if that be possible, is even superior to the Medina, but no one thought of experimenting upon the Hudson River shales for this purpose until a year ago. What the possibilities are for procuring natural gas this purpose until a year ago. What the possibilities are for procuring natural gas no one is so bold as to conjecture. It has been demonstrated to exist in great volume in the Medina sandstone in the counties of Welland and Haldimand, and in the Clinton limestone in Essex, and three or four days. limestone in Essex, and three or four ago a good flow is claimed to have been struck in the Trenton formation within a struck in the Trenton formation within a few miles of Toronto. In this way we are being treated to a succession of surprises, and the work of prospecting the Province for minerals has been scarcely begun as yet in a systematic and intelligent way. The Bureau of Mines has therefore, says the director, of Mines has therefore, any a large field to occupy even if limited in its scope to the recording of progress and discovery alone. But the aim will be to deal with progress and discovery in the widest sense, and in the most practical way aid in promoting the mining interests of the

He gives a summary, partly estimated, of the quantity and value of mineral production for the year 1891, with the wages paid. They have watered their stocks until it is next to impossible for anyone not in the ring to tell how much the real value of the properties controlled by them is, and they are paying handsome dividends on the money so invested. When they come to deal with the public they charge for their money so invested. When they come to deal with the public they charge for their products just as much as is possible, subject always to the knowledge that if they add more than the heavy duty to the fair market value of their goods wholesalers will be able to import cheaper goods from Great Britain or the United States. When these millionaire masters of ours have a Great Britain or the United States. When these millionaire masters of ours have a surplus stock they do not sell it at a reduced rate to the Canadian people, but they ship it to China, and sell it there at a much lower price than it is possible for Canadians to secure it at the mill door. How the public is fleeced may be gleaned from the Toronto World, which is a good "protectionist" authority. The World informs us, on information supplied by a

forms us, on information supplied by wholesaler, that shirting, which is now sol wholesaler, that sufficiently, which is now soft at the factory at 10½ cents a yard, could one year ago have been bought for S½ cents. Raw cotton cost then 9½ cents per pound, now it can be bought for 7½ cents. That is an advance of 2 cents a yard in the price of the manufactured material, and 13 cents

less for the raw cotton.

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

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

Verdict of the Coroner's Jury on the Phair Tragedy.

mportant Testimony Given at Last Night's Adjourned Meeting.

Evidence of George and Duncan Toles, Eye-Witnesses of the Affair—A Graphic Description of the Shooting—The Pest-Mortem Examination-The Jury Deliberate for Twenty Minutes.

Independent of the country Minutes.

The spectators at the Police Court stood several rows deep behind the barrier that separated them from the court proper last night when the adjourned inquest on the Phair tragedy was resumed. At 7:30 o'clock Coroner Flock and all the nineteen jurymen were on hand, and the prisoners, who had been taken from the jail and were waiting in the cells below, were sent for. They were brought in, hand-cuffed together by P. C. S Nickle and Egelton and placed in the dock, the onlookers craning their necks to get a glimpae of the two now notorious men. Wilson and Burke sat side by side. They listened attentively to the evidence, but whatever their feelings were they exhibited no outward sign of concern. They said little to each other, but at certain points of the evidence they would exchange a syllable or two and a smile.

The crown was represented by Mr. J. B. McKillop and the prisoners by their counsel, Mr. P. McPhillips. The first witness was George Toles, sworn—I am a farm laborer, working near Courtright, in Moore township. I was in London on Thursday, Oct. 13, with my brother Duncan. We were going up Richmond street, toward the C. P. R. station; we went into a tailor shop; I came out first and noticed a boy carrying a coat, and with him the prisoner Burke. They were going north. Burke seemed to be throwing his arms out. The detective stepped out of a shop, walked up to Burke and tapped him on the shoulder. Then he pulled Burke's hands behind his back, half-way round; then the detective clinched Burke by putting his arms around him, tripped him on the shoulder. Then he pulled Burke's hands behind his back, half-way round; then the detective clinched Burke by putting his arms around him, tripped him and threw him down. My brother and I walked south until we came to the spot. I heard the detective say to Burke, "You would strike me, would you?"

Then he called on me, to halp him.
