





ONTARIO'S CROP **BULLETIN ISSUED**

Fall Wheat Is Classed As Better Than Average Yield

This Year.

Fodder Supplies Are the Heaviest in Some Years-A Poor Fruit Season.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Toronto, Nov. 17.—The following statement of crop conditions in Ontario on the 1st of November, based upon the returns of a large number of correspondents, has been issued by the Ontario Department of Agriculture. It is the final crop bulletin for the year.
Fall Wheat—While a number of correspondents speak of the yield and quality of fall wheat as being the best for years, others complain of the grain being less plump than usual, owing to dry weather at the time of filling. Taken as a whole, however, fall wheat may be classed as better than the average crop. Spring Wheat—Less spring wheat is being grown than formerly, goose wheat LABOR ORGANIZATIONS being grown than formerly goose wheat being the variety chiefly raised. The crop was fully up to the standard this

year in every respect.

The New Fall Wheat—An increased acreage of wheat has been sown this fall, and as most favorable conditions existed at seeding, and since that time, the cro is now looking more promising. In fact some correspondents express a fear tha the young fall wheat may have too much top for entering the winter. Only scat-tering mention was made of injury to tering mention was made of injury to the crop by Hessian fly, wire-worm, or other insects. Sowing ranged from the last week of August to the first week of October, the bulk of the crop being put in during the first and second week of September. Dawson's Golden Chaff is still the favorite variety of fall wheat, Red Clawson and over forty other vari-eties following

Red Clawson and eties following.

The Grain Crop. Barley has turned out well, taking the province over. The sample was generally plump, and while some discoloration was reported, that is not now considered a serious drawback, as most of the barley raised in this province is fed to live stock.

Oats—Oats were rather short in the straw, but the heads were well filled straw, but the heads were well filled with grain of good weight, and where the crop was not knocked down by rainstorms just before cutting, it was an unusually good one. On account of wet weather when harvesting, oats were harder to gather than in the case of the other spring grains.

Rye—This grain is not largely raised

in Ontario, but where grown it is classed this season as from fair to good. Peas—This crop has been somewhat The vines suffered from drouth, and a green aphis also affected them, and as a result the pods were but poorly filled in most cases. The pea weevil was also reported in several localities.

Mixed Grains—Correspondents are hardly as enthusiastic over the growths. hardly as enthusiastic over the growing of mixed grains as they were a year ago. It is claimed by some that it is difficult It is calmed by some that it is difficult to get the various grains to properly ripen together; but others still point to the advantage of a greater production by the combination. I notice that Mr. Daly doesn't attempt to justify that firebrand utterance, though he attacks me for condemning it.
