TURKEY WILL OPEN STRAITS TO RUSSIA IF RUSSIAN FORCES LEAVE TURK LANDS

Constantinople Wants Muscovite Armies To Find Only Request To Resume Withdraw and Black Sea Fleet Demobilized And In Return Will Give Free Passage of the Dardanelles, While Sultan's Armies Are To Remain Intact.

London, Jan. 5 .- Free passage of the Dardanelles for Russian ships, Russian evacuation of Turkish territory and the demobilization of the Russian Black Sea fleet, are provided for in the draft of Turkish peace terms presented to Russia, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Petrograd. Turkey, it is provided, is to retain her active army in consequence of the continuation of the war against the Entente.

Many shops, especially in the west end, did not open, as they had no meat to offer for sale. Others had laid in stocks of rabbits, which found a ready sale at 75 cents to \$1 each. Wilkesbarre, Pa., Jan. 5.—One hundred men and boys were trapped in the Barnum mine of the Pennsylvania Coal Company at Pittston today, when the middle vein caved in, letting down thousands of tons of coal and rock. The main gangway was not entirely cut off, and most of the imprisoned workers got out safely. About twenty were slightly hurt, and there remain rehind the fall seven miners of whom the company officials can get no tiace. The cave-in is one of the largest since the disaster in the Twin Shaft mine, in which scores of men were entombed and never rescued.

Mr. Lloyd George said that during the last few days he had taken special pains to ascertain the views and the attitude of representative men of all sections of thought in the country.

He had read the statement of labor's war aims, he continued, and had discussed the subject of the war alms with former Premier Asquith and with Viscount Grey. Had the Nationalist leaders in Ireland not been engaged with the tangled problem of Irish self-government he would have been happy to exchange views with them. He had also consulted representatives of Great Britain's overseas dominions.

Not a War of Aggression, Not a War of Aggression.

As a result of these discussions said Mr. Lloyd George, although the Government alone was responsible for the actual language he proposed using, there was a national agreement as to the character and purpose of the nation's war aims and peace conditions. He was speaking, therefore, not merely the mine of the Government, but the mine of the nation and the Empire.

"We are not fighting a war of aggression against the German people," declared the premier, "The destruction or disruption of Germany or the German people has never been a war aim with us since the first day of the war to now. The British people never almed at breaking up the German people or the disintegration of their state. Our wish is not to destroy Germany's great position in the world, but to turn her aside from schemes of military domination to devote her military domination to devote her strength to beneficent tasks." The premier declared Great Britain was not fighting to take Constantinople from Turkey nor destroy Austria-Hingary.

"We are not fighting," he said.

NO GAIN WILL COME IN HOLDING POTATOES FOR HIGHER PRICES

Food Controller Says Prices Must Not Go Beyond Present Level.

OTTAWA, Jan. 4.-Higher prices for OTTAWA, Jan. 4.—Higher prices for potatoes than those now prevailing will not be permitted. The food controller is sending a letter to this effect to all wholesale handlers of potatoes, stating that any attempt to secure higher prices will be dealt with promptly. If retail dealers should attempt to charge an unreasonable profit on potatoes, the food controller is prepared to fix the margin of profit and if necessary to fix maximum prices. In a statement issued tonight Mr. Hanna said:

"A recent survey of the situation by this office indicates that there is still a large supply of potatoes in the hands of the growers and dealers sufficient to meet a continuous and heavy demand neet a continuous and heavy demand intil the 1918 crop will be available. All handlers of potatoes should under-stand the situation clearly and realize that a special effort to keep the public plentifully supplied at reasonable prices is necessary in order that no part of the large crop of the last season be "In order to prevent possible loss "In order to prevent possible loss later in the season the winter movement of potatoes must be stimulated by every possible means. Potatoes are the only food of which Canada has a large surplus not in great demand for export. No effort should be spared, therefore, in using all the potatoes that can be eaten."



PREMIER MISLED HIS EXCELLENCY **ELECTION TRICK**

Mewburn's Latest Statement Shows Up Spurious Order Passed.

THE BAIT FOR FARMERS

Parliament Alone Has Power to Alter the Military Service Act.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

OTTAWA, Jan. 4. - The statement given out by Gen. Mewburn yesterday,

given out by Gen. Mewburn yesterday, coupled with the issue of a special number of the Canada Gazette today, form an interesting commentary upon Government methods prior to the election for the securing of votes. The special issue of the Gazette, which is dated December 31, contains an order-in-council passed on December 3, which reads as follows:

"His excellency the governor-general-in-council, on the recommendation of the Right Hon. Sir Robert Laird Borden, the prime minister, and under and in virtue of the provisions of the military service act, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that in any case where a person engaged in agriculture has applied for exemption, and such exemption has been refused, the minister of militia and defence, if he is of the opinion that the services of such person are essential for promoting agricultural production, may, by order under his hand, discharge such person from military service."

By virtue of the order, Gen, Mewburn, minister of militia in the new Borden cabinet, announced publicly on the platform to all and sundry that he would take such action wherever he considered it necessary or rightful. It was in vain that Liberal speakers pointed out that an act of Parliament could not be interfered with except by Parliament; that the military service act did not specifically exempt farmers, and that it was only in the power of the tribunals appointed under the act to grant such exemption. The promises of the minister of militia, backed by the prime minister, were taken at their face value by thousands of the electorate.

What Mewhurn Now Says.

Mhat Mewburn Now Says.

Almost simultaneously with the publication of the Gazette containing the order there was published the somewhat remarkable statement of Major-Gen. Mewburn, repudiating utterly the statements made by him on the public platform prior to the election. Says the minister of militia:

"It is pointed out that it was not intended, nor was it within the power of the minister of militia, to abrogate the provisions of the military service act, and the executive action above referred to could not in any case be taken except when men were actually called up under the act. It follows, therefore, that farmers who failed to secure exemption at the hands of the local tribunals should prosecute their appeals in the usual manner, as provided in the military service act. Applications for leave to appeal should be addressed in all cases to the registrar of the district concerned. If a farmer who has actually joined up still considers that he has grounds for exemption, he should state his case to his commanding officer, who will take the necessary action on his behalf."

Governor-General Misled. In the light of the above it is evident that the governor-general-in-council was deliberately misled by his adviser, "the Right Hon. Sir Robert Laird Borden, the prime minister," who recommended the spurious order of December 3, and that Major-Gen. S. C. Mewburn, minister of militia, either deliberately or unwittingly, spread the falsehood conveyed in the order and deceived the

FIVE SOLDIERS KILLED IN C.P.R. COLLISION AT DORVAL STATION

Two Others Missing and Score Are Injured.

ALL RETURNED HEROES

Vancouver Men, Homeward Bound, Come to Grief in Collision.

MONTREAL, Jan. 4.—Five soldiers are known to be dead and two other missing and believed to have been killed, as a result of a local train on the Canadian Pacific Railway from Montreal to Pointe Fortune running into the rear of a train bound for Vancouver with a large number of soldiers aboard about 6:30 p.m. this evening near Dorval station.

The killed are Ptes Thomas Kelly, Hunter, Mackie, Clark and Lalonde, ail of Vancouver.

About twenty persons were injured, the majority of them slightly. Among them are Bugler Cross, Ptes. Irwin, Dickson and A. R. Kelley, who were brought to the Royal Victoria Hospital, this city.

According to Bugler Cross there were 250 men on the train bound for Vancouver. The train was traveling slowly near Dorval, when it ran into a switch. The Pointe Fortune train was traveling at a rapid rate and crashed into the military train.

The C. P. R. official statement said

The C. P. R. official statement said the Pointe Fortune train ran past a signal set against it and struck the rear part of the westbound train containing a number of colonist cars. The train for the west, so the C. P. R. officials say, had taken a siding near Dorval to allow the Pointe Fortune train to pass. The C. P. R. officials also say six were killed and about thirty injured.

In the impact the middle cars of the military train telescoped, and it was owing to this that the fatalittes and injuries occurred. The last car was shoved up on top of some cars ahead, but fortunately this had been vacated shortly before the accident occurred. Several men were pinned beneath the wreckage, and it was some time before thy could be liberated. Ambulances and doctors were rushed to Westmount station, and the killed and injured were brought there on C. P. R. trains. Most of the men on the train were returned soldiers who had seen service in France. Pte, Thomas Kelly had been wounded three times in France and had been back only about three months.
