

There is much conjecture this morning as to the probable reasons for the brief cruise of the Port Arthur fleet. According to a dispatch to the Daily Express from Che Foo the navigation of the harbor of Port Arthur is seriously impeded by ice, which may have been the reason why the fleet went out Another supposition is that the vessels had been so long laid up at Port Arthur that the admiral in command desired to ascertain how they would behave at sea.

The statement is published here that the draft of a treaty which Japan originally submitted to Russia tained seven articles, the first of which provided for the mutual recognition of the integrity and independence of China and Korea. The second recognized Japan's right to advise Korea on finances and general administration.
The third stipulated that Russia should not hinder the development of Japan's commercial interest in Korea. The fourth recognized that Japan was entitled to send troops to Korea in the event of disturbances, such troops to be withdrawn when peace had been restored. The fifth article provided that no fortifications be erected on the southern coast of Korea, and guaranteed the freedom of the Straits of Korea The sixth article arranged for the eventual junction of the Korean and Manchurian railroad systems. 





An Appeal Made to the People of Western Ontario.

The British and Foreign Bible Solety was instituted in a meeting of the Tract Society in the house of Joseph Hardcastle, London, England, March 7, 1804, the sole object of which was to supply every man in every part of the world with the Word of God, in his own tongue wherein he was born. During the hundred years of its existence it has issued 180,000,000 copies of the Scriptures-complete or parts-in 370 different languages and dialects, and is promoting translations or revisions in over 100 languages at the present time. It employes 850 colporteurs and over 650 native Bible women. It spends £700 sterling every working hour from January to December. Notwithstanding this work, wonfalls far short of the purpose for which it was instituted. It looks out on the 300,000,000 of India, the 400,000,000 of China, the 5,000,000 in South America, and the many others in whose homes the Bible has never yet been found and in sympathy with these dark and Col. # HIGHEST IN SIX WEEKS

Thermometer Registered Thirty-Nine Above This Morning.

Thirty-nine degrees above zero, the highest registration in six weeks, was recorded by the thermometer at the local observatory in South London at 8 o'clock this morning. On Jan. 23, 38 mess, and around the board were Col. degrees was registered, the highest in that month.

The present thaw was ushered in last night by weird disturbances of the elements. In the early evening a nasty rain set in, which soon gave way to a pattering hail. This was later followed by rain, which in a short time turned to sleet, rendering the sidewalks as slippery as skating rinks. On toward midnight vivid flashes of lightning lit up the sky, the electrical Col. Young expressed the regret felt assturbances lighting up for periods the entire city.

Many people who chanced to be out, as well as those who were attracted to their windows by the glare, imagined that a huge fire was in progress in the northeastern portion of the city. They were correct in their imagination but no damage was done, as the blaze was caused by Canadian Pacific Railway employes, who were destroying the cars wrecked in the accident at Adelaide street crossing yesterday

The street railway company scented danger in the gathering sleet and ice on the rails and roadbed, and all night cars patroled the streets to keep the lines open. As a result night owl pedestrians were treated to a brilliant electrical display, for the wires were covered with ice, and as the cars sped along lights of various hues from the trolleys lit up the night. This morning the drizzling rain con-

tinued, and the thaw undermining the snow on the sidewalks, walking was made very difficult.





## WOMAN IN MEDICAL WORLD

MISS M. C. THOMAS SAYS MEN ARE EVER UNGENEROUS IN THIS REGARD.

Interesting View of the Position of Women in the Pursuit of Medical Training.

Women's position in the medical world was described by Miss M. Carey Thomas president of Bryn Mawr College, at the fitteenth anniversary celebration of the New York Intirmary for women and children.

The object of Miss Thomas's address was primarily to enlist financial support for the infirmary, but in doing this she gave an interesting view of the difficulties which women have had to compete with in entering the medical profession. One conclusion which she arrived at was that the men have made it particularly difficult for the women to get along in this country. She said in part:

Channels of the least resistance for women have been the professions of teaching and nursing. Neither profession affords men as large pecuniary rewards as business life, and both require for success patience, sympathy and service, qualities which women's lives have

Medicine, on the contrary, though closely allied to nursing and requiring that women seem pre-eminently to pos-sess, is one of the most lucrative of all professions and one into which the influx of men have been phenomenally great "They are very 'dressy' in their peculiar way. 





Men who have lingered too long in these chambers of new wine when the doors are closed have before now been overcome by the deadly fumes.
From October to March the wine stays

in the barrel. It is tasted and poured into a gargantuan hogshead of polished oak. Paddles revolve within the hogshead, so that the brew is well mixed. A certain quantity of old wine is added of the brand from year to year. The wine at this stage is still; it does not sparkle. It is crude to the taste, but the flavor and bouquet are already distinctive, though they need time to be matured and developed. This blending of champagne is a delicate work. On it depends to a certain extent the future

NOT ALLOWED TO SLEEP. Now the wine is bottled and corked and borne away to the famous cellars, But champagne must not be allowed to sleep. Every six months the bottles are moved from one part of the league-long cellars to another. When these years have gone by a sediment has formed on the side of the bottle, which must be removed. Sometimes it adheres to the glass, and men hammer the bottle on a small bench to loosen it. It is a curious sight to see half a dozen men standing in a row, each with a champagne bottle in either hand, smashing them down up-on the plank. Very strong is the glass, for few bottles are broken.
