The Swiss Exhibit Closed Tempo-

Switzerland's Commissioner Claims His Government Has Been Treated
With Indignity.

Chicago, Ill., May 22.—The Swiss exhibit in the great manufactures and liberal art building is temporarily closed. James Perrenoud, the Swiss commissioner, claims that his Government has been treated with indignity by the United States customs officers, and he ordered the Swiss section to be closed until the Minister of Switzerland at Washington, who has been notified, has obtained satisfaction.

Saturday night P. B. Nebitzs, agent of Saturday night P. B. Nebitzs, agent of the 30 Swiss exhibitors, and having in charge over \$100,000 of exhibits, was arrested for selling a diamond brooch which was held in bond by the United States customs office. As soon as he was arrested two customs officers were put in charge of the exhibit, which was closed by them. Commissioner Perrenoud did not hear of it until late Saturday night, when one of his assistants teld him. He at once communicated with the customs house department and demanded to know why its officers had been placed in charge of the property under the guardianship of Swiss officers without notifying him. He also sent a dispatch to the Swiss Minister at Washington notifying him of the alleged indignity. Pending a settlement Commissioner Perrenoud temporarily closed the indignity. missioner Perrenoud temporarily closed the Swiss exhibit.

Speaking of the affair this morning the commissioner said that he did not hold that the United States officers were in the wrong in arresting the agent, but he claimed that he, as representative of Switzerland, should first have been communicated with. "As soon as I heard of Nebitz's arrest," he continued, "I formally dismissed him from the service. But I claim that the Swiss exhibit is practically on Swiss soil, and the United States officers have no right to trespass. I had issued orders to all the agents telling them they must, under no circumstances, seil any of the exhibits, under the penalty of the United States laws."

HE'S A POET.

A Local Russian Hebrew Who Writes Verse.

Escaped from the (zar's Tyranny-Docan't Like Protection, It's Another Kind of Despotism - The Way His Countrymen Are Oppressed.

There lives in the city a young and well educated Russian Jew, one who has felt the scourge of the Czar's tyrannic despotism, and withal a poet of no mean ability in the Hebrew and Jewish tongue. Although he

and withink poet of no mean ability in the Hebrew and Jewish tongue. Although he left Russia only three years age, and previous to that had not heard one word of English he now speaks it with fluency, and, not content with speaking the tongue, he has set about translating some of his peems into "English as she is spoken." S. Courbleth is the young man's name, and his home is on Simcoe street. Although only 23 years of age, Mr. Courbleth has already had more than an ordinary man's share of the ups and downs and vicissitudes of life. He was born of Jewish parents, on the borders of the Black Sea, at a place called Teofipole, State of Wolnien, near Odessa, Russia. When only 20 years old he managed by a series of thrilling events and escapades to clude the minions of the Czar and make his way to New York. There heresided for two years, and then made his way to Canada, settling down in London aboutten months age. "He came here for and make his way to New York. There he resided for two years, and then made his way to Canada, settling down in London about ten months ago. "I came here for the purpose of studying the English language, the people, their custom and ways of life," said Mr. Courbleth, in conversation with an Advertisear reporter a day or so ago. "Although I have been here such a short time, I have become acquainted with your politics, and take a deep interest in them. I sympathize with your paper and its stand, just because it is the most liberal and aims at the truth. I don't like this policy of protection, and do not care to see the masses ground down to enrich a few monopolists. My Russian experience with despotism and tyranny causes me to take this liberal view."

"Are the Russian Jews persecuted as terribly as the reports imply?"

"Well, they are persecuted, bitterly persecuted, but not so badly as you people think. There is probably what you might call 'a line too much' in the newspaper paragraphs relating to that matter. Talmage never saw the abject poverty, nisery and oppression of the poor; he saw none of their troubles. He simply met the Czar in all his pomp, got two or three nice wines and nicer stories, and then came back to this country prepared to laud the head of Russia to the sky. In Talmage's stand on the Jewish phase of Russian life he simply relates things which he is ignorant of and what he does not know anything about."

"What constitutes the oppression?"

"Well most people have the idea that the persecution consists of the driving from home and native land of our people, but this is not the case. We are treated there worse than your municipal government treats dogs, and if anyone wants to leave the country he has to steal away. We have no rights, human or divine, no privileges; and even our desires are subservient to the extortionate Russian tax collector. Our people pay the highest tribute and suffer difficulties of all kinds. This should not be if the Russian rulers would look at it in the right light, because the Russian Jew is of more use to the country than the Russian citizens themselves. A Jew conducting a business worth \$200 is taxed \$300 or \$400. If he is in the needle business, and although his stock may not be worth \$10, his taxes during the year will amount to \$800 or \$1,000. Our people are not allowed to farm; they are too gody business men and the Russian knows who puts the money in his treasury."

London, Tuesday, May 23.

THE DAY TO BE CELEBRATED. Probably in no other portion of the empire is the Queen's Birthday so generally celebrated as in the Dominion of Canada. It is the first holiday of the summer season, and the hard-working Canadian welcomes it as a breathing spell in which to enjoy those outdoor amusements which may come most readily to hand. We sometimes wonder what the community will do when the Queen retires from the throne, as in the natural order of things she must retire, and the Prince of Wales becomes King of Great Britain and Emperor of India. His birthday falls on Nov. 9, and fine weather though we often have in that month, no one will say that the climatic exhilarations are at all to be compared with those generally vouchsafed us in this the merry month of May. Perhaps we will adapt our-selves to conditions with as much ease as do the average citizens of a British borough. Unlike us, they do not regard it as a strict necessity to observe her Majesty's natal day as a civic holiday. These accommodating Britishers fix upon a suitable day, anywhere within a week or ten days of the 24th of May, and by corporation proclamation establish it as the "Queen's Birthday." We prefer the Canadian plan.

Queen Victoria herself has learned to take things easy. And really at her time of life she exhibits good sense in so doing. Her Majesty has now attained the ripe old age of 74, having been born at Kensington Palace, May 24, 1819. At the time of her birth she appeared to be far from the succession, but in six months after her advent her father, the tourth son of George III., died, and as neither George IV. nor his brothers, the Dukes of York and Clarence, had surviving legitimate issue, she became heir-presumptive to the throne on the accession of her uncle, William IV. in 1830. He died without issue seven years later. It was a memorable morning, that 20th of June, 1837, when the messengers arrived at Kensington Palace, sum moned the youthful Princess Victoria from her sweet slumbers and declared her to be her sweet slumbers and declared her to be her sweet slumbers and Ireland. Not Queen of Great Britain and Ireland. Not for over 100 years had the British people tor over 100 years had the British people to over 100 years had the British people tor over 100 years had the British people to over 100 years had the British p twelve years' reign-and when Queen Victoria, a plump, petit, comely maiden proceeded in state to Westminster Abbey on June 28, 1838, her Majesty was received with popular demonstrations, exceeding in warmth those extended to any of her predecessors for many a day. The Queen did not long regard it as right to live alone, and on February 10, 1840, she married her cousin, Prince Albert, of Saxe-Cobourg-Gotha. It was a love match, the chroniclers tell us, and in that respect alliances contracted by crowned heads.

For nearly 22 years her Majesty enjoyed
the association and help of the Consort, but on Dec. 14, 1861, Prince Albert died through an attack of typhoid fever—a disease which nearly caused the death of the Prince of Wales ten years later. Since the death of her husband, the

Oueen has lived a quieter life than any gueen has heed a duter has spent her time chiefly between Windsor Castle, the Isle of Wight, and her Highland residence, Balmoral. Some have thought that if her Majesty could have been prevailed upon to establish a place of abode, for even a limited period, in some of the many beauti-ful spots in Ireland, there would have been fewer political disturbances in that island. Be that as it may, it must be conceded that the Queen and her family have a good time. The Queen has borne sway for a longer period than that chronicled of any English sovereign since William I. ascended the throne in 1066, with two exceptions, Henry III. was king for 56 years, and George III. ascended the throne in 1760 enviable record. The Queen's 55 years' reign has witnessed far more real progress than that achieved during the long term of office of the two kings named. It might have been different if Victoria had attempted to exercise the so-called "divine right," as some of her predecessors, to the great injury of the nation, were moved to do. This Queen has wisely enjoyed the perquisites of the sovereignty, and refrained from asserting her queenly functions, except at thosuggestion of the Prime Minister for the time being. It is because the Queen has wisely assumed that she is the figurehead of government, that it is the people who rule through their elected representatives, that her Majesty lives the life of ease and comfort that she does. Were she to below

the management of the army and navy, she would not only give herself much unneces-sary trouble, but hasten the day when even royal figurehead would be dispensed with as an unnecessary interference with the self-governing power of the nation. As it is, the Queen moves from royal residence to royal residence at her sweet pleasure; she goes abroad or she stays at home just as it suits her. She is not called upon to picket her railways with armed troops in order to prevent Nihilists from blowing her sky high, as the people know that in all matters affecting them they, and not their ruler, are the real arbiters. She is even reasonably assured that the heir to the throne has long since ceased to sow his wild cereals, and that he fully recognizes, to the satisfaction of the people, that never again will the British tolerate a sovereign who does not set a good example to those who place him over them. For all these blessings the Queen must this day be tolerably thankful. Many a conday be tolerably thankful. Manya con-tinental sovereign would gladly exchange situations with her, and for that matter the continental peoples would be com-paratively well off if they had the conditions of life guaranteed in this enlight-ened age to the British people.

THE Opposition in the Ontario Legisature went straight against the plebiscite on the liquor question. Even Mr. Marter does not desire to see where the people stand. But the people will be enabled to give an untrammeled verdict on the question, nevertheless.

MR. MEREDITH CONDEMNS THE PLEBISCITE.

Of course, Mr. Meredith is opposed to the popular vote on the question of prohibition. If it had been a royal commission, or a measure that would bring legitimate temperance effort into disrepute, he might have indorsed it, but a plebiscite -never! It is not the way that they do things in the old world. It will only show whether or inot the people are ready to support and to enforce prohibition. It will only afford a correct idea of how the electors view this great question. That is

all. Therefore Mr. Meredith opposes it. If Mr. Meredith had been in public life when municipal institutions took the place of family compact and close corporation methods, he could have been relied on to champion the last named, and denounce popular local government as revolutionary, ecause it was not established in Great

Britain. If Mr. Meredith had been in Parliament when the £ s. d. system was made to give place to decimal coinage, he would have assailed the proposition to introduce dollars and cents as likely to bring ruin on the country !

The argument that a method is wrong because it is in advance of that adopted by another portion of the world is puerile.

What is needed in this Province, and in

every portion of the Dominion, especially in regard to those matters that affect the habits of the people, is to know what the populace desires, and is prepared to sus-tain. That made known beyond a reasonable doubt, and the plebiscite is a powerful aid to definite a conclusion, then will be a seasonable time to hold the Government to strict responsibility, according as it carries out or disregards the popular mandate.

Painted, Powdered and Laced, They Swarm at London Afternoon Tear.

A new type of masculinity has been discovered by Hearth and Home, which goes vigorously for the weaknesses of the sex. Of late, says the writer, in London at any rate, a certain type of man has become very objectionably prominent—a weak-kneed, miserable, vain specimen of humanity, who has literally no redeemable points that we can discover, and who yet gives himself all the airs of one to whom the universe ought to do unquestioning homage. The modern effeminate young man is a terrible creature, and he is beginning to swarm in London society. He is to be seen at first nights, waggling to his place in the stalls with a gait which he imagines to be graceful, tut which is in reality painfully absurd. His thin, high-pitched voice is audible at private views, pronouncing a languid and final decision upon the merits of the works of art exhibited. He trips up with bird-like movement, on high-heeled boots, through the park and rustles into concert rooms, gathering his long skirted coat around him delicately ere he adjusts himself in his seat to hear music, which he always professes to adore. He stands against the walls of ballrooms—unable to dance because nebody asks him and he could hardly be so manly as to invite any-body—with posed head and rounded eyes, intent upon his artistic pose, and anxious that every gaze should be upon him. He chatters feebly at atternoon tea parties, where he feels at shome and where he inveighs against athleticism and unrefined and dangerous sports, such as cricket and football. He frequently affects a slight foreign accent—French if he can manage it—in talking, and he is very fond of flourishing about his white hands, which he takes care to have perpetually manicured and on which he displays a variety of rings. He often clasps bangles around his wrists, walks out in openwork stockings and gloves with a dozen buttons, and laces or straps himself in that his waist may be visible to the naked eye.

Nor does he always stop here. It is an absolute fact that a larger number of young men get themselves up. The rougepot and the powder-puff find a place upon their toilet table. Their eyebrows are darkened; their hair is often crimped or curled, and sometimes even dyed; and their figures are trained and artistically improved. A fashionable West End hair-dresser linformed us that he had quite a number of young men among his customers who came regularly to have their hair dyed blonds, which he declared was the fashionable color among men. People who go about a great deal in the West End must have met occasionally with men—gentlemen, too—who paint their faces. At one of the brilliant first nights of the present dramatic season there was a man sitting in the stalls with rouged checks and darkened cyebrows, who is not only conspicuous in soliety, but who has been much about the court. Another young man, a well-known baronet, on one occasion acknowledged that he occasionally strove to improve his complexion and increase the brilliancy of his fine eyes by the restrained use of rouge and bismuth. 

RADICAL WORKINGMEN

Single Tax on Land Values and No on Improvements.

That is What Organized Labor Wants and Will Try to Get.—They Say It Will be Good for the Farmers and Good Alse for Most Other People,

During the past year some interesting developments have taken place in the attitude of organized labor, which are especially worthy the attention of those who like to know how large bodies of their fellow-citizens are thinking on great public questions, however radical and startling may be the ideas that that thought develops.

The first occurrence which called public

The first occurrence which called public attention to the radical trend of economic thought in the labor ranks was in connection with the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, which held its sessions in the old Parliament buildings. There the following resolution was introduced:

"The earth, with its lands, forests, mines and other natural opportunities, is the gift of nature, and not to a part but to the whole of humanity.

"Whilst men have an unquestionable right to charge for the crops they raise, the houses they build, the services they render, we denounce as utterly unjust that any man should be allowed to charge for the land and other natural gifts that he never made.

made.

"The value that accrues to land from the presence and concentration of population should not go to the enrichment of speculators and collectors of ground rent, but should be applied to public purposes.

"To impose taxes on improvements is to discourage the beneficent use of capital in the employment of labor and enrichment of the country, whilst encouraging its use injuriously in speculation and monopoly.

"Therefore, be it resolved that we urge the Provincial Government to grant municipalities the power to remove all taxes from the products of industry.

"And be it resolved further that we urge upon the Dominion Government the removal of all duties and imposts levied on the products of industry, either imported or manufactured in the country, except such as are levied with a view to restricting the use and consumption of any article or product held to be injurious, and the substitution therefor, as a means of raising the revenue required for the government of the country, of a single tax on land and natural opportunities."

Surely, a pretty thorough-going piece of radicalism! Yet is found favor in the eyes of the assembled delegates, and the only thing which prevented it from passing by a sweeping majority was the suggestion that it would be better to let the local organizations pass upon it. So it was ordered to be printed and forwarded accordingly, and will be finally dealt with at the next meeting of the congress.

Since then, the local organizations have been dealing with the resolution, and assembly after assembly have indorsed it by large majorities—amongst others the Trades and Labor Councils of Toronto, Hamilton, Ottawa and other places; so that there is no doubt of an overwhelming vote to finally pass it at the next Trades Congress.

Congress. Some questions were asked of a person who is well informed on the subject, as to the scope of the proposed measure somewhat as follows:

"What do you expect to accomplish by the single tax?"

"We expect chiefly to accomplish the destruction of monopoly, which presses hardest of all upon the workingman. The single tax is a tax upon land values only, apart from improvements. Therefore, it means that there is no tax upon buildings, fences, drains, barns or any improvement

burden to the farmer?"

"On the contrary, the farmer will be greatly benefited by it. Remember that the single tax is on the value of land, not on the area of land. Therefore the bulk of Dominion taxation would fall where the bulk of land values? They are not in the great land values? They are not in the rural townships; they are in the towns and cities. There are several acres of land in Toronto that are worth about \$1,000,000 per acre. That is where the single tax would hit hardest. As to municipal taxation, such a tax would encourage good farming by not fining or taxing a man because he improved his place. In a word, the single tax favors the user of the land at the expense of the mere owner; and the greatest user of the land is the farmer. His interest as a user is far greater than his interest as owner."

"But does not all this mean a great and sudden revolution?"

troduced as gradually as you like. That is the way it has been introduced in British Columbia and elsewhere." "Has it then been put in practical operation?"

It has been practically adopted in Manitoba, New Zealand, New South Wales and other places; besides British Columbia, where buildings etc., can only be taxed to half their value, whilst land must be taxed to its full value. It is said that New Zealand has become very prosperous since its introduction."



TOOK OUT THEIR TEETH.

A Windsor Teacher's Substitute Prac-tices Dental Surgery on the Scholars.

A Windsor Teacher's Substitute Practices Denial Surgery on the Scholars.

Windsor, May 22.—During the past two weeks Miss O'Connor, one of the teachers at the fourth ward separate school in Windsor, has been sick, and her place was filled by Adolph Girardot, of Sandwich, Girardot is about 22 years old and a student of the Detroit College of Medicine. His father is inspector of schools for Essex county and his brother is mayor of Sandwich.

Girardot noticed that two or three of the children had the toothache, and examining their mouths he found, or claimed to find, decayed teeth. This put a brilliant idea in his head. All but two or three of the 50 little boys allowed him to examine their mouths and pull any teeth which he thought needed pulling. One child only 6 years old had eight teeth extracted. Others contributed two or three, and some only one tooth.

While this was going on the teacher in the other room was asked if some of her pupils might have their teeth pulled, and as she made no objection 24 little girls got excused long enough to visit Girardot's room and add to his collection of teeth.

When Girardot dismissed school for the day and went home he carried 125 teeth, rolled up in a newspaper, and exhibited them to his friends.

Friday morning Miss O'Connor was well enough to take her school, and Girardot's services were not required. Many of the pupils were kept at home by their parents, however, for fear of losing what teeth they had left, and Miss O'Connor had to hunt them up and promise to leave their melars alone.
