Railway Machinists Demand More Wages TREATY THAT DEVIATES IN ANY and Better Hours WAY FROM WILSON'S 14 POINTS

Count von Brockdorf Rantzau in Address Before German National Assembly States Enemy's Attitude-Socialization Commission Resigns Due to Obstructive Tactics From Economic Bureau.

Berlin, April 11.-Count von Brockdorf Rantzau, foreign minister, speaking before the National Assembly at Weimar today said Germany would not sign a peace treaty which deviated in any essential from President Wilson's fourteen points.

The resignation of the whole socialization commission, which has been rumored for some time, was formally announced last night. This action was due, according to declaration made public in the Vorwaerts by Dr. Kantzky, Independent Socialist, to the fact that "from its birth it had to combat obstructive tactics from the imperialistic economic bureau." It was, therefore, unable, it is said, to make proper plans for the socialistic reconstruction of Germany. A special dispatch from Weimar states that the Government has abandoned for the present its intention to transfer further sessions of the national assembly to Berlin, owing to the unsuitable condition of the Reichstag building, which for months has been used for a barracks for revolutionary troops. It is estimated that four months' work would be required at an expenditure of 600,000 marks, to properly

SALARY INJUSTICES

Are Not Satisfied With Existing Conditions.

ALLEGE DISCRIMINATION Show Difference in Cost of Living Does Not Warrant It.

To The Editor of The Advertiser:
The members of Branch No. 4, Federated Association of Letter Carriers, wishes to correct certain statements that appeared in a local paper, stating that the letter carriers of London were satisfied with conditions as they are.
The carriers west of the great lakes receive \$130 per year more than the carriers east of the great lakes. Why? The department of labor statistics show that on December 31, 1913, it cost a family of five persons, on an average, in the 60 cities of Canada, for four items of living, viz.: food, rent, fuel, light, \$14.02 per week, or \$549.04 for the year.

How It Climbed.

December 31, 1918, the same statistics show that the cost of living for a family of five persons had climbed to \$21.61 per week for the four items mentioned. For the three years (1913 to 1917) letter carriers have had to bear the increased cost of living without remuneration.
