## IDEOUS CRIME ORDINARY PRACTICE WITH GERMANS

French Commission Finds the Proof of Deliberate Plans For Burning Villages.

ENEMY'S CLAIMS UNTRUE

Killing of Civilians Not Always Due to Troops Being Assaulted.

Paris, Jan. 7-12:25 p.m.-The com mission appointed on September 23 to inquire into accusations that German officers had acted "savagely and in humanly" against French civilians and soldiers says in its report, made pubde today by the French cabinet:

"We must conclude that there never has been a war between civilized nations of so savage and ferocious a character as that waged upon our soil by our emplacable adversaries. Pillage ravishing, burning, murder, are or-dinary practices of our enemies and facts collected in many cases prove that the German claims that the killing of civilians was due to firing of the populace on troops are unfounded.

Ample Proof.
"We found proof of the existence in the German army not only of a sys-tematic plan for burning villages, but the possession of elaborate materials for this purpose, including torches, grenades, fuses, oil sprayers, sticks of inflammable matter and sacks of tab-lets composed of very inflammable

compressed powder.
"The commission affirms that it has distinguished carefully between fires caused by bombardments and those said to have been set by hand, when no fighting was in progress. It is stated that the object was to intimidate the population, thus spreading terror and panic ahead of the invaders.

Ravishings Common. "Ravishings of women and girls were so frequent that the number of cases established was only a small part of those which might have been investi-gated," the commission says. "The victims of these odious acts generally refused to testify, because it would

compromise their future."

The cabinet has been withholding the report of the commission because, it is said, it did not desire further to excite public feeling. It was only upon the demand of Georges Clemenceau, the former Premier, and others, that the cabinet decided to make public the report. ## MIGHT HAVE SPLIT THE GERMAN ARMY

Correspondent Tells How the British Missed Chance On the Aisne.

OCCURRED EARLY IN WAR

Picture Drawn of Positions Held By Rival Armies In December.

A town on the Aisne, France, Dec. 15—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—A little battle graveyard by the roadside, only a half-dozen soldier graves with wooden crosses, marks the high-water point reached by the British in the battle of the Aisne in September. It lies near the Chemin Des Dames (road of the Ladies), which coughly parallels the Aisne three or a short distance from the battered sugar factory city of Troyon, for which the Royal Sussex Regiment, the King's Royal Rifles and the Royal North Lancashire Regiment paid so heavy a price in the battle of September 15. Field Marshal Sir John French registers the names in his report of October 8, in which he tells how the British forces, following up the retirement of the Germans from the Marne line, crossed the Aisne east of Soissons and fought their way to the top of the ridge of hills on the north bank, where they were checked and held by the German

# **RUSSIA CAPTURES**

Has Placed New Army on the Offensive in the Mlawa Region.

BAYONETS CHASE ENEMY

Przemysl Garrison Force Annihilated in Recent Sortie.

[Canadian Press.] PETROGRAD, Jan. 6 .- The official statement from the Russian staff in Poland shows that the Russians have placed another army on the offensive in Mlawa region, and have captured the village of Roserowa, driving the enemy out at the point of the bayonet, and that in Galicia the Czar's forces have occupied Sypot and Kameral, Gurahumora and Bouksohla, the later two places on the direct route to Transylvania.

The official statement follows: Our troops on January 5 made a sudden attack against the village of Roserowa, to the west of the road from Przasnysz to Mlawa, near Groudouck. The enemy, who occupled this village, were entirely bayoneted. We also took some

prisoners.



COPENHAGEN (Via London), Jan. 6.—9:15 p.m.—A special dispatch to the National Tidende from Constantinople says the former German cruiser Goeben, which now flies the Turkish flag, struck two Russian mines in the neighborhood of the Bosphorus and was seriously damaged. She has two big holes on her water-line, and it will take two or three months to repair her. This fact, the dispatch adds, has been kept secret from the people of Constantinople.


