







#### THE CASEMENT CURTAIN THAT COMES CLOSE TO THE GLASS

These fashion letters are not confined to wearing apparel, but furnish authoritative information on the art of home furnishing.

THE FASHIONABLE WINDOW curtains its glass closely. And the fabric that veils it is usually selected with a genuine consideration for the characteristics of the rest of the room.

ONE ROOM, FOR INSTANCE, may take the colored casement curtain to emphasize its dominant color note and unify its color scheme. Another may use the casement curtain to lend a note of positive color to an otherwise neutral-tinted background. Still another room—the more conservative type may prefer the unobtrusive glass curtain in white, cream or other neutral color.

JUST ONE FASHION RULE that holds good for all of these closely veiled windows. The curtains must always be made of a sheer translucent fabric that brightens the room on dark days and softens the light on bright ones. For the rest—the color and the texture of the material—the room itself is responsible.

THE ROOM WITH A FLAIR FOR COLOR nearly always carries its color scheme over into its window curtains, that are made of silk, net, gauze or tissue in the shade that harmonizes best with the room or its furnishings.

IF. FOR INSTANCE, there are window hangings of many colored chintz or cretonne, the glass curtain is very likely to emphasize the color note in the cretonne that is most closely allied to the dominant note in the rest of the room.

IF THE FURNITURE is upholstered in some rich fabric, the bright glass curtain may be the color link that brings the furniture and the walls into the right relationship. And the sun sifting through the silk mesh of the curtains may make them glint like the metal threaded brocade of the furniture.

IF THE ROOM is furnished in the 18th century French or English, with the pastel-tinted walls that belonged to those periods, the casement curtains may introduce a deeper shade of the wall color and so lend character to the background.

MANY WINDOWS are making ready for spring with new golden or peach

colored curtains to give the illusion of spring sunlight. Or they are introducing the spring note with curtains in one of the tulip or sweetpea shades, or in a delicate new-leaf green.


